He warned the House and the country against alarmist rumors. There had been rumors of riots here and there. The minister stated that there was one small riot last night in Poplar, one of the London suburbs.

So for these, and many other reasons, children should be taken from the custody of a mother who will teach them low ideals of conduct and who will almost certainly lead her daughters to follow her example.

Have done with her. Put her and her lover out of your mind, out of your soul, and build your life again along other lines. 
