
IN POLAND

Petrograd, Jan. 14—Furious fighting has been resumed in Russian Poland. The Russian forces in the north, which are pushing toward East Prussia, in the region near Milaama, have captured several villages. "In the centre the Germans have made four violent attacks within the last forty-eight hours. They forced back the Russians and occupied considerable ground. "In Champagne, the region of Perthes, continued to be the scene of local engagements for the possesison of German trenches on the second and third lines of defense. To the north of Beausejour we blew up some of the enemy's positions to make impossible his laying of mines. "The Germans, believing they were being attacked, manned their trenches. We then opened a violent artillery and infantry fire on these positions. "There is nothing to report on the rest of the front."
