Ordinary meetings of the Kirk Session are held on the first Saturday in each month.

Meetings of the Board of Managers are held quarterly on the first Monday in the months of January, April, July and October, at 7.30 p.m.

Pew rents are payable to the Treasurer, quarterly in advance, at the Manager's Room, on the 21st day of March, June, September and December. Sittings not paid for within six weeks thereafter may be re-let by the Managers.

The Managers will be in their Room on the first Monday in each month, from 7.30 to 9 p.m., to attend to applications for sittings. Those who give up their sittings should notify the Managers, as sittings cannot be transferred to other parties except by the Managers.

Packages of envelopes will be furnished, on application to the Managers, to Members and Adherents of the Church who are willing to adopt the "Envelope System" of making their weekly offerings. The plan is the following: Each envelope bears a number corresponding to the number opposite to the contributor's name on the Treasurer's book. Each contributor undertakes to give a fixed amount weekly, and to make up the deficiency in case of absence on one or more Sundays.

### Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Funds.

Contributions will be made on the third Sunday in each month during the current year, in special envelopes provided for the purpose, to the Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Funds of the Church. Contributors may, if they choose, indicate the special objects to which they wish their contributions applied. The amount not so designated will be distributed by the Kirk Session. The following are the chief objects for which contributions are asked:

1. Home Missions.—For the support of 208 Mission fields, having 614 preaching stations, in the needy districts of Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia. The amount required for the current year is \$31,000.

2. Foreign Missions.—For the support of Missions in five fields. (1) Among the Indians in the North-West; (2) In Formosa; (3) In Central India; (4) In the New Hebrides; (5) In Trinidad. \$45,000 is needed this year for the part of this work under the care of the Western Section.

3. French Evangelization.—Missionaries, Colporteurs and Teachers are employed, under the direction of the Assembly's Board, in spreading a pure gospel among the French Canadians. There is an admirably conducted School at Pointe aux Trembles. The estimated amount required for the current year is \$35,000.

4. Colleges.—(1) There is a common fund for the support of Knox, Queen's and Montreal Theological Colleges. The amount required this year is \$15,050. (2) This Congregation is responsible for two scholarships—one of \$60. and the other of \$50—in Queen's University. (3) A grant is also made for the support of Manitoba College.

5. MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.—For providing annuities for the widows and orphans of ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each minister contributes \$12 per annum to this fund.

6. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.—Amount re-

quired, \$10,000.

7. St. Mark's Mission.—One-half of the Missionary's stipend is paid by the Managers; the other half (\$400) is paid from the monthly contributions to Missions.

8. THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS.—It has been decided to defray the expenses of the St. Andrew's, St. Mark's and Dorset Sunday Schools from this source for the current year. Amount required, say \$350.

The Fund for the Augmentation of Ministers' Stipends is not included in the above. A special collection will be made for this object towards the end of the year.

## Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

The Fifty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church was held in the School-room of the Church, on Wednesday evening, the 20th January, 1886. There was present a large representation of the Congregation.

The Rev. D. J. Macdonnell was appointed Chairman, and Mr. William Mitchell Secretary, of the meeting.

The Chairman opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of last Annual Meeting, as printed in the last Annual Report, were held as read and confirmed.

The Secretary read the Report of the Board of Managers, and submitted a detailed statement of the receipts and disbursements for the past year.

On motion of Mr. Jas. Maclennan, seconded by Mr. R. J. Wylie, the Report and Statement of the Managers were received and adopted.

Mr. William Mitchell moved, seconded by Mr. James M. Rogerson, "That the Managers be and they are hereby authorized on behalf of the Congregation to apply to the Presbytery of Toronto for permission to sell the property on Adelaide Street West (until recently used as a site for St. Mark's Mission Church in connection with this Congregation), and to apply the proceeds of the same in reduction of the debt incurred in purchasing the new site on King Street, upon which the Church now stands." Carried.

The election of Managers in room of those now retiring by rotation was then proceeded with, when Messrs. Russel Inglis and A. M. Cosby were re-elected, and Mr. R. W. Sutherland elected for the ensuing term.

Mr. J. F. Somerville read an interesting report of his work in connection with St. Mark's Mission Church.

The Report of St. Andrew's Sunday School was read by the Chairman in the absence of the Superintendent.

Reports were read from St. Mark's Sunday School, Dorset Sunday and Evening Schools and Sewing Class, by the respective Superintendents.

Reports were also read from the Men's, Women's and Willing Helpers' Associations.

It was then moved by Mr. R. J. Wylie, seconded by Mr. H. S. Alexander, "That the very satisfactory reports of the different Schools and Associations now presented be received, and the hearty thanks of the Congregation be and they are hereby tendered to the teachers and others who have so efficiently conducted the work in connection with these organizations during the past year." Carried.

The following motion regarding the retirement of Mr. I. C. Gilmor from the Board of Managers was moved by Mr. James Maclennan, seconded by Mr. Wm. Mitchell, and unanimously adopted: "That this meeting desires to record its sense of the value of the services rendered to this Congregation by Mr. Isaac C. Gilmor during the many years he has held the office of a Manager of its affairs. Mr. Gilmor has been a Manager continuously for the long period of nearly forty years, during a number of which he was the Treasurer, and during sixteen of which he was Chairman of the Board, and it is not too much to say that

# Fifty-Fifth Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

The Board of Managers herewith present to the Congregation a detailed statement of the ordinary revenue and expenditure for the past year. The sums received from the two chief sources of revenue are respectively:

The Sunday collections averaged \$99.45, being less by \$8.78 per Sunday than the average for the year previous, while the revenue from pew rents shows a small increase. The whole of the revenue has been absorbed in the payment of current expenses, interest on debt, and on necessary repairs to the Church property, leaving nothing to be applied in the reduction of the debt. The items for repairs on property are exceptional, and are permanent improvements, a portion of which has still to be paid.

For several years past the Managers have avoided making any special appeal to the Congregation on behalf of the Church debt, but they are of opinion that the time has now arrived when an annual gradual reduction of the debt should be resumed, and they would prefer that this end should be accomplished out of ordinary surplus revenue rather than by making a personal canvass. agers would ask for an increase in the weekly contributions either by envelope or by open collection. By the envelope system the sum contributed will be acknowledged in the printed report at the end of the year.

The Managers have to urge a more strict observance of the rule regarding the payment of pew rents. This rule provides that all pew rents shall be paid in the Managers' Room on the 21st days of March, June, September and December. Through the non-observance of this rule by a large number of seat-holders during the past year, about one half of the total receipts from this source had to be collected by an agent, entailing a charge on revenue for commission of \$111.30. Attention is also called to the fact that there is a very considerable number of persons in regular attendance at the services of the Church who hold no sittings. Visitors and the poor are always welcome, and will always be provided with the best seats available; but the Managers submit that members and others receiving Church privileges, who are able, should secure sittings for themselves, and bear their share in supporting ordinances in the Church to which they profess to belong.

Since last annual meeting the Managers have had to record the loss by death of one of their number, namely, Capt. Charles Perry, who died on May 20th last. The following resolution was adopted at their first meeting thereafter:

"Resolved,—That the Managers of St. Andrew's Church desire to record an expression of their sorrow at the sudden and unlooked for removal by death on the 20th inst. of Capt. Charles Perry, who for the past nine years had

been associated with them in the management of the tem-

poral affairs of this Church.

"By his death the Managers feel that they have lost a kind and warm-hearted friend, and the Congregation a generous, faithful and devoted office-bearer. The Managers also desire to express their heartfelt sympathy with the bereaved family, and commend them to the God of all comfort, who has promised to be a Father to the fatherless, and an ever present help in every time of need."

In accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, the Managers, at their first meeting after the death of Capt. Perry, appointed Mr. A. M. Cosby to fill the vacancy on the Board.

The Kirk Session having represented to the Managers that the number attending the services and the Sunday School in St. Mark's Mission Church had increased to such an extent as to require larger and better accommodation, it was also considered that the locality was undesirable for the purposes of the mission. After full consideration, and with the concurrence of the Kirk Session, the Managers purchased a lot consisting of 208 feet fronting on King Street West, by 108 feet fronting on Tecumseth Street, at a cost of \$9,655.84, to which site the building has been removed and enlarged to fully double its former seating capacity, at a further cost of about \$2,300, a detailed statement of which is subjoined. These sums the Managers have borrowed upon favourable terms, the interest upon the whole of which is guaranteed by those attending St. Mark's.

The plan which was adopted last year of raising funds for the Missions and Schemes of the Church by monthly collections has proved successful, the amount realized (with interest added) being \$2,589.51, as compared with \$1,989.62, an increase of \$600. The special collection for Augmentation of Stipends amounted to \$1,434.39. The amount contributed to the Session Fund on the three communion Sundays (\$366.40) has been devoted almost entirely to the relief of the poor connected with the Congregation. The Dorcas Committee of the Women's Association has lent valuable aid in administering the larger portion of the fund.

The Session call attention to the large number of communicants whose names are year after year struck off the roll on account of removal from the bounds of the Congregation, or long-continued absence from the services of the Church. Those who have been absent from the Communion or from public worship for two years or more, without good reason, are liable to have their names struck off. Communicants leaving the city, or removing to such a distance from the Church that they are unable to attend, should at once secure their certificates of membership, and connect themselves with some Church in whose work they can take an active part.

May the year upon which we have entered be one of increased fervour of spirit and diligence in the work which the Master gives us to do.

### Mission Work in St. Mark's.

This branch of the work has been carried on during the year with encouraging results.

As intimated in our last report, we opened a morning service on the first Sabbath of February, and since that time two services have been conducted every Sabbath.

The Bible Class has been continued on Monday evening, and the Gospel Service on Thursday evening.

Seeing that at least nine-tenths of the poverty, wretchedness and indifference to religious things was caused by the intemperate use of intoxicants, we were constrained to do something to remedy the evil. To be successful we must prevent and reclaim, and therefore we formed the children's singing class into a Band of Hope, and organized a Gospel Temperance Society for adults; and at the meetings of these societies, which are held fortnightly on Saturday and monthly on Thursday evenings respectively, we try to bring young and old into union with Him who is "mighty to save." Some have been reclaimed.

A very pleasing feature of the work of the year were the Communion services held on the 26th of April and the 4th of October, conducted by Mr. Macdonnell. At the former service twenty-eight, and at the latter seventeen, persons united with the Church.

During the first four months of the year 150 families were visited, some of these several times. From the 1st of May until the end of October "225 families were visited, many of these repeatedly. Over one hundred families

came to the services occasionally; seventy-five of these ought to come regularly; fifty families did come regularly."

During the last two months seventy-five families have been visited, several of these two or three times.

In addition to the visiting done by the Missionary, there is the fortnightly visitation of the parish west of Brock Street by the district visitors. They number ten or twelve, and their work consists in calling on the people and distributing gospel literature; some, more experienced, read God's Word and pray with the families. This work has been greatly blest; in fact, the work of the Missionary would amount to very little without it.

Considering the number of families visited, the attendance at the services has not been as large as we have hoped for, but during the cold weather there are causes which prevent many from coming. During the former part of the year the average attendance was as follows:

### St. Andrew's Sunday School.

The School is in a satisfactory condition. The numbers do not increase, but the work done is steadily and faithfully carried on. The average attendance for the year has been 198 out of a roll of 290.

The contributions of the children, with the addition of bank interest, amount to the sum of \$242.01, being an average of \$4.65 per Sunday. These moneys have been allocated as follows: Central India Mission, \$60; Dayspring, \$50; Trinidad Schools, \$30; Welland Canal Mission, \$10; Sick Children's Hospital, \$30; Dorset School, \$62.01.

Two of the scholars have been removed by death, Laura Henderson and Minnie Davies.

The total number of children is now 265, an increase of 115 over last year, the average attendance being 164. The relatively low average is accounted for by the fact that the increase in the number of scholars took place during the later part of the year. Five of our scholars have become communicants in the Church during the year.

The number of teachers has increased in proportion to that of scholars, seven of them being from among the members of the Mission, which has been a source of great gladness to myself. The total number of teachers is now 31. Teachers' meetings are held on the first Friday of each month. We have adopted the General Assembly's method of reporting quarterly, and I believe it will stir up both teachers and scholars to greater diligence in Bible study.

A social gathering was held in connection with the opening of the Church, at which Mr. Hay kindly gave us an exhibition of views, to the delight of all present; the children as they retired receiving a bag of fruit provided by the teachers.

The collections for the year amounted to \$90.29, an increase of \$46.00 on the previous year. One special collection for Queen's College Missionary Society amounted to \$6.00. I cannot close my report without expressing our appreciation of all that the Managers of St. Andrew's Church have done for us, in enabling us to enjoy so comfortable a Church and School.

# Report of the Women's Association.

The Association has held fifteen meetings during the eight months from January to May, and from October to the close of the year, and has raised for Missionary purposes the sum of \$378.38. It has met on the first and third Fridays of these months, at 4 o'clock, for prayer, praise, Missionary intelligence, and the transaction of business. The ordinary attendance has been from twenty-five to thirty. Besides the letters regularly received from our Missionaries in India, Formosa, Trinidad and the North-West, we have had during the year a short account of each of the foreign fields occupied by our Church, as well as of the groups of Home Mission Stations. Special interest has been taken in the Mission to the Indians of the N. W., and a satisfaction felt that in contributing a large share of our funds to the W. F. M. S. we are helping to send both

General Missionary items, articles on kindred topics, and leaflets containing stimulating suggestions on giving and on personal consecration, have also been read. A larger number of our members than formerly have taken part in the meetings; and probably to this fact is due the feeling generally expressed, that in no year have our gatherings been so pleasant and so profitable.

The Association has this year adhered strictly to the plan of "direct giving," those present at each meeting bringing a voluntary contribution to the "Missionary box." We have also adopted the use of mite boxes, which have been very generally used, and have added nearly \$50.00 to our funds. The Association collected \$46.75 as a donation from the Congregation to the furnishing of the building used by the Young Men's Christian Association of University College. Early in the year, the Association made Mrs. Macdonnell a life member of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. At the annual meeting, a donation of \$25.00 having been made by a member for the purpose of creating another life membership, it was unanimously agreed to confer it on Miss Sutherland, to whom the Association feels indebted for so much of its success.

The SEWING COMMITTEE reports fifteen meetings held. About twenty ladies took part in the work, and the sum realized was \$31.33.

The VISITING COMMITTEE reports that thirteen ladies have visited the seventy-eight families who connected themselves with the Congregation during the past year.

With regard to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, it was agreed hereafter to send our contributions directly to the Presbyterial Society, instead of as heretofore through the Murray Mitchell Auxiliary; also that our membership fee of 50 cents be waived in the case of all who contribute through us the sum of \$1.00, which constitutes membership in the W.F.M.S.

#### Report of Men's Association.

The Dorset Mission work has for the last few years been carried on at 168 Adelaide Street West, which, although the best building that could be obtained at the time, has proved latterly altogether unsuited for the work. Another building has been secured a little further west on the same street, No. 230½. The new premises have been occupied about a month, to the entire satisfaction of all those connected with the work.

The different departments of the mission work show a most encouraging increase in prosperity.

At the Night School the average attendance has increased from forty-seven to about sixty.

The attendance at the Sunday School in the old building had reached the limit of accommodation, namely ninety. Since opening the new premises the Superintendent reports that the attendance has even in that short time considerably increased. This will show that new and larger quarters were urgently required.

The Treasurer's report of the Penny Savings Bank, showing, as it does, an increase of business over any previous year, is ample proof that the usefulness of that branch of the work continues.

The year was begun with such a good balance that it was not necessary to take any steps for the raising of funds until the month of October, when a circular was issued to the members and friends of the Association. A sufficient

#### Report of "Willing Helpers."

The work of this Society, which is the successor of the "Young People's Association," has been carried on during the past year on its enlarged basis with a gratifying measure of success. It is true that we are not able to make a substantial contribution to the schemes of the Church from our surplus funds, as we did last year. On the contrary, the Treasurer's statement shows a slight excess of disbursements over receipts; the deficiency, however, will be amply covered by the membership fees for the present year, which are now or will shortly be in the hands of the Treasurer. As to the work done by the Society, it may be said that its main effort has been in the direction indicated in last year's report-to "endeavour to lend a helping hand" in some departments of Christian work. House to house visiting has been carried on by its members throughout the greater part of the district assigned to this Church, with a considerable degree of regularity, and a particularly thorough visitation of this kind has just been completed. The reports of the visitors show that their labours have been followed in not a few instances by encouraging results, and we feel that we have every reason to persevere in this work, and, with God's blessing, to look forward to greater things in the future. It may be mentioned that the visitors have distributed a great number of tracts bearing on sanitary matters, along with those of a directly religious nature, which had been placed in their hands. 
