# 20,000 STUDENTS ON STRIKE

June 3—A strike involving nearly 20,000 students in all the lead-ing Austrian universities and high schools began today through the re-newed activity of Dr. Wahrmund, pro-fessor of Catholic ecclesiastical law, whose attitude as shown by a speech in which he criticized the doctrines of the Roman Catholic church, recently led to difficulties with the Vatican.
