STRONG EFFORT FOR PEACE IN IRELAND SOON

Bishop Clune is the Chief Intermediary

Said He Has Been Asked by Lloyd George to Sound Sinn Fein Sentiment—London Times' Comment on Situation.

Dublin, Dec. 6.—Determined efforts to bring about an early peace in Ireland are being made here. Conversations have been in progress more than a week, and hope was expressed last night by some of those engaged in the negotiations that within another week a tangible basis of settlement might be reached.

The chief intermediary at work is the Rev. Patrick Joseph Clune, Bishop of Perth, Australia, who, it is understood, has been asked by Premier Lloyd George to sound out the Sinn Fein sentiment and prepare, if possible, the ground on which a foundation for the peace edifice can be reached.

Monsignor Clune planned to have a hard interview today with Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, who made a special week end trip in connection with the peace movement.

The Australian prelate expects to go to London tonight or tomorrow to report to Premier Lloyd George on the result of his work. Every facility to carry out his mission had been given him by the government, he said, and he was free from espionage that he has talked not only with Arthur Griffith and other republican and other nationalist leaders, but with men in the active element of the Sinn Fein movement whom the government is trying its utmost to lay its hands on.

It is too early as yet to say what thus far has been accomplished, he said when asked the nature of the settlement he thought it was possible to reach.

Whether his efforts bear fruit it is for London to determine, for it is there peace must be made and not in Ireland. He has been merely to try to arrange the preliminaries, and I will know, perhaps in a week, whether it has been successful.

So far as can be ascertained, members of the British peace commission visiting Ireland are not directly concerned in the peace movement which Monsignor Clune is engineering.

Arthur Henderson had a long talk with Cardinal Logue yesterday and is returning to England, leaving other members of the commission to pursue their investigations.

A BREAK, SAYS LONDON TIMES

London, Dec. 6.—Unofficial relations between members of the British peace commission and Sinn Fein leaders are reviewed by the London Times, in commenting on rumors of peace negotiations in Ireland.

During the last six weeks, at least four channels for unofficial communication with various sections of influential Nationalist opinion in Ireland had been kept up in spite of crises in Ireland and reprisals on the part of crown forces, the object of maintaining order and restoring peace not having been lost sight of by either side.

Reports of recent exchanges of views are confirmed by the newspaper, which says these were not initiated in any official quarters, but that some members of the government had taken opportunities to hear accounts of the true conditions in the island from sources other than those to which the government's official informants had access.

"An eminent Irish writer," says the Times, "recently furnished Premier Lloyd George with more valuable information than had been contained in official reports, but the arrest of Arthur Griffith, which was made without the knowledge or consent of the cabinet, checked, if it did not actually interrupt, exchanges of views."

"Discussions that had been going on have not involved any question of abandoning the home rule bill, the issue being an amendment of that measure in a direction of fiscal and financial autonomy, provided that after a truce was arranged the majority of the Irish electorate outside the six counties of Ulster should indicate readiness to accept the measure thus amended."

"Though one phase of the negotiations may be broken down, the government is still exploring such avenues toward peace as may still be open. It is clear influences inimical to any Irish settlement government's plan. It has been suggested in seeking deliberately to obstruct that Premier Lloyd George has acted behind the backs of his colleagues, and that any dealing with leaders of the popular movement in Ireland will incur strong disapproval from one section of the coalition cabinet."

Hope that "neither the premier nor the government should be deterred by mischief-making of this kind" is expressed by the newspaper.

Raid Bishop's Residence

London, Dec. 6.—Soldiers conducting a raid in Queensland have arrested Hugh O'Reilly, town clerk, it being alleged that seditious documents were found in his possession, says a dispatch to the Daily Mail.

The residence of the Most Rev. M. Fogarty, Bishop of Killarney, at Ennis, also was raided on Sunday, during the absence of the bishop, and some papers were confiscated.

The newspaper's labor correspondent states that during an interview between Arthur Henderson, labor leader in the House of commons, and Cardinal Logue, primate of Ireland, last week, the cardinal was extremely anxious to assist in ending the reign of terror, and that the Catholic hierarchy would exert some time this winter.

GAP IN CHAIN OF IMPERIAL UNITY

London Times on Matter of Co-operation in Banking and Currency.

London, Dec. 6.—(Canadian Associated Press)—Supporting a plea for imperial co-operation in banking and currency made by various correspondents, the Times today remarks that it is a startling fact that the relations between the Bank of England and the United States Federal Reserve Bank are closer than the relations between the former and any bank in the overseas dominions.

The reason of this is that none of the dominions possesses a central reserve bank. It is, the Times says, a serious disadvantage to the empire that less financial co-operation should be possible between the mother country and Canada than between Britain and the United States. It reveals a gap in the chain of imperial unity which is now serious consequence to the exchange of goods within the empire.

The Times suggests that the approaching establishment of a central bank in South Africa points a way to the remedy for the existing chaotic position in imperial banking.

Political and other objections to the scheme recently outlined by Mr. Darling in Toronto are declared serious, but none so serious as to be raised to the remedy of the empire, of proper central banks, having currency arrangements suited to the peculiar needs of each.

WILL CUT OFF FINANCIAL AID FROM GREECE

Britain's Course if Constantine Returns

France Demands Payment of Outstanding Loans—People's Vote Largely for Former Ruler—Another is Named as Possible King.

Athens, Dec. 6.—Great Britain will extend no further financial aid to Greece if Constantine returns to the throne, according to a note presented to the Greek government yesterday by Earl Granville, British minister in this city.

Both notes forbid the issuance, by the national bank, of paper money already printed against a loan of 400,000,000 francs arranged during the regime of Venizelos.

"We can only do what the people want," said Premier Rallis, in speaking of the two communications. "The recent has received no word from Constantine. I will reply in a few days to the British note."

Returns from the plebiscite held throughout Greece yesterday indicate a majority of 200,000 in favor of the return of Constantine and claims are made that the entire electorate of 800,000 voted for him.

Paris, Dec. 6.—Premier Leygues returned to Paris last night. He expressed satisfaction at the result of his meeting with Lloyd George and the Italian foreign minister, Count Sforza in London.

THE DOHERTY MOTION OFF TO NEXT MEETING

Consideration of Amendment re Article 10

Committee is to Consider it in Meantime—The Argentine Delegation to Leave Geneva on Wednesday or Thursday for Paris.

Geneva, Dec. 6.—Consideration of an amendment to the covenant of the League of Nations which would eliminate Article 10 has been postponed by the assembly of the league until the next meeting.

This amendment, which was proposed by Hon. C. J. Doherty, Canadian minister of justice, and one of the three delegates in the dominion, has been referred to a committee, which has been instructed to submit a report when the assembly holds its next session.

Consideration of a report prepared by Hon. N. W. Rowell of Canada and Rev. Vivian of France, on the relations between the assembly and the council of the league was planned for today's session.

Argentina's amendment to the covenant of the league, rejection of which caused the delegation of that country to leave the assembly on Saturday morning, has also been referred by the assembly for consideration at its next meeting.

STOP GAMBLING IN FOODSTUFFS

Cotton Also in Bill to Be Introduced in Congress by Senator Capper.

Washington, Dec. 6.—Senator Capper of Kansas, yesterday made public his proposed bill to stop gambling in foodstuffs and cotton in the United States.

A tax of ten per cent, designed to be prohibitive on "future" trading in grain and commerce, except by actual owners or a limited class of traders under federal license, is the basic feature. This tax would apply to options, and the measure would affect grain products as well as raw grain.

Two Point Gain for Atlantic

Montreal, Dec. 6.—The local stock exchange was much stronger at its opening today, and many substantial advances from Saturday's closing levels were recorded.

C. F. INCHES IS VICE-CONSUL FOR URUGUAY HERE

A Canadian Press despatch from Ottawa announces that orders published in the London Gazette show that the King has approved of the appointment of C. F. Inches as vice-consul of Uruguay, at St. John. The Canada Gazette contains a copy of a formal order issued at Buckingham Palace appointing Hon. Arthur Meighen, premier of Canada, a member of the privy council, and which carries with it the title of "Right Honourable."

DIED WHILE AT EVENING MEAL

William Good, of Killam's Mills, Westmorland Co., died suddenly on Sunday evening of heart disease while taking supper with his family. He was about seventy years of age, and leaves his wife, who was formerly Miss Killam, and two sons, Arthur of Boston and Allan at home, and one daughter, Mrs. H. Parlee of St. John. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Allan Coughlan of Watertown, Mass., and Mrs. A. L. Buhar of St. John, and three brothers, Seth of Boston, Cyrus of St. Stephen and Alfred of Moncton.

Mr. Good was a well known farmer of William's Mills, where he was highly respected as a Christian citizen, and where he had lived for more than twenty years. He was a son of the late John Good of Moncton, who was well known throughout the lower provinces.

A LARGE SUM.
It was announced in the Cathedral, yesterday, that \$987 had been collected two weeks ago for the Archdiocese of Winnipeg, following an appeal made by Rev. Father Rheame. In a collection taken up on last Sunday week in the Cathedral for the work of St. Vincent De Paul Society the sum of \$1,216 was realized, a total of \$2,203 on the two Sundays.

BRITAIN MAY HAVE NEW CABLES ACROSS 2 OCEANS

Comment on Purchase of United States Cable System

Have Now Two Systems Across Atlantic—The Disposition of Lines Seized From Germany During the War.

(Associated Press Correspondence) St. John's, N.F., Dec. 1.—Cable authorities here see in the recent announcement by the British government of its purchase of the United States Cable Company an attempt by that government to break up American control of most of the Trans-Atlantic cables which, it is contended, has existed for the last eight years.

ican concern headed by Clarence Mackay, of New York, and the Western Union system which operates not only the Western Union cables but leased the Anglo-American and Direct United States cable lines in 1912. This arrangement it is said here, has resulted in the control by America of the two most important trans-Atlantic cable systems. It is understood here also that the French cables have friendly relations with the Western Union system.

The Seized German Cables, One of the two German cables across the Atlantic seized by the Allies during the war was directed so that its terminals were at Pensance, Eng., and Halifax, N. S. The European end of the other German line was diverted from Emden to Brest, France.

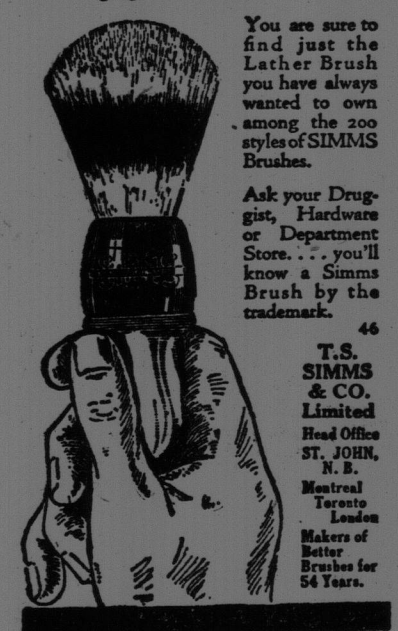
This left only one German cable under British control and there was no guarantee that this arrangement would be allowed to continue in the future. At the big cable conference in Washington in October last, which considered the distribution of German cables seized by the Allies, the principal claim by the United States was understood here to have been that these cables should be surrendered by Great Britain and France and be internationalized if the power should be unwilling to agree to their transfer to the United States.

The Direct United States Cable control of which has been purchased by the British government, extends from Balmaskells to Harbor Grace, N.F., and thence to Halifax, N. S. The understanding here is that this line will be taken over by the British government and worked in connection with the former German cable to Halifax, thus giving the British Imperial Service two cables instead of one. This second line was required by the British government as a safeguard in case of damage to the one-time German cable.

Two New Cables Possible. It is regarded here as by no means unlikely that wireless telegraphy may be also developed by an Imperial scheme controlled by the British government. A parliamentary committee, headed by Sir Henry Norman, recently made an extensive report in favor of a policy of Empire-wide wireless stations encircling the whole world.

FROM STREET CAR TO LITERARY FAME

Knut Hansun, Nobel Prize Winner, Once a None Too Good Conductor in Chicago.

(Contributed.) Stories about the rail-splitter Lincoln becoming the first man in the United States, about the peasant Burns becoming the beloved Scottish bard, about Dickens, the young London reporter, rapidly winning world-wide fame as a novelist, and about the young Scot, Knut Hansun, a Norwegian, won his way from a poor, inefficient street car conductor to a well-known novelist, and winner of the Nobel Prize for poetry is no less interesting.

To the people of Chicago who knew him when he worked on the street cars away back in the eighties, as a blond lad, with a thin face, and a perpetual stare into the horizon, Hansun's success has been phenomenal. Hansun went to Chicago after working in the prairies as a ploughboy, and secured a job on the thirteenth street car line. In those days horses pulled the cars. There are people today who knew the Norwegian poet then as he worked on the cars. They recall his red, chapped wrists and coat sleeves that did not meet his mittens, and books sticking out of his pockets. He read voraciously, his favorites being Aristotle, Euripides and Thackeray. He read at his work so much that often he forgot to pull the rope at the corners. The future poet was more absorbed in the thoughts of great writers than he was in learning the names of the streets, and he often made such mistakes as calling out "North Avenue" for "Division street." So the superintendent of the line gave Hansun the sack.

From Chicago Hansun went to New York. Afterwards he got a berth on a Newfoundland fishing smack. Later he worked his way to Norway as a seaman,

keeping up his old habit of scribbling in spare moments. His scribbling was not in vain, for in 1898 his poems began to appear. Hansun has also written two powerful novels, "Hunger," and "Shallow Soul."

Recently Knut Hansun has been awarded the Nobel prize for poetry, and hence his name is destined to go down to posterity as one of the world's great literary men. The street car failure of a generation ago is today at the age of sixty receiving the recognition and praise of the world. His winning of the Nobel prize is a distinct shock to the people of the United States where his writings are little known. Yet he has been read extensively in other lands, 68,000,000 pages of his writings being translated into twenty-three languages.

FORTY-TWO YEARS IN SAME OFFICE

Thomas H. Lawson, caretaker and messenger of the government savings bank, corner of Princess and Canterbury streets, has been granted a pension after forty-two years of faithful service in the one office. His friends unite in wishing him many years to enjoy his well earned rest. He will continue to reside in this city. The civil service branch of the dominion government has announced that his position is vacant. In filling the vacancy preference will be given to a man who served overseas. The salary is \$690 a year, with free house rent, free fuel, free water and light, all of which is estimated to be worth \$200, and in addition there is a high cost of living bonus.

NEW WIRELESS TO AID VESSELS ON WAY TO ST. JOHN

A wireless directional station to give bearings to ships entering the Bay of Fundy is to be installed at Red Head this week. H. A. Coode, an engineer of the radio-telegraph branch of the naval service department at Ottawa, who is in charge of the work, said last evening that a permanent station would be ready this week to replace the temporary one in use there now. Its location still is a matter of doubt, as there is to be further necessary experimental work carried out in order to find the place most suitable for the erection of the station. The new one may stay on the property of Olive Gibbs, where the temporary one is now, or placed on the government property at Battery Point.

STEAMER BURNED

Campbellton, Dec. 5.—The steam ferry R. R. Call, owned by Capt. Frank J. Allard, which plied between Dalhousie, Carleton, Miramichi and Campbellton, was completely destroyed by fire at Carleton. The crew were on board at the time and although they made strong efforts to check the flames they had to abandon the task, being unable to save their belongings. They had a narrow escape from serious burns. The wreck lies sunk in nine fathoms of water. The R. R. Call was built at Chatham and was valued at \$5000.

FATAL CARBONACEOUS FIRE

St. John's, Nfld., Dec. 4.—At Carbonaceous (Nfld.) a fire which broke out early this morning destroyed a dwelling house and resulted in the death of an aged inmate, Tobias Howell.

\$200,000 FIRE PUTS 200 OUT

St. Leonards, Dec. 6.—Nearly two hundred men are out of employment as the result of the fire at Allendale, across the St. John river, near Van Buren. The burned property consisted

of the large saw mill of A. E. Hammond and five other buildings, two freight cars and a large quantity of lumber. The loss on the buildings is \$40,000 and the lumber was worth \$80,000. The five buildings were occupied by business men in the main street of the village.

BABY'S DEATH IN SOAPSUDS London, Eng., Dec. 6.—William John Thomas, two years old, died after falling into a pail full of scalding soapsuds. The mother said the accident would not have happened but for a defective copper flue which caused her to be washing upstairs.

**COMMITTS SUICIDE
IN EVENING GOWN**

**Wealthy New York Woman
Makes Careful Preparation
for Ending Life.**

Boston, Dec. 6.—After arraying herself in a pink silk evening gown and satin slippers, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Fuller, a wealthy woman of New York and Boston, climbed on a chair, tied a rope about her neck, looped it over a curtain pole, then kicked the chair from under her feet and died from strangulation. Her lifeless body was discovered in a suite of rooms in the Hotel Lenox, beautiful and of a well-to-do family in New York, Mrs. Fuller, who was about thirty-five years old, calmly registered at the Lenox as Mrs. Mary Wilson, 100 West 92nd street, New York, went to her room, attired herself in her death robe of gay colors, wrote her will, looked about for a convenient place to hang herself and then did so.

Mrs. Fuller carried only a handbag when she arrived at the hotel. Investigation showed that only a clothesline, a wood drill and a hook were in the bag. In the room she had engaged, she used the clothesline and part of a window cord and a portiere pole with which to fashion her gallows. Then wearing her pink silk gown and satin slippers she sat down at a desk and wrote her will, addressing it to Attorney Frank P. Ryan, of Worcester.

Concluding her writing the woman evidently carried the chair to a spot beneath the curtain pole, stepped upon it, adjusted the noose about her neck and kicked away the chair.

**DEATH SEPARATES TWINS
BY BUT FEW HOURS**

Ramsgate, N. B., Dec. 6.—An extraordinary chain of coincidences has ended with the death of the two daughters of J. D. Smith. They were twins, married at the same time and died from heart trouble at the age of thirty-two years within a few hours of each other.

Forty Executed Daily.

Paris, Dec. 6.—No fewer than 1,200 persons, an average of forty a day, were sentenced to death by Moscow revolutionary tribunals and executed in Moscow during September, according to the official Soviet organ, "Izvestia."

The same paper throws light on the desperate fuel situation in Moscow by stating that \$5,000 wooden houses have been torn down in Moscow to provide fuel for the people.

A wide choice in suits was displayed in straight box jackets and closer fitting suit coats, with ripples at the dices and flat hanging panels front and back. Eton and bolero models give new effects with scallops, uneven hems and cost edges. Tailored suits, with and without belts are cut severely slender. Skirts are short, with a suggestion of more fulness; in some cases with panels, tunics, hem trimming and pleatings.

PRECIOUS METALS OF NOVA SCOTIA

New Glasgow, N. S., Dec. 6.—Dirt "paying five hundred dollars a ton, a rich mixture of silver and lead chlorides" has failed to quicken the pulses of blue-noses a single beat, and there is no mad rush to the scene of its reported discovery near Gordon Summit, Pictou county.

"Unlike the gold-bearing quartz of Guyaboro, which is hard and granitic in appearance, the samples of the mineral from the 'Rainbow Lead' are soft and break up quite easily. The cost of mining is therefore small, and even at a much lower production per ton than is estimated through the various assays made," says the New Glasgow News, "it should be a richly paying proposition from the start."

The latest discovery of gold in Nova Scotia recalls to old timers the days when digging for the precious metal in Halifax and Guyaboro counties was paying dividends. The province was never so Eldorado, but a dozen years ago when labor and material for the cautious shallow mining were cheap, Nova Scotia sold her gold for coin of the realm.

"It doesn't pay now," said a Nova Scotian who knows as much about the gold-mining history of the province as anybody, "for the same reason that it doesn't pay to mine fairly rich dirt in Africa and Australia. Perhaps when

**U. N. B. STUDENTS
THINK BOARD IN CITY TOO HIGH**

**Hold a Meeting on Matter of
Charges in Fredericton—
Some of the Possibilities.**

The students association of the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, at a general meeting held on last Friday, considered the matter of rates for board charged to students in Fredericton. The argument was advanced that the cost of living had decreased to a considerable extent but that there had been no corresponding decrease in the rate of board.

A committee of the association was appointed to take up the matter and wait upon the various people of the city with whom university students board. The prevailing rate of board was said to be \$9 per week, last year \$8. The students suggested that the rate should be reduced to not more than what it was last year.

It was said the agitation may result in a movement for the establishment of a university residence. Failing that there may be a movement for the establishment of students apartment houses under student management.

Residence for a small number of students existed at the university until 1904 when, on account of a clash between residential students and the professor in charge, it was abolished.

SPeAKS FOR TWELVE DAYS.

London, Eng., Dec. 6.—Leslie Scott, an attorney, spoke for 12 days steady in a suit over damages arising from a mountain slide, which it is alleged was caused by negligence. The cost of the case, which has been bitterly fought, will be \$850,000.

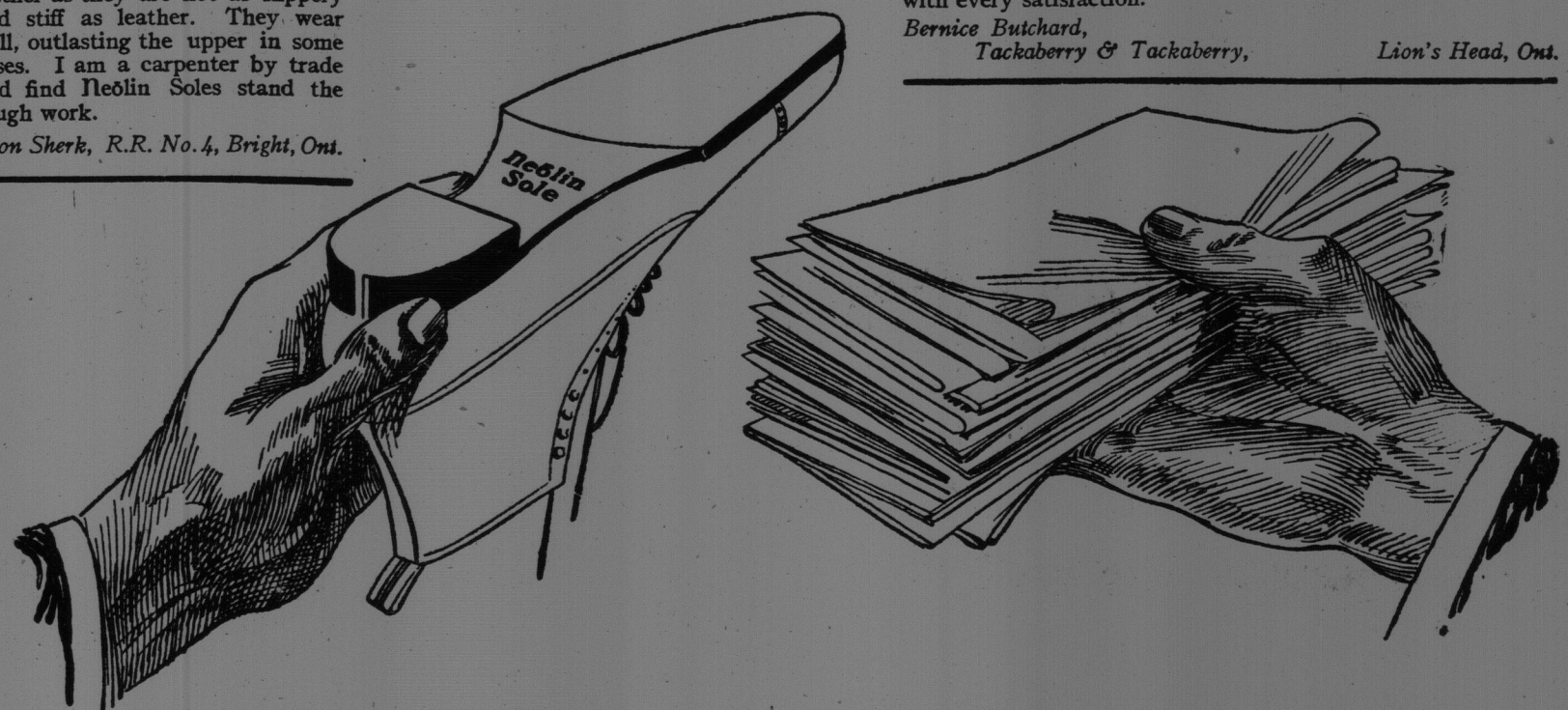
