Seeing Red in the United States.

Congress and the various legislatures in the United States have been in a wild stampede amounting to panic over the enemies of the social order.

POLITICAL NOTES

Events again are marching faster than men. The resignation of Sir Robert Borden as prime minister, which has been hanging fire for a long time, is now all but an accomplished fact.

The World carried a despatch from Ottawa yesterday which indicated a settlement in government circles in favor of the selection of Sir Thomas White as the new leader of the Unionist government.

The Mall and Empire's editorial is significant because it is a fair surmise that it was inspired from Ottawa or at least with the approval of the government.

The Canadian who with most general acceptance, both in political circles and in the country at large, could take Sir Robert Borden's place at the head of the cabinet, is Sir Thomas White.

But the new leader will be chosen neither by government papers nor by members of the government. Every Unionist senator and member will have one vote, and it may take several ballots before a majority of them go to any one man.

The caucus will not necessarily determine upon the formation of a new party or the drafting of a party platform. It will probably seek to get a leader who can keep the coalition together for a session or two and let the more distant future take care of itself.

Still no one can tell just what may happen at this caucus or in the near future. There are a good many members who want the coalition to hold together and want the general election deferred until 1922 who are none the less anxious to get rid of the Unionist label before they face their unturfed electors at the polls.

The manifesto is a safe document. It favors rigid economy in every branch of the public service, provincial rights, full autonomy for Canada, but always within the embracing folds of the British Empire.

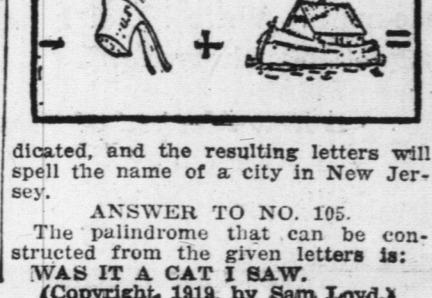

REPORT OF BOARD ON RADIAL DISPUTE

Conciliators Recommend New Hour and Wage Scale on Niagara-St. Kitts Line.

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—(By Canadian Press.)—The unanimous findings of the board of conciliation which investigated the dispute between the Niagara, St. Catharines & Toronto Railway and employees who are members of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Employees of America, has been received by the minister of labor.

The hours of freight trainmen are fixed at ten hours six days a week, to be completed in the least number of hours possible. The board recommends on week days the wages of freight conductors during the first, second and third years of their service shall be 47c per hour.

The board recommends that the company recognize the right of the employees to their union, and agree to treat with the employees' representatives on grievances.

Railway Board to Discuss Live Stock Shippers' Contract

NITTI DISCUSSES FOREIGN POLICY

Says Italy Must Evacuate Fiume if Pact of London is Accepted.

Rome, Feb. 9.—Premier Nitti discussed the Italian foreign policy in the chamber of deputies Saturday. He began his speech by asking for a suspension of the work of the chamber for a few days, as he had to be in London on Thursday at a meeting of the allied premiers.

"In the critical hour of our history," said the premier, "it is indispensable to tell the entire truth, even if we have to do so with an aching heart. Foreign policy has influenced our home policy, and home policy on foreign policy, so the two must harmonize."

Must Evacuate Fiume. "In other questions where Italy is most interested, namely, the Adriatic, Constantinople and Asia Minor, Italy must be guided by the broadest principles of nationality. The spontaneous plebiscite at Fiume, declaring its union with Italy, created a new political situation, which caused a series of difficulties.

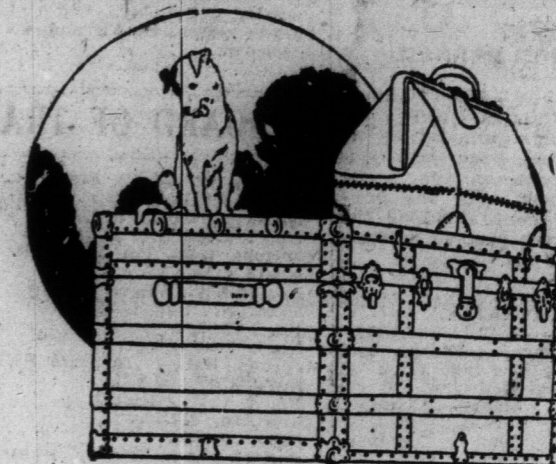
