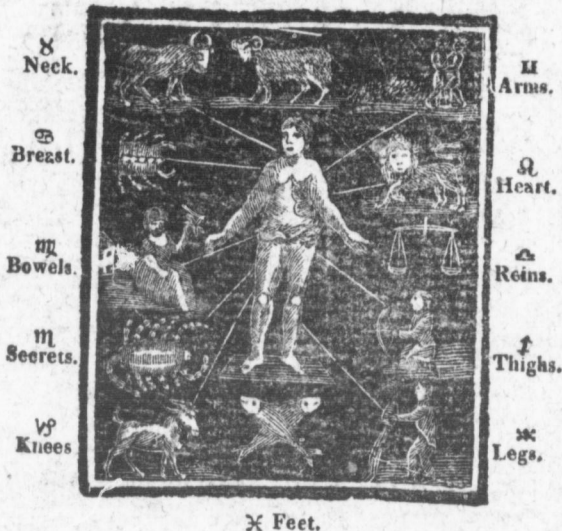

⚡ The times in the above table are to be added to or subtracted from the time of high water at Halifax, according to the directions there given. Example—To find the time of high water at Cape Sable, May 4, 1829. The time of high water at Halifax, May 4, by the calendar is 8 hours 25 minutes; to this add 30 minutes (time set against Cape Sable in the table) and you have the time of high water at Cape Sable, 8 hours 55 minutes.

Eclipses in 1829.

There will be four Eclipses in the year 1829, two of the sun and two of the Moon in the following order:

The first will be of the Moon on the morning of the 20th of March, at 9 hours 37 minutes, consequently invisible.

The second will be of the Sun on the 3d day of April, at 6 hours, 7 min. in the Afternoon, invisible here on account of the Moons south latitude.

The third will be of the Moon, September 13th, at 2 hours, 15 minutes in the morning, partial, and visible as follows:—

Fruit Trees.—It is possible that the following crude hints may be useful to some less experienced brother farmers.

Within a few years I have transplanted on my farm several hundred apple trees, some of which have been set in spring, and some in autumn. But not remembering to have lost a single tree, I am unable to say which time is the best.

The method I have generally pursued is this: wherever the soil is thinner, or the land drier than I could wish, I direct the holes to be dug about 4 feet in diameter, and from 20 to 24 inches deep. And the earth taken from below what is useful as soil, we cart into the road, or wherever it may be wanted, and return to the holes an equal quantity of the small stones which are usually considered a nuisance, with these we intermix any kind of compost or good soil from the road. In regard to trees in general, I have ever found advantage from intermixing from the earth, while setting, a bushel of rotten manure to each tree.

In digging up the trees we are careful to rob them as little as possible of their roots; and aim to diminish the lateral branches by pruning about as much as the roots had lost in taking up. We set the trees about as deep as they stood in the nursery; treading the ground as hard as we can around them; setting out, and keeping them erect; and let them stand without stakes; or being visited by any horned cattle.

It is surprising to see how rapidly these trees have grown. There are several now in fair view, which were set out in the beginning of May last, on which may be seen a full grown handsome apple. U.

Curing Blindness.—The story in the Apocrypha, of Tobit's blindness being cured by the gall of a fish, has been much ridiculed. Prideaux thought it not reconcileable to a rational credibility. But the Richmond Family Visitor, states, that Dr. Manlove, a physician of extensive practice in Dinwiddie country, Va. thirty or forty years ago, left on record on the margin of Prideaux's Connexions, the following note:

"That the gall of an eel, laid on with a soft brush, with great care, and occasionally repeated, has successfully removed a film from the eye, is most certain. The writer of this leaves it on record in this place, with an intention that it may be useful to some fellow creature, after the writer is no longer an inhabitant of this world. I most solemnly declare, I have experienced the good effects of the application in the course of my practice. But it should be used when the disorder is recent.

How to make Starch.—To make starch from wheat, the grain is steeped in cold water until it becomes soft and yields a milky juice by pressure; it is then put into sacks of linen, and pressed in a vat filled with cold water, as long as any milky juice exudes, the pressure is continued; the fluid gradually becomes clear, and a white powder subsides, which is starch.—*Davy's Elements of Agricultural Chemistry*.

Economy of time.—The Chancellor D'Aguesan, finding that his wife always kept him waiting a quarter of an hour after the dinner bell had rung, resolved to devote the time to writing a work on jurisprudence. He put this project in execution, and in the course of time produced a quarto work of four volumes.

Best preparation of black lead for cleaning stoves.—Mix powder of black lead with a little common gin, or the dregs of red Port wine and lay it on the stove with a piece of linen rag; then with a clean, dry and close, but not hard brush, dipped in dried black lead powder, rub it to a beautiful brightness. This will be found to produce a much finer and richer black varnish on the cast iron than either boiling the black lead with small beer and soap, or mixing it with white of egg, &c. which are the methods commonly practised.—*Domestic Encyclopediæ*.

Cement for wood or paper.—Dissolve some isinglass in a small quantity of gin or proof spirit, by a very gentle heat, and preserve it in a bottle for use.

To remove the musty flavor from Wheat which has been damaged.—An English receipt book directs as follows : For every bushel of wheat take two pounds of potash, dissolve it in water with about double the quantity of wheat. Let the wheat be thoroughly washed in the solution, rinsed with pure water, and dried quickly.

In a letter to the Right Hon. Sir Joseph Banks, it is observed, "if wheat be musty, it must be put into any convenient vessel, capable of containing at least three times the quantity, and the vessel must be subsequently filled with boiling water; the grain should then be occasionally stirred, and the hollow and decayed grains (which will float,) may be removed. When the water has become cold, or in general when about half an hour is elapsed, it is to be drawn off. It will be proper then to rinse the corn with cold water, in order to remove any portion of the water which had taken up the must; after which, the corn being completely drained, it is, without loss of time, to be thinly spread on the floor of a kiln, and thoroughly dried, care being taken to stir and turn it frequently, during this part of the process."

Valuable Receipt.—Dr. Godman has recommended the following certain and simple remedy for a common disease among children. He says, "whenever they are threatened with an attack of Croup, I direct a plaster covered with dry Scotch snuff, varying to the age of the patient, to be applied to the top of the throat, and retained there, till all the symptoms disappear. The remedy is found to be always effectual when applied in the first and second stages of the malady." The plaster is made by greasing a piece of linen, and covering it with the snuff.

Painting Houses.—A writer for the New-England Farmer, says, "I believe it is a general practice for people to do their painting sometime during the three summer months; but repeated experiments have been made within a few years, which prove that a house painted late in autumn or in the winter, will hold the paint more than twice as long as one painted in warm weather. The reason is obvious—for when paints are applied in cold weather, the oil with other ingredients, form a hard cement on the surface of the clap boards, which cannot easily be raised; whereas, a building painted (as usual) in the heat of summer will soon need a new coat; for the heat causes the oil to penetrate into the wood, and leaves the other component parts dry, which will soon crumble off."

Management of Horses in Case of Fire.—It is well known that, when a fire happens in a stable such is the natural dread of the horse, that he cannot be prevailed on to move out of danger, but remains to his certain destruction. In this alarming case it has been recommended, and in a few instances practised with success, the opportunity of a few minutes offering, to blind the horses with any cloths which can be suddenly laid hold on, and a bridle or halter also being put on, to back them out; for it seems, when these animals see or smell fire, they obstinately refuse to move forward, but may be forced backward. It is obvious that there are too many desperate cases, in which no opportunity can be had for this practice; on the other hand, during the hurry and confusion of a fire it may not occur, even when such an opportunity may be instantaneously present, whence it is worthy of memorandum and recollection.—*Adams's Horsemanship.*

If you do not, the worms which they contain, and which have been the cause of their premature decay, will make their escape into the ground, and you will find the evils, which await their visitations will increase upon you another season.

Saw your Wood.—"A Farmer" says, "a very considerable saving may be realized by using the saw instead of the axe in preparing wood for the fire, although very few of our common country people are aware of the fact, having never tried the experiment. A saw suitable for this business costs no more than an axe, is as easily kept in order, and with careful usage will last many years. A man can saw as much and probably more wood in the same time that he can cut with an axe. Scarcely any litter is made, the wood may be cut all of an exact length, and on the whole the annual saving to every householder, by using the saw instead of an axe, would, in the course of several years, amount to something of considerable consequence.

Cleanse your Cellars.—If you wish to live half your days, be careful not to be in the habit of breathing the gasses of putrefaction, vegetable or animal. We do not pretend to say whether a parcel of rotting or rotten potatoes, cabbages, turnips, and other vegetables, decaying in a cellar will produce what is called yellow fever or not. But a kind of fever may be manufactured from vegetable or animal putrefaction, which may prove as fatal, though perhaps not quite so rapid in its progress as the genuine plague of the West Indies or the Levant. Beef brine or pork brine suffered to stand too long, becomes very offensive, and whatever offends the sense of smelling is injurious to health. We have been assured by physicians of eminence, that they have reason for believing that bilious or typhus fevers of a malignant and fatal kind have originated from sources of this description.

To protect young plants from Worms.—The powder of the dust of tobacco thrown over the beds, in a garden, where the plants are just coming up, will save them from the worms.

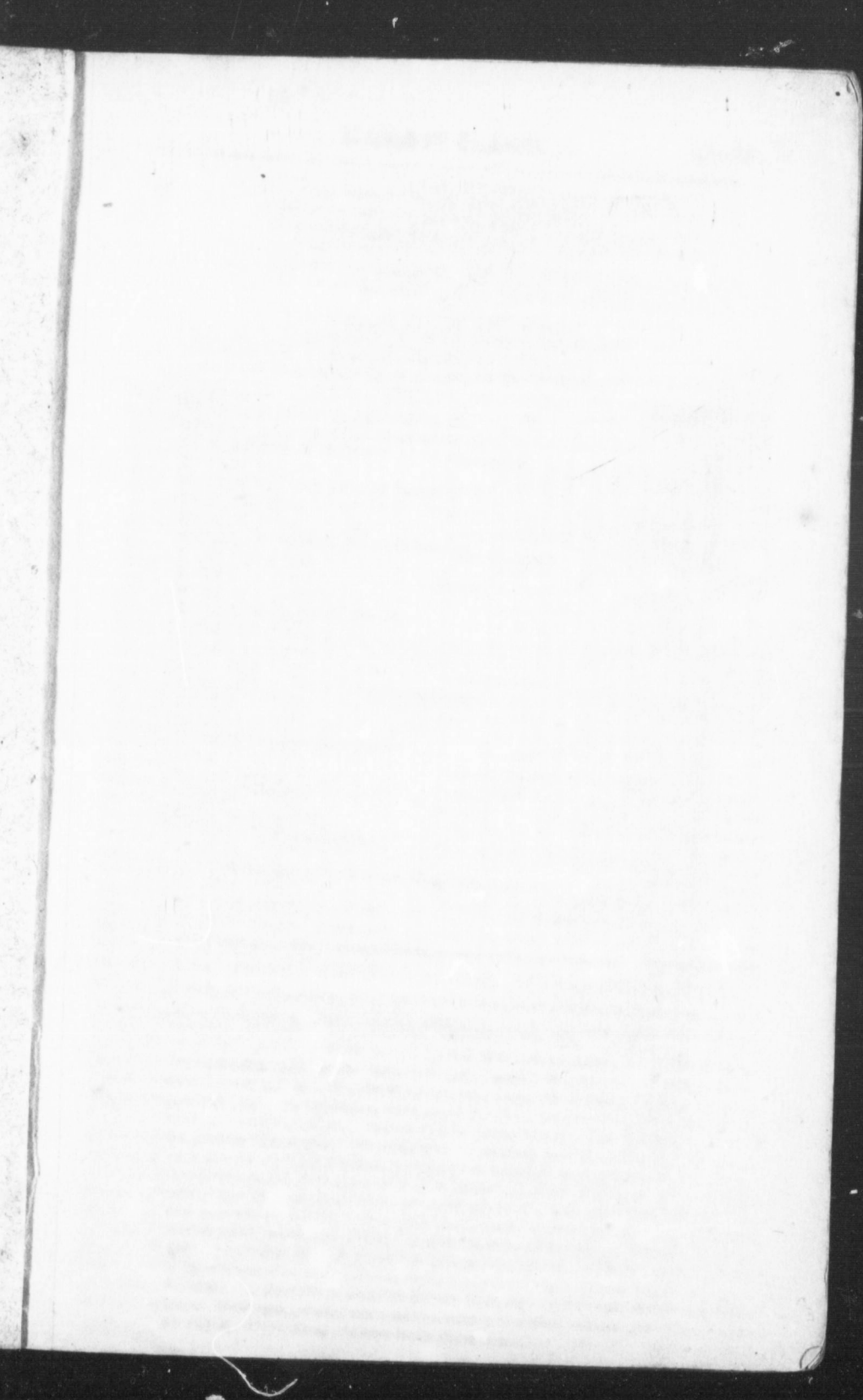

Working Bulls.—The Bull is naturally vicious, and often becomes so mischievous as to endanger valuable lives; an evil which we conceive might be remedied by teaching him to labour. Bulls are not only broken with little difficulty, and work well, but they recover from fatigue much sooner than an ox.

Working Cows.—“Why should the cow be exempted from the labours of the field, while the wife and daughter of the farmer are expected and required to be daily employed in cooking, washing, baking, spinning, milking, and making butter and cheese? Ought a farmer to treat his cows more tenderly than his wife and children?” In a work written by the famous Arthur Young, entitled “Young’s Eastern Tour,” it is remarked, that “Mr Bakewell, a famous English cultivator, used to draw with oxen, but now draws all with cows—Mr B. finds them just as handy as oxen, and that they draw just as well as oxen of the same size.” Indeed, we can see no reason why cows should be exempted from labour any more than mares. The only objection to cows being trained to the yoke of which we are aware, is, that for some time before and after calving they will not be in a condition to labour. This objection, however, applies with equal force to mares. Cows commonly calve at a time of the year when team work is but little wanted. Besides, a farmer with considerable neat stock might so

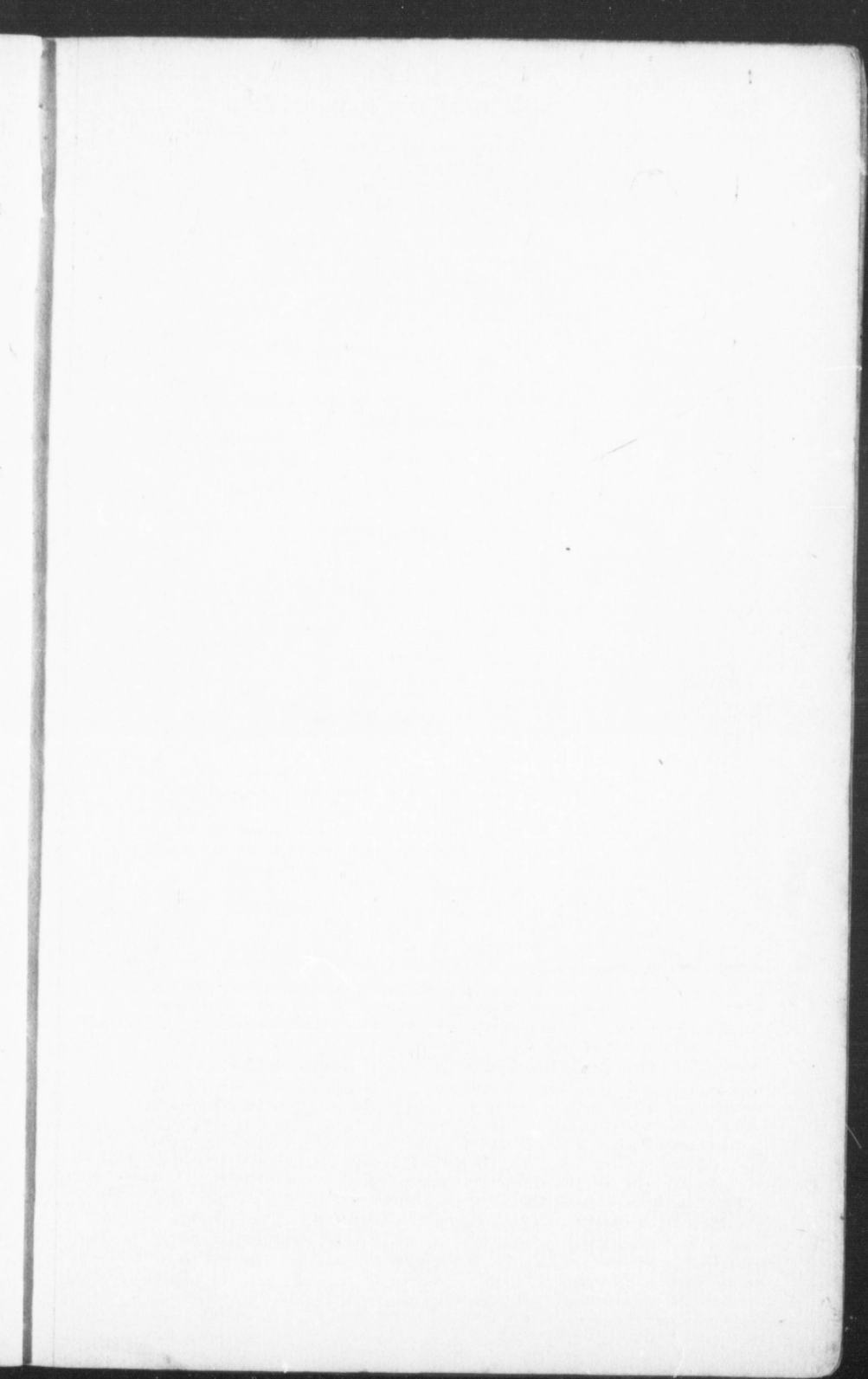

manage that some of his cows might always be fit for the yoke. And it is possible that working cows moderately would serve the purpose of exercise to the human species, and would thus strengthen the constitutions, and improve the breeds of the animals, by imparting vigour to the breeders.

To clear a house of Cock Roaches.—Into a common bowl put a gill or two of water made sweet with molasses. 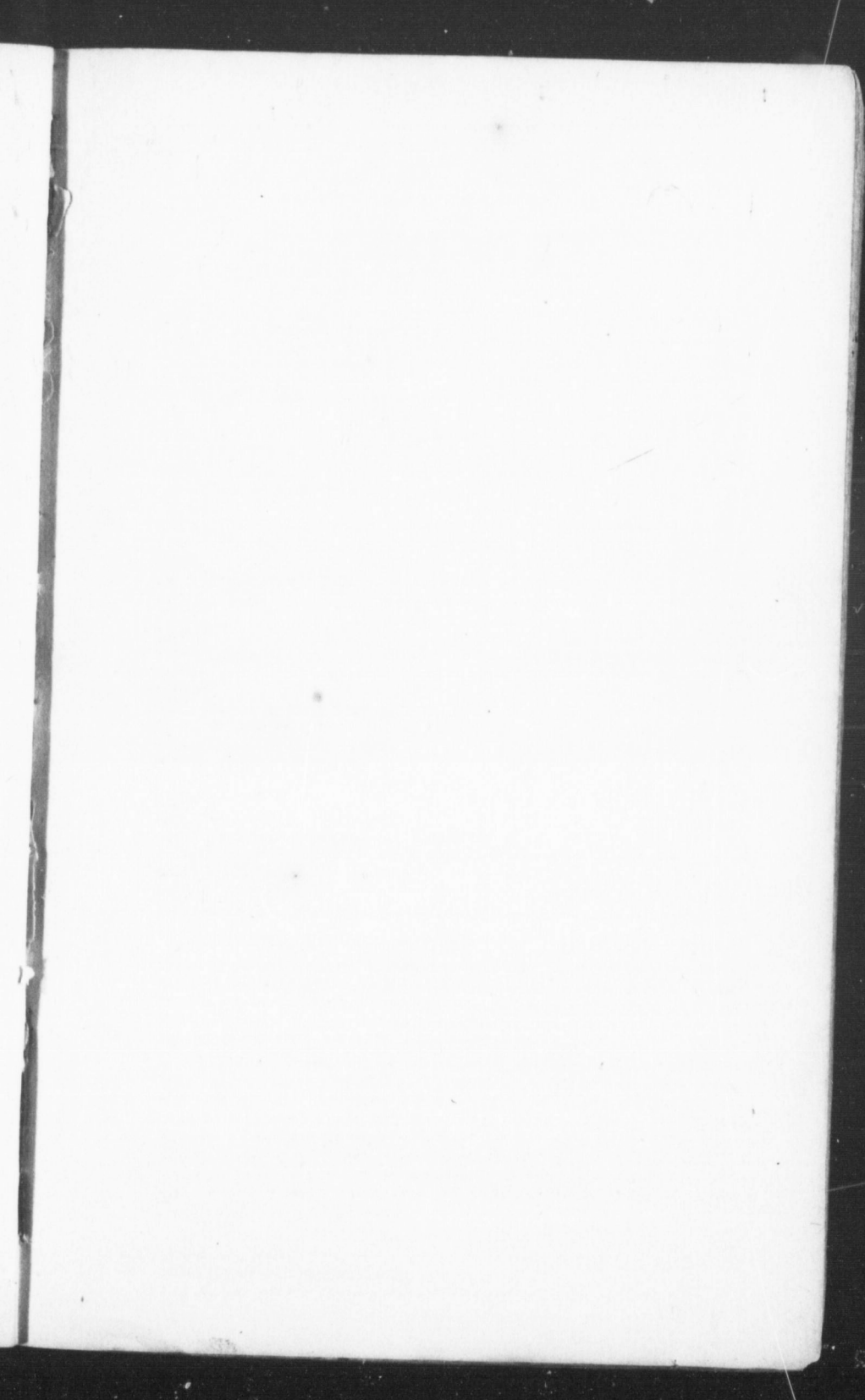

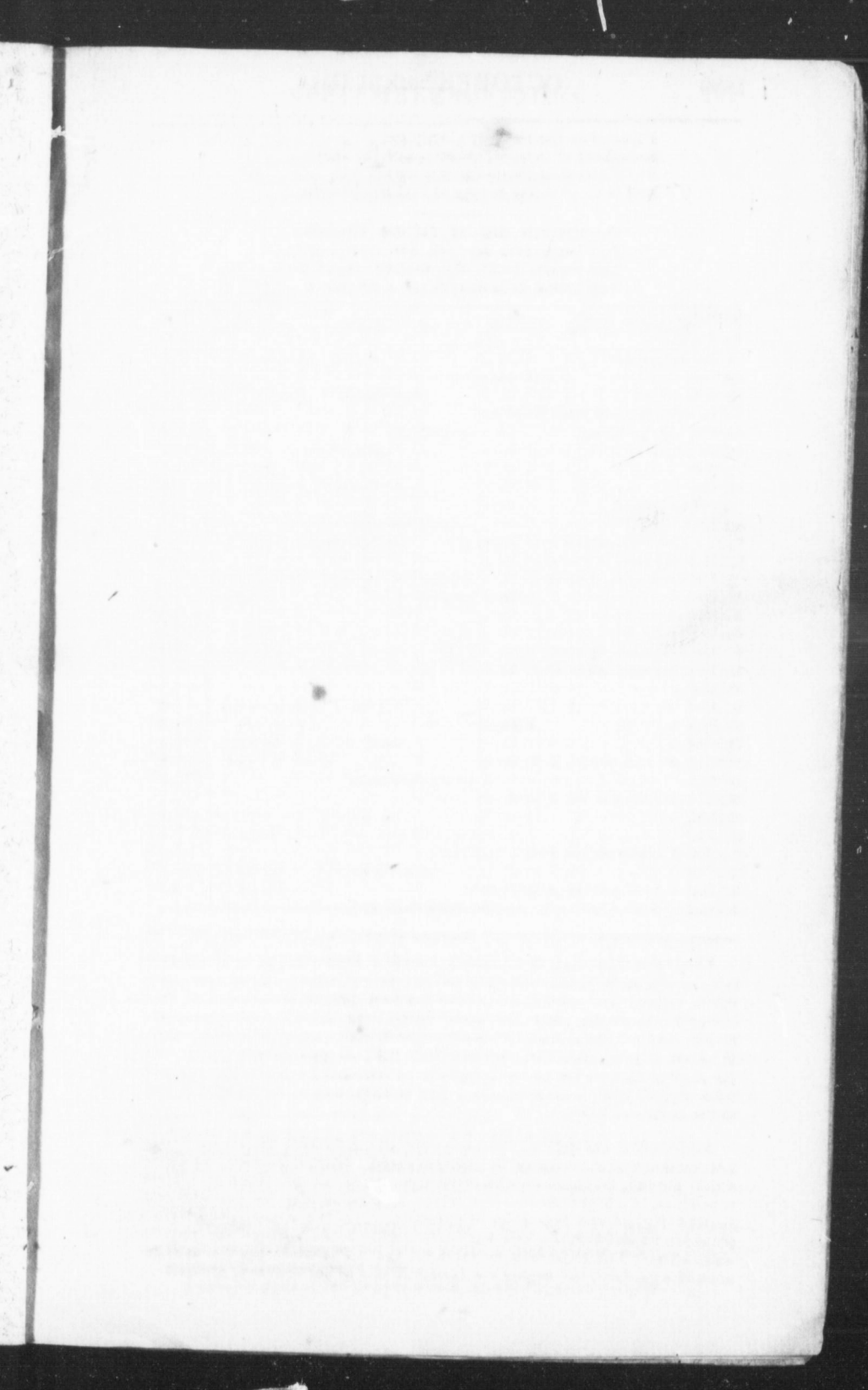

Cure for the Bilious Cholic, and the Dysentery.—Dissolve in keen vinegar as much common table Salt, as will, when put into an open bottle, ferment and work itself clear.—The bottle should be nearly full, that it may discharge the foam; this done, bottle it for use; let the person affected, take a large spoonful of the vinegar in about a gill of boiling water, or as hot as he can drink it, until he finds relief.—It will effectually remove the cause, (says the recipe,) although the patient may be so far relaxed and exhausted as to die with weakness. The same remedy is said to be excellent in the common choke.

Let every farmer divide his pasture ground as he pleases. Let the fence be as strong as an external fence. But, if possible, let all his arable ground, though it be a hundred acres, be in one lot. Then his plough runs clear, in a long furrow.—His tillage is divided only by the different species of grain and vegetables he cultivates. There are no fences; in consequence no inconvenient and worthless headland; no apology for thistles and nettles. The scene is beautiful to the eye. The whole has the appearance of a garden; and begets the farmer a sort of horticultural neatness.



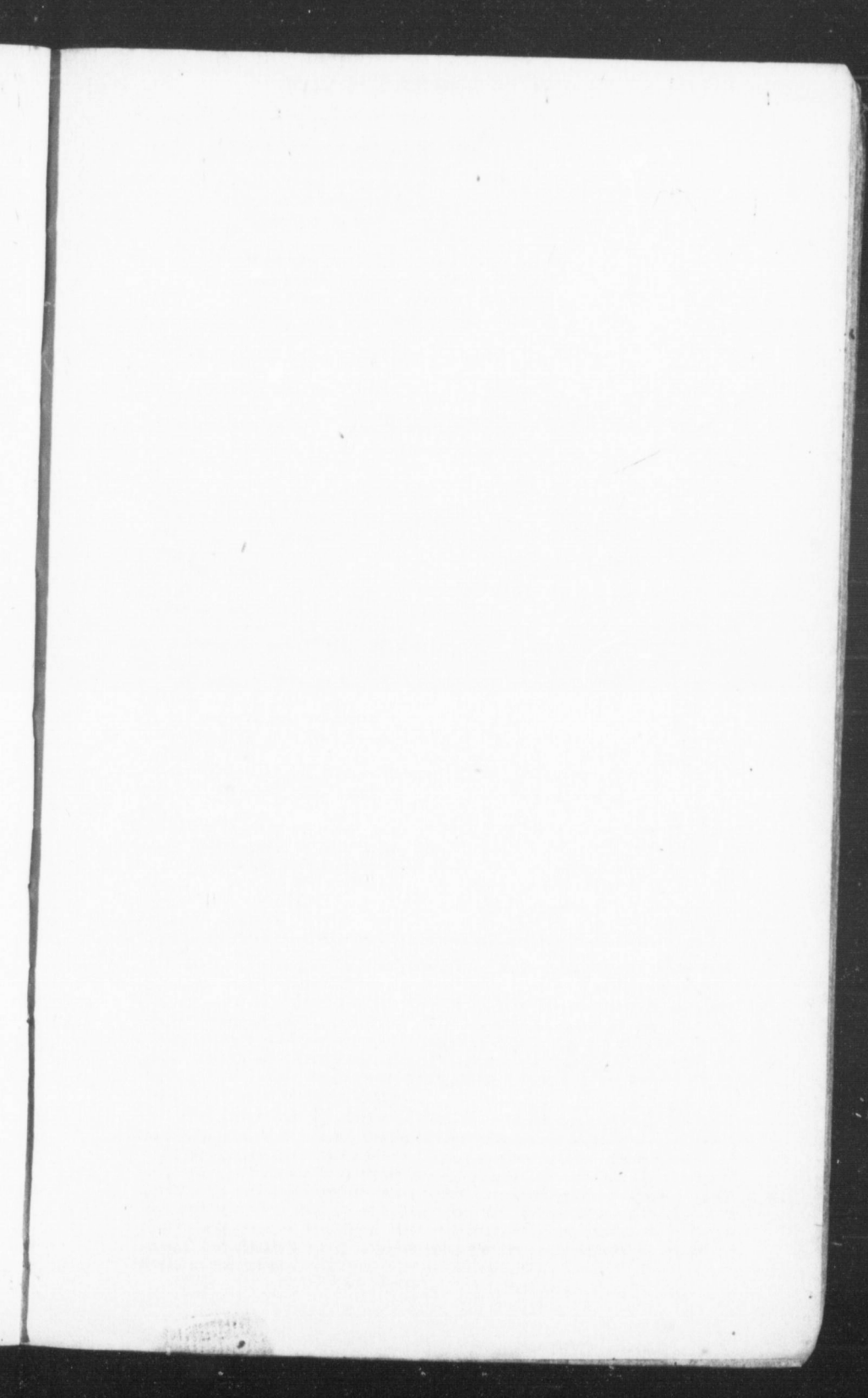

The Doctor has known persons entirely freed by the use of this material, from their former visitations of rheumatic pains; and to have become much more warm and comfortable through the winter, without any additional clothing, than they had been before under the use of a cumbersome great coat.

Preservation of Shoe Leather.—The following Recipe has been successfully used, during several seasons, by a sporting gentleman resident in the Fens: half a pint of drying oil (boiled linseed); one ounce of bees wax; one ounce of spirit of turpentine; half an ounce of Burgundy pitch. To be melted together over a slow fire, in an earthen vessel. If new boots be saturated with the above composition, and left to hang in a warm place for a week or ten days, they will not only be rendered soft and pliant, but almost entirely impervious to wet, and will seldom be found to crack at the sides.

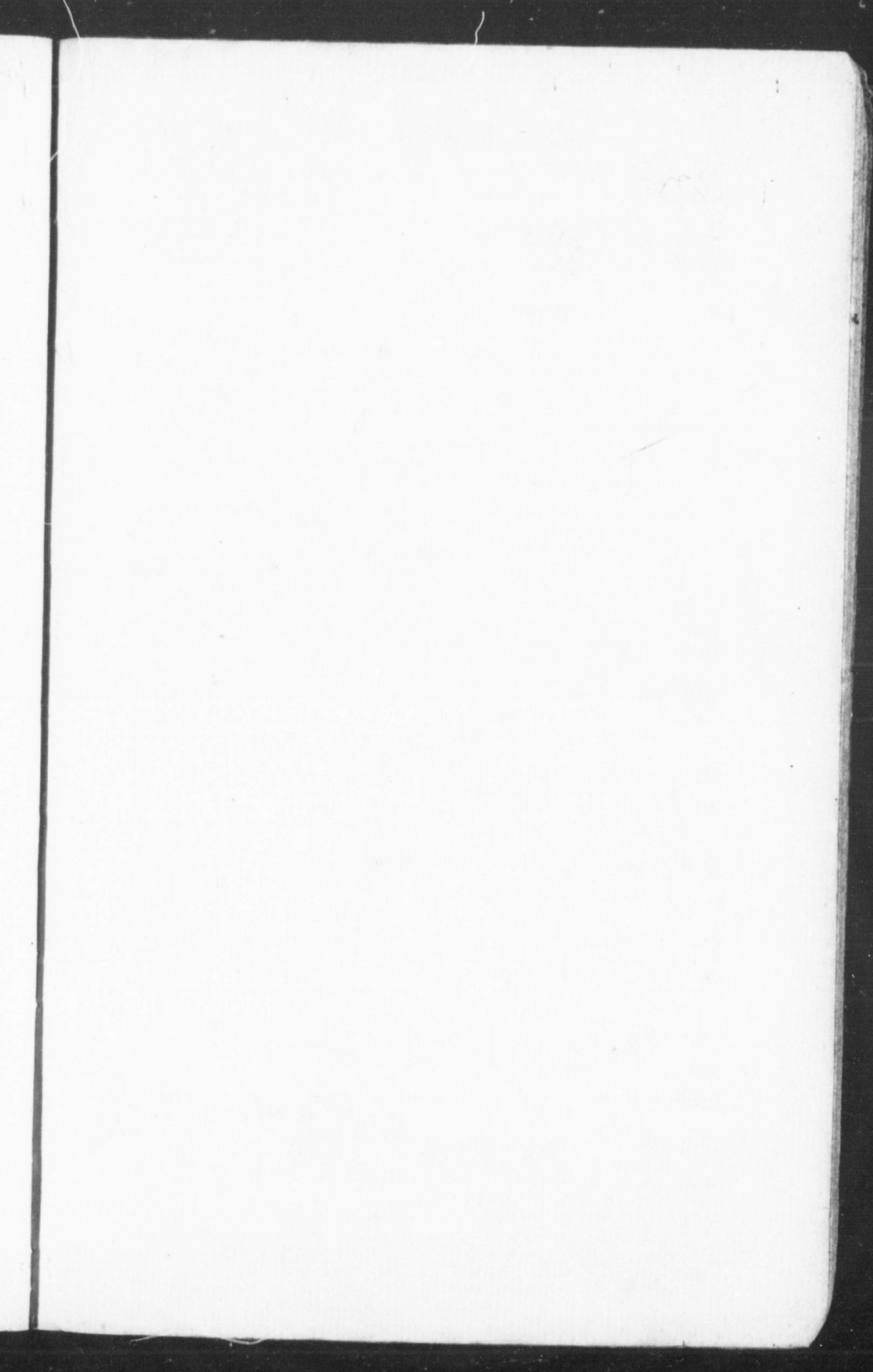

Pearl Barley as a substitute for Rice.—It is equally advantageous to the public to learn the use of a known substance as the discovery of a new one. I am sure the application of barley to another branch of domestic cookery will not be disregarded by some of your readers. I can assure them that they will find it an excellent substitute for rice. It has been long used in this country in broth; and when boiled with milk, sometimes called Scotch rice; but by far the best way of using it is by pounding it in a mortar. In this form it fairly rivals mannacrop, tapioca or ground rice, and can be easily procured at one twelfth of the price of the first, and one third of the price of the last substance. It was resorted to as a change of food for my children's breakfast; and the great similarity to mannacrop induced us to try it in a pudding for them, and I can assure you, I think it one of the best of the kind—same management as with either of the others, milk, eggs, &c. &c. What we call pearl barley is the kind used; but I dare say, any of the kinds would answer.—*W M Argylshire.*

Time of going through the Falls.

THE Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

Directions for coming into Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed Directions in the Custom-House at Halifax.

SAMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W. From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E.; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please. Note—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outer most one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E. When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger. When a-breast of Chebucto Head, run N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the south point of George's Island. When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15. In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beech, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach. There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point. Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

New Light House.—As the Light House on the Tower at the west end of Manger's Beach, at the entrance of Halifax Harbour, is intended only to lead vessels up the harbour, the greater part of the eastern side will be darkened, viz—*from N. E. by N. to S. half E.*—The following directions published by the Commissioners of Light Houses should be attended to:—“Vessels coming from the Eastward must keep Sambre Light open to the southward of Chebucto Head and until the Light opens on Manger's beach, which will then bear N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W—they will then be to the westward of Thrum Cap Shoals, and may shape a course up the harbour, always keeping the Light on the Beach open, and on the starboard bow. Vessels coming from the westward will see this Light when they are as far to the eastward as Chebucto Head, by keeping it open, and on the starboard bow, it will lead them up to the beach. This Light will appear of a red colour, which will distinguish it from any other on the coast. It is fifty eight feet high from the level of the sea.”
