THE FOLLOWING APPEAL, made by Rev. John V. I Young of the Mission Church St. John Baptist, tells of a desperate need for aid in relieving the distress among his parishioners. The Times-Star takes pleasure in publishing it in the hope that its readers may seize an oppor-

"Here I am again with an appeal-a very urgent appeal on behalf of the poor and needy of my parish. If some of my people who are in such great distress are to be helped, there seems nothing else for me to do but once more appeal to the good and generous people of our city. The poverty is just desperate and pitiful.

Through the kindness of a number of people I was able to help many during the past few months, but now my Poor Fund is exhausted and we are facing some of the hardest weeks of our long winter. Family after family are in dire need-no work-no money coming in to buy food and fuel, and naturally they turn to the Church

"People have been very kind in sending in clothing, but just now it is food and fuel which are needed. As there are so many to look after, I can only give them just what is necessary to keep body and soul togethersuch as bread, butter, milk, flour, molasses, tea, sugar and potatoes and such like food, and coal in small quantities, which does not go very far.

"One hears of 'undeserving' and 'deserving' cases. Where is one to draw the line? Perhaps a father may not be much good, but he has a wife and family of small children-can one see them starve or freeze? One naturally turns down fakirs, those who try to impose upon one. There has been this season an unusual number of stray men wanting a meal or a bed. One cannot refuse a hungry man a meal (some have been living on one meal a day), or refuse to give a man a bed these cold nights, but this all takes money.

"As my Poor Fund was exhausted, I have had to refuse to help several times this week, but they have come back and back, and I was compelled to give assistance, otherwise they would have gone without. I am sorry I have to appeal so soon again, but one behalf of the many committed to my care, I have to do it. The need is so great, I beg of you to give something-something for Christ's poor.





When the Guttenberg track was one of the most popular in the country, Mrs. Sennett and her husband, the late "Jim" Sennett, equally well known in racing circles, owned a string of race horses. In the stable were Our Johnnie, which is said to have won \$80,000 for its owners in a single race; Eclipse and Dr. Williams. They also owned much real estate in Hudson County and operated the Eclipse Hotel, County and operated the Eclipse Hotel, near the Guttenberg track and named after the famed horse.

Who won the National title in 1924? Who won the International title in 1924? Who is considered by fans as one of the most popular and most aggressive performers on the steel blades? There is apparently a very good reason for putting these questions to them because there is evidence of discrimination against the Canadian ace, Charlie Gorman. Recently a communication was received by one of the leading promoters in the States inviting a team of the fastest skaters in America to participate in a series of races in Norway. It was announced in the press throughout the States that Charles Jewtraw, Joe Moore, Duke Donovan and Valentine Bialis had been selected and in all probability they would journey to the Scandinavian country to demonstrate their prowess. There was no mention of Charlie Gorman, holder of the world's record for the 440 yards, as well as the National and International championships. Perhaps Julian Fitzgerald or some of the others interested in sending the quartette of skaters to Norway do not realize that Charlie resides in America. However, a glance at the geography should quickly dissipate any doubt on their part. While having no intention of making little of the quartette selected it is hard to realize why any one of the four should be chosen in preference to Gorman. They are all good skaters and while Moore and Jewtraw have been keen competitors of Gorman and have triumphed over him in some meets Donovan and Bialis can hardly be considered in his class. Instead of being ignored Gorman should head the list in virtue of his great achievements on the big circuits. Perhaps Charlie should be given a publicity agent to go to the States and inform some of the racing magnates who is the real champion

WELCOME HOME and congratulations were the greetings handed out to Charlie on his arrival here yesterday from Newburgh, N. Y. where he made such a creditable showing in the Middle Atlantic championships on New Year's day. It was with keen regret that his many friends and admirers learned that he is having trouble wit one of his legs which stopped a "Hun" bullet during the great world war. It is not the first time that the leg has bothered Charlie, but by careful nursing for a short period and then consistent training he should be fit to defend his titles when the time for the big meets come around. Charlie is too young and, by far, too good a skater to consider retiring. However, there is one phase about Charlie's condition which gives us food for serious thought. St. John today can boast of having the premier skater of America and the fastest quarter miler in the world, but how about the future? Sooner or later Charlie will have to bow to "father time" and like many great athletes step down to allow someone else to carry on in his footsteps. If the injury to Charlie's leg should prove stubborn St. John will be deprived of a senior representative to uphold her honor in the great winter classics. There are a number of most promising intermediate and junior skaters, which include, Willie Logan, Snodgrass, the O'Connor brothers and others, who give every promise of developing into championship calibre. This fact should not be lost sight of. Everything possible should be done to encourage them and fit them for the day when they will be sent forth to seek National and International fame. Series of races should be held frequently and faulty starting and stroke corrected. They should be taught the proper method of training as well as proper dieting. The real St. John or home spirit should be fostered. Send a boy away as an individual and he lacks the incentive to stick when he is tiring, but let him realize that he has behind him every citizen in his home. town and it will help give him that extra amount of reserve energy to fling himself at the tape and win the coveted title.
