THE question of Canadian Trade Through Canadian Ports was made the subject of a parliamentary inquiry which lasted over two sessions, and the Senate report, which was adopted on June 9, 1922, contained this posi-

"After all the sacrifices that Canada has made in building three transcontinental railways, it is IMPOSSIBLE that we should go on al-

transcontinental railways, it is IMPOSSIBLE that we should go on allowing our seaports to be deprived of their LEGITIMATE traffic, to obtain which our people have been and are being so heavily taxed."

Early this year the Federal Government published the report of the Royal Grain Inquiry Commission. Supplementary to the main report was a report on Transportation, signed by J. G. Scott, one of the Government's commissioners. Mr. Scott dealt at length with the subject of Canadian Trade for Canadian Ports; and, commenting on the Senate report, declared:

"It is the DUTY of the Government to do this, because it was on the DISTINCT PROMISE in Parliament, in 1904, that the Transcontinental would cheapen the rates of freight upon Western grain to Canadian seaports, that the people consented to the building of this railway, which has cost the country \$160,000,000. It is a BREACH OF FAITH with the Eastern seaports to keep the rate of freight at such a

FAITH with the Eastern seaports to keep the rate of freight at such a figure as to prevent this being done, after the railway has proved its ability to do it, and to do it profitably."

That is the report of the Federal Government's own commissioner; to which he adds, that failure to do what he says should be done "means

a distinct breach of faith, and would seem to be a contradiction of the intention of Parliament, as expressed in the Senate of 1904, and should be IMMEDIATELY REMEDIED."

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 24—Gerald Chapman, who has gained nation-wide notoricty through his deeds outside the law, will not die on the gallows at the state prison at Wethersfield, Dec. 8, for the murder of a New Britain policeman more than a year ago. The writ directs that Chapman be produced before Judge Thomas in the Board of Pardons room at the state prison next Monday morning. Then the mail robber and gunman will start a fight for his life that may end in the United States Supreme Court. 

ONE of the greatest pests in the world is what I call the devouring friend," said a woman the other day. "She is a blood-thirsty cannibal, who gobbles you up alive, and you have no other way of protecting yourself against her because the sacred name of friendship bars the use of all the lethal weapons that you can use in defending yourself against other bores and social nuisances.

And she runs your grocery bill up to the skies because she develops a taste for the most expensive food.

Unfortunately for me I have a number of women friends who are rich, and whose principal occupation in life is killing time. Now these women know perfectly well that I not only do all of my own housework, but that I make my children's clothes and that, if they kill a morning for me, they upset my whole schedule and make my work pile up upon me so that my labor is twice as hard

Every time Lulus husband gives her a new limousine I have to waste hours of my valuable time listening to a minute description of all its splendor. Every time Sallie and Susie want to be sympathized with, or want to brag about their children, they ruin the heart of a day's work for me by backing me up against a wall and making me listen. And a dozen times a day I am interrupted by women who call me up over the telephone to hold long and fruitless conversations about nothing.

"Yet there is no possible way to protect my precious time against these friends who eat it up. They are all charming women. They like me, and I like them. I want to retain their friendship, so I cannot shut my door in their faces when they come to see me. I can't ask them to leave when they stay too long. I can't ring off when they call me over the telephone. I can't even say 'damn' aloud no matter how much I am thinking it. "PERHAPS there is no way to get rid of devouring friends, but it certainly would add to the pleasures of life if we could swat them as we do other household pests."


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

U. S. Customs Report Shows Result of Closing Down on Rum Row

Nineteen Automobiles, 5,700 Bottles Seized During October: Duties Increase

MONTREAL, Nov. 25-"More hard Donor was seized in October than in my previous month for the present year, indicating that the present effective work of the coastguard on the New England and New Jersey coast has diversed the smuggling of hard liquor over the Canadian border."

This disclosure of operations, and the official opinion deduced therefrom, form one of the parts of the summary of October business of the United States Customs Service, Vermont district, by Harry C. Whitehill, collector. NINETEEN AUTOMOBILES.

"Nincteen automobiles were seized by the Customs border patrol," Collector Whitehill further outlined. "The appraised value of the seizures was 118,608.10. The total amount of liquor seized in automobiles during October 328 5,700 bottles.

"Sixteen automobiles are now being operated by the Customs patrol along the Caanadian border. The total expense of operating the patrol cars in October was \$1,856.94, which included many permanent repairs to the patrol

"October was an unusually produc-tive month for Customs duties col-lected in the district. They exceeded those of September by 34.6 per cent, and September was better than the average. They show a gain over Octo-ber, 1924, of 78.4 per cent. Total duties collected were \$241,924.11.

Total value of all importations was \$\frac{1}{2}\text{107,972}\$. In addition to the usual principal commodities, such as hay, fream and milk, and milk foods, there were large importations of potatoes, turnips, nickel and fresh meats.

"Among items exported, with their values, were: Shell fish, \$1,500; calf skins, \$12,878; sheepskins, \$16,548; goat and kid leather, \$10,081; canned corn, \$14.898; apples, 7,220 barrels, \$29,270; berries, 550,285 pounds, \$43,486; cocoa butter, 62,820 pounds, \$19,757; granulated sugar, 100,250 pounds, \$3,190.

"Total number of automobiles to receive Customs attention in the district during the month of October was 40,062. The number of passengers to pass Customs was 125,572. MANY VEGETABLES.





This arrangement was also advisable from a safety standpoint, on account of the handling of the high voltage wires of both parties.

I have checked over the work since it has been completed and find that it has been done in accordance with the plans. Your order to the Power Commission of the City of Saint John to clear the interferences has, therefore, been complied with.

In carrying on the work referred to in this report, the rules of the National Electrical Safety Code have been followed, so far as it is possible and practicable with conflicting lines.

I understand from you that the responsibility for the continuation of proper clearances will now rest with the two parties. This will require their future attention, due to poles leaning over, at the top from time to time, from one cause or another; wires sagging below their present levels, and changes and additions to the exsting lines.

I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation which both parties have extended to me in carrying on this work to its completion.


