School Report. The Report of the Halifax School Boa for the year 1912 is just issued and con tains much of interest. The number o A licenses, 80 had B, 74 C, and 4 D. in any form may be sold in the Aldershot cradustry. and the girls 4,260. The average daily ttendance was 6.210, a gain of 266.5 over the previous year, while the registration was only 22 greater. This shows that the Compulsory School Act is being better enforced year by year. In this regard

Supervisor McKay says:

A few years ago the compulsory age in Halifax was seven. It was found, however, that a very large proportion of the children under that age, not only from poor homes, and in demoralising environments, but also from some of the more comfortable homes, were allowed to associate with vagrants in the streets, or left to the care of ignorant servants. They readily acquired had habits most difficult ceradicate, and learned mostly evil. They lost in each as in morals, for the hygienic, social and moral conditions of mearly all our schools are infinitely superior to those of many homes. So the Compulsory Act was smended to include children of the age of six. As a result the health and moral conditions of a large proportion of the children are considerably improved. Under the intelligent and kindly supervision of our child. pervisor McKay says: ably improved. Under the intelligen and kindly supervision of our primary teachers these young children spend their happlest hours in the scholoroum. Their teachers possessing the maternal instinct, and having studied child psychology, are much more skilful than the average mother in the management of the children. Besides, it is a well-known fact that children, under properly supervised play learn very much from each other, especially as to social adaptations—a privilege almost entirely lacking in most homes.

There were 605 students enrolled in the

There were 605 students enrolled in the regular High School work in the various High Schools, 145 for Grade C, 78 for Grade B, 24 for Grade A, and 24 taking the Comreial Course. This is only 6 per cent. of the total attendance, a very unsatisfactory number. On this point the Supervisor There should be some explanation for the

There should besome explanation for the small percentage of high school pupils in our schools, and for the decrease in numbers where we should have expected a rapid increase from a growing appreciation of the value of education. The increased cost of living may have had a depressing influence, but the principal cause is to be found in the feeling of both parents and children that the training prepares for college as at present constituted, rather than for the economic factor in life, and that the traditional course of study falls to take account of the students' aptitudes, or to give him that information about himself, nature or scolety which would help more directly to make him industrially efficient, self-subporting and useful to there.

Organized educational forces, in spite of Organized educational forces, in spite of the accretions of formal pedagogy, are recognising the vital importance of the economic factor in education. Activities that require on the average 65 per cent of man's total energy are surely worthy of apecial attention in our high schools.
