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CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

ONTARIO RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION.

- 1. That this Association be denominated "The Ontario Rifle Association."
- 2. Any person being a subscriber of \$1 per annum, shall become a member of the Association.
- 3. Donors of \$20 at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a prize of not less value than \$40, to be competed for at the annual prize meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as life members of the Association.
- 4. Any Battalion or Rifle Association in the Province subscribing not less than \$10 annually to the funds of the Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships, in the proportion of one to every half-dollar thus subscribed. Each subscribing Association is to elect from its members the persons to hold such memberships, and return their names and addresses, when elected, to the Secretary of the Association, to be registered by him one week previous to the match.
- 5. There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons named by the Council.

 The Lieut.-Governor of the Province of Ontario, for the time being, shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron."
 - 6. There shall be a President.
- There shall be four Vice-Presidents,—one for each Military District.
 - 8. There shall be a Council, composed as follows :-
 - 1st. Four members from each of the Military Districts, who shall be elected primarily at this meeting, and hereafter at the annual meeting.

2nd. The Deputy Adjutant Generals of Militia.

3rd. The Brigade Majors.

4th. The Presidents of local affiliated Associations and Clubs, being members of the Association,—

Five of whom shall form a quorum; and in the event of vacancies occurring in the elective members, from any cause whatever, the remaining members of the Council shall have the power of filling such vacancies.

9. The Council shall choose from the members elected the President of the Association.

10. There shall be a Vice-President for each Military District, selected from among the members of the Council for such District, and who shall be elected by the Council.

11. There shall be a Treasurer, and there shall be a Secretary at Toronto, both to be appointed by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.

12. The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting—such account having been previously audited by a person or persons not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of all the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.

13. The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such bylaws as may from time to time be enacted by them; no by-law being, in any case altered, or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.

14. The annual prize meeting shall be held at such times and places as may be determined on by the Council.

15. The prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such regulations as may be passed by the Council from time to time.

16. An annual report, embracing the audited account of the finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council), be published as soon after the prize meeting as may be found practicable.

17. There shall be an annual meeting, to be held at such time and place as shall be selected by the Council.

Secretaries of Rifle Associations affiliated, or desirous of affiliating with the Ontario Rifle Association, will confer a favor by forwarding the names and addresses of the office-bearers of their Associations, as soon after their election as possible, in order that they may be published in the annual report.

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There shall be two ordinary meetings of the Council; the first of which shall be held on the day of the annual meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time as the Council may then determine upon.

Extraordinary meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required by any six of the members of the Council—notification being sent to each member of the Council at least ten days previous to such meeting—and the requisition for the meeting, and the notices to the members must state the object or objects of such extraordinary meeting.

The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at all meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary, and open to the inspection of any members of the Council.

There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three members of the Council.

The Treasurer is authorized to deposit from time to time in the Savings Department of the Ontario Bank, all sums of money paid over to him on behalf of the Association.

All expenditure of sums for current expenses which may be required by the Secretary, must be authorized by the signature of the President of the Association, or in his absence, by some member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner.

Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

A detailed statement of all Receipts and expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer.

Council passed

REPORT OF COUNCIL

OF THE

ONTARIO RIFLE ASSOCIATION,

1871.

The past year has been an eventful one in the annals of this Association. Since presenting the last annual Report, Ontario has been represented at the meeting of the National Rifle Association, at Wimbledon, and not only achieved success by the efforts of her representatives, but enjoyed the prestige, of being the first of Britain's Colonies, to send her Riflemen to compete with the veteran shots who have gained for the Mother Land, the reputation of being first in the skilled science of marksmanship.

That her kiflemen by their prestige may secure peace and protect her liberties, is the earnest desire of Her Majesty's loyal and devoted Canadian Subjects; and it is with such objects and aspirations that your Council seek to advance and develope the growth of our own youthful national organization—relying on that peace which is secured by a knowledge of, and respect for, our strength "for Defence, not Defiance."

Your Council congratulate your Association on the generous recognition by the people of Ontario of the objects which led to the representation of the Association at Wimbledon. That such a representation has proved of undoubted and lasting benefit to the Province, in other ways than the stimulation of generous rivalry in the art of shooting, is abundantly proved by the interest that their visit has excited in Great Britain. That the familiar intercourse thus commenced will lead to permanent and beneficial results in strengthening our connection with the Mother land, and leading her people to think of us as trans-atlantic brethren and fellow subjects, rather than as Colonial dependants, is a consummation that may be reasonably looked for, and that the visit will go far to dispel the ignorance that obtains regarding the character and resources of the country, and tend to bring it to

the notice of intending emigrants, as a field for their labors, may be confidently expected.

The gallant bearing and loyal character of our representatives was an earnest of the unchanging devotion and loyalty of our countrymen to the Mother land, and cannot fail to awaken a reciprocal feeling in the hearts of those, whom we long to assure of our sympathies and affections. These and other benefits growing from a freer and more intimate intercourse, we hope to reap, from the visit of our representatives to Wimbledon.

The Council beg reference to the accompanying full report from Lieut.-Colonel Skinner, Captain of the Ontario Wimbledon Team.

Owing doubtless to the tax which the contributions towards the Wimbledon fund has laid upon Corporations and individuals, your Association is not able this year to report an increase in the generous contributions towards the Association. They have to record the munificent grants of the Dominion and Provincial Legislatures, the Gifts of his Excellency the Governor-General, and of the Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, and the donations of the Canada Company and T. C. Street, Esq. Besides these a liberal subscription by the ladies of Ontario has enabled your Association to purchase a handsome silver challenge cup, which they offer as the first prize in the Affiliated Association Match. They have again to record as evidences of the interest taken in the Association by residents of the Mother Country. the receipt of a silver cup from Messrs. Elkington & Co., the world renowned silversmiths; of a match rifle from George Gibb, Esq., the patentee and manufacturer of the Metford rifle, and a match rifle from Messrs. Reilly & Co., the well known Gun Manufacturers, of Oxford Street, London. To these gentlemen the thanks of the Association are especially due, not only for the value of the gifts so generously made, but for the evidence of their desire to recognize Canadian institutions and progress.

Your Council congratulate your Association that they are again able to report a balance to the credit of the Association, notwithstanding the decrease in receipts caused by the Wimbledon contributions, and the small attendance at the Prize meeting. They trust that the coming year will enable them to record, once more the municipal grants of former years, and that the annual subscriptions will be larger than at present. They regret to say, that notwithstanding the appeal made in the Report of the Association, and through the newspapers, last year, the number of annual members continues to be very small. They hope another year will cure this indifference, and that the support of the people of Ontario will not be wanting to secure the permanency and efficiency of your Association.

It is a matter of the gravest regret that the success of the annua Prize meeting, was again interfered with by the existence of large Brigade Car had been ma adjournmen of an annumeetings in

In the deatl they have sust energetic promand zealous metial and courte meetings of the Brigade Camps during the continuance of the meeting: although efforts had been made by the President to prevent their clashing, by successive adjournments. Your Council have decided, in view of the likelihood of an annual interference of this character, to postpone the Prize meetings in the future, until the autumn of the year.

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The Prize meeting, although attended by small numbers, was in other respects satisfactory. Provision had been made for a large number of competitors, the arrangements were complete, and the regulations of the Association carried out with entire satisfaction to all concerned. The two essential characteristics for a successful match were, however, wanting; fine weather, and a numerous competition. It unfortunately happened, that after a long period of fair weather, the time of the meeting should fall upon a week remarkable for boisterous and uncertain storms of wind and rain. It is no small drawback, as well to the character of the shooting, as to the comfort of the competitors, that everything should be soaked with rain, tents blown down, and firing made uncertain by sudden gales of wind; but under these disadvantages, the Prize meeting for 1871 was carried out.

The Prize List comprised about \$1400.00 in cash prizes, besides the Aldwell challenge trophy, the Brassey cup, the Ladies' challenge, and the Elkington cups, with the cups presented by His Excellency the Governor-General, and the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, together with the Metford Rifle, presented by Geo. Gibb, Esq., and a large number of Snider Enfield Rifles and ammunition; altogether an attractive and satisfactory Prize list, which would doubtless have drawn together a large number of competitors, had not the Brigade Camps interfered.

Owing to the experience of 1870 the markers did their work well. No accidents occurred. The thanks of the Association are again due to Lieut.-Col. Denison, and Major Otter, as Executive and Range Officers, to Surgeons Richardson, Thorburn, and Lizars, as Medical Officers, and the officers of the city corps who lent their aid as squad commanders. They are again indebted to the reporters of the Globe, Leader, and Telegraph, for their full and able reports of the proceedings.

The liberality of the Grand Trunk, Great Western, and Northern Railway Companies, and of the Royal Mail Line of Steamers, in carrying competitors to and from their homes at one fare, deserve the thanks of the Association.

In the death of the late Lieut.-Col. Fairbanks, your Council feel that they have sustained a loss not easily to be supplied. An active and energetic promoter of the formation of the Association, an untiring and zealous member of the Council'since its formation, and an impartial and courteous member of the Executive Committee during the meetings of the Association; he will long be regretted by his coadjutors,

and the members of the Association, in the welfare of which he took so lively an interest.

Your Council have decided to vote again the bonus of \$20 00 for 1872, on the following conditions, viz:—The amount, together with a special badge provided by the Association, to be awarded to the highest aggregate score made at the Annual Match of the Affiliating Association during the year 1872; upon the condition, that the holder of the badge shall present himself at the Ontario Rifle Association Matches for 1873, to compete in a match provided for the purpose; as a means of ensuring a full representation from affiliating associations, and to establish a nursery for the representation of Ontario, at future Dominion and Wimbledon competitions. And upon the further condition, that an authorized copy of the winning scores at such match be furnished to the Secretary of the Ontario Rifle Association, on or before the 1st November, 1872.

SIR,—I have the honor to report that just a year ago, you notified me that I had been selected by the Council of the Association to organize and command a team of Volunteer marksmen, to represent the Province of Ontario at the forthcoming meeting of the National Rifle Association at Wimbledon, and in the event of my accepting the position the work of collecting the funds necessary to carry out the undertaking, would devolve upon me.

After a few days consideration over the matter, I notified you that I accepted the position and responsibility, and at once arranged my business so that I might be able to give the whole of my time to the undertaking.

I decided to get up a team of twenty, the outside number authorized by the Association, and estimated the expense at eight thousand dollars.

Without any delay I notified each officer commanding a Volunteer Corps in the Province, what I had undertaken, and requested them to send me the names of the best shots in their respective corps, who would be willing to join the team, in the event of their being selected.

After an interval of a month, I only received eight replies to my communications. I felt disappointed, as I had a right to expect a patriotic.

During the month of December I petitioned the Provincial Legislature, all the county, and most of the city and town councils, for grants of money towards defraying expenses. I attended the meetings of several councils, when, after explanation, the matter was (with one exception) taken up in a patriotic spirit, and a liberal sum given to me.

About the middle of the month I commenced a tour of the Province, and from that time until the latter end of May, I was, with the exception of about three weeks, constantly on the road. I visited in all sixty-eight different places, and upon the whole was well received. For this I was indebted, in a great measure, to the hearty manner in which the leading newspapers in the Province advocated the undertaking.

In travelling through the country, a good deal of my time was spent in soliciting the interest of members of the several corporations, in which I was cordially assisted by gentlemen connected with the volunteer force, in almost every place visited.

I made it my business to see personally the best marksmen in each locality, my desire being, in selecting the team, to get the best shots if possible, to have the different sections of the Province represented,

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and if practicable to have in it the several nationalities composing our population. I explained to each of them, the terms on which I was to get up the team, viz.: that passage from Canada to Wimbledon and back would be provided, as well as subsistence on the way, and until the conclusion of the match, but that each member would have to give his time for nothing, on this understanding they would be notified to attend preliminary trial matches in their respective districts. The following gentlemen having kindly undertaken the superintendence of the preliminary matches, viz.:-Colonel Moffatt, at London; Colonel Gillmor, at Toronto; Major Phillips, at Kingston; and Colonel Forrest, at Ottawa. Candidates for admission to the team being notified to attend; one hundred and thirty-seven put in an appearance. Out of the number I selected forty-seven for final trial, and notified them to present themselves at Hamilton, for competition at a match to be held there, to commence on the 17th of May. Thirty-three candidates attended, when they were subjected to a further test, during three days, under my own personal supervision.

Previous to their dismissal, I intimated that I would make a selection as soon as possible, and would give each one selected due notice. I again took occasion to explain to them all, the terms on which the members of the team would be dealt with, and that in addition, I had decided to divide any prize money that might be obtained, equally among all; after deducting entry fees, ammunition, &c., and that when the team got together, each member would have to sign a paper containing terms of agreement.

Previous to our departure from Canada, I applied to the Adjutant-General of Militia for leave to proceed to England on this duty, and authority was granted, in compliance with the request, in General orders of the 10th June, 1871, as follows:—

"The following officers having been selected by Lt.-Col. Skinner, to compete as representing the Province of Ontario, at the approaching meeting of the National Rifle Association, at Wimbledon, England; are hereby granted leave of absence for three months from the date of embarkation:—Lieut.-Col. J. Skinner, 13th Batt., Capt. W.H.Cotton, No. 2 Battery Ottawa Brigade Garrison Artillery, Lieut. A. P. Patrick, No. 3 Battery Ottawa Brigade Garrison Artillery, Ensign John Burch, 2nd Battalion, Lieut. J. Little, 13th Batt., Capt. D. Gibson, Toronto Garrison Artillery, Capt. A. R. McCleneghan, No. 6 Co'y. 22nd Bat., Ensign T. Wastie, No. 5 Co'y. 7th Batt., Capt. W. R. Bell, 2nd Batt. Rifles, G. T. R.'

It will be seen that we proceeded to England duly authorized, both by the Militia Department and the Ontario Rifle Association.

The following is a copy of the agreement with the signatures, which which was signed on board ship:—

"We, the officers, non Skinner, from sent said Probe held at We the team, are time to time

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3rd. "An Captain, or of the force assesshall forfeit 1 4th. "The

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"We, the undersigned, agree to the following regulations. The officers, non-commissioned officers and privates selected by Lieut.-Col. Skinner, from the volunteer force of the Province of Ontario, to represent said Province at the meeting of the National Rifle Association, to be held at Wimbledon, are to be under his command, as Captain of the team, and to be subject to such orders and regulatious as he from time to time may issue for their guidance."

"No member of the team to be absent from the headquarters of the team, from the day of landing in England, and until the conclusion of the match at Wimbledon; on any pretence whatever; without the Captain's permission.

3rd. "Any member of the team disobeying the orders of the Captain, or contravening any of the orders made for the regulation of the force assembled at Wimbledon, or be under the influence of drink, shall forfeit his return tickets.

4th. "The several members of the team shall have their Railway and Steamer fares paid, as well as their ordinary board on the Steamer, and at such places after landing, and until the conclusion of the match at Wimbledon, as the Captain may select; all these allowances to be stopped from any member of the team, guilty of a breach of this agreement.

5th. "No member of the team shall send communications to the press for publication, with respect to the shooting or any other matter connected with the team without the Captain's permission.

6th. "The Captain will provide the necessary ammunition, pay entry fees, &c., for matches open to the team, as a team, or as individuals, and all prizes won by the team or by individuals in such matches, shall be divided equally among the members of the team after deducting the cost of entry fees, ammunition, &c.

A few days after the competition at Hamilton, I decided who were to compose the team, and notified each individual that I would leave Toronto by the Grand Trunk Railway on the evening of the 6th June, and would expect them all to meet me there or on the road to Montreal. Eleven of the number met me in Toronto, the remainder joining us at various stations on the way.

Just on the eve of my departure, I received notice that one of the parties selected, could not leave home. I at once telegraphed to Captain Werner, of Kingston, to accompany me, which he did, and it gives me much pleasure to record my indebtedness to him; for on seeing the great amount of work that necessarily fell upon me, he volunteered to perform a part of it. I therefore appointed him Quarter-Master, and from the time of our landing in England until the dispersion of the team in London; he not only discharged the duties required of him in common with the rost, but performed the duties of his office in the most indefatigable manner.

On arrival in Montreal, Colonel Osborne Smith, officers of the Volunteer force and other gentlemen, gave us a hearty welcome, and did all in their power to make our stay there very pleasant. We remained in Montreal until the evening of the 9th, when we proceeded to Quebec.

We sailed from the latter place by the S. S. Scandinavian, on the 10th June, and after a very fine passage, arrived in Liverpool on the 21st of the same month, where I received every facility in passing the Custom house.

After seeing all the members of the team comfortably settled at an hotel, I called upon the gentlemen officially connected with the range at Altear, by whom I was very kindly received, and the range placed at my disposal.

Next day I left Liverpool, accompanied by the team, for Altcar, a distance of twelve miles, when having made arrangements for practice and procured temporary accommodation for the team at an hotel a short distance from the range; I placed the next senior officer in command, and left the same night for London, in order to report myself at the office of the National Rifle Association.

Whilst in Liverpool, I was fortunate to meet Sir Feter Tait, and was very much pleased to learn that he and other gentlemen in London, were much interested in the team; and that on his return home, a committee would be organized with a view to getting up a special match

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Previous to invitation from where we were took the oppor

among ourselves, something similar to what was usually done for the Belgians who attended the Wimbledon meeting. Sir Peter also informed me that he had already given orders for the manufacture of a cup, which he proposed presenting for competition in the Dominion. The cup, a most magnificent one, is to be competed for at the next meeting of the Ontario Rifle Association, the match to be open to teams from all the Provinces, and my instructions are to place it in the mean time in the custody of the Honorable the Minister of Militia.

On my arrival in London, I at once proceeded to the office of the National Rifle Association, where I was kindly welcomed by Captain Mildmay, the Secretary; and was very much gratified on being informed by him, that the Council had decided on making an exception to the rules in our case, that I could still enter for the "Queen's" and "St. George's," and that no charge would be made on account of post entries, in any of the other matches open to us, and for which I might wish to enter.

I afterwards called upon Captain Costin, the executive officer of the Association, who was very glad to see me. Both gentlemen took great pains in explaining every thing connected with the competition, and kindly offered to give me all the information I might at any time require.

During this and a subsequent visit, I was obliged to make to London, I was very much indebted to Captain Tait, of "the London Irish Volunteers," he having placed his whole time at my disposal; indeed were it not for his valuable assistance, I could not have got through with the business I had to transact, in so satisfactory a manner.

On my return to Altcar, I found the team in good health and fairly settled down to practice. Being desirous to have them all together at the range, Dr. Parsons very kindly gave me use of his hut, the range Committee supplied the necessary number of burdettes, mattrasses, &c., and Captain Tait sent from London a bale containing one hundred blankets. We were once more comfortably settled under one roof, and as there was a canteen on the range, favorable arrangements were made with the Proprietor for our subsistence. We remained at Altcar, practising twice a day until the morning of Saturday, the 8th July.

The Liverpool Volunteers were very kind and attentive, they certainly did their utmost to make our sojourn amongst them very pleasant, and I am happy to say that our intercourse with one and all, was most cordial and friendly.

Previous to leaving Liverpool, I accepted, on behalf of the team, an invitation from the field officers to dine with them at the Royal hotel, where we were entertained most sumptuously. During the evening, I took the opportunity to say, that we did not visit England with the

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it, and was n London, me, a comcial match object in coming over, was to tell the people of Great Britain, that the people of Canada were imbued with the same loyal and patriotic feelings as themselves; that they dearly loved the Queen; that it was their earnest wish and desire to remain in connection with the Motherland, to live and die under the old Flag, and that they were ready at all times to do their share towards supporting and maintaining the honor and dignity of the Empire. The very cordial and hearty manner in which the few words I said were received, not only on this, but on many subsequent occasions; in the Camp at Wimbledon; and in London; was very gratifying to us all, as it made us feel that the tie which binds the Mother-Country to the Dominion, is not so weak as many in Canada have been led to suppose.

As a slight token of appreciation of the great kindness shown to us in Liverpool, I had a cup made, with the following inscription:—
"Presented to the Liverpool Volunteers, as a memento of the Visit of the Ontario Team to Altear, 1871," which I left with Colonel Jones, Inspecting Officer of the District, to be competed for by teams from the different corps.

Having made arrangements with the Midland Railway, for a special carriage and baggage van to run through to Wimbledon; we left Liverpool, in charge of a Special Conductor, at 8.30, on the morning of the 8th July (many of our Volunteer friends being at the Station to bid us good-bye), and arrived at Wimbledon Station at 5 P.M., where we found Sir Peter and Captain Tait waiting to receive us. We at once proceeded to the Camp, and in about an hour's time were comfortably settled in our tents.

I entered all the members of the team for the "Queen's," "St. George's," "Alexandra," "Windmill," "Martini," and "Snider Nursery;" those of the number having small bore rifles, for "The Albert," and "any Rifle Nursery;" the four winners of national medals for "The Prince of Wales;" the whole team for "The Imperial Challenge Cup," and for our own special match, got up by Sir Peter Tait's Committee; and, in addition, having given permission to the individual members to enter for any further matches open to them, and which would not interfere with their other engagements; the prizes which might be won in such matches, to be the property of the winners. Sufficient work was found for the whole team during the continuance of the meeting.

Being satisfied that many of the rifles taken with us from Canada would not stand the Wimbledon test, the sights of many having evidently been altered since their original issue, I had them all examined by the Armourer of the Association, who reported, that in the event of a protest, at least one-half of the number would be rejected. I at

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once made the matter known to the Council, when new Government rifles were given to me: with which, having been exchanged for those of our own that were defective, I set the men to work.

Our reception by Earl Ducie, President of the Council, and all the gentlemen connected in an official capacity with the Association, was most friendly, and during the continuance of the Camp, nothing could be more pleasant than my daily intercourse with them all.

Earl and Countess Dacie, in an especial manner, evinced the greatest interest in the team, several of us, frequently having had the honor of participating in the hospitalities of "Windmill Cottage."

During our stay in Camp, the team had the honor of being visited by Prince Arthur, the Crown Prince of Prussia, the Crown Prince of Denmark, Lady Lisgar, Lord Spencer, Lord Heatherby, Lord Lindsay, Sir Hope Grant, Sir Stafford Northcote, and many other noblemen and gentlemen; all of whom expressed the warmest interest in Canada.

A good deal of my time at Wimbledon was spent in receiving and returning the visits of our brother Volunteers, who one and all vied with each other in their efforts to make us feel at home amongst them; and they certainly succeeded. I received invitations to mess from almost every corps in Camp—of course, we could not be everywhere; but when we did put in an appearance, we were received in the most friendly manner, and treated with unbounded hospitality. The bighearted "London Scottish" contributed largely to our enjoyment of camp life, and we were much indebted to them for many of the pleasant evenings we passed at Wimbledon. Our intercourse with all in Camp was most friendly and agreeable; and I only hope that a team from the Mother Country will before long visit Canada, when we can have an opportunity of doing a little in the way of returning the great kindness shown to us.

A grand banquet, in honor of the team, was given by Sir Peter and Lady Tait, at their house in Putney, where many ladies and gentlemen were invited to meet us. To Sir Peter and his amiable Lady, we owe a deep debt of gratitude, for their unwearied exertions on our behalf, and for repeated acts of warm-hearted hospitality. As for Sir Peter, he did not lose sight of us from the moment of our arrival in Liverpool, and never allowed a day to pass without visiting us in Camp.

It was very pleasing to us all to see so many Canadians; numbers from all parts of the Dominion came every day to my tent. I must specially mention Mr. D. McInnis, of Hamilton; Mr. Magee, of Ottawa; Colonel Cumberland, Mr. John Gordon, Major Croft, of Toronto; and Mr. Carruthers, of Kingston; to all of whom I am indebted for many acts of kindness.

Hundreds of visitors to the Camp called upon me, a large number of them in search of information respecting Canada, with a view to emigrating. It gave me much pleasure to reply to all their questions;

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om Canada naving evil examined a the event ected. I at and having copies of a pamphlet, referring to Ontario, supplied to me by the Honorable John Carling, I took the opportunity of distributing many of them.

The Imperial Challenge Cup match elicited a great deal of interest, not only among Volunteers, but also among the many thousand visitors to the camp; this being the first occasion, that a Colonial team had the temerity to enter the lists to contend for a prize, with a team of British Volunteers. Opposed to us were twenty of the best shots in the three kingdoms, and we were fairly beaten by one hundred and one points. I enclose with this, a copy of the register of scores made by both teams. Ours being the only Colonial team competing, the second prize of one hundred pounds sterling fell to our lot.

I herewith enclose list of Prizes won by the team in the matches for which I entered, by which you will see that eleven out of the twenty took twenty-three prizes amounting in all to ninety-five pounds. This, considering the great odds against us, was as much as could be reasonably expected, although I must say it was no little disappointment to me that not a single member of the team got into the second stage of the "Queen's."

The competition finally ended on the evening of Friday, the 21st July. The arrangements for conducting the meeting were perfect; everything went on with smoothness and regularity; and it was particularly pleasing to see the amity and good feeling existing among competitors, during the most exciting contests.

On Saturday, by previous arrangement with Earl Ducie, I presented myself with the team, in front of the grand stand; when each of us had the honor to receive from the hands of the Princess Louise, a badge presented by the Association in commemoration of our visit to Wimbledon.

I remained in camp until Monday afternoon, saw everything handed over, settled damages, and bade good-bye to all the gentlemen officially connected with the camp.

Next day, all the members of the team joined me at the Cannon Street Hotel, where we were entertained at a banquet, given by Merchants of the city of London, in their usual princely manner; when Mr. Morley, M.P., the chairman, presented each of us with a very handsome medal, as a memento of our visit to London. At the close of this truly magnificent entertainment I dismissed the team; several of the number leaving town the same evening. I remained until the Saturday night following, my time being occupied in paying official visits, and winding up matters connected with the undertaking.

The members of the team while under my command, (with one or two exceptions which I think unnecessary to particularize) having conducted themselves in the most exemplary manner, it gave me much pleasure to lour agreement ticked without any in the hands equal distribution.

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the followin mentioned, Alderman B Mr. Cook, M Sir John Re Mr. Phillips, Mr. Jackson terest in our

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pleasure to have it in my power to do more for them, than the terms of our agreement required. I, therefore, in addition to giving them all return tickets, divided the whole of the prize money amongst them without any deduction for entry monies, &c.; and placed my cheque in the hands of Captain Werner, for one hundred pounds sterling for equal distribution; making in all twenty pounds sterling for each of the twenty.

I must take this opportunity to place upon record my indebtedness to the following, noblemen and gentlemen in addition to those already mentioned, viz.: Lord Elcho, Lord Bury, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Alderman Besley, Mr. Morley, M.P., Mr. Hope Morley, Mr. Leaf, Mr. Cook, Mr. French, Mr. A. R. McPherson, Mr. P. S. Buchanan, Sir John Rose, Captain Hutchinson, Sir Randal Roberts, Dr. Rae, Mr. Phillips, Colonel Steble, Major Bousfield, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Powell, Mr. Jackson and Mr. George Gibbs, all of whom took a friendly interest in our mission.

In conclusion, I beg leave to say, that I undertook the responsible position of Captain of the team, in the belief that good could only result from the presence of so many Canadian volunteers in England; and I have not been disappointed. Through the public press for at least a month, Canada has been daily brought before the British people, and in the most favorable aspect; and the most kindly feeling on the part of all classes of the community, elicited on behalf of the Dominion.

I would, therefore, respectfully but earnestly recommend, that a team (as large a one as possible), be sent home every year; not merely to represent Ontario, but the whole Dominion: being fully satisfied, apart from other most important considerations, that no cheaper or more efficient emigration agency (even should the Dominion Government pay the expense, including a liberal allowance to the men comprising the team for their loss of time), could be obtained.

Should my recommendation be acted upon, and a Dominion team sent to Wimbledon, I have the promise of the N. R. A., that ground would be specially set apart for a Dominion Camp. I have also the assurance of Sir Peter Tait and other gentlemen, that the committee already in existence would become permanent; in which case the team would be well looked after, Canada still more prominently brought into notice, and the captain more favorably situated than I was: having only a small tent, in which to receive the very great number of friends who honored us with their presence.

I herewith enclose statement in detail, of all the monies contributed towards defraying expenses, and received by me, previous to my departure, and since my return, I also enclose statement of my disbursements, in which, having in view the experimental nature of this first

attempt, I used every economy commensurate with my representative position, and the comfort of those under my command; and I have much pleasure in sending you my cheque for the balance remaining, viz.: one thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight dollars and fifty-nine

I send you two "Martini Henry" Rifles, the gift of Mr. Martini, also a field glass with stand, which I purchased for the use of the team at Wimbledon.

The thanks of the association are particularly due to Mr. C. J. Brydges, who so generously granted free passes over the Grand Trunk Railway, for all the members of the team, for the double journey, from Toronto to Quebec.

My hearty thanks are due to yourself personally, and also to those other gentlemen throughout the Province, who so cordially assisted me, in collecting money and otherwise; and whose kind words of encouragement, lightened as much as possible the labors of my arduous undertaking.

Having parted with the team on the same friendly terms which always existed between us; it was with very great regret (certainly not all on my own account, but for the sake of the team, and of the force with which we have the honor to be connected), I subsequently learned that one of our number; from motives best known to himself; had seen fit to make me the subject of an attack in the newspapers of the Province, and that too, in such terms, that regard for the position I occupied, and feelings of self-respect, equally precluded the possibility of any notice on my part.

Influenced solely by a sense of duty, and an earnest desire to be of some service to my adopted country, I rest content with the plain statement of facts connected with my management of the undertaking, from its inception to its close, which I now submit.
