MINISTER OF RAILWAYS DEFENDS RATES BOOST

Intimation by Hon. Dr. Reid That Any Appeal to Cabinet Will Be Fruitless—Reviews Transportation Situation—Thinks National Railways Will Equal C.P.R. Management—Advocates Deepening St. Lawrence for Ocean Boats.

If the minister of railways, Hon. Dr. Reid, voices the views of the government on the question of increased freight and passenger rates, his appeal to the cabinet to disallow the increase authorized by the railway commission will be fruitless.

In opening, the minister of railways expressed his thanks for the invitation to be present and tendered his congratulations on the growing success of the National Exhibition. He believed no country in the world was so well served by a show of this character as Canada by the Toronto Exhibition.

were working for the best interests of the public. Dealing with the amalgamations, the minister said a situation had developed in which the Canadian Northern had not been able to carry on, and the government had been obliged to take it over.

Having a government railway, there might be an impression abroad that the government would be prone to quarrel with the C.P.R., but that was not the case. The Canadian Pacific was the pioneer transportation system of Canada, and it had done more in developing Canada and advertising this country abroad than any other agency.

Referring then to the National Railways, Dr. Reid said they had a management there that was doing its best for the interests of the country, and, altho it had just got started, he believed it would equal the splendid management of the C.P.R.

steamships to their system, and they now had 250,000 tons of shipping. "I have been trying to follow in the footsteps of the C.P.R.," continued the speaker, "and if we do, we will succeed with the national railways."

Besides, these mentioned Canada had other transportation systems on the inland waterways. Starting with a 9-foot canal at Welland, improvements had been gradually made, and had it not been for the war, ocean boats would have by this time been running up the lakes to Port Arthur and Fort William.

Improving Highways. With these developments by railways and on the lakes, he was glad to see that the highways were not being neglected. The federal and provincial governments were providing for 20,000 miles of improved highways, and to this work the federal government was contributing \$20,000,000.

Reverting again to the rate question, Dr. Reid said it was only fair that the railways should be permitted to pay an adequate return on investment. It was very discouraging for the chiefs of these systems to find deficits in spite of all their efforts. Because of the fact that the Canadian National was largely a colonization system, it had shown a deficit of \$47,000,000 last year.

Canada's great future, the minister said in conclusion, justified optimism, and he asked the public not to be too hard on the railways. "If you can't boost, don't knock," he said, in conclusion.

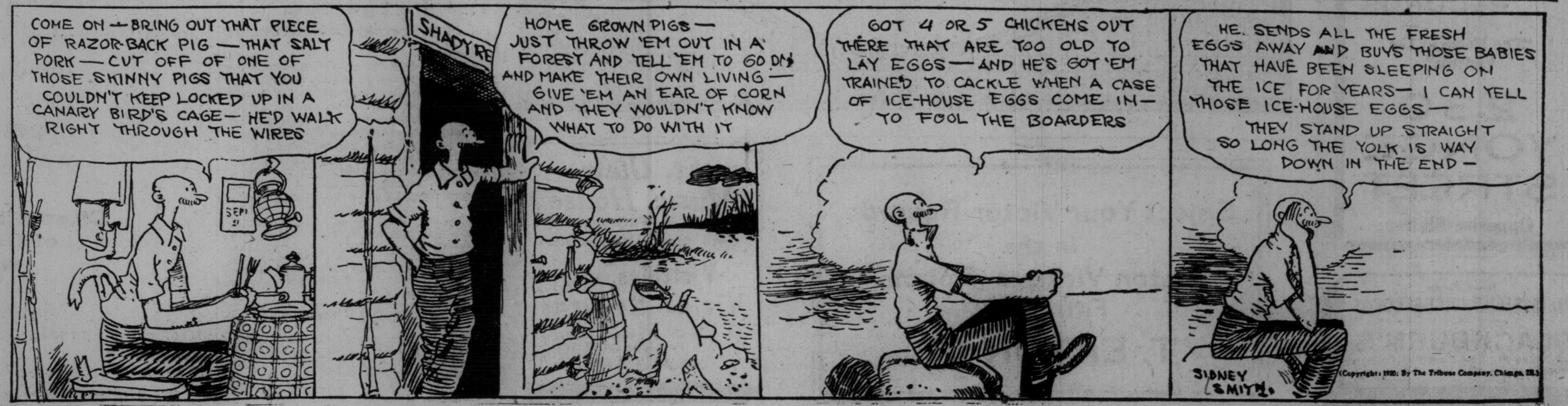

Railway Rates and Party Politics.

Generally speaking, people seem to think that the railway rates should have been increased, but not so much. Many will agree with Chief Commissioner Carvell that the Canadian National Railways should earn enough to pay operating expenses.

The government pays the fixed charges out of the public treasury, but should not the patron of the road pay a rate sufficient to cover the cost of wages, coal and the like of that?

The sore touch probably comes in the case of the Canadian Pacific. People generally believe that compensatory rates for the Canadian National will mean excessive profits for the Canadian Pacific.

The governor-in-council might deal with questions of public policy beyond the ken of the railway commission. It is, however, misleading to say that the appeal is to the government, because a permanent policy of carrying passengers and freight at less than cost could not be adopted without the consent of parliament.

The average citizen is more indignant at the raising of restaurant tea five cents a cup than at the advance of many millions in the transportation costs of the country.

Neither should the government be urged to make votes for itself by reversing the judgment first and reading it afterwards. Effervescent popularity would attend a government which carried passengers free, but the problem is one for business thought, rather than the chicanery of peanut party politics.

Mr. Ferguson Should Go Into the Box.

The royal commission carrying on the timber probe is ready to hear the testimony of Hon. Howard Ferguson at any time. That being the case Mr. Ferguson should not delay about going into the witness box.

The Presidential Struggle.

A press despatch from Chicago announces that 25,000 orators are to be "unleashed" by the Republican national committee on September 17, and from that time until election day they will address the untried electorate in doubtful states.

The women are not to be neglected, and spellbinders of their own sex have been secured. Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, daughter of Theodore Roosevelt, is taking a prominent part. Democratic spellbinders are going at it in a more rough and ready way, because most of them have to grub-stake themselves to a large extent.

The Republicans have always been able to raise more money than the Democrats. Mr. Harding's talk about a \$3,000,000 campaign fund does not sound impressive. That amount would not keep the 25,000 spellbinders long in the field.

We all take it for granted in Canada that the peace treaty and the league of nations will be the controlling issue in the campaign. On this issue Governor Cox has the advantage of a clean-cut, definite position; he is for the ratification of the peace treaty and the covenant of the league of nations with practically no reservations.

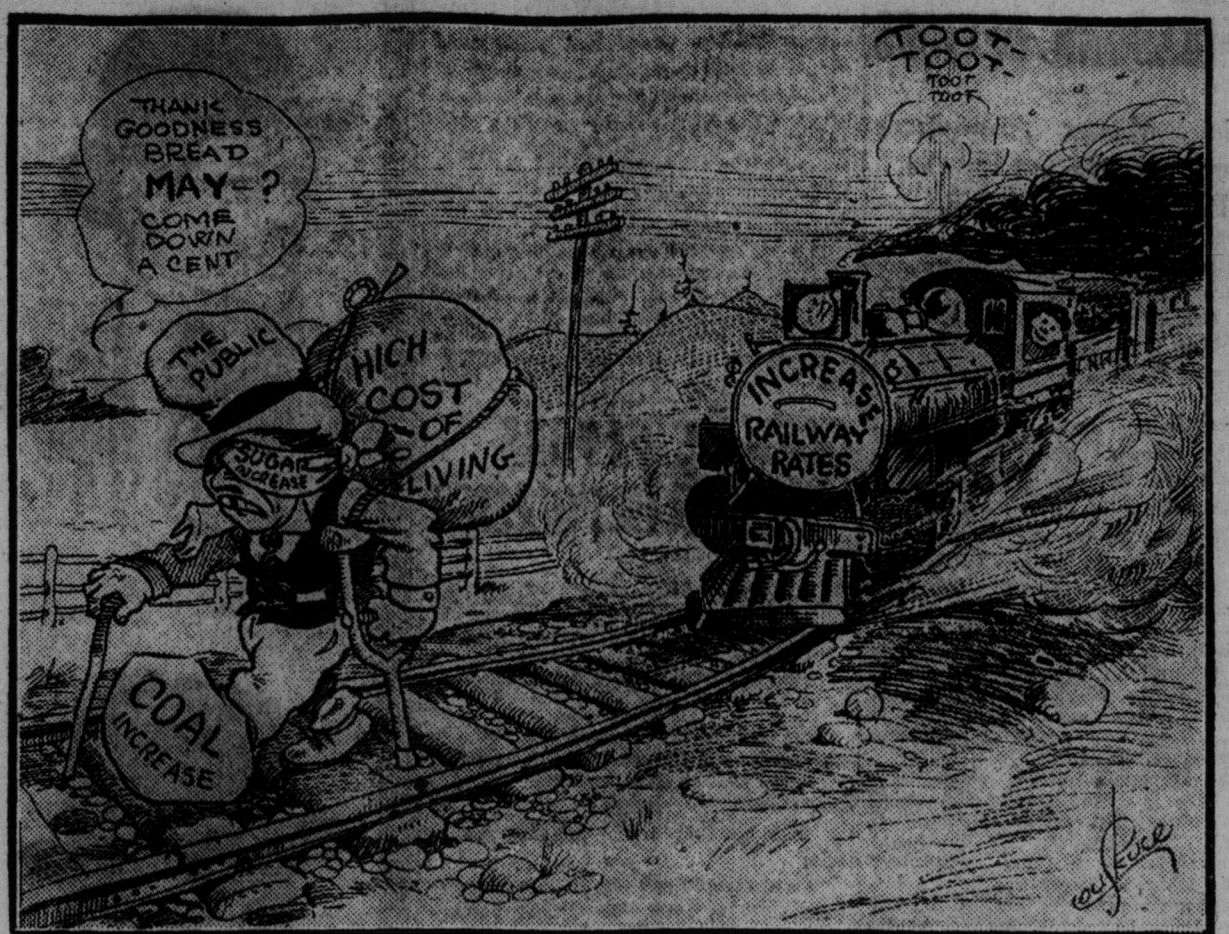

property of the Toronto Railway Co., in connection with the franchise. The city of Toronto will have to pay all the bonds or notes of the Toronto Electric Light and get all its plant, contracts, lines, ducts, etc. in the city of Toronto.

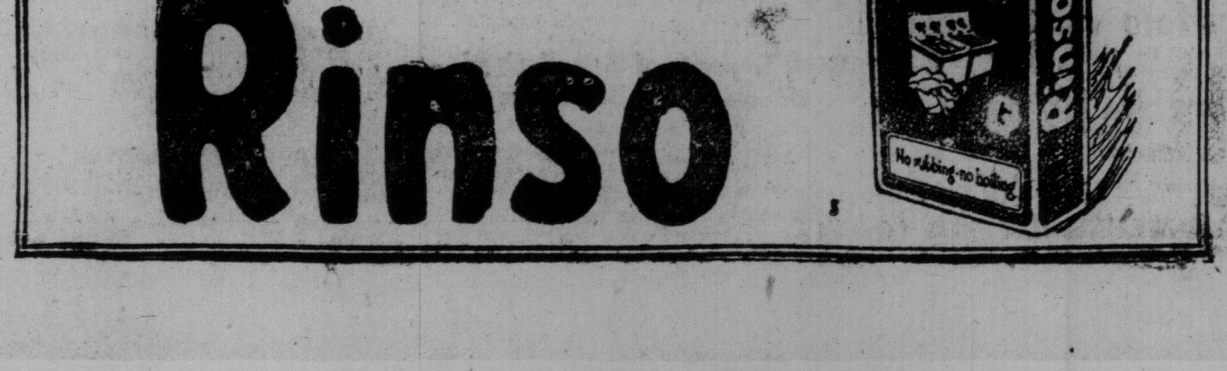
