London Stresses Importance of Geneva Protocol

ABANDON PLANS

Larkin Watching Experiment of Australia, With Liaison Officer in London

By H. BAILEY, British United Press. LONDON, Jan. 8.—There is not the slightest likelihood of the proposed Imperial conference for the discussion of the Geneva protocol and the Chamberlain alternative plan being held although the final decision of the government in this matter will not be made known until Col. Amery returns from Geneva where he is now staying.

Grave Disappointment. There is grave disappointment in official circles over this abandonment and it is the official view that the Dominions have no idea of the serious importance of the Geneva protocol or of the Foreign Secretary's alternative plan and an exercise in parliamentaries now explore other means of perfecting inter-Imperial relations by consultation.

Watching Experiment. Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canada's High Commissioner, is watching the experiment which Australia is making of having a liaison officer between the Dominions and the foreign and colonial offices with the closest interest but it is already seen that the appointment raises some very delicate and very difficult questions.

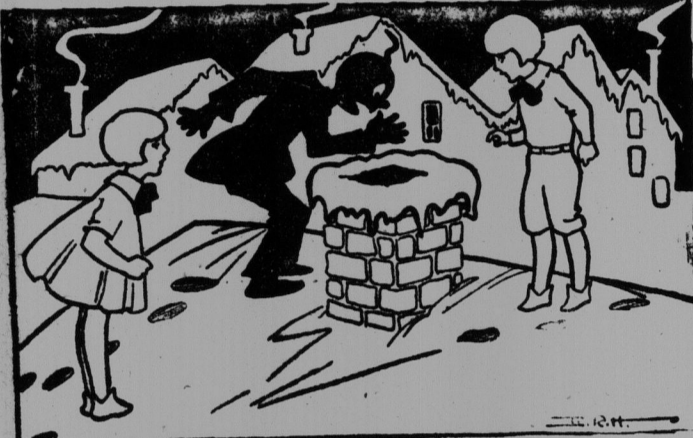

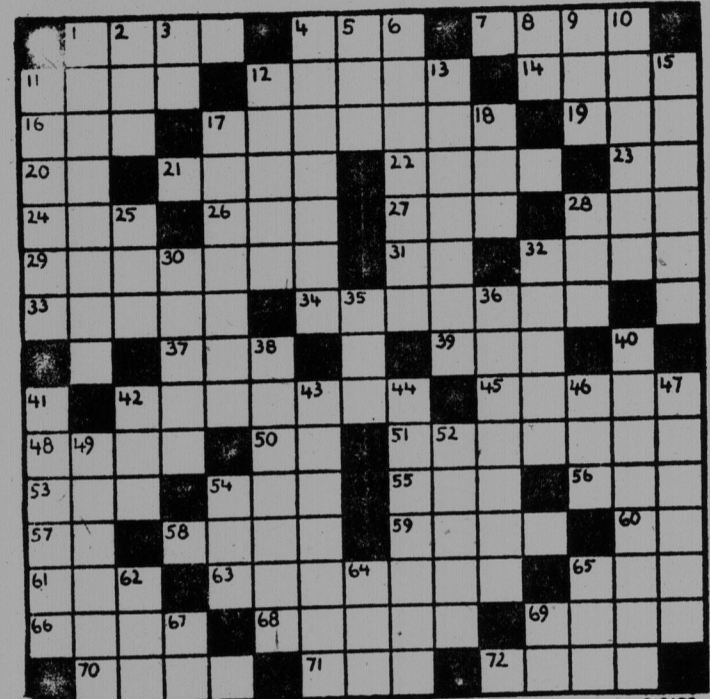

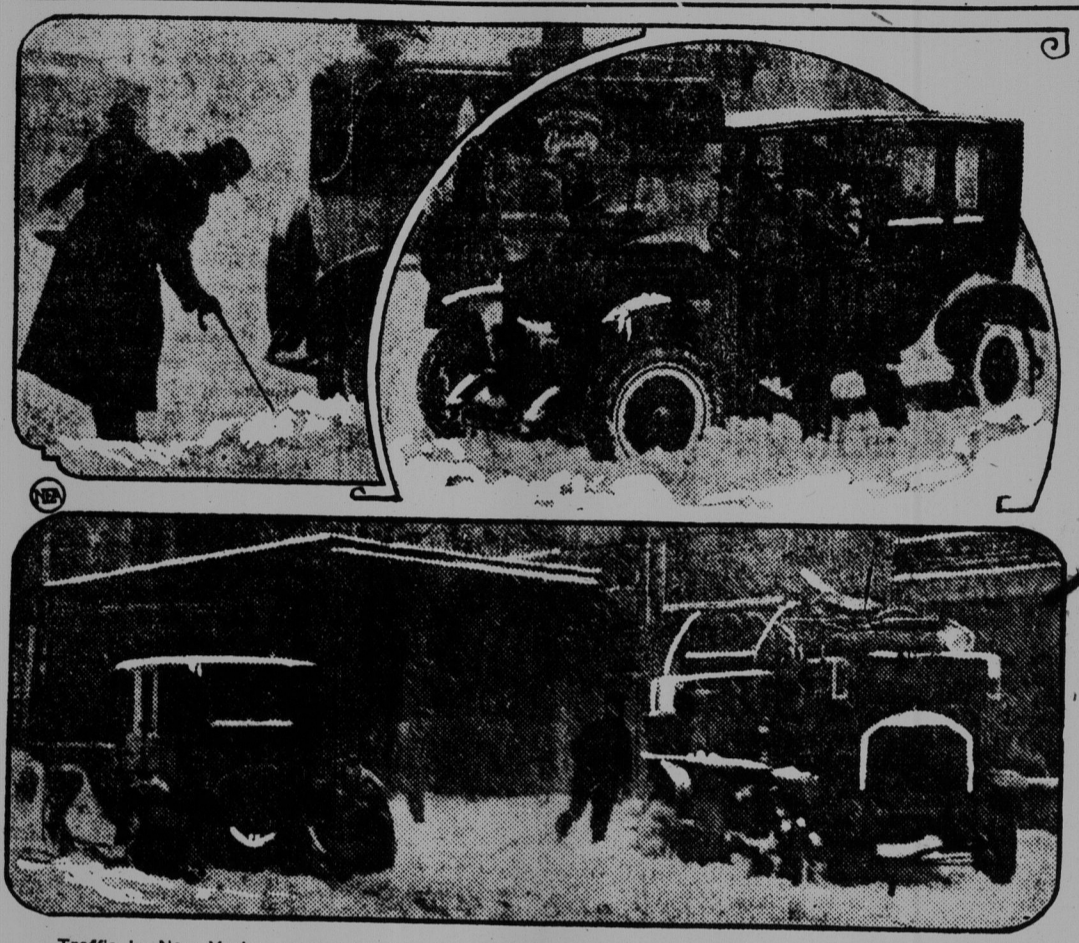

NEED STRICT LAWS TO REDUCE CRIME

N. Y. Judge Says City is Reservoir for Desperados and Bandits. NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—When Judge Otto A. Roskay was empaneling jurors in his part of General Sessions he referred to the fact that the calendar in the criminal courts was smaller than it had been in many years, but added: "This does not mean that crime is decreasing. I still maintain that we are a lawless community, with real desperadoes and bandits who ought to be in the penitentiary."

NEED STRICT LAWS TO REDUCE CRIME

RESENTS ATTITUDE OF EASTERN CANADA

Head of Manitoba Farm Women Describes Policy as Suicidal One. BRANDON, Man., Jan. 8.—The possibility of serious friction between eastern and western Canada was suggested today by Mrs. James Elliott, President of the United Farm Women of Manitoba in her address to the annual convention of the Association.

"The attitude of Eastern Canada to Western Canada," she said "is strikingly similar to the attitude of Great Britain to the United States prior to the revolution. The colonies were looked upon by the people of Great Britain, with one or two notable exceptions, as a happy hunting ground for exploiting the extraction of wealth and the imposition of owner's taxes. One cannot help but wonder if history will repeat itself and the attitude of the east will not force the people of the west to seek some form of self government such as a suicidal policy is to be deprecated."

ONLY 54 CHURCHES AGAINST UNION

474 Congregations Vote in Favor of United Church to Date. TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 7.—Up to 11 o'clock tonight the standing in the Church Union vote, based on returns gathered by the United headquarters here, had that 54 Presbyterian congregations had decided in favor of Union and 54 had voted non-concurrent. Of the results received today 38 were for Union and 16 against.

IS LOSING POWER

High Caste People of India Organize to Oppose Policy of Gandhi. CALCUTTA, Jan. 7.—The high caste classes are showing signs of counter-organization against the strength of the campaign by Mahatma Gandhi and others in favor of removing the grievances of the untouchables and the lower castes. At a meeting held in Bombay, a committee was appointed for the purpose of counteracting the Gandhi propaganda.

HEARST WITH ZIEGFELD IN A THEATRE DEAL

New Alliance Causes Sensation Among Showmen
CHAIN PLANNED
Syndicate Likely To Build Large Playhouses In Other Big Cities

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Florenz Ziegfeld, Jr., in association with William Randolph Hearst and Arthur Brisbane, will build two theatres on the southeast and southwest corners of Sixth avenue and Fifty-fourth street, and will probably follow this by putting up playhouses in Chicago, Philadelphia and Boston. As a forerunner to this important alliance, Mr. Ziegfeld has leased Mr. Hearst's Cosmopolitan Theatre at Columbus circle and will take almost immediate possession with one of his own productions.

It is learned positively that the two new New York theatres would be known as the Ziegfeld and the Billie Burke. The Ziegfeld, which will be on the southeast corner of Sixth avenue and Fifty-fourth street, will be considerably the larger. The other, on the southwest corner, will probably seat about one thousand, but will nevertheless be equipped to house musical productions. Both theatres will be built by the Messrs. Hearst and Brisbane, and will then be leased for long terms to Mr. Ziegfeld.

The new alliance was the occasion of much comment from theatrical men, and from many angles. One of the principal points of discussion was the fact that, with the construction of two playhouses at Fifty-fourth street for so important a producer as Mr. Ziegfeld, and by his taking over of a theatre at Columbus circle, the theatrical centre takes a definite step northward. It is realized also that the northward movement in this case was made possible by the removal of the elevated structure north of Fifty-third street. Outside of the Hippodrome, these will be the first theatres on Sixth avenue.

Kingsclear Man Killed In Western Explosion

FREDERICTON, N. B., Jan. 8.—Word has been received here of the tragic death at Seattle, Wash., of Shore Ellegood, a native of Kingsclear, who was killed in an explosion.

Details of the fatality are unknown here, the only information that has been received coming from New York, where his sister, Mrs. W. B. Phair of Kingsclear received word of her brother's death while she was spending the holiday season with her daughter.
