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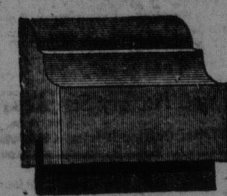

Police Court.

They were placed in a cell and will be taken to Dorchester this morning where they will serve their two years' term.

TWO SETS OF PLANS FOR THE PROPOSED BRIDGE AT FALLS

Premier Fleming Announces that if Street Railway Company will Share Additional Expense Structure will be Made to Accommodate Traffic of Cars - Valley Railway Contract.

Premier Fleming announced last evening that the department of public works for the province had prepared two sets of plans for the proposed bridge across the river at the Reversing Falls. One set of plans shows the cost of a bridge constructed to carry street car traffic as well as the ordinary highway traffic, while the other shows the cost of a bridge for highway traffic only.

"Several conferences," said the Premier, "have been held with the Street Railway Company of St. John and with a view to arriving at an agreement by which the Street Railway Company would bear the additional cost necessary to provide a bridge for street car traffic, and the Commission of Public Works is arranging for another conference to go further into the matter. He is now prepared to give the company information as to the contribution expected of them, and if they agree to bear a proper proportion of the cost of constructing a bridge for street car traffic, the government will call for tenders to construct the bridge as soon as possible.

"The present bridge was overhauled during the summer, and substantial repairs made to it, and it is no doubt capable of carrying the traffic for a considerable time to come."

Speaking of the Valley Railway Mr. Fleming said he did not care to make public all the details of the contract until it was signed, but he stated that the company had agreed to all the provisions, and that the contract would fully safeguard the interests

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

HOPE TO ESTABLISH EXPERIMENTAL FARM

Delegation of Local Government Intend Consulting Federal Authorities.

Hon. Dr. Landry states that a delegation of the local government planned on going to Ottawa in a short time to consult with the federal authorities in connection with the project to establish an experimental farm in New Brunswick. He said the local government would determine the location of the proposed farm, but that his department would urge that it be located near Fredericton.

Dr. Landry said the department had not yet received full reports in regard to the crops during the past year, but that the estimate was that there was a larger crop generally than last year. "And the farmers are also getting better prices," he added.

Many Requests Made by Various Organizations for Assistance-Want Railway Bonds Guaranteed.

A meeting of the provincial government was held in the city yesterday at which delegations were heard asking for assistance for an extension of the Tobique Valley Railway, the opening of Oromocto Lake to the fishing public, and more knowledge and better methods in connection with road making.

J. J. Carter, of Andover, and J. L. White, of Grand Falls appeared and asked the administration to consider the propriety of guaranteeing the bonds for a railway from Plaster Rock to Riley's Brook, on the Tobique, a distance of 23 miles. This road would be an extension of the present Tobique branch and plans for its construction have been under way for some time.

The government promised consideration of the proposition as soon as possible.

A large delegation from the New Brunswick Fish, Forest and Game Association interviewed the administration in connection with the fishing privileges of Lake Oromocto, which are now under lease to parties in St. John. The delegation asked that at the expiration of the lease next year the lake be thrown open to the public on some practical basis. They expressed a desire to have the fish properly protected and the public admitted to fishing privileges on the payment of the rod license.

A delegation from the Good Roads Association composed of Messrs. Burditt, Lee, Fisher and O'Brien urged upon the administration the advisability of adopting some plan which would ensure the dissemination of a better knowledge of roadmaking and the employment of better methods in road construction.

Thos. Howell, general immigration agent of the Canadian Northern Railway, was in the city yesterday, and interviewed the local government with a view to arranging a plan of co-operation with the provincial immigration department in the work of bringing out new settlers to the province. Interviewed by a Standard reporter, Mr. Howell said he was much pleased at the reception accorded him and his proposals by the members of the government.

"The immigration department of the Canadian Northern," he added, "is in close touch with a type of people who want to come out here and who would make excellent settlers for the Maritime Provinces. The New Brunswick government has a live-wire immigration office in England, and we would be glad to work with it. Co-operation would be to our mutual advantage, I think."

"We are in touch with a large number of farmers in rural England, who wish to come to Canada. Many of them with the capital at their disposal could establish themselves very comfortably in the Maritime Provinces, whereas if they went west their capital would not suffice to put them in the way of immediate success."

"The St. John Valley has always looked good to me as a place for new settlers and it only needs an extensive and systematic publicity campaign setting forth its advantages to bring the people here."

"Our immigration department had a very successful season last year, but practically all the people we brought out went to the west. We located about 1,500 domestics in the west, and expect to place a number in the Maritime Provinces next year."

"Our steamship line has put a man on the ships, whose duty it is to look after the girls. She ranks as an officer and the innovation has proved very satisfactory. The company will probably put on more ships next year."

Speaking of the commotion among the ladies of Montreal by the report that the Canadian Northern had advertised last year for 5,000 wives for western farmers, Mr. Howell said it was the result of a misconception. An English paper substituted the word wives for domestics, and all the other papers made a great hurrah about 5,000 wives being wanted in Canada.

"The curious thing," said Mr. Howell, "was that the English papers took the report seriously and wrote editorials about it, stating that in view of the number of Englishmen going to Canada it was only the logical thing to send the women after them."
