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REPORT OF THE SESSION.

The Session review the year 1892 with hearty thanksgiving to Almighty God for the manifold temporal and spiritual blessings bestowed upon the congregation.

The attendance upon the diets of Public Worship on the Lord's Day has been large and devout. The numbers waiting upon the administration of the Holy Communion have been exceptionally large, and there is abundant evidence that the liberality of the congregation is on the increase.

Without any external agitation or unusual excitement, there has evidently been a quiet and wholesome and permanent work of grace, resulting in not a few conversions and building up of character for service in the Kingdom of God here and hereafter.

On the evening of Wednesday, the 11th inst., the Session met with the Christian workers of the congregation for the reception and consideration of reports on "Religious Life and Work" from our numerous departments of church activity. Brief and cheering reports, in some instances not devoid of honest criticism, were received and discussed: 1st. From the Session. 2nd. From the Prayer Meetings Committee. 3rd. From the Church Schemes Association, including (a) The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (no report); (b) The King's Messengers' Mission Band; (c) Sunbeam Mission Band. 4th. From the Sabbath Schools, (a) Central; (b) Oxford Street; (c) London West; (d) Mr. G. W. Armstrong's Senior Bible Class. 5th. From the Ladies' Aid and Visiting Society. 6th. From our large and prosperous Y. P. S. C. E.

A conjunct view of these reports indicates a large amount of earnest and successful work, as well as a goodly staff of devoted laborers loyal to Christ and devoted to His service in the Church.

A number of stirring addresses full of gratitude and hope were delivered by gentlemen present. The meeting was a good one—a means of inspiration.

The deaths during 1892 were nineteen—fifteen of these being members in full communion.

The additions to the Communion Roll were 84—48 of these being by profession of faith and 36 by certificates from other churches. Fourteen persons, in consequence of change of residence, applied for and received letters of disjunction. Notwithstanding the numbers removed by death and change of residence, there has been a clear gain to the roll of 55.

The Session within the last month have very carefully revised and corrected the Communion Roll, and find that after removing every questionable name we have 740 *bona fide* members and about 280 contributing families. The number of baptisms for the year is 21—all infants.

In the list of deaths, the congregation will notice with deep regret the demise of one of our oldest and most faithful elders, Mr. William Kent. He was a good man, a most liberal supporter of the congregation and the schemes of the church, kindly in disposition, and honorable in all his dealings. Our sympathy is warmly extended to his widow and friends.

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THE FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

—OF THE—

RAY,

BOARD OF MANAGERS

BEING FOR THE YEAR 1892

The Board of Managers of St. Andrew's Church submit herewith a detailed statement of the revenue of the Church showing the Receipts and Disbursements for the year ending December 31st, 1892.

In this statement it will be observed that the Receipts through the envelope system amounted to \$5,006.24, and the open collections to \$615.18, an average per Sunday of \$108.00. In comparing the revenue from these two sources with that of the previous year, it shows a total increase of \$58.42 in the envelopes, and of \$67.74 in the open collections.

Your Board earnestly request that more of the members and adherents of the congregation would adopt the envelope system, and that some of those so contributing would, if possible, increase their contributions.

As there are six Managers to be elected to fill the places of those retiring, the Board recommends that a Nominating Committee be appointed, composed of two Managers (not retiring) named by the Chairman of the Board, and three persons chosen by the congregation to nominate suitable persons for election, and in the event of a greater number of names being submitted than are required, a ballot be taken.

The six Managers whose term of office now expires by rotation are Messrs. R. A. Gray, R. A. Little, J. B. Laidlaw, J. A. Cairncross, Geo. A. Somerville and M. H. Rowland, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

During the year all necessary repairs have been made to the church and the manse, which are now in good condition. A new picket fence has been placed in front of the cemetery at a cost of seventy-five dollars. The monuments have been properly adjusted, and the grounds well kept. But in consequence of the proximity of the cemetery to the city limits and the probability of its being brought within the corporation, persons requiring lots have gone to other cemeteries, so that the revenue derived from it is very small in comparison with the yearly expense of keeping it in order.

The carpet in the church, which has been in use for nearly eleven years, will soon have to be replaced by a new one, and it is thought that the congregation should devise some means of meeting this expenditure without encroaching upon the ordinary revenue.

THE BOARD RESPECTFULLY RECOMMENDS—

1st. That the Report of the Organ Committee as published in the last Annual Report be adopted, and that the thanks of the congregation be hereby tendered to the Committee for its diligence, and that the Committee be relieved from any further responsibility therewith.

2nd. That the congregation grant our pastor a vacation of a month or six weeks each year, thus enabling the Session to take steps as early as possible to provide suitable supply during his absence.

3rd. As it is very desirable that our Choir be maintained in its present state of efficiency, and as a few of the members of the congregation have been liberally contributing to a fund for that purpose during the last two years, and,

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as it is thought unfair that those members should have to bear the whole burden, that the Board be authorized to use a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars for choir purposes, *if required*.

All contributions received by envelopes for congregational purposes are acknowledged quarterly by printed statements, and placed in the pews, and the whole amount of receipts for the year is published in the Annual Report. The contributions for the schemes of the church, by red envelopes, are acknowledged in the report of the Missionary Association.

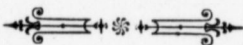

THE MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

HELD ON THE 18th JANUARY, 1893.

The Forty-second Annual Meeting of St. Andrew's congregation was held in the Lecture Room of the Church on the evening of Wednesday, the 18th January, 1893.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises by the Pastor, Rev. J. A. Murray, after which the Chairman of the Board of Managers, Mr. M. H. Rowland, occupied the chair, and read the minutes of last Annual Meeting, which were sustained.

Moved by Mr. McSween, and seconded by Mr. Gibson, "That the Annual Report of the Board of Managers for 1892 and the Treasurer's Financial Statement be submitted to the meeting, and that the report be considered as read, and taken up clause by clause." Carried.

The first three clauses were then read and passed, after which the Chairman appointed Mr. Jas. McSween and Dr. Macarthur a Nominating Committee from the Board of Managers, and Messrs. J. W. McIntosh, Geo. A. McGillivray and T. H. Purdom were appointed by the congregation, to nominate suitable persons for election.

The next two clauses of the report were read and passed.

The 6th clause was read, and after some discussion it was moved by Jas. McSween, and seconded by Alex. Fraser, "That the clause pass, and that the ladies of the congregation be requested to take up the matter of carpeting the church."

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The report of the Nominating Committee was then received. Ten candidates were nominated, and the following six were elected :—Messrs. G. A. Somerville, M. H. Rowland, R. A. Gray, J. B. Laidlaw, R. A. Little and James Houston.

The balance of the report was adopted without amendment, with the exception of clause No. 8, which, upon motion of T. Purdom and G. W. Armstrong, extended the Pastor's vacation to two months.

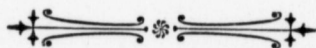
The report was then adopted as a whole.

St. Andrew's Church Sabbath School

REPORT FOR 1892.

Our Sabbath School work has gone on very satisfactorily during the year considering the accommodation. Why such a large, intelligent and influential congregation as St. Andrew's is should listen from year to year to the appeals of those who labor earnestly for the good of the rising generation, and never put forth a single effort for the better arrangement of the school room, is a question difficult to answer. Apparently very little interest is taken by the majority of our congregation in this department of church work. Very few of our members drop in to see how we are getting along. Even when open meetings are held, and pressing invitations are given from the pulpit, the attendance is so small that we are almost forced to the conclusion that but a small percentage of the parents take an interest in the school. We would fain hope that such is not the case.

For some years it has been thought that it would be well for Presbyterianism in this city if a Sabbath School was organized in London West. In December, 1891, a joint committee, composed of members appointed from the Sessions of St. James' and St. Andrew's churches, took up the question and succeeded in organizing a school there in January last. Mr. R. H. Morrison, who took an active part in its organization, was appointed superintendent. We are pleased to learn that the school is progressing favorably. The formation of this school accounts for the decrease in our average attendance, as shown by the following statistics :

The regular Sabbath collections for Missions amounted to \$273.64, which is \$31.38 less than was raised last year. Besides this one junior class of girls contributed \$2.65, and one class of boys \$4.75; two senior classes of girls contributed \$7.00 and \$5.50 respectively for Port Pelly. These sums are over and above their regular contributions, making the total \$293.54.

We recommend that it be divided as follows: Foreign Missions, including \$24 to Port Pelly, \$64; Home Missions, including \$10 to the Provincial S. S. Association and \$25 to the London West S. S., \$115; Augmentation Fund, \$25; Point Aux Trembles, \$65; French Evangelization, \$15; Welland Canal Mission, \$5, and Charity, \$4 (special).

The library has been well patronized by the scholars. A large number of the books are badly worn, and if its usefulness is to be maintained it is necessary that we should expend from \$75 to \$100 during the present year in replenishing the shelves with good literature. This will afford a grand opportunity for some of our wealthy and generous friends to bestow a lasting benefit on the school.

On the 9th of October the school was favored with a visit from Dr. Paton, the church's celebrated representative in the New Hebrides. He addressed the school on "mission work" in his field.

On the 16th of the same month, Dr. Macdonald, Principal of the Presbyterian College in Calcutta, was present and addressed the scholars on "The Character and Customs of the Children in India."

In September last Mr. Muir's family removed to Detroit, where their father had gone nearly a year previous. They all took a deep interest in the school. Miss Muir had been organist for many years. We all felt as if their departure was an irreparable loss. However, the Master has raised up others who are nobly endeavoring to fill the places of those whom, we trust, have only gone to labor in another part of His vineyard.

On the 3rd of March David Crone, a member of the Intermediate Class, was removed by the hand of death. The family have our prayers and sympathy in their bereavement.

During the year twenty-one of our scholars made a public profession of their faith in Christ, and became members of the church in full communion.

The Chinese class has increased in numbers and interest. There are seventeen on the roll, with an average attendance of eight. They appear to be making satisfactory progress in learning our language, and at least two of them take a deep interest in spiritual things.

Our Anniversary was held on the 23rd of December. The programme, with the exception of an address from our Pastor, was carried out by the scholars. An interesting feature was the scholars presenting their gifts to the crew of the Dayspring of 1892, to be carried by them to the Indian children at Port Pelly.

North Presbyterian Sabbath School

IN CONNECTION WITH

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, LONDON.

To the Session of St. Andrew's Church:

BRETHREN,—In submitting the Fifth Annual Report of our North Sabbath School for the year ending Dec. 31, 1892, we desire to acknowledge with gratitude to our Divine Master the measure of success He has again given us. We thank Him for the harmony and spirit of earnestness that has prevailed among us during the past year, and trust that our service may be accepted by Him and made a blessing to many young hearts. Our work has gone on steadily during the year without anything unusual to note—faithful teaching and a fair measure of earnest study has been the rule in all our classes. Our membership is still about the same as reported last year, viz.: 21 teachers and officers and 119 scholars.

Since last report Miss Thoms, Miss Burnett and Miss Maggie Gilmour, three of our efficient teachers, have left us, and five new teachers have been added to our staff, viz.: Miss Rhoda Gordon, Miss Rodgers, Miss Douglas, Miss Gilmour, Miss Gillean and Mr. Brimmacomb.

During the summer we made exchanges of library books with the Westminster S. S. (Rev. Mr. Sawers), and with London East S. S. This gave us a lot of books new to our school and relieved us from the necessity of purchasing new books for our library at that time. However, we now need

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more books, probably many of the members of our congregation have books suitable that they would gladly contribute to our library when they know we need them. They could help us in this way.

By your authority the Trustees of our school property have rented the building to the Board of Education for Kindergarten purposes during the current year. The terms are: \$10 per month for ten months and three tons of coal, with the use of their piano and other furniture as we may wish to use them. This arrangement in no way interferes with our work.

We have been steadily reducing the amount of our floating debt, as reported by our Treasurer.

Our Weekly Prayer Meeting has been regularly held on Wednesday evenings, with a few exceptions. The attendance is not as large as we anticipated, many of our people in our part of the city who ought to be with us do not come. Their presence at our prayer meeting would add to the success and interest of it.

The necessary expenses of our work for the current year will be about as follows:—Janitor, \$60; fuel, light and water, \$75; S. S. supplies, \$45; making a total of \$180. As our only source of revenue for this purpose is the contributions of our classes, and is not sufficient for the purpose, we would suggest that the Managers be requested to continue the grant of \$100 given us last year.

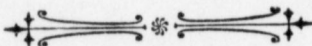

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REPORT OF THE LONDON WEST SUNDAY SCHOOL

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DEC., 1892.

In accordance with the expressed desire of several families in London West for a Presbyterian Sunday School, and under the joint auspices of the Sessions of St. Andrew's and St. James' Churches this school was organized on the 3rd Sabbath of January, with a membership of thirty scholars, eight teachers and five officers. Our attendance has not increased very much during the year from the fact that the ground was pretty well occupied by the other denominations, and that we got all the children in connection with the Presbyterian families at the opening of the school. Some have withdrawn during the year, and others have been added, so that our membership at the present time is thirty-nine scholars.

As we had no funds when the school was opened we asked for contributions of books suitable for a Library from the congregation, and got a very liberal response, nearly 200 volumes being contributed, for which we desire to thank all our kind friends. Our thanks are also due, and are hereby tendered, to Mr. C. R. Somerville, Mr. Lohead and others who assisted us in our treat for the children. We desire also to thank the Central School for supplying us with lesson slips and Sunday School papers gratis. The school meets in the Temperance Hall every Sabbath afternoon at three o'clock, and we invite all friends in the congregation interested in Sunday School work to come over and see us and the work we are engaged in. We

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find that we must make some additions to our Library as soon as possible, as some of the books at present in use are getting old, and others are hardly suitable for the children. The following is our present staff of officers and teachers :

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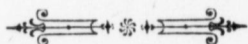

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The King's Messengers Foreign Mission Band.

In presenting this our Sixth Annual Report we cannot but say that the Lord has been very good in blessing our work that has been carried on during the year, and we know that the year we are about to enter will also prosper if we only ask our Father's guidance and blessing. We have now 37 names on the roll, which makes 7 less than last year. Eleven meetings have been held during the year, with an average attendance of 22. Our ways of earning money have been much the same as in former years. In March Rev. R. Johnston, of Lindsay, delivered a lecture in behalf of the Band. Mite boxes have also been used. In returning them in September we realized the sum of \$5.64. The cent-a-day boxes were also used, but not as last year, only one having been taken. In October our Annual Thank-Offering Meeting was held. So few being present owing to the inclemency of the weather, we did not realize as much as in former years, receiving \$4.70. Receipts from all sources amounting to \$55.00, also a box sent to the North-west valued at \$25.00.

Again we plead for more workers; we all cannot go and work in the foreign field, but work in our own land is plainly set before us, that will help the advancement of God's glorious work. How much work could be done in our church? It is plainly seen that out of such a large congregation, a roll membership of 37, something must be wrong and ought to be remedied. The only way it can be done is by each member so consecrating herself that it

will be her aim and object to advance this part of the Lord's work. During the year we have lost several members by removal, but we hope only to take up the Lord's work in other fields. Miss J. Gourlay, our 2nd Vice-President, left in August. She has been greatly missed, as she always took such an active interest in our work.

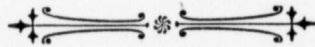

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The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor.

During the past year we have added to our membership twenty-nine (29), making a total membership of 174. Of these, however, quite a number, many of them from among our best workers, have left the city. Twenty five of our members publicly professed their faith in Christ during the year, and we have about forty of our members engaged in Sabbath School work as well as a number who are ready to act as substitute teachers when called on.

We made no special financial effort during '92. Contributions and collections amounted to about \$110.00, of which amount \$45.00 was sent to the Knox College Missionary Society, while Convention, printing and other running expenses, including a supply of Christian Endeavor Hymn Books, used up much of the balance.

We have also given some financial aid to needy members of our congregation, and on Christmas and New Year's

Even we distributed eatables to a number of families with the idea of making the holiday season more enjoyable.
