

stock's "hard yest," when so many prosperous farmers went, to the wall on account of crop failure and lack of a market for such products as they were able to raise. When the panic had subsided Mr. Christie had not only lost his original investment of \$500, but was \$1,000 in debt, besides.

In the spring of '96, he planted twenty-five acres of potatoes, which yielded a good crop and a fairly remunerative market price. This encouraged him and for three per four years in succession he raised large crops and sold them at high prices.

As a result of his industry and thrift, he has now not only the original 100 acres, but has from time to time added adjoining land until his farm now comprises a block of 400 acres, 300 acres of which are cleared and in a condition of high cultivation. He now raises in the neighborhood of 150 tons of hay, a large grain crop and plants on an average of eighty acres of potatoes a year, with a yield never less than 100 barrels an acre.

His buildings consist of a large two-story house, fitted, with a very modern convenience, a barm 65 by 120 in size; a potato house with a storage capacity of 5,000 barrels. In the working season he finds it necessary to employ four teams, and during the busiest months, a large crew of men.

When Miller was playing second base for the St. Paul team under Mike Kelley he was a right-hand hitter, but later tried his luck at the left side and with the greatest success. He batted above 300, something he had never been able to do as a right hand hitter.

Bob Bescher. a great fielder of the Cincinnati team, was a right hand batter and changed to the port side to try and better his hitting, with the result that today he is one of the stars of the game and is hitting excellently.


Lee Magee, of the St. Louis Nationals, one of the star infielders, was originally a right hand hitter, but switched around and is now considered a regular 300 man.
