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THE TENDENCY TOWARDS RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

The dispute between Spain and the Vatican, which is still in an acute stage, naturally recalls the struggle between France and the Holy See, although the situa-tions obtaining in the two countries were not quite the same. It is significant, however, that Spanish statesmen at the time were much impressed by France in the latter's dealings with the Vatican, and that Premier Canalejas himself was in Paris during the debates, study-ing French methods.

ing French methods. France had long had a law of religious liberty for non-Catholics, and substantially it was enforced. Spain had such a law, adopted fifteen years ago, but with the agreement that it would remain a dead letter. Hence one of the contentions, and a main one, between Spain and the Vatican, is whether a place of worship not under control of the Church of Rome, may publicly pro-claim itself such place, and permit all who desire to do so to enter, and having done so, to worship God as they please.
