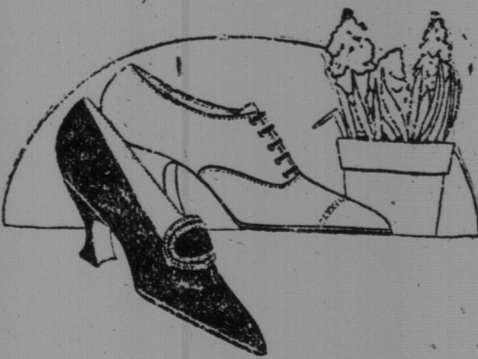

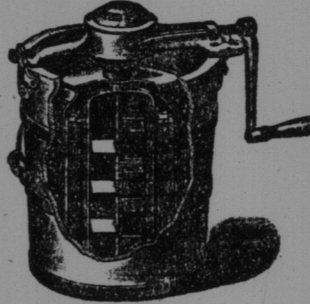

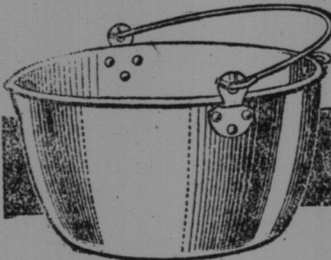

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1918

Notice to Employers of Labor WHEREAS on the 17th day of April A.D., 1919, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and Council did by Order-in-Council bring within the scope of Part I of the "WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1918," from and after August 1st, 1919, the following industries, viz: Persons employed in the woods in logging, cutting of timber, pulp-wood, fire-wood, railroad ties or sleepers, river driving, rafting, booming, or the transportation of logs, timber, pulp-wood, fire-wood or railroad ties or sleepers.

FIRST AID KIT In an industry where ten or more persons are employed, it shall be the duty of the employer to provide a suitable FIRST AID KIT approved by the board and in charge of a suitable person. Certified, passed May 1st, 1919.

### LOCAL NEWS

#### ROTHESAY ROAD

Tomorrow being the peace holiday the Rothesay road will be open.

#### THE ORPHANS HOME

There are several vacancies in the Protestant Orphans' Home at present, as several children have been taken out recently.

#### NOW REPORTED DEAD

J. W. Williams of North Devon, N. B., infantryman, previously reported missing now officially reported dead.

#### HOLIDAY ON PLAYGROUNDS

Tomorrow will be a holiday on the supervised playgrounds, so that children may spend it with their parents for the demobilization of the Canadian Garrison Regiment, which will be entirely demobilized by August 1.

#### WILL PLAY TONIGHT

Contrary to an announcement in the sporting page of the Times-Star tonight, there will be a baseball game on the west side grounds. The Y. M. C. I. and Fairville teams will play.

#### STRACHAN CAVE

A quiet but pretty wedding was solemnized at St. Mary's church on Wednesday by the Rev. R. T. McKim, when Ida, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Cave, of Little River, was united in marriage to James Strachan of St. John.

#### ON LABOR BUREAU WORK

Charles Robinson, secretary of the N. B. Returned Soldiers' Commission, returned today from Newcastle, where he and Major Rows, yesterday on a visit connected with the work of the labor bureau there.

#### ONE FOR HERE

On the S. S. Cedric, which left Liverpool, England, on July 11, there is only one officer for military district No. 7. It is expected that the vessel will arrive in Halifax tomorrow.

#### HELD FOR BOSTON TRAIN

No. 14 train due to leave at 12:30 o'clock, did not leave today until after 2 p.m., because of the Boston train being about an hour and forty minutes late. The Boston brought about 150 passengers for points east and north and came in in two sections.

#### BASEBALL TOMORROW

Arrangements are being made for two baseball games tomorrow on the East End diamond, one in the morning at 10:30 o'clock, between the Roses and the Cotton Mill employees, and another between two other teams at 2:30 p.m. At Fair Vale tomorrow a double-header will be played between the baseball team of that place and the Braves of St. John. Then there will be the afternoon game between St. John and Calais on the Queen square diamond, Carleton.

#### BASKET SOCIAL

A basket social under the auspices of the ladies of the Waterloo street Baptist church was held last evening in the school room to raise money for the benefit of the church. A large number of people attended and an enjoyable time was spent. Mrs. W. H. Parize and Mrs. Robert Short, assisted by Miss Annie Hoyt, Mrs. Herbert Hoyt, Mrs. Harrison Hoyt and Miss Mary Parize and other ladies in the church were in charge. A large number of fancy baskets were sold and brought good prices, and also home made candy and ice cream were on sale.

#### CARS CRASHED

Two passenger automobiles crashed together in Rothsey avenue, opposite the Brookville school house last night about eleven o'clock. Both were of the touring car type and one came from Rexton, Kent county, to St. John, and the other was an Overland owned and driven by the Kent county car. The force of the collision was such that both wheels on one side of the Overland were sheared off and both cars came to a sudden stop as each blocked the other. The passengers in the automobiles were not injured and the Kent county car was able to proceed under its own power; the other was left on the roadside until this morning when it was towed to the city for repairs. The damaged car was a new one which had been in the possession of its owner for only a few days. Both drivers said the collision was purely accidental and neither blamed the other.

#### ESTHER K. PUTS INTO ST. JOHNS, LEAKING

A despatch from St. John's, Nfld., says that the American four-masted schooner Esther K. of Eastport, Me. which left St. John, N. B. for Queenstown on July 6, arrived at St. John's on Wednesday leaking badly. It is expected that she will be obliged to unload her cargo of hard pine and dock for repairs.

#### BIT OF FLOOD IN THE BOARD OF TRADE BUILDING

An accident occurred in the board of trade building, Prince William street, last evening about six o'clock. The water tank in the lavatory on the top floor of the building, broke away from wall and fell to the floor; at the same time the supply pipe started to flood the upstairs part of the building and the water started to leak through into the rooms of the board of trade in the middle floor. Miss Magee, of the board of trade staff, notified the janitor who turned the water off. Had the accident occurred a few minutes later when the building was unoccupied, serious damage might have resulted.

#### PAY FOR DAMAGE TO SILENT POLICEMAN

An unusual accident occurred on Thursday afternoon, July 10, at the corner of Union and Dock streets, where a team driven by James Oakes backed into and damaged one of the city's silent policemen. As a result of this Mr. Oakes appeared before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning, charged with the offence, and pleaded not guilty. James Marshall gave evidence that the defendant was guilty. The magistrate was advised that the damage done amounted to \$6, so he told the defendant that he would dismiss the case providing he went to the city hall and paid the city for the damage done, which the defendant agreed to do. Policeman McNamee reported the incident.

It is hoped that all those interested in trap-shooting will attend the shoot on next Wednesday evening. Every member should be preparing for the cup matches which will commence very soon. The Yarmouth team of five very expert shooters is expected at St. John in the near future, and also teams from both Truro and Halifax.

### TOMORROW'S PEACE CELEBRATION HERE

Tomorrow will be memorable in the annals of the city, because of the importance of the event celebrated—the signing of the peace treaty that ended the great war—rather than because of the nature of the celebration, but in this St. John is not alone. In Montreal efforts to arrange for parades proved futile and the same experience was encountered in Toronto, celebration committee, and in both places the day will be observed publicly, much along the lines of the celebration here. One reason why the demonstration tomorrow will not be on a more elaborate scale is the fact that the citizens are looking forward to two big days in less than another month—the gathering of the returned soldiers from over the province and the welcome to the Prince of Wales.

The chief feature of tomorrow will be speeches by Lieutenant Governor Fugate, Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen and Chief Justice McKeown in King square at 2:30 o'clock. They will be preceded and followed by band concerts and there will be another band concert in the evening, followed by a display of special fireworks.

The city and other public buildings and houses and many residences are being decorated today and already the streets in the central parts of the city are beginning to present a gala appearance.

In the suburbs plans are being made by various outing associations for a big day of sports and outdoor entertainments.

A royal salute will be fired tomorrow at noon at the exhibition grounds under instructions from His Majesty the King, to celebrate the signing of the peace treaty. A telegram received at local military headquarters this morning, read as follows: "His Majesty has commanded a salute of twenty-one guns to be fired at twelve noon, Saturday, July 19. Please comply."

The holiday for the celebration of the signing of the peace treaty will be observed by all branches in local military headquarters.

One of the citizens who was serving on the committee which had in hand the arrangements for the peace celebration tomorrow, speaking of a critical letter which appeared in the Telegraph, said the writer had brought out, but said in explanation that so many people were out of town during the summer and more particularly on holidays, it was difficult to arouse sufficient enthusiasm amongst the citizens to make a big celebration possible. He said that the boys scouts and kindergartens were nearly all going on picnic and a great many of the automobile associations members would be away, too. The committee had made many plans which they were forced to reject on account of the difficulty in getting citizens to co-operate.

### NINE DEATHS THIS WEEK

Nine burial permits were issued by the board of health during the week. Deaths were due to the following causes: Tuberculosis, three; and pneumonia, influenza, bronchitis, premature birth, cancer of uterus and cerebral hemorrhage, one each. Speaking of the death rate St. John this morning, T. M. Burns, secretary of the board of health, said that the number of burial permits issued since the influenza epidemic has been consistently lower than usual. It was forecasted by Dr. Melvin during the epidemic that this state of affairs was likely to follow and so far his prediction is working out correctly.

#### TRADE COMMISSIONER HERE

W. J. Egan, Canadian Trade Commissioner in South Africa, is in the city and this morning called on the secretary of the board of trade. He later started a round of visits to the manufacturers of trade between Canada and South Africa. Mr. Egan expects to remain in the city until Monday.

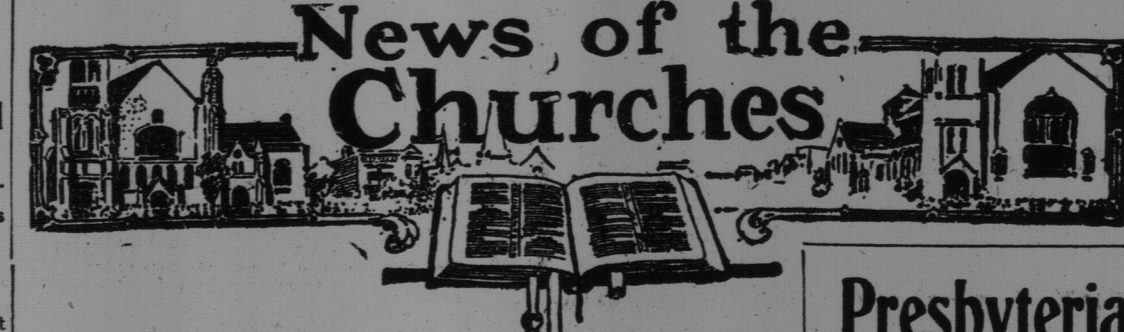

OFF HOME WITH SOME \$8,000,000

400 Italians Leave States Bound for Their Native Land

New York, July 18.—Carrying away an estimated amount of more than \$8,000,000 in money earned in the United States, 400 Italians boarded the steamships Giuseppe Verdi, Caserta, and the Italia bound for ports of their native land.

The leaders of the new movement contend that this system would remove the block constituted by parliament's lack of time, and at the same time open the way to all such reforms as the Church may desire to make in its own system. Their views, briefly, are: In the activity of self-government and self-reform the Church will gain greatly in its conscious realization of its corporate life as a society of disciples pledged to uphold the principles of Christ. But the Church has no living sense of corporate responsibility in such matters, because it at present has no means of corporate utterance or action.

The Church will, by self-government, unquestionably come to a fuller realization of its function in the world. That function can only be discharged by the United Church of Christ, and this point has always been emphasized by the Life and Liberty Movement.

ONTARIO FLAX CROP IS POOR

Toronto, July 18.—This is a bad year for the flax industry in Ontario. Reports to the department of agriculture show that sixteen of the twenty companies in Ontario which operate thirty-seven of the fifty-one mills in the province, are that the crop is not a success. Generally speaking, they report one-third of the crop on the 11,000 acres will have to be cut instead of being pulled. The flax is very short because of drought.

NEW PROFESSOR FOR ENGINEERING

At a meeting of the senate of the University of New Brunswick held yesterday afternoon in the government rooms here, Ernie O. Turner was appointed to the chair of civil engineering,

but no appointments were decided upon for the other two vacancies. Mr. Turner is a graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and has of late been acting as assistant in the Brooklyn Polytechnical Institute.

ACT DESIGNED TO STOP PROFITEERING

Chicago, July 18.—The city council of Chicago has passed an ordinance creating a department of foods and markets and farm products with the object of preventing frauds in the manufacture, distribution and marketing of food products, and to prevent in so far as possible all factors tending to create and maintain exorbitant prices.

The passage of this ordinance is one of the most important pieces of legislation passed by the council in many years, in the opinion of John H. Lyle, city alderman and author of the ordinance. "We spend," said Mr. Lyle, "\$836,000,000 a year in Chicago for food supplies, and heretofore have not provided one cent toward the regulation of food prices, while thousands of dollars are spent for the regulation of public utilities."

The commission created by this ordinance is to have the power to conduct investigations and hearings on the sources of food supply, available stocks and food and food products hoarded by speculators; delays in shipping, and hauling food supplies; customs and practices of producers and distributors in handling and marketing foods; keeping of records of the amount of foods shipped into Chicago, and to make charges against speculators alleged to indulge in the practice of buying up throughout the producing area of the state, crops and fruits, vegetables and other products, and refusing to market the same or permitting them to decay.

The department will publish reports containing information on the cost of production, distribution and marketing of foods, and recommend state and city legislation whereby food and food products may be supplied as directly as possible from the consumer at a minimum cost, and will maintain a free bureau of information for the use of the producer and consumer, to which complaints can be made.

The most important provision of the ordinance, in the opinion of Alderman Lyle, is that permitting the city to cooperate with the state and federal authorities to prevent food profiteering. The council meeting that the ordinance was from interests that will be affected by it, Mr. Lyle said, and he charged in the ordinance that the packers were interested in preventing its passage.

The ordinance provides that a commissioner shall be appointed as head of the new city department at a salary of \$3,000 a year. Nine citizens who shall serve without pay for a term of one year are to constitute an advisory board to cooperate with the department in performing the duties defined in the ordinance. At least six of these members are to be representatives of the consumers and the remaining three shall be experts with special knowledge of production, transportation and marketing of the new law provides.

EUROPE'S WORKING PEOPLE ON HOLIDAY

Theodore Morgan Describes Reaction After War Tension

PRODUCTION COST HIGH

Britain's Overseas Trade Curtailed; Pendulum Will Swing Back to Lower Prices Slowly

(Montreal Gazette). Prices will come down but the pendulum in that direction will swing but slowly, said Theodore Morgan, of Henry Morgan & Co., Limited, addressing the Montreal Publicity Association at its weekly luncheon at Freeman's yesterday.

Mr. Morgan a month ago returned from a trip to Europe and England, where he made a study of merchandising conditions, being abroad in the months of March, April and the better part of May.

Before prices fell central Europe and other places that were in great need of goods and food would have to be supplied.

Reaction Apparent. Mr. Morgan said he had gone over with an open mind to find out merchandising conditions in order to get an intelligent view of price conditions.

telligent view of price conditions. Going through the densely populated midland cities of England, to Scotland, and into the pottery districts, one gathered an idea of the disorganization that exists in the great commercial centres. There were a number of conditions that impressed one, and the first and foremost was that the tremendous tension due to the war, and under which the people have been living, had suddenly snapped, and this period of unrest was due to the reaction taking place.

When would prices come down? The cost of labor had gone up, the cost of materials was high, in some lines it would come down, but in others where there was a scarcity prices would not come down. The cost of coal today played a large part. Factories in England and France which had not figured on coal prices previously today had to readjust their factories so as to provide for this new item of cost for coal would not come down, and it is now a serious factor in the cost of production.

Walking in the shopping centres of Paris and London one saw much fine merchandise, and to one who did not know it would be thought that there was a wealth of merchandise. That merchandise, however, was high, and the demand correspondingly small because of the high prices.

normal conditions the cost of production in Europe would be less. Another factor that had to be remembered was that England could not turn from war to peace at once, first, because the labor could not be found to convert the mills, secondly, that labor was hard to get, and, thirdly, that the manufacturers were unable to get labor at the prices. The working classes of Europe, in effect, had been taking a holiday, said Mr. Morgan, a mild form of Bolshevism, the idea being with them that they had worked much and would rest until the money they had saved is gone. This was a result of the reaction following peace. Also, the governments had been too busy with international and peace affairs to study problems of their own countries. Mr. Morgan, as an instance of progress that had been made in northern France, said that his firm had goods in its store today manufactured in the French towns which had been under bombardment up to the time of the armistice.

The question of international credit was an important one, and Mr. Morgan believed that Canada and the United States should advance credits. This would mean for Canada getting markets which later on they might have no chance of getting.

An Englishman in the early days of 1914 would begin his breakfast with oatmeal porridge. This would be followed by fish-kipper or whiting. Then came the breakfast proper, which would probably consist of bacon and eggs, a plate of sausage and a dish of devilled kidneys. The meal ended with a sweet marmalade or a jam, and of course, it was accompanied throughout with cup

after cup of coffee and rack after rack of toast. Between courses, too, it was customary to peck at a cold game pie or a slice or two of cold boiled ham. There is a story they tell about the English breakfast. An English woman said to her husband one Sunday morning: 'Jack, dear, I do wish you'd eat a lighter breakfast today. I'm so afraid you'll be having another nightmare in church.'

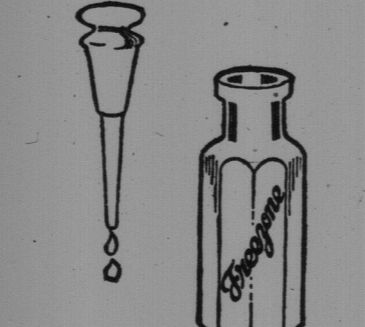

#### Kings and Queens Convention at Hampton Selects Delegates For Ottawa Convention—Resolutions Adopted

Hampton, N.B., July 17.—The Liberal convention for Kings and Queens (Royal) was held this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the County Court House, both counties were represented and a most successful convention was held. The entire meeting endorsed the union of Liberals.

The convention was called to order by Hon. Dr. J. E. Hetherington, M.P. for Queens county, Speaker of the House of Assembly. He opened the meeting with an address, asking that all those present put themselves on record as being in favor of a united Liberal party. He said that during the last election he was a Laurier Liberal, while some of his neighbors and friends were Unionists, yet he did not mean to throw bricks at any one, neither did he want any bricks thrown at him.

After the address the nomination for chairman and secretary for the meeting was in order, and J. R. McLean, of Sussex, was nominated chairman, and G. Hasen Adair, of Sussex, was nominated secretary. After this the election of delegates to attend the convention at Ottawa took place. The following were nominated: Kings county—G. Hasen Adair, Sussex; E. A. Harner, Newton; Sterling Keith, Havelock; Dr. G. N. Pearson, Sussex; Thomas A. Gilliland, Hammond River. Dr. Pearson did not accept the nomination, but the other four delegates did. G. Hasen Adair and E. A. Harner were elected to attend the convention, while S. Keith and T. Gilliland are to act as substitutes. Queens county—Richard Reid, Gagetown, delegate to convention; James Robinson, Cambridge, substitute.

At the conclusion of the election of delegates a resolution committee was appointed consisting of George A. King, M.P., Chipman; Hon. Mr. Ferris, of Queens county; R. S. Carter, Robbsey; Dr. J. E. Hetherington, M.P., of Coxy. The committee adjourned and drew up the following resolutions, which were unanimously accepted by the entire meeting.

### NATIONAL LEAGUE

Will Not Extend Season—The Division of the World Series Pool

New York, July 17.—The relocation of the 140 games schedule was decided at a meeting of the National League here today. There was an unanimous vote in favor of the recently revised rules for the division of the world series proceeds. If the American League takes similar action the division of the players' pool next October will be as follows:

Seventy-five per cent to be divided, sixty per cent to the winners and forty per cent to the losers with the remaining twenty-five per cent divided among the players of the second and third teams of the two leagues.

Further exhibition games between teams of the National League during the remainder of the season were prohibited with the exception of one contest already scheduled between Boston and Chicago for Syracuse some time in August.

A communication from the minor league organization was discussed and it was unanimously resolved not to enter into any formal agreement with the minor leagues unless the right of the major leagues to draw players from the minors was included so as to enable baseball players to advance in their profession as provided for in the present national agreement.

At a subsequent meeting of the board of the directors of the league it was decided to expunge from the record the second game of July 6 between Pittsburgh and Cincinnati and the teams were ordered to replay the contest on July 28 or August 31. Attention was called to this contest by the New York club which alleged a violation of the league constitution on the ground that the game was called early in order that Pittsburgh might catch a train when there were later trains which would have carried the team to its next destination after a full nine inning contest had been played. Cincinnati won by a score of 2 to 0, the game being called at the end of the seventh inning by agreement. As a result of today's decision one victory is subtracted from the Cincinnati club record to date and one defeat removed from Pittsburgh's record.

### AUSTRALIAN TENNIS PLAYERS MISSED STEAMER

Will Not Be Able to Participate in Eastern Doubles Championship Tournament

Boston, July 18.—The Australian tennis team, headed by Norman E. Brooks, will not reach this country in time to participate in the eastern doubles championship tournament, which begins at the Longwood Cricket Club next week. Efforts are under way, however, to make it possible for them to attempt qualification for the national doubles title in a later sectional tournament.

Secretary Richard Bishop, of the Massachusetts Tennis Association, had announced today that the Australians were en route to America and would be here in time to compete in the eastern tournament. Later, however, he said they had missed the steamship Aquitania and had called that they were sailing on the Adriatic, due in New York on July 28. United States Lawn Tennis Association officials were requested by Secretary Bishop, in response to a request contained in the cablegram, to arrange for



OTTAWA LETTER

Some of the Premier's Troubles in Re-construction

The Matter of the French-Canadian Representation in Cabinet—Likely Government to Assume More and More of Conservative Hue

Ottawa, July 16—Cabinet making has temporarily halted, because Sir Robert Borden has retired into the silence. He is trying to figure out how he can make his cabinet a really representative union one, including a French-Canadian element, when he has only one man of that race in the Unionist ranks to choose from; and that not a very eminent one. It is this lack of French-Canadian material which has given rise to the constant rumors that Premier Gouin will enter the cabinet. This is unlikely, although it is known that advances have been made to him.

It must be admitted that the cabinet needs some new Liberal blood, if it is to have any right to the name "Unionist"; because those Liberals who are now in it are generally considered to be either about to return to the Liberal party before another session of parliament or are looked on as lost to it forever. In the former class would be put Carvell and Maclean; in the latter, Guthrie, Calder and Rowell.

There are a few eminent French-Canadian not in parliament who might be looked on as cabinet possibilities; but they are very few. Probably the most eligible name is that of Sir Hermandus Lacombe, who has been chairman of the War Purchasing Commission, and may be presumed to be friendly to the government.

There are any amount of English members in the house who would answer the call and be glad to do so, but they are all former Conservatives. There has been a fierce competition in the house this session to catch the public eye between Nickle of Kingston, Stevens of Vancouver, and Nicholson of Algoma. While Stevens and Nicholson devoted a good deal of their time latterly to the cost of living committee, of which they were the most active members, Nickle remained in the house steadily pouring out speeches on every possible occasion. When occasion seemed to him, he created it by introducing resolutions and delivering interminable speeches on them, smacking of the midnight oil and the early legal fathers.

Nickle seemed to have considerable of a future when he entered parliament, but his weakness appears to be the not uncommon one of not knowing his own mind. This has given him the reputation of being independent, when he is really unstable. He made three distinct turns on the tiller abolition question, voting against the measure within a few minutes after sitting down from advocating it in a long and impassioned speech. He has plenty of ability, but more unstability.

Stevens and Nicholson have both worked hard this session; and the interest they have taken in public affairs would seem to justify some reward. Although a strong Conservative, the former seems to be of an independent turn of mind, and has had a considerable parliamentary experience. Both he and
