Tanker And Ferry Launched At Palmer's Shipyard, Jarrow

First of Anglo-Saxon Fleet and Australian Steamer Built in Britain—Is Steel Single Screw Motorship, 9,900 Deadweight Tons

The first of a fleet of oil tankers ordered from various shipbuilders by the Anglo-Saxon Petroleum Co. Ltd., of London, has been launched at Palmer's Shipyard, Jarrow. She is the Pecten, a steel, single screw motorship of about 9,900 deadweight tons, which will have a length overall of 40 feet and has been built under Lloyd's special survey to their highest class for the carrying of petroleum in bulk, the construction being on the combined longitudinal and transverse system of framing.

special service conditions in Sydney Harbor and yet be thoroughly seaworthy vessels, capable of making the 14,000 miles' voyage to Australia under her own power. The performance of a sister vessel, built for this firm, both at sea and on service, has given complete satisfaction to her owners in both these divergent respects.

PRINCIPAL DIMENSIONS

The principal dimensions of Karakara and Kalang are as follows: Length overall, 199 feet; length between perpendiculars, 187 feet; breadth extreme, 45 feet 3 1/2 inches; breadth moulded, 33 feet; 6 inches; depth moulded, 11 feet. The vessels are designed to carry 80 vehicles or an equivalent of deck passengers on a draft of 12 feet 2 inches and a displacement of 11,200 tons.

OPTIMISM OF FUTURE

Speaking after the launching, Summers Hunter, chairman and managing director of the North-Eastern Marine Engineering Co., Ltd., congratulated the Palmer's company on having built such a vessel which had numerous outstanding features. It was, he said, probably the largest vessel to be fitted with single screw diesel engines. Although his firm had built the engines they could not claim all the credit for them, for they were assembled by the designers of the type, and also with Mr. Zulver, of the Anglo-Saxon Co. They had developed the engine, and experiments were being carried out which he was confident would be successful. It would be more fitting as Palmer had built the engines, but that was simply one of the things which was due to the saving of the pondulum. It was very pleasing to see Palmer's yards so comparatively full of work, and he hoped the future of the firm would surpass its past record. There was no finality in shipbuilding and in the requirements of the British Empire in regard to ships. Palmer's had done their full share in this regard to the building of merchant and warships. Times were bad just now but there was always a gleam of sunshine.

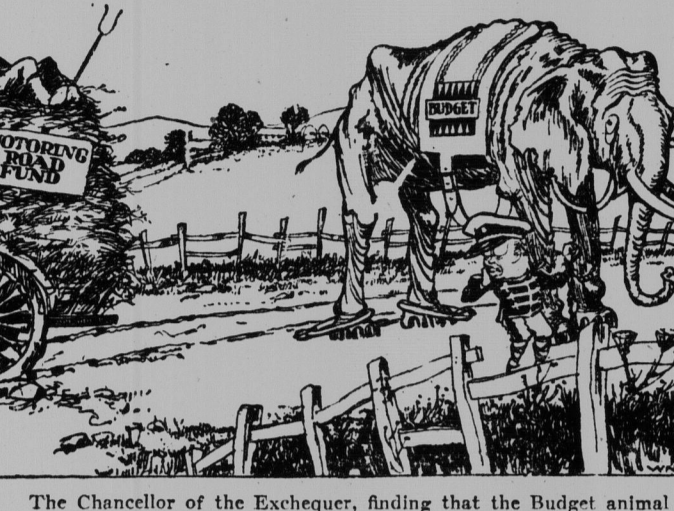

**Dorothy Dix**

**Advice to an Unhappy Husband in a Desperate Situation—Can a Dead Wife Come Between a Widower and His Fiancée?—Why the Gay Girl Who Finally Settles Down Makes the Best Wife.**

DEAR MISS DIX—I am a married man with three children, and the best-looking little wife you ever saw, but she has gone crooked. She admits it, and says that she loves this other man. I worship her and have done my best for her, forgiven her, bought her clothes I could not afford, but she just can't keep straight. This is running me mad. What shall I do? Kill her and the man? Get a divorce, or what? COWARD.



DOROTHY DIX

ANSWER: Get a divorce. The children's welfare demands that they be removed from under the corrupting influence of such a mother. An immoral father is bad enough, but he is not the curse to his children that an immoral mother is to hers, because the children are not influenced as they are under the mother's. A good mother may nullify the influence of a bad father, but no father can atone to his children for having a bad mother.

Also a man's immoralities are not often staged under his children's eyes, while a loose-living woman is an ill bird that fouds her own nest. Likewise, it reflects far more on children for them to have a bad mother than to have a bad father. So for these and many other reasons, children should be taken from the custody of a mother who will teach them low ideals of conduct and who will almost certainly lead her daughters to follow her example. It is perhaps because women of this kind, who have an attraction for other men, have a double attraction for their husbands, that they are so often loved far above their worth and much more than better women.

And it is this baffled love and jealousy, as well as the insult to his honor, that make many a betrayed husband slay those who have wrecked his home. But for all desperate remedies for a desperate situation, this is the most sensible. It brings back to the man none of the happiness of which he has been robbed, but it brings utter ruin upon himself and his children.

Potato Omelet—Beat three eggs till very light, add a teaspoon onion juice, one-half tablespoon minced parsley, if convenient, and three cups of hot mashed potato. Beat till fluffy, transfer to a medium sized frying pan in which three tablespoons of vegetable fat have been melted and cook gently till brown on the bottom. Fold over like an ordinary omelet and serve plain, or with any kind of creamed, cooked or salt meat or creamed fish.
- Breaded Asparagus—Put bread crumbs or cracker crumbs into butter and let them get a golden brown. Roll asparagus in salted water and drain well. Place the asparagus into the warm crumbs and pour hot melted butter over all. Add salt and pepper and serve hot.
- Rhubarb Pudding—Into a deep pudding dish put as much cut rhubarb as will be needed for your family. Sprinkle well with sugar, and if desired, add the juice of one orange. Cover with a batter lighter than would be used for layer cake (the lighter the better) and bake in the oven till cooked. Serve from the dish in which it is baked. It does not require a sauce.
- Egg Salad—Boil eggs hard, cut in half lengthwise, remove yolks, crumb them and mix with melted butter, salt, mustard and red pepper; return to whites and serve on lettuce with mayonnaise.

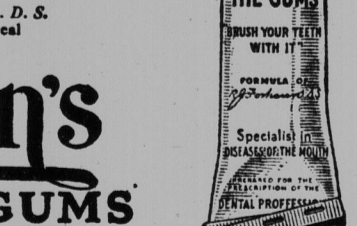
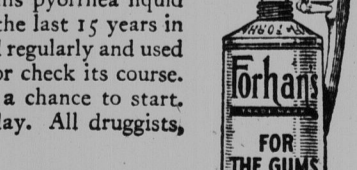

Conference in London Latter Part of May

KELLOGG PLEASSED

Idea For Tighter Restrictions Originated With the British Government

WASHINGTON, May 5—Great Britain wants to do her part toward preventing the smuggling of liquor into the United States.

MEET IN MAY

The invitation to a conference, to be held shortly in London, has been accepted.

Correspondence between Washington and London on the subject made public last night, discloses that the idea for tighter restrictions with Great Britain's aid, originated with British authorities and that the conference invitation was extended "as proof of the desire of His Majesty's government to give such assistance."

In accepting the invitation with deep appreciation, Secretary Kellogg said the United States delegation should arrive in London by the end of May.

The correspondence reveals that British shipping laws are being rigidly enforced against vessels suspected of rum running, that registers of shipping in the West Indies have been called upon to take special care to prevent transfers to the British flag of vessels intended for the smuggling trade and that the British want to remove liquor smugglers from the British register.

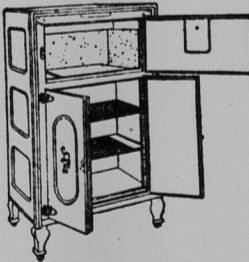

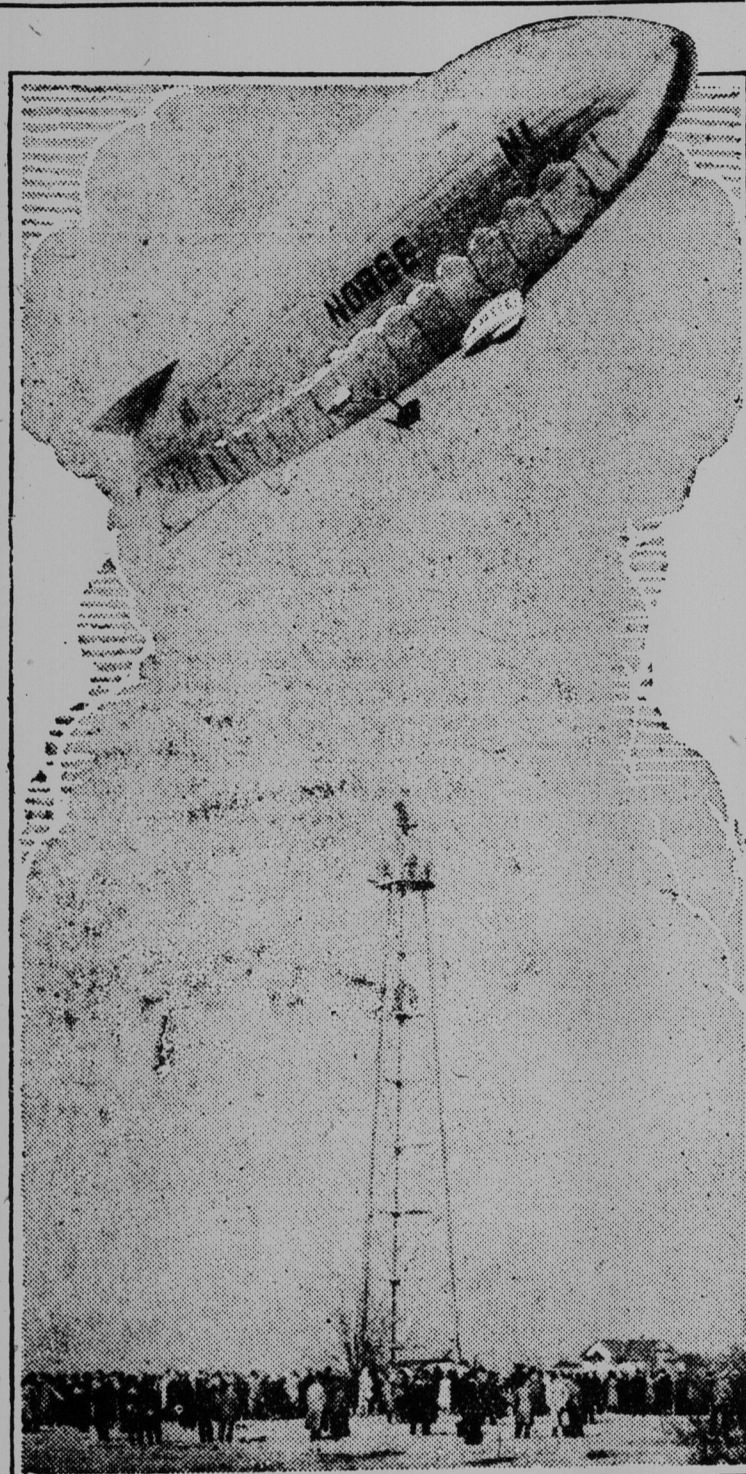

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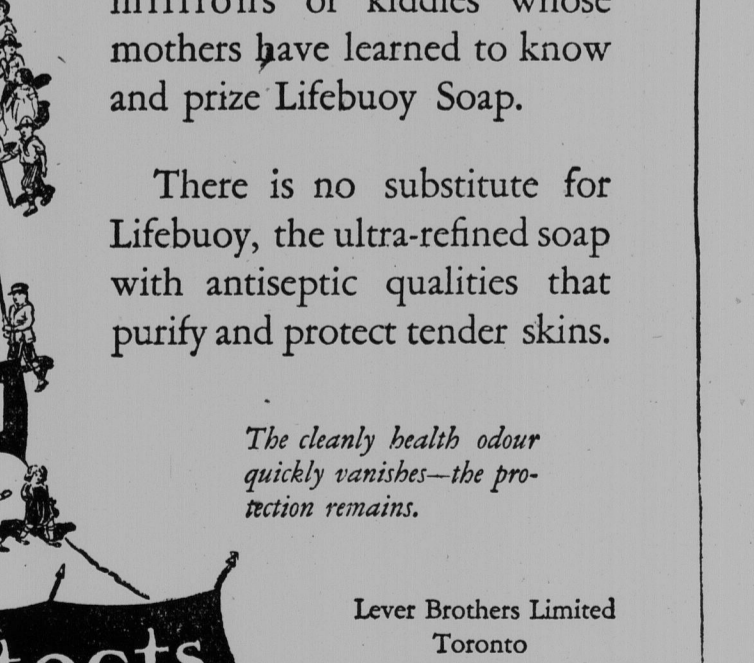

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**COMMONS DEBATES ELECTION APPEAL FROM PEACE RIVER**

**King Starts Discussion by Effort to Knock Out Petition**

**LEGALITY QUESTION RAISED BY PREMIER**

**Meighen Says Serious Step Will Be Taken if Plea Isn't Received**

**OTTAWA, May 4**—It was ten in the evening before the discussion ended on the Peace River petition and the speaker reserved his ruling.

**OTTAWA, April 4**—Shortly after the opening of the house this afternoon, Premier W. L. Mackenzie King raised a point of order as to whether the petition of J. A. Collins, questioning the right of D. M. Kennedy, Progressive, to retain his seat as member for Peace River, Alberta, was properly before the members of the House of Commons.

This petition was presented several days ago by Hon. R. B. Bennett (Conservative, Calgary West) on behalf of Mr. Collins, who was Conservative candidate in the Peace River riding at the recent general election.

Premier King stated that the petition was presented under the Contravened Elections Act. He pointed out that this matter was already before the courts. The purpose of this particular act, under which the petition was filed, said the Prime Minister, "was to remove from the jurisdiction of parliament any matter relating to the election of members."

The act had been passed in 1874. In 1874 a case had been brought before the House of Commons when a petition had been presented for the defeated candidate in Gaspe, Speaker Anglin, at that time was of the opinion that it was an election petition and ought not to be received.

Premier King cited other instances of the speakers refusing to receive petitions.

**MEIGHEN SPEAKS.**  
Hon. Arthur Meighen said "A most serious step is to be taken in this petition is not to be received."

The precedents quoted by the Prime Minister, said Mr. Meighen, did not preclude the acceptance of Mr. Bennett's petition. The real point at issue was whether or not the house had the right to examine the conduct of the deputy returning officer, who was a servant of parliament.

Hon. E. M. MacDonald thought that the whole question was whether or not the matter contained in the petition came within the purview of the election committee.

**CAHAN URGES ITS RECEIPT.**  
C. H. Cahan (Conservative, St. Lawrence-St. George) said the arguments of the prime minister and the minister of national defence clearly proved that the petition should be received in order that the house might become cognizant of its contents so as to be in a position to render a decision.

**BENNETT READS PETITION.**  
Hon. R. B. Bennett (Conservative, Calgary West) stated that the question raised was whether a "free citizen has the right to petition parliament or not." It had been argued, he stated, that a "free citizen" could not petition parliament because there was already before the courts another suit under the contravened elections act.

Bennett then read the petition presented by him on behalf of J. A. Collins. The petition, among other allegations, stated that at the recent Mr. Kennedy had been declared elected with a majority of 171, but at Brule Mines, Poll No. 4, although the vote had been shown as 12 for Kennedy, 125 for Ray (liberal candidate) and 21 for Collins, that at least 111 electors at Brule Mines Poll No. 4, had voted for Collins.

**DEPUTY CONVICTED.**  
The petition further declared that the deputy returning officer at Brule Mines, poll No. 4, F. A. Robby, had been charged before the Supreme Court of Alberta with "fraudulently destroying" a number of ballot papers at that poll, "fraudulently putting into the ballot boxes papers other than those authorized by law" and "wrongfully" put his initials on certain papers, Robby, the petition declared, had been found guilty of these charges and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

The petition further declared that Mr. Collins had received the majority of ballots cast at the election in Peace River. If this petition, stated Mr. Bennett, alleging malfeasance on the part of one of parliament's officers, were not heard, it would be placing a "premium on reality."

**BOIVIN'S STAND.**  
Hon. H. G. Boivin, Minister of Customs and Excise, declared that under section B of the House of Commons Act, Mr. Kennedy could not resign even if he desired to do so.

"While he could not resign, it is equally clear that he should not participate," interjected Mr. Bennett. Continuing Mr. Boivin said that Mr. Cahan had advanced the argument that the House of Commons could not decide upon this matter until the petition had been read. This point had been easily remedied, however, by the reading of the petition by Mr. Bennett in the course of his argument.

**No Reduction Moncton Rates For Lighting, Recommendation Of Mildram to Utilities Board**

**MONCTON, May 4**—The N. B. Public Utilities Commission held an all day session here today, hearing the case of the City of Moncton asking for a reduction in the electric lighting rates charged by the Moncton Tramways Electricity and Gas Co. The report of the Utilities Commission experts, S. H. Mildram, was presented to the Commission and it recommended that no reduction be made for at least another year on account of the present schedule of rates not, as yet, producing any substantial amount in excess of an eight per cent. return upon the fair value of the property used in rendering the services, and in view of the fact that the company, under the terms of the original lease, is obliged, beginning this year, to repay the payments to the city.

These expenses 60 per cent. since that time. Mr. Mildram said that there had been a reallocation of the accounts in some cases, and that one large item, \$8,000, was for the extraordinary expenses incurred in the taking over of the company by the new stockholders.

**QUESTION OF PROFITS.**  
Dealing with the gas department, Mr. Taylor tried to obtain admission that the profits had been from \$100,000 to \$150,000 on gas for the last year or two. Mr. Mildram said they did not amount to that, as 40 per cent. of the gas to be paid for several years, and that a considerable sum had also been laid aside, \$100,000 of which had been invested in other companies and was earning considerable interest.

The question of the value of the company's property for taxation purposes was then taken up. Mr. Taylor said that it had been fixed at \$10,000 for civic purposes, and that for school taxes it was \$300,000, whereas it was placed at \$1,821,000 by its own figures.

The replacement value of the Moncton plant, which Mr. Taylor said had been instructed was \$200,000, was under consideration when the meeting adjourned at 1 o'clock for luncheon.

### FAMILY PEDIGREE BEGAN ON FORGERY

Famous Sidney Family's True Beginning Revealed After 400 Years

LONDON, May 5.—The astonishing revelation is made, after 400 years, that the pedigree of one of the famous families in the British Peerage begins with a forgery. This revelation comes in a report made for the Historical Manuscripts Commission. It concerns the pedigree of Lord de Lisle and Dudley, the head of the Sidney family, of which Sir Philip Sidney was an illustrious member. The Sidney family, it is now discovered, sprang from a Surrey yeoman, not from a knight, who proves to have been the invention of a pedigree expert 400 years ago. The discovery was brought to light by the investigation of ancient manuscripts preserved at Penshurst Place, Kent, the seat of Lord de Lisle and Dudley. Robert Cooke was the pedigree expert who forged the documents purporting to prove the descent of the Sidneys from a knight. An ancestor of Lord de Lisle entrusted him with the task of tracing the history of the Sidney family. Cooke, doubtless wishing to flatter so distinguished a family, forged a pedigree, naming an apparently fictitious knight as the family founder. For 400 years the forgery has gone undetected, and has been accepted by

experts. The astounding story is told by Mr. Kingsford in a report on the manuscripts preserved at Penshurst Place.

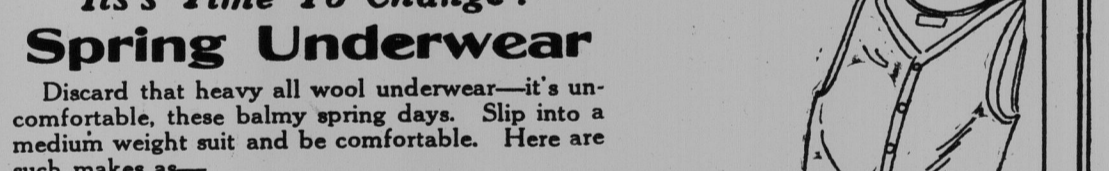
