REVISED CONSTITUTION  
OF THE  
MISSIONARY SOCIETY

OF THE  
Wesleyan-Methodist Church in Canada.

ARTICLE 1.—That in consequence of the withdrawal of the British Conference from connexion with the Canadian Conference, the Canada Conference Missionary Society has ceased to be Auxiliary to the Wesleyan Missionary Society in England; it is therefore expedient that the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada reorganize and establish, as it existed previously to the year 1833, an independent Missionary Society, to be denominated THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA.

ART. 2.—The object of this Society is to excite and combine the exertions of the Societies and Congregations of the Wesleyan Methodists and others throughout the Province of Canada, in the support and enlargement of Missions among the Indians and destitute Settlers of this Province and elsewhere.

ART. 3.—The payment of One Pound, and upwards, annually, shall constitute a Member; and the payment of Ten Pounds, and upwards, at one time, shall constitute a member for life, and shall entitle each to a copy of the Annual Report.

ART. 4.—The Officers of this Society shall consist of a Treasurer, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries, who, together with ten Managers, shall form a Board, by whom the business of the Society shall be transacted during the intervals of Conference. They shall be annually elected by the Society. At any meeting of the Board five shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

ART. 5.—The President and Secretary of the Conference shall be, *ex-officio*, Members of the Board of Managers.

ART. 6.—The Conference, at each of its Annual Meetings, shall appoint a Committee, consisting of the President and Secretary of the Conference, the Chairmen of Districts, and five others, whose duty it shall be to audit all the Accounts of the Expenditures, &c., during the past year, and make, as far as may be necessary, the appropriations for the support of the Missions during the ensuing year.

ART. 7.—All the Methodist Missionary Societies which have been, or may be formed in the several *Districts* of the Province of Canada, shall be entitled "Auxiliaries;" and all Societies in the particular Circuit of any District shall be entitled "Branches."

ART. 8.—All Benefactors of Ten Pounds, and upwards, and all Subscribers of One Pound, and upwards, Annually, to any of the Auxiliary or Branch Societies, shall be deemed members of the General Society.

ART. 9.—An Annual Public Meeting of the Members and friends of the Society shall be held at the time and place of the Session of the Conference, at which Meeting the Officers and Managers of the Society shall be appointed, according to Article 4.

## R E P O R T.

WITHOUT the religion of the Bible, man cannot be saved, or be made holy, or free, or happy. The Scriptural instruction of the entire population of a country is, therefore, amongst the first duties of the Christian, the Philanthropist, and the Statesman. The Bible alone is the source of all correct principles and sound morals; the inculcation of its truths should, therefore, commence with the existence of every community, and form the basis of its civil and social institutions. And to make a community Christian, its individual members must be made Christians.

Under the influence of these considerations, the labours of the Wesleyan-Methodist Church in Upper Canada were commenced before the year 1790, when this Province was a comparative wilderness, and contained less than ten thousand inhabitants. During many years, those labours were prosecuted under circumstances of toil, privations, and sufferings, not exceeded, the Committee believe, in the history of Christian enterprise since the days of the Apostles. The first regular Methodist Missionaries who came to this Province, were sent here by the Superintendents of the Methodist Church in the United States, in accordance with the directions of Mr. Wesley and Dr. Coke.\* The American Superintendents continued for a length of time to supply this Province with Missionaries—selecting, in all cases where it was practicable,

either British-born subjects, or preachers who preferred labouring in the British dominions.\* In the course of time the Ministers and Members of the Methodist Church in Upper Canada, consisting almost entirely of British subjects, desired to dissolve all foreign ecclesiastical connexion. The American Methodist General Conference, with a liberal and praiseworthy regard to the feelings and circumstances of the junior branch of the Methodist Church in Canada, consented to its independence. About seven years since, an arrangement was entered into between the Wesleyan Conferences in England and in Canada with a view, according to certain "Articles of Union," of combining the resources and energies of the two Connexions for the wider extension of religious instruction amongst the new settlements and Indian Tribes of the country. The Wesleyan Committee in London claiming, at length, a control in the local affairs of Canada not provided for in the Articles of Union, and to which the Canadian Conference could not assent, the English Conference thought proper, in August last, to abandon the Articles of Union—drawing away as many Missions as could be induced to secede from the Canada Conference; and suddenly withdrawing all support from the rest.

It was under such circumstances, at the Special Session of the Canada Conference in October last, that the Committee assumed their present responsible charge. The Church was in an unsettled state: several Missionaries had retired from the Conference; the Missionaries remaining had received but a small part of the first quarter's allowance then due them; the Committee had not a sixpence to meet their demands, or to supply their wants, and could hold out no other prospect of support than that which was presented by the excellence of their cause, the liberality of the Canadian public, and the blessing of Him whose watchful Providence

has ever protected the interests and prospered the labours of the Wesleyan-Methodist Church in Canada. Our devoted Missionaries resolved to "suffer the loss of all things," and to endure poverty and want, rather than abandon their companions in labour and the Church of their choice and affections. The apostolic spirit of sacrifice in which they went forth to their fields of suffering and labour, was soon rewarded, not only by the testimony of a good conscience, and the blessing of God upon their ministrations, but by a sympathy and princely liberality on the part of the members and the friends of the Wesleyan-Methodist Church hitherto unparalleled in the history of Canadian Missions.

In presenting, therefore, the *Sixteenth Annual Report* of the operations of this Society, it is the grateful duty and privilege of the Committee to record the special displays of the Divine favour which have crowned its exertions during the past year. The important and benevolent objects of the Society, in regard both to the New Settlements and the Aboriginal Indian Tribes, seem never to have been more fully understood, or more highly appreciated, or so liberally supported. The joyous and triumphant feelings which have ushered in the close of the year, delightfully contrast with the gloomy apprehensions and prospects under which it was commenced, and warrant the prosecution of our work with increased confidence and zeal. During many years this Society was almost alone in its labours amongst the new settlers and Indian Tribes; and the religious history of most of the Townships of this Province would characterise Methodist Missionaries as the Christian pioneers among the scattered and destitute inhabitants. In reviewing their last year's labours, the Committee would invite attention, in the first place, to the Missions amongst the Aboriginal Indian Tribes; and secondly, to the Domestic Missions, or Missions amongst the new and scattered White Settlements.

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## MISSIONS TO THE INDIAN TRIBES.

The fact is as striking, as it is humiliating and lamentable, that the contact of the North American Indian with European and American intelligence, has proved, not the means of the Indian's improvement and elevation, but a new and fruitful source of his poverty, degradation, and misery. The disease of European vices has been widely and fatally propagated, unaccompanied by the antidote of European virtue, benevolence, and piety. The White-man's commerce and vices have impoverished and ruined the Indian; whilst the White-man's religion was withheld from him. Few Indian Tribes of North America have experienced to a greater extent the effects of this "accursed process" than those of Upper Canada. Their thousands of population have dwindled to hundreds; their vast territories of land have been reduced to isolated plots; to their vices of nature have been added those of art; so that they have long since become a proverb, as well as spectacle, of moral debasement and social wretchedness. The depth of their degradation was considered by many to be below the reach of Christianity itself; and they were regarded as doomed to terminate their rayless life by a midnight tomb.

It was thus "against hope believing in hope," that the successful operations of this Society were commenced, nearly twenty years ago, amongst the Indian Tribes of this Province. Their success has not only falsified the predictions of their early opposers and sceptical friends, but has added another practical and irresistible testimony to the truth of the long-disputed doctrine, that Christianity is the proper, and only efficient, instrument of civilization; that as there is no example of any nation having acquired the knowledge of one true and living God without a revelation from heaven; so, wherever the Gospel is truly preached and received, it continues to be the "power of God unto salvation," and an essential and suitable preliminary

step in the arts and that in this infant stage of civilization, ignorance, and often severely exercised perseverance of heart, and the struggle to be subdued in and infirmities in moral elevation, from the pollution of barism, will detract from the brightness of the But after making upon the value of our Indian Missions, amply warrants "Godliness is profitable to the life to come"—abolishing the wretchedness of man—sowing the seeds of virtue—creating habits of industry, expanding, and love and devotion, moral and intellectual elements of relief, alleviating the suffering, illuminating the "sure and certain everlasting life."

The Reports are a practical illustration of general observations.

step in the arts and comforts of civilized life. It is true, that in this infancy of the spiritual life, and in the first stage of civilization, there will be found much remaining ignorance, and weakness, and error, which will often severely exercise the prudence, and patience, and perseverance of the Missionary; the depravity of the heart, and the superstitions and vices of the life, are not to be subdued in a day; instances of failure will occur; and infirmities incident to humanity, even in its highest moral elevation, and especially when just emerging from the pollution and degradation of idolatry and barbarism, will detract from the beauty and obscure the brightness of the greatest Missionary achievements. But after making due allowance for all these abatements upon the value and extent of our success, the history of our Indian Missions during the last seventeen years amply warrants us in reiterating the assertion, that "Godliness is profitable unto all things, having the promise of the life that now is, as well as of that which is to come"—abolishing an irrational and cruel idolatry—subduing the worst passions of the depraved heart of man—sowing the seeds and ripening the fruits of piety and virtue—creating the feelings and promoting the habits of industry and enterprise—developing and expanding, and elevating the sympathies of Christian love and devotion—and forming and arranging all those moral and intellectual materials which constitute the elements of religious, social, and civil happiness—alleviating the sufferings of poverty and affliction, and illuminating the "valley and shadow of death" with a "sure and certain hope of a glorious resurrection to everlasting life."

The Reports from our several Indian Missions afford a practical illustration of the truth and justness of these general observations.

#### GRAND RIVER MISSION.

This Mission is established in the vicinity of the "Salt Springs," among the Mohawk Indians. It was

within the bounds of this Mission that the message of salvation was first made known by our Missionaries to the Aboriginal Indians of this Province; it was here that the dagon of idolatry first fell before the ark of the Gospel; it was here that the first tears of genuine penitence were shed, and the first filial cries of "Abba, Father," were heard amongst these neglected and injured people; it was here that several of the first Indian converts, after having for years adorned their christian profession by a "holy walk and godly conversation," triumphantly finished their earthly voyage, and calmly entered their immortal haven "as a summer's wave ripples upon the shore."

Yet various obstructions have, at different times, impeded the success and prosperity of this Mission; and the Committee are grieved to say that the abandonment of the articles of the Union by the English Conference has given birth to a serious division of the Indian Society at this place. This is one of the few examples in the history of Protestant Churches, in which their differences have been carried into the fields of their Missionary labours, and made instrumental in dividing the babes and scattering the lambs of Christ's flock. Those who have "need to be fed with milk," are not likely to be able to digest the bones of ecclesiastical controversy, or to judge of its merits. The destroying of the confidence of such converts in their religious guides is the first, if not the almost certain step, in the way of apostacy into their former barbarism and wretchedness.

It is, however, an alleviation to the feelings of the Committee to be able to say, that there are upwards of fifty souls,—besides a large and attentive congregation,—who are "steadfast and immovable," walking "in the fear of the Lord and in the comforts of the Holy Ghost." Their appearance and habits forcibly contrast with the wretched condition of their drunken neighbours. The afflictive circumstances which have affected the interests of this Mission during the year were not anticipated

at the commencement of the year. It is probable that the success and the ensuing year.

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at the commencement of it; the best arrangements possible are intended to repair the evils done, and promote the success and usefulness of the Mission during the ensuing year.

#### CREDIT MISSION.

This is the parent Mission amongst the *Chippewa* Indians of British North America. For sixteen years it has been a living witness of the saving power and beneficial influence of Christianity upon the hearts and lives of the most degraded and miserable of the human race. Proverbs, amongst all the Canadian tribes, for drunkenness, filthiness, and every species of moral debasement, the Indians at this place, since their conversion to Christianity, have attracted the visits and admiration of thousands, by the piety of their lives and the improvement in their social condition, as evinced by their habitations, their gardens, their fields, their shops, and their mills—erected at the very place which was formerly the scene of their revelries, vices, and murderous combats. The natural increase of population for several years past has been about ten souls a year. During the entire history of this Mission, the instances of apostasy have been few; few even in comparison of the number who have died in the *full* “hope of immortality and eternal life.” From this centre, the light of the “glorious Gospel” has radiated to the very circumference of our Missionary operations. Native labourers who have derived their religious knowledge from this fountain, and caught the hallowed fire from this altar, have traversed the distant regions of the west and north, and have illuminated the gloom of many an Indian wigwam by the pure flame of truth and love.

At our Special Conference, held in October last, in consequence of the abandonment of the Articles of Union by the English Conference, our total destitution of funds rendered it expedient for our long-tried and valued Missionary, PETER JONES, to attend Missionary Meetings throughout the greater part of the Province.

It became necessary, therefore, to supply his place at the Credit. The Rev. James Wilson undertook this service. This venerable man, though upwards of seventy years of age, and laid aside as worn out, seeing several Preachers withdraw from the connexion at the Special Conference, arose, and, in terms the most affecting, expressed his unwavering attachment to the Church, and volunteered the employment of his expiring strength in its service, should the exigencies of the work require it. His ministrations have been very useful at the Credit. During his labours there, he was brought apparently to the "valley of death;" and, when visited in that state by one of the Committee, he was found triumphantly "strong in faith, giving glory to God."

The Committee subjoin the following letter from Messrs. Wilson and Jones :

**CREDIT MISSION.**—It will afford the friends of Indian Missions much pleasure to learn that the members of Society at this Station still continue faithful in the service and worship of the Great Spirit.

The religious exercises in general have been interesting and profitable; and the heart of the Missionary has often been made to rejoice in beholding the softening influences of the Holy Spirit on the minds of the poor Indians.

During the last Conference year, many of the Indian brethren have been severely afflicted in body and mind, owing to the great number of deaths, caused principally by the measles. Three adults and seventeen children have been called from earth to heaven. The adults died in faith, and the larger children prayed and loved the Saviour, who said "Suffer little children to come unto me, for of such is the kingdom of heaven." An orphan lad, by the name of *John Pahlequong*, died very happy, and said that Jesus had come to take him up to heaven, and that he was not afraid to die; he exhorted with his dying breath a poor backsliding Indian (who was taking care of him at the time) to give his heart to the Great Spirit, which would alone prepare him to meet him in his Father's house above, whither he was going. The exhortation of this lad has had a most happy effect upon the person to whom it was addressed; as it has already brought him to his right mind, and he is now trying to save his soul alive. Many a parent's heart has bled and mourned for the loss of their offspring; but oh! the blessed hope and consolation which the christian religion has imparted to them in these trying times! Whilst the hand of death has cut deep into the heart, the Gospel at the same time has poured balm into the wounded soul, so that the once benighted heathen has been enabled to rejoice with joy unpeakable and full of glory. One of our pious Indian sisters has buried her eighth child during this year, and has now only one left! As all her children have gone to heaven, her eyes of faith look there; and often when faith is strong, and hope expands, she longs also to depart to be with her Saviour and her God, there to meet her little ones around the eternal throne:

"O! that will be joyful,

To meet to part no more,

On Canaan's happy shore,

And sing hallelujah with them that are gone before."

It is with deep regret that we have to state that some of the Indians at this Mission, particularly the youth, occasionally take the Fire-waters, when out amongst the white people; and it has been found necessary to enforce discipline in a few cases.

This Society has been somewhat weakened from the circumstance of so many of our official members having been called out into the work at other Missions. There are no less than ten of our brothers employed in the work in different parts of this country. There are in Society 73 Indians and 8 Whites, making a total of 81 members.

Soon after the Special Conference, an arrangement was made with the Toronto Circuit preachers to take into their work a few appointments amongst the white people, from which places a number of members were returned last year.

The Mission School numbers 23 scholars, who have made considerable progress in their studies; 4 read in the English Reader and Cypher, 8 read in the Testament, 7 in Easy Reading and Spelling, and the remainder in the Alphabet and Abs; 12 write.

The Sunday School, conducted by Mr. John Jones, has been in active operation during the year; it numbers about 30 scholars, who have recited 6212 verses of Scripture. It is to be hoped that the good seed sown in the minds of these children will have its desired effect in producing an abundant harvest, and preparing many souls for the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The friends of Christian Missions will be glad to know that the Indian community, with the assistance of some of their white neighbours, have done more this year towards raising funds for the Missionary Society than on any former occasion, having contributed the noble sum of £31 12s. 1*d.*, besides paying for the repairing of the Mission Chapel to the amount of £26 2s. 6*d.*

That the blessing of the Great Spirit may still rest on this Mission, and prosper the poor Indians more and more, both in temporal and spiritual good, is the sincere prayer of their friends,

#### INDIANS AT MUD LAKE AND BALSAM LAKE.

The Indians at these places may be considered as the remains of two important and flourishing Missions—the one at Grape Island, and the other at Rice Lake. Two or three years since, the Indians at Grape Island removed to Alnwick, on the south shore of Rice Lake, where they have formed a settlement, called “Aldersville,” and have thus become connected with what was called the Rice Lake Mission. The Indians at Mud and Balsam Lakes have been heretofore visited by the Missionaries at Rice Lake. The Indians at Rice Lake have been induced to leave the Conference under whose labours they received their spiritual birth, and were nourished during a period of fifteen years, and to unite with the English Conference. The Committee rejoice that the spiritual interests of these poor people

are cared for; but they lament that the harmony and unity of our Chippewa Missions should be broken, and the means and prospects of bringing the Chippewa Tribes of Canada into one great christian community thus blasted and destroyed.

The minds of the Indians at Mud Lake and Balsam Lake have been agitated by the same causes which have severed the Rice Lake Indians from our spiritual watch-care; but they still remain in connexion with us, and are visited by the Preachers on Peterboro' Circuit. They form two small bodies; and though exemplary and faithful, are more than usually inclined to the chase and to wandering habits. But they have, under great disadvantages, held fast their integrity ever since their conversion to Christianity, and they are still, with very few exceptions, blameless in their lives and conversation.

The Rev. Mr. Gilmore, the excellent Agent of the New England Company, is greatly promoting the improvements and interests of the Indians at Mud Lake. The Indians at Balsam Lake have about thirty acres of land under cultivation. The number of church members at these two places is about fifty.

#### LAKE SIMCOE AND COLDWATER MISSION.

This Mission includes three Tribes of Indians—one on Snake Island, near the west end of Lake Simcoe—the other in "Rama," near the "Narrows," on the north-east side of the Lake—the third at "Coldwater," not far from Penetanguishene, a bay on the south-east shore of Lake Huron. The work of conversion to Christianity commenced amongst this body of Indians in 1827; since which period they have, in general, honoured their Christian profession, and greatly improved in their domestic condition. In no instance has the inconvenience arising from the want of titles to property been more sensibly felt, and the misapplication of Indian funds been more obvious, than within the

bounds of this Mission. In the report of 1839, the Rev. Mr. STINSON—Agent of the London Wesleyan Committee—has stated:—

“At the commencement of the year, the Indians at both Stations were in an unsettled, dissatisfied, and unimproving state, owing to their having been deprived of their property, and no new lands granted to them. At *Coldwater* all at present is uncertainty; and though on Lake Simcoe a location has been allowed them, and a village commenced, some things have been done so contrary to their wishes, that much dissatisfaction remains. They have been necessarily much from home, and consequently deprived of the pastoral supervision of those placed over them; and their absence has been attended with many temptations, inconveniences, and losses. Having few at home, the meetings have been small, the school badly attended, and the classes not regularly met. Scarcely anything, under these circumstances, has affected us more than the unavoidable injury sustained by the school, notwithstanding the ceaseless solicitude and exertions of their teacher. The *Coldwater* Tribe has been wholly without a school; but we earnestly hope that such will not be their deplorable lot another year.

“Under these circumstances, it will excite no surprise that some of the Indians have yielded to sin, and that others have continued to serve God under great opposition and discouragement; but the generality of our members have been steadfast, and still show that Indian improvement and piety are not a chimera. Nevertheless, we cannot conceal the fact, that the protraction of the time for allotting land to the *Coldwater* natives is so disheartening and painful to them that their piety is greatly endangered.”

The Committee regret to say, that little improvement has taken place since these statements were made. The buildings erected at *Coldwater*, at great expense, are now useless; most of them are in a state of decay; and the Indians have been removed from the land they occupied there. The land selected at the Narrows, with the very best intentions, by Sir John Colborne, was very inferior in quality; a number of houses were also erected by the direction of His Excellency. The Indians at this place were subsequently removed by order of Sir F. B. Head. Some of the houses built out of the Indian funds have been sold for a small part of what they cost. It is stated by the Missionary, that “a half acre was lately sold for £7 10s., having on it three Indian houses, which did not cost less than £50 each. The man who bought the lot said, that he could not erect buildings equally valuable to him for £100.” Some of the Indians who formerly resided at this place have gone to *Snake Island*; and, as the Missionary writes, “a part of them have been removed to Rama, a

township on the eastern side of this lake, where a small portion of land has been allotted to them. But, as yet, they have no title for it; on which account they entertain strong fears that they may, at no distant period, be driven from it also."

This unsettledness and these removals of the Indians from place to place, have subjected the Missionary Society to heavy losses, and very greatly retarded its labours in behalf of the Indians. The Committee are happy to learn that His Excellency the Governor General has ordered an investigation into the affairs of the Indians; an investigation which the Committee hope will result in justice to the Indians, and in placing their interests upon a sure and settled foundation. Their settlement in one place and incorporation into one body, with a proper title for their lands, would, the Committee may venture respectfully to suggest, contribute, in various ways, to the interests of these poor and injured people.

The Rev. S. Hurlburt, after detailing the facts above stated, gives the following account of his Mission. His letter is dated "Orillia, May 3, 1841."

"I am somewhat particular in thus noticing, at some length, the temporal condition of my Indian brethren, from a strong conviction of the important bearing it has on their *spiritual* condition. Though temporalities must always be viewed in subordination to the more important concerns of religion; yet such is the constitution of the human mind that it must, in a good degree, be free from the pressing anxieties occasioned by acts of flagrant injustice to prosper much in religion. I believe the influence of religion to be a most efficient instrument in civilizing mankind. When you take men from the wandering state of barbarians, and congregate them in settlements or villages, you then cut off their hopes of sustenance by the chase; so that there must then be a recognition of individual property, which creates a necessity for the cultivation of the soil. Wherever the influence of the Gospel has subdued the hearts of the Indians, they have invariably expressed an anxious desire to learn the arts of civilization—to live like 'good white men.' Reason must approve of the choice, and humanity would dictate every measure calculated to favour so laudable a desire. We need not wonder, when all the obstacles encountered by our brethren are taken into account, that they have prospered no more. Indeed, it is a matter of thankfulness that they have prospered as much as they have—that so few of them have turned back from the ways of religion and truth. As a people, they are, in their moral and religious character, worthy of the imitation of their more enlightened neighbours; and we think our Leaders especially would suffer nothing by a comparison with the Leaders of any Indian Mission, or with the Leaders generally among white people. We speak from actual experience of the character of these men.

"The school in Rama has been continued with some unavoidable intermission since my last report. (See my letter in the Guardian, No. 565, September 2, 1840.) The house then occupied by us as a school-room belongs to an Indian brother, who was kind enough to give it up for that purpose. He has this spring taken possession of his house again, so that now there is no school. But the Superintendent has directed the man employed to build houses for the Indians to finish off a house for a school and meeting-house, which was commenced by themselves last autumn. This has revived our hopes a little, as we have laboured under great discouragements and disadvantages since our appointment to this Mission, because we have neither chapel, school-house, nor mission-house, on that side of the lake. It would greatly promote the interests of this people if the Committee could erect suitable buildings for the accommodation of a mission family, and appoint a suitable man solely for that place. Of this the Committee must judge for themselves.

"Permit me now to say a word respecting the industry of the Indians here. They cleared last summer probably not less than eighty acres, about fifty of which was sown to wheat last autumn. They raised large crops of corn and potatoes last year, which have been a great help to them, as their temporal circumstances have thereby been made tolerably comfortable. They have yet on hand a sufficient quantity for seed, and for their own consumption, till more will grow. This is so far encouraging. Should their wheat be a good crop, it will make them still more comfortable another year.

"The Snake Island Indians have not prospered much since their removal from this place. Till within a short time past they have had no school. Brother John Williams, who is now with them, has been engaged to teach the school. He is also a local preacher; and we hope his labours may be blessed. They are improving a little in their temporal matters. They sowed last autumn about twenty acres of wheat. They raised last summer a considerable quantity of potatoes and corn. Of their spiritual condition we cannot say much, as we have not been able to visit them very often since our appointment to this Mission. Once a month in the summer season was as often as we could get to them; and during the past winter, owing to the bad state of the ice, we could visit them only twice. But as they now have a Teacher with them, we hope their progress in every thing good may be more rapid.

"The temporal condition of the Coldwater Indians is every thing but prosperous. This has been occasioned by the policy of Sir F. B. Head. Large sums of their money have been expended in erecting buildings and clearing land: probably not less than thirty dwelling houses, besides a grist mill and saw mill. All the dwelling houses, with the exception of three or four occupied by white families, are now in a dilapidated state. The mill, with the chapel, and two large framed dwelling houses, have been rented by a white man for a trifling sum. A part of them are staying on a desolate point, about ten miles north-east of Penetanguishene. They have a few log houses, erected with their own hands at their own expense. A part of them removed to the township of Sunnidale when their settlement was broken up; but they have no land of their own. They have cleared a few acres on the bank of the Nottawasaga, where they plant a little corn and potatoes; but they depend principally upon the chase for a subsistence. They have had no school among them for some years past. Our Society has never had a school for the Coldwater Indians. The school, when they had one, was supported by the Government, or out of the Indian funds. Of course their children are now growing up in ignorance.

"There is one thing, however, that has a tendency to cheer us amidst so much cause of discouragement; and that is, the religious and moral character of these Indians. It would be more than could be expected to suppose they had suffered nothing in their morals during so long a course of unsettledness. Thrown, as they have been, in the way of many temptations, some of them have deviated. But the number is small compared with the difficulties they have encountered. This shows

most forcibly the strength of religious influence—that they are a people saved of the Lord. It proves incontestably the genuineness of the work among them; and is sufficient to justify continued and increasing efforts in their behalf. They are the remains of a noble but ill-treated and injured race. Many, however, have died triumphantly in hope of eternal life—hundreds more are pressing forward to the same glorious end.”

#### MUNCEY MISSION.

This Mission exceeds in importance, and in the number of members and hearers, any other Indian Mission in Canada. It is situated on the River Thames, about twenty-five miles from the town of London, in the midst of a fertile territory, a large tract of which belongs to the resident Indians. The Indians in this neighbourhood number upwards of one thousand souls; between *four and five hundred* of whom have been admitted to Christian baptism. They speak three languages—the *Chippewa*, *Muncey*, and *Mohanik*; but are so conveniently situated as to be able to assemble together in one place, where the Missionary has frequently preached to them through the medium of *three* interpreters.

The obstructions to the successful labours of our Missionaries at this place have been numerous and formidable, arising from the vile conduct of vicious and unprincipled white men, and the inveterate superstitions and immoral customs of the Indians themselves. Their veneration for the obsequies of heathenism at the burial of the dead; the infatuations of *necromancy* in its various forms; their old custom of divorce on every trifling occasion; and their deeply-rooted habits of *polygamy*, have seriously opposed the labours of our Missionary, and often rendered his duties difficult and perplexing. Where part of the surviving relatives of a deceased person have been heathens, they have insisted, with great tenacity and vehemence, upon the funeral obsequies of idolatry, independent of the service of Christian burial.

yielding to the pure principles and hallowed influence of the Gospel. The spacious chapel, 30 by 50 feet, is frequently filled to overflowing with listening multitudes; it is said that the number of *professed* Pagans does not exceed one hundred; and many of these are often seen listening to the "Word of Life." Several have lately presented their idol gods to the Missionary, and embraced the Christian's God as their God. During the last five years, this Mission has been under the superintendence of the Rev. Solomon Waldron; and at no time was it in a more flourishing condition than at present. At the Annual Missionary Meeting held in February last, the house was crowded with a cleanly-dressed congregation of Indians. The addresses of the Deputation were interpreted into three different Indian languages. The collection amounted to the noble sum of £34 5s. 0d.; and amongst the offerings of Christian Indian liberality in this collection, were found *nine five-dollar bills!*

To this Mission has been recently added a large body of *Oneida* Indians, who have emigrated from the State of New York, (where most of them were converted to the Christian faith,) and purchased from the British Government several thousand acres of land, on which they are building houses and clearing farms. They have determined to build a house of worship and school-house, and have applied to our Conference to be taken under its pastoral care. The following graphic and interesting account of the arrival and reception of this respectable body of Indians at Muncy, has been communicated by the Rev. S. Waldron; and it is so novel in its character, and so honourable to the parties concerned, that the Committee deem no apology necessary for introducing it into the report of this Mission:

"TO THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY IN CANADA.

"Muncy Mission, May 19th, 1841.

"On the 17th instant I had the pleasure of witnessing the formation of a union between the several tribes of Indians residing at this Mission and the *Oncidas*, who

have emigrated from the State of New York. It will be recollected that a part of them came last autumn, and commenced clearing, fencing, and building on their land. During the winter two have died, and seven have been born. The Munceytown Indians being apprised that the remainder would be on by 12 o'clock of the 17th instant, assembled on an eminence commanding a delightful prospect; and, seating themselves on the green, awaited the arrival of their Oneida brethren. Accordingly about noon they made their appearance, accompanied by the States Agent and his Assistant; and, being joined by the party who came last autumn, advanced slowly to meet the Muncey Indians. On approaching each other, the Chiefs advanced in front of their companies; met and saluted each other; held a short consultation, and then fell back in front of their respective companies; who now became seated on the green, at short distances from each other. After a short pause, the Oneida Chief arose and said: 'Brothers, we are all present now, and we are waiting to hear what you have to say to us;' and sat down. A little close council was then held between the Muncey Chiefs Canotong and Riley, when the latter arose and addressed his Oneida friends as follows: 'Brothers, we thank the Great Spirit for preserving us to meet on this day at the time appointed. Brothers, it makes our hearts glad to see you all seated with us on this ground. Brothers, you have come a long march to settle yourselves down by us. Brothers, I raise my hand to heaven, and take the white feather and brush out your ears that you may hear us distinctly. Brothers, I raise my hand to heaven, and take the white linen and wipe out your eyes, that you may see us clearly who we are. Brothers, your journey has been long and tiresome; you have come through dust and mud; in your hard march you have sweat much. I raise my hand to heaven, and take the clean white linen and wipe off all the sweat and dust from your bodies, that you may be rested and have contentment. Brothers, I raise my hand to heaven and take the white linen and make your feet clean, that you may take comfort. Brothers, we are thankful to the Great Spirit who has brought you here in safety, with your women and children. I raise my hand to heaven, and take the pure white linen and wipe all your hearts clean, that you may have great happiness in this land of our fathers. Your march is now ended; we meet you as brothers; we shake hands with you all. This is all I have to say.' To which the assent of 'yoh, yoh,' was resounded throughout the whole multitude. After a short pause, the Oneida Chiefs whispered together a few minutes. Then one arose and replied to the above address as follows: 'Brothers—We, the Chiefs and Warriors, with our wives and children, are all agreed. It makes our hearts very happy to hear your good words to us this day, that you raise your hand to heaven and take the white feather;' (here followed a perfect echo of Chief Riley's speech) to which he added—'Brothers, it is very true we have left the graves of our fathers, and come a long march through much difficulty to settle ourselves, with our wives and children, by your side, under the British flag. We are all of one mind now; and if you should hear any evil words to make things crooked betwixt us, we hope you will throw them down where they came from, and not give your ears to them, that we may henceforth live by you in peace. Brothers, we thank the Great Spirit that we see you all here this day; we shake hands with you all. This is all I have to say.' Again resounded loud assents of 'yoh, yoh.' Each party was then formed into a line, and the procession commenced, when a hearty shake of hands ensued. Much sympathy was felt, not only amongst the red men, but also amongst the white spectators who joined in the procession. This done, the dinner was brought out, and set in order by the Indian women, when all sat down and dined together as one family. Pure spring water, sweetened with maple sugar, served for coffee. Dinner over, a hymn of praise to the Great Spirit was given out, in which both parties joined, and, carrying their parts in the open air, made melody sweet. The singing of the hymn was followed by prayer to the throne of the Heavenly Grace for the Divine blessing to perpetuate and prosper this union

so happily begun. The assembly, with evident un-  
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so happily begun. The benediction of the Sacred Trinity being pronounced, the assembly, with evident marks of satisfaction and delight, peacefully retired.

"One thing I could but observe with feelings better felt than described, viz., that during the time of singing praise to the Great Spirit, the christians stood—the pagans sat; and during prayer, the christians with meekness devoutly kneeled before their Creator, Preserver, and Redeemer—the pagans still sat! Would to God that we had no practical pagans among the whites! On returning I could not but repeat, 'How good and how pleasant a thing it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!'"

#### SAHGEENG MISSION.

The Mission at *St. Clair*—which is the fruit of labourers raised up by the Canada Conference—having been claimed and possessed by the London Wesleyan Committee; the next Mission to be noticed is the SAHGEENG, which is situated on the south shore of *Lake Huron*, about sixty miles east of the town of *Goderich*, in the heart of the great Western wilderness. This Mission has, during the last three years, been under the care of two *Native Indian* labourers—the one performing the duties of a Missionary, and the other teaching the school. The number of Church members at this place is about 107. The report from this Mission is gratifying, in regard both to the piety and faithfulness of the Indians, and the state of the school. The excellent brother who has so faithfully and successfully laboured at this place is one of the devoted band of native labourers who have been sent out from the *Credit Mission*, which has been signally honoured as the school of prophets as well as the birth-place of souls.

#### BIG BAY AND OWEN'S SOUND MISSION.

Big Bay forms a part of Owen's Sound, and lies about twenty miles east of *Sahgeeng*. There is a tribe of Indians at Big Bay who have earnestly solicited a Missionary and School Teacher. They have been visited several times during the year by the Native Missionary at *Sahgeeng*; and about twenty of them have renounced their idols—have believed on the Lord Jesus Christ, and obtained "redemption in his blood, the forgiveness of sins." New white settlements are forming in

the neighbourhood of Owen's Sound; and to meet their spiritual wants, and furnish to this tribe of Indians the bread of salvation, it has been determined to send a suitable Missionary amongst them. That his needed and prayed-for labours will be eminently useful, we have little doubt—cheering with the light of life the cottage of the destitute emigrant and the wigwam of the benighted Indian—forming the centre of operations, which will make the “solitary places glad,” and convert the “wilderness into the garden of the Lord.”

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### DOMESTIC MISSIONS,

#### OR MISSIONS TO THE POOR AND DESTITUTE WHITE SETTLEMENTS.

The Committee now turn to another part of the Mission field, which, though of great importance and interest, has not, of late years, we regret to say, occupied a distinct place in our Annual Reports, or received any detailed notice. Yet no department of our work is connected with considerations more impressive, and associations more affecting, than that which embraces the *poor and destitute white settlements of the Province*. To be reduced from competence to want—from abundance to destitution—is more distressing than always to have lived in indigence—than never to have known the comfort of sufficiency and the luxuries of affluence. Previous indulgence infuses unwonted bitterness into the cup of subsequent privation. To have enjoyed the comforts and blessings of sanctuary privileges, and then to be deprived of them, gives birth to a thousand melancholy emotions of the soul, to which even those who never knew the House of God are strangers. Many a poor emigrant, who, in his native land, from his youth up, has gone, like the Psalmist, “with the multitude to the House of God, with the voice of joy and praise, with a multitude that kept holy day,” has, in

the wilderness of the Psalmist when wa Judea,—“My *tear* my soul *longeth*, y Lord.” With a fe the Emigrant pra Israel,—“O send lead me; let ther thy tabernacles!”

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the wilderness of Canada, realized the feelings of the Psalmist when wandering in exile in the wilderness of Judea,—“My *tears* have been my *meat day and night*—my soul *longeth*, yea, even *fainteth* for the Courts of the Lord.” With a feeling known only to experience, has the Emigrant prayed with the banished Monarch of Israel,—“O send out thy light and thy truth; let them lead me; let them bring me unto thy holy hill, and to thy tabernacles!”

To alleviate such sorrows, and to furnish the desired answer to such supplications, the labours of our Ministry have been conspicuous. It is matter of notoriety that our Preachers have, from the beginning, been the Missionary pioneers of the Province. In these “labours” they have been “more abundant,” and have often had reason to adopt the language of St. Paul, “We both hunger and thirst, and are naked, and are buffeted, and have no certain dwelling-place; and labour, working with our own hands.” Had it not been for such privations and labours, we believe Upper Canada would not now stand at the head of the British North American Colonies in virtue, intelligence, and enterprise.\*

The system of labour adopted and pursued by the Canada Conference has been, not to enter into the labours of other men, or to build upon another man's

\* “To the disinterested and indefatigable exertions of these pious men this Province owes much. At an early period of its history, when it was thinly settled, and its inhabitants were scattered through the wilderness, and destitute of all means of religious instruction, these ministers of the Gospel, animated by Christian zeal and benevolence, at the sacrifice of health and interest, carried among the people the blessings, consolations, and sanctions of our holy religion. Their influence and instruction have been conducive, in a degree which cannot be easily estimated, to the reformation of their hearers from licentiousness, and the diffusion of correct morals, the foundation of all sound loyalty and social order.”

“The great and surprising change which has occurred within a short period of time in the character and condition of large bodies of the Mississagua Indians is well known. From a state of vice and ignorance, wretchedness and degradation, almost brutal, they have been brought to habits of industry, order, and temperance, a thirst for knowledge, a profession of the Christian Religion, and apparently a cordial and humble belief of its truths, and enjoyment of its blessings. In this change the Methodists have been chiefly instrumental. They have manifested the most benevolent zeal in accomplishing it; they have sent Missionaries and established schools among them, which are supported by voluntary contributions: and they are still labouring among them with the same disinterested spirit, and the same surprising encouragement and success.”—*Report and Address of the Upper Canada House of Assembly, 1828.*

foundation, but to convey the streams of truth and salvation to those who were living "in a dry and thirsty land where no water was." Had the labour and expense which have been employed in dividing societies and congregations which the Canada Conference had won from the wilderness, been expended upon the scattered and destitute settlements of the Province, the moral desert would have been greatly circumscribed, and many whose souls have panted for the ordinances "as the hart panteth after the water brook," would have been enabled to say,—“I will go unto the altar of God, unto God my exceeding joy.”

But to this large class of our fellow-subjects, the labours of our Preachers have been specially directed. The adverse changes of trade, and the pressure of other circumstances, have compelled many thousands in Great Britain and Ireland to seek an asylum and home in the new parts of this Province; and it was truly affecting to see many of them, at the late *Centenary Meetings*, come forward in various interior parts of the country, and with cheerful hearts present their liberal thank-offerings, stating the destitute and helpless condition they were in when our Missionaries came on foot through the wilderness to their humble cottages—the consolations they had since experienced—the manner in which they had been prospered in their temporal circumstances—and the gratitude which they now felt in presenting a thank-offering to support the institutions of a Church to which they owed so much of their present comforts and future hopes.

Notwithstanding the difficulties of the past year, the labours of our Missionaries amongst the new settlements have not only been continued but have been extended, as they have penetrated in several settlements which had not been heretofore visited. Each Mission is designated by the principal township or village contained in it, though it embraces many townships.

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**BARRIE MISSION.**—This Mission embraces a number of thinly-settled Townships situated between the west end of Lake Simcoe and Lake Huron. The field of labour is large, and not easily travelled over. Previously to the visits of our Missionaries the inhabitants in many places were destitute of all public means of religious instruction; in some places they had not heard a sermon for years. On the first arrival of the Missionary, the feelings of the emigrant would halt but little behind those of the Prophet in the exclamation, "How beautiful *in the wilderness* are the feet of him that bringeth good tidings of good, that publisheth salvation!" The work became so enlarged, that a *second* Missionary was sent on in January last. Thus nearly thirty places are supplied with the preaching of the "Word of Life;" and the hearts of many hundreds made glad. There are on this Mission 146 members of Society. Two young men have been called out from thence into public service of the Church—the one as a Preacher, the other as a Missionary School Teacher.

It is to be lamented that a Missionary of the London Wesleyan Committee has been sent to the village of Barrie; who has succeeded in dividing the class at that place, and at two or three other places on the Mission. How much better would it be to employ men and money to supply those who are "*perishing for lack of knowledge*," than to divide societies of a Christian Church already supplied with the ministrations of the Gospel!

**MONRO MISSION.**—This Mission lies west of the Barrie Mission and the Albion Circuit, extending from what is called the Toronto Circuit on the South to Lake Huron on the North, as far west as "Big Bay," and embracing several Townships. The poor people in this region were indeed as "sheep having no shepherd;" and the laborious Missionary, travelling a considerable part of the time on foot, and at other times carrying provender for his horse, has truly been "instant in season and out of season," abounding in his divine and bene-

volent work ; and his words would prove doubly precious to those who, having seen " better days," are destitute of many of the ordinary comforts of life, and are ekeing out a scanty subsistence in the wilderness. As the settlements are thin, and often " far between," much of the Missionary's labour has been " from house to house." Nor has he laboured in vain ; many have been raised from " a death of sin to a new birth unto righteousness ;" and *ninety-seven* have been formed into classes.

GUELPH MISSION.—This important and growing village, now the metropolitan town of the Wellington District, and surrounded by a new and improving region of country, has unhappily, like the village of Barrie, but to a much greater extent, been the scene of the London Wesleyan Committee's divisive proceedings. A flourishing Society had been formed here, and a chapel built, which was deeded to trustees for the Canada Conference ; but the deed not having been recorded, and there appearing some legal defect in the mode of its execution, the agents of the London Wesleyan Committee succeeded in getting the deed destroyed and a new one drawn, transferring and securing the Chapel to Trustees for the English Conference. Our Missionary occupies the public school-house in the village. The havoc made in the Society is chiefly confined to the village. We have 60 members of Society on this Mission ; a number have been recently added ; and the Missionary writes most encouragingly of his success and prospects.

WARWICK AND ADELAIDE, (London District).—The work of our laborious Missionary on this Mission has also been invaded by an agent of the London Wesleyan Committee, and nearly fifty of the subjects of his pastoral charge have been severed from him ; but, in the midst of his difficulties and afflictions, he has pursued his labours with a diligence and perseverance truly apostolic ; and has already had the satisfaction of wit-

nessing the conversion of many souls who had been alienated from the Gospel, and who have been brought into places hithe-

He has extended his labours into places hitherto unvisited, where the poor people have received with joy and "meekness the engrafted word;" and from their liberal contributions, like the Churches of Macedonia, "the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty have abounded unto the riches of their liberality." In many parts of this Mission, the principles of the "Temperance Reformation Society" have become paramount in their influence; and the ordinary use of spirituous liquors has nearly ceased amongst the people.

**HURON MISSION.**—This Mission is east of Warwick and Adelaide, embracing a region of new country between London and Goderich. The London Wesleyan Committee has taken possession of the Mission at the latter place, which was heretofore supplied by the Canada Conference. The Huron Mission is just established; and is intended to supply a large number of poor and scattered destitute settlements.

**WALPOLE, (Talbot District.)**—The poverty of the people, rather than the encouragement of success, has induced the continuance of this Mission. There are, however, eighty-one members of Society on it. Several souls have been converted during the year. It has been latterly united with the Simcoe or Long Point Circuit, with which it will probably continue connected.

**BROCK MISSION, (Home District.)**—We have had two Preachers on this Mission, whose field of labour embraces the townships of Brock, Mariposa, Ops, Fenelon, Verulam, Georgiana, Uxbridge and Reach, and who preach about thirty times each every four weeks. The good which has been thus effected, and the consolations which have been imparted, cannot be estimated. In some of the Townships visited by our Missionaries, a sermon had never been preached. There are 189 members of Society on this Mission, who have contributed about

one half of the support of the Missionaries during the year. There are also several Sabbath Schools, in which are taught 145 children.\*

**CARTWRIGHT MISSION.**—This Mission embraces several townships in the rear of the Newcastle District, containing about eight hundred inhabitants, who were destitute of the preaching of the gospel until visited by one of our Ministers, who is now employed as a Missionary amongst them.

**MARMORA MISSION.**—This Mission embraces the townships of Marmora, Madoc, Hungerford, Tyendenga, and Rawdon, in the Victoria District, in all of which places Societies have been formed, and numbers are supplied with the ministrations of the sanctuary. During several years the inhabitants of these townships have received little other religious instruction than what has been imparted to them by our Missionaries. This Mission is now attached to the Sidney Circuit, on which the labours of two Ministers are employed.

**MISSIONS IN THE EASTERN DISTRICTS.**—These are called *Clarendon, Plantaganet, Bonchire, and Pembroke* Missions, and extend over a large region of country—a “region of the valley and shadow of death” until visited by our Missionaries. Some of these places are remote; and, previously to the establishment of our Missions, individuals were known to travel upwards of one hundred miles in order to hear the preached word and receive the Lord’s Supper. In some seasons of the

\* While the Report is going through the Press, the Committee grieve to learn that a Missionary of the London Wesleyan Committee has been sent to the very heart of this Mission, and divided the principal Society on it. On no Mission amongst the new settlers in this Province has the Canada Conference expended more labour than on this Mission, which had nearly become sufficiently matured to be placed on the list of regular Circuits. But for these self-denying and long-continued labours, the people would have dwelt in a “land of darkness.” A Mission of *division* is now commenced amongst them; the evils of which cannot be conceived. To divide new and thin settlements is virtually to destroy their happiness and paralyze their moral energies, as experience shows that in scarcely any one thinly-settled neighbourhood can more than one School, or Congregation, or Society, be kept up for any great length of time. And this division is effected by appeals to the influence of national and party feeling, as the Committee are assured. Such surely was not the mission of the Apostles.

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year, from the overflowing of the rivers and streams, and the absence of passable roads, the difficulties of travelling are almost insuperable; yet have our Missionaries succeeded in gathering about 250 souls in church fellowship, and supplied many hundreds with the means of eternal life. Most of the regular Circuits in this part of the Province were, a few years since, new and laborious Missions—travelled to a considerable extent on foot, under circumstances of great hardship and suffering on the part of the Missionaries. These Circuits are now aiding in preaching the word in “regions beyond.” Thus does township after township, and district after district, become enlightened with the “Sun of Righteousness,” and vocal with the “songs of rejoicing and salvation.”

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### CONCLUSION.

In the expression of sentiment and feeling which the narrative of the last year's labours of the Wesleyan Missionary Society in Upper Canada has called forth, in regard to certain proceedings of Missionaries of the London Wesleyan Committee, we desire not to be understood as conveying any censure upon the general operations of that Committee, or as entertaining any feeling of unfriendliness towards the English Conference. We regard their labours as a potent and divinely-owned agency in various parts of the world for its conversion and salvation. In the past success of that agency we heartily rejoice; for its future more extensive success we earnestly pray. But in respect to *Upper Canada*, we solemnly believe they have been misinformed and misled, and thus drawn into a course of proceeding unworthy of themselves, inconsistent with the principles on which they profess to act, deroga-

tory to the character of Methodism, and injurious to the peace of the Province and to the best interests of religion.

In the London Wesleyan Missionary Report for 1821—written by the late excellent and eloquent RICHARD WATSON—the following remarks occur respecting the Wesleyan and London Missionaries in South Africa:—

“Among the interesting circumstances of the Missions in that part of the world, is the *harmony* of affection and effort which exists among Missionaries of different Societies. In the past year two or three journeys have been made by some of our own Missionaries and those of the London Society in connexion, for the purpose of exploring the condition of distant tribes, and to search for new fields of difficult labour. A moral scene more truly sublime and impressive can scarcely be contemplated, than a few Missionaries of different denominations, *rising above the jealousies of mere party*, and intent only upon *enlarging* the boundaries of light and mercy; traversing the dreary desert, cheerfully submitting to heat and cold, weariness and hunger, and joining themselves to the society of men in the lowest state of cultivation, unelevated by intellect, and uncorrected by moral influence, in order to offer them benevolent assistance.”

But in what light does this scene of moral sublimity exhibit the scene witnessed in this Province during the last few months, of not merely the Missionaries of one Church opposing those of another Church, but Missionaries of one branch of the same Church labouring far and wide to weaken and divide the societies of another branch of that Church; and that at a time, too, when there are regions of moral desolation and solitude beyond, whose deep silence is never broken by the voice of salvation—moral wildernesses in whose forests the sound of the Gospel ~~axe~~ has never been heard—widespread valleys over which “the gloom of despair settles, and sin and death hold undisturbed dominion!”

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To the principles and facts set forth in the foregoing Report,—sanctioned as they are by the names and subscriptions contained in the Treasurer's Report,—we confidently appeal as to the nature and tendency of the work in which we are engaged—as to whether it should be opposed or assisted—as to whether our fields of labour should be made the arenas of unhallowed strife and division, or the scenes of Christian harmony and fruitfulness? It is against the proceedings of the London Wesleyan Committee in reference to *Upper Canada* alone that our remonstrances are directed; and whilst we feel it our imperative duty to “withstand them to the face” in regard to matters peculiar to *Upper Canada*—as the Apostle Paul withstood Peter on another occasion—we fervently pray that they may have a right judgment in all things, and hereafter direct their well-deserved influence and needed labours into those channels of usefulness which will not “cause divisions and offences contrary to the doctrine of Christ;” but which will make the “solitary places glad,” and convert the “wilderness into a fruitful field,” and render the death valley of “dry bones” instinct with “immortality and eternal life.”

From a subject so painful, the Committee gladly turn to more agreeable and congenial topics.

To the arrangements of God's providential government; to His gracious and powerful call to the high and holy duties of the Ministry, and to His softening and expanding influence upon the sympathies of the heart, do the Committee ascribe the opening fields of usefulness which have presented themselves, the supply of suitable labourers to cultivate them, and those liberalities which, notwithstanding the depression of trade and the difficulties of our position, have crowned the year with such unprecedented productiveness.

Our position has been one of necessity, not of choice; one which took us by surprise, and without any preparation for the exigencies which it involved; one which

excited our sorrow and awakened our apprehensions; one which presented the extraordinary phenomenon of the elder branch of a family putting forth its energies to weaken and exterminate a younger branch. At such a juncture, and under such circumstances, in the raising up of friends to our cause amongst all ranks and classes of society—the raising up of labourers to supply nearly twenty vacancies in our Ministry, and the calling forth as with the fiat of a word the liberalities of the Church to support and even extend our plans of usefulness,—we see an operation and influence so striking, so harmonious, and so efficient, that we cannot but view them as signs of the cloud of the Divine Presence going before us—as cheering proofs that “God is with us”—as calls for renewed consecration, and warrants of future success.

To those Gentlemen who, in different places, have taken the Chair at our Public Missionary Meetings, and who have so greatly aided the cause by their example, influence, and addresses, the cordial thanks of the Committee are respectfully presented. To several Ministers of other Denominations,—especially of the Congregational Churches,—and to various private Gentlemen, who have powerfully and successfully employed their talents in behalf of the objects of this Society; and to those Ministers who have, at so much inconvenience to themselves, accepted of the Deputations assigned them, and made extensive journeys in the service of the Society, the warmest thanks of the Committee are due, and are here most cordially tendered.

To the numerous Collectors throughout the Province, and especially to the Female Collectors, the Committee feel that the Society are under obligations of the strongest kind. These unwearied agents in the cause of human salvation have, in their walks and applications of benevolence and mercy amongst all classes of the religious public, been generally encouraged by that willing and copious liberality which renders it equally

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delightful to ask and to give; and there have not been wanting instances of enlarged Christian beneficence honourable to any age and to any country. To those who, under the influence of the proper motives and feelings, have furnished the bread and water of eternal life to any starving, famishing Indian of the forest, or emigrant of the wilderness, it will be said in the Great Day,—“Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me.”

From the preceding review of our operations, it will be seen that they embrace two classes of Missions;—those established among the Indian Tribes, and those among the new settlements and poorer portions of the white population of our country.

The ABORIGINAL TRIBES of the country demand our strongest sympathies from various considerations. In addition to the facts already stated, let it not be forgotten, that we are growing rich upon the soil which they once possessed, and that we have not suitably rewarded them for it. Being superior in strength, we have driven them back from their fisheries and hunting grounds; from their pastures and corn-fields; and possessed ourselves of their lands and forests. We have ploughed over the graves of their fathers, while they have looked on in silent grief! And will we make them no returns? Can we look upon our flourishing towns and villages, erected on the ground where once stood their rude hamlets, and not pity them? Can we behold our numerous vessels of commerce and trade covering those waters which, a short time since, they called their own, and not desire to benefit them? Can you joyfully worship God in those temples, now so happily erected on the spots where once smoked the council-fires of Indian chieftains, and feel no desire to bring their children to worship the Great Spirit around the same altars with ourselves? If not, then send them the only blessing which they crave at our hands; send them the gospel of peace.

Let it be repeated, that they have hitherto received from the civilized world little better than treachery for their honesty, drunkenness for their sobriety, imposition for their credulity, and banishment for their possessions. By the white man's cupidity, they have been so imposed upon in trade, deceived in negotiations, and corrupted in their habits, that soon the white man must cease to injure and oppress them, *for they will cease to be!*

Let us hasten, then, to show our sense of justice and compassion to the surviving fragments of those noble and mighty tribes who once possessed and governed this western world; who have been born in our forests and have fought in our battles; and whom Divine Providence seems to have thrown upon our benevolence and piety.

" See where o'er desert wastes they stray,  
And neither food nor feeder have;  
Nor fold, nor place of refuge near—  
For no man cares their souls to save."

Let all those who are capable of pleading the cause of the neglected and benighted wanderer, call to their friends in our public assemblies, saying, Come ye, and let us go "up to the help of the Lord; to the help of the Lord against the mighty." And let the rich, of their abundance, cast liberally into the treasury of the Lord, while the widow withholds not *her two mites*; and let all God's people join in one concert of prayer, fervent and faithful, invoking our Divine Redeemer to come to our aid, and claim "the heathen for his inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for his possession." Then will our forests be every where vocal with the praises of God, and the lost pagan tribe, now held in the chains of idolatry, shall come forth to the liberty of the redeemed, and there "shall be one fold and one shepherd."

And what strong and affecting claims upon our christian sympathies and benevolent labours have our DOMESTIC MISSIONS, established as they are in the new townships among such portions of the white popu-

lation of the country the ministry of the

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lation of the country as are obviously unable to support the ministry of the word among themselves!

One feature in the operations of the primitive church, applauded and honoured by Christ himself, was,—“the poor have the Gospel preached unto them;” and this glorious feature, of which the Saviour of the world might well make his boast, has, we rejoice to know, been the distinguishing characteristic of our Society from the beginning.

What more sublime and delightful sight can be presented before the eye of the reflecting and pious mind, than that furnished by our Missionaries pioneering our forests, following the first sound of the woodman's axe into the dense wilderness of the north and west, willingly submitting to the inconveniences and hardships incident to new settlements, and thus transforming a “barren wilderness into a fruitful field!” But still there are “regions beyond” which must be visited—sterile soil that must be subdued. The enterprising emigrant is constantly subduing the forests of our country, and as constantly should we be employed in rendering the progress of Scriptural Christianity equal to the advancement of human enterprise.

And now, Christian friends, you see the field before you; and though not so extensive as the Missionary fields occupied by sister churches in other lands, or by the elder and more wealthy branches of our own beloved Zion; yet it is sufficiently large to employ all our energies and resources in its improvement; and it remains for you to say whether it shall be cultivated or not. If, by your unabated zeal and benevolence, you say to us, *Go on*,—we shall cheerfully obey; and gladly shall we share both in your labours and rewards.

Ours is a noble and glorious relation as well as enterprise. We form an integral part of the great Missionary family that are to bring the whole world to the obedience of Christ. And while some members of that family are, hewing down the gods of India, and

others are traversing the deserts of Africa ; while some are teaching the Cannibals of the South Seas to worship their Maker, and others are inviting the natives of distant regions in America to come to our Redeemer and live,—it is our happy privilege to cultivate a field equally interesting, though not so imposing—the *moral field of Canada.*

All the principles and motives of past exertion remain in full force. There is the *nature* of the work—benevolence and mercy—claiming our continued homage and consecration. There is the *agency* of our work—the “Gospel of the Grace of God”—challenging our continued confidence “as the *power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth.*” There is the *experience* of the work—giving assurance of its future success. There is the *Author* of the work—“Jesus, who though He was rich, for our sakes became poor, that we, through his poverty, might be made rich”—teaching us by his example, commanding us by his word, and animating by his attributes, and right, and purpose, and certainty of universal government. There is the *humanity* of the work—

“ Shall we, whose souls are lighted  
With wisdom from on high ;  
Shall we, to men benighted,  
The Lamp of Life deny ! ”

There is the *patriotism* of the work. A people without Religion must exist either in a state of slavery or anarchy. A *Christian* people will exist in neither of these states. Religion is the vital artery of a people’s freedom, happiness, and greatness ; the absence of it converts men into demons and animals. “ Righteousness exalteth a nation ; but sin is a reproach to any people.” There is also the *reward* of the work. “ He that watereth, shall be watered himself. They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament ; and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever.”

Then blessed indeed is every agent in this work. In

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order to render it even more successful the ensuing year than it has been during the past, the Committee are persuaded there needs but to be "a continuance in well-doing"—punctuality where there has been neglect—regularity where there has been a want of system—general applications where they have been partial and isolated—and earnest and importunate prayer to the Lord of the harvest for a more copious effusion of Divine influence upon the labours of his servants. Many neighbourhoods and circuits which are now most liberal contributors to the Missionary cause, were, a few years since, the fields of Missionary labour; and many whom our Christian liberality is now supplying with the ministrations of the Gospel, will soon be co-workers with us in sending it into "regions beyond." It is thus that, co-existent with the traces of human footsteps throughout the land, we will become "a people whose God is the Lord"—Christian, intelligent, united, prosperous, and happy. "God, even our own God, shall bless us, and make us a blessing. God shall bless us, and all the ends of the earth shall fear Him. Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wonderous things, and blessed be his glorious Name for ever, and let the whole earth be filled with His glory. Amen and Amen."
