





TEMPERANCE WORK OF CATHOLIC CHURCH

Dr. Dube at Knowlton Explains
Campaign Started by Archbishop Bruchesi

Knowlton, Que, July 29—At the Temperance Convention here Dr. Dube gave a graphich description of the battle against alcoholism, and an account of the methods employed by the earnest temperance reformers of the Roman Catholic Church. The home and family life were touched on. The part to be played by the mother in weaving a shelter of home protection, for husband and little ones, was described; the duty of the father to be a true moral leader of his sons was pointed out.

The three lines of activity being pursued by my church," said Dr. Dube, "are education, law enforcement, and legislation. We are teaching the teachers of the children. I have just given four lectures to teachers at Joliette, the substance of which will be repeated to 6,000 children next winter. We are encouraging Savings Banks in our schools, believing that if we inoculate the children with the spirit of thrift they will not afterwards waste their money on drink. We don't intend to lose time with fools who won't give up their love of drink, or with victims who cannot; we are after the children. Clubs and social circles are being formed in every parish and our organization is being perfected so that we shall soon have a committee in each parish whose duty it will be to get the bars closed where possible and to get the law enforced all the time. "The campaign started by Archbishop Bruchessi is designed to cover every point of attack and meet every emergency. By resolute, patient endeavor, we must win. We could close every bar in Montreal in two weeks if we tried, but, while probibition is my flag. I prefer that we shall capture the country furnishes the life-blood of the city. 
