## MOUNT ALLISON HAS PLEAS- ANT TERM

The second term commences in Mount Allison University on January 9th, with 140 students in the Residence.

The students learned with regret that Dr. Andrews, professor of Chemistry and Biology was leaving for Regina, where he will be principal of the Wesleyan College there. His departure is a great loss to the institution. He has been connected with the college for twenty years. The students join in wishing him success in his new work.

A most enjoyable recital was given on the 20th of January in Fawcett Hall by Miss Lucia Fyde, together of vocal culture in the Conservatory of Music. Miss Fyde sang, beside encores, sixteen pieces, of which four were from the German, four from the French, four from Italian and four from the English language.

The Junior Skating party held on the night of the 27th was one of the greatest events of the season. A special train ran from Amherst and a great many town people were present. The rink was crowded with one of the largest attendance on record. The Sackville band furnished an excellent programme of music. Every one present thoroughly enjoyed them selves and the juniors deserve great praise for the excellent entertainment.

The election for the Mock Parliament took place on the 28th. The candidates were, for the liberals Mr. F. Peacock, for the conservatives Mr. G. McDougall, and for the Socialists, Mr. A. J. Gould. The election resulted in the return of the liberals to power; the poll stood Conservatives 30, Liberals 67, socialists eleven.

The first session of the parliament was opened in Fawcett Hall by Governor General Sir Ernest Baines R. C. P. O. K. R. on February 4th. The officers of the senate were Hon. P. T. Meek, S. U. P. S. speaker; O. C. Thompson, speaker of the black side; F. F. Bond, aide de camp. The officers of the house were Hon. C. H. Cochrane, speaker; W. H. Outerbridge, clerk; R. S. Machum clerk ass't, and H. H. Smith, sergeant at arms.

The Kings game, were on duty but in spite of the most careful guarding an anarchist got in and a bomb was thrown. The bomb was rendered harmless by the efforts of a courageous member, and the anarchist was captured by detectives. After a great deal of discussion which lasted through two nights the budget was passed. The chief part of it was the question relating to a bill to provide for the coronation of King George in Fawcett Hall.

Miss Knight assisted by the Mount Allison septette held her graduation recital in Bethoven Hall Friday the 17th. Miss Knight showed to a delighted audience that she was a master of the violin.

On Thursday night February 16th, Mt. Allison hockey team defeated Acadia at Sackville after thirty minutes overtime play by a score of 3-2. The game is second in length only to the U. N. B. Acadia game at Wolfville. The game was extremely exciting throughout; it was one of the fastest ever played in Sackville. The visitors were entertained at the Bakery by the Mt. Allison team after the game.

On February 18th Mt. Allison defeated St. Joseph at Sackville by a score of 5-1. The visitors put up a hard game but were outclassed in every respect by Mt. Allison.

On the afternoon of February 21st, Mt. Allison defeated Kings College by a score of 10-1. The game was in Mount Allison's hands all through, although the Kings men were good sports and worked hard.

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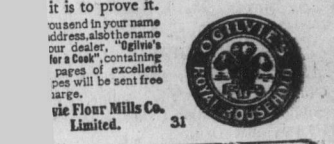

## TRAIN WRECK NEAR NEW GERMANY

Two Killed and Twelve Injured in  
Wreck on Halifax and South-  
western Friday—Wreckage  
on Fire.

Halifax, Feb. 24.—The Halifax  
and South Western train from  
Middleton for Lunenburg was  
wrecked near New Germany this  
evening. Two men were killed  
and five persons were more or less  
badly injured. The cars took fire  
and the passengers were rescued  
through the roof which had to be  
cut. It was impossible to get out  
by the door. The accident, it is  
thought, was caused by spreading  
rails.

The engine and two or three  
box cars went along all right, but  
the baggage car and passenger  
car at the rear jumped and fell  
over a ten foot embankment, lying  
on their side. In a few moments  
after the cars fell over the flames  
afterwards spread to the passenger  
coach, which held twelve persons.

The dead are—Lauchlan Mc-  
Laughlin, Lunenburg, baggage-  
master.  
The injured are—Mr. and Mrs.  
Willis Faulkner, Bangor, Me.  
Leander Hirtle, Northfield.  
H. Wentzell, Upper Branch,  
Lunenburg.

Seven others were slightly in-  
jured.  
Within the baggage car were  
four men. Standing on the out-  
side was Orien Sargeant the  
brakeman. He was thrown to the  
ground and the car fell on him  
causing instant death.  
People ran to the baggage car  
and opened the door. They pulled  
out three men, and thinking that  
was all, then devoted their attention  
to the passengers. One was,  
however, left in the car, and either  
perished in the fire that burned  
the baggage car, or was kied in its  
fall.

Axes were used and the sky-  
lights on the roof of the passenger  
coach were cut away and the pas-  
sengers imprisoned within were  
pulled out. They were severely  
bruised but none fatally hurt.

**COMPULSORY SERVICE  
IN AUSTRALIA**

Prompt Response of Youths for  
Army Training—Afraid of Jap-  
anese Spies.

Melbourne, Australia, Feb. 24.—  
Under the compulsory service law,  
125,000 lads have registered for  
army training. Figures show re-  
sponse by the youths of the feder-  
ation has been marvellous. The  
federal government has gone a  
step further in the campaign  
against Asiatics in Australia.  
Regulations have been issued  
which will have the effect of great-  
ly restricting the movements of  
Mongolians. The real reason is  
that the authorities charged with  
the duty of securing the defence  
of the island continent are anxious

## POLITICAL CRISIS IN FRANCE.

Premier Briand, Forsaken by a  
Strong Section of His Followers,  
Forced to Resign.

Paris, Feb. 26.—The bare ma-  
jority of sixteen, which the govern-  
ment received last night in a vote  
of confidence in the Chamber of  
Deputies, following the Premier's  
arraignment by the Radical Socialists,  
Louis Malvy and Paul  
Meunier, was a sore blow to the  
Premier and his associates, who  
had been sustained many times in  
previous crisis by much larger  
votes. In the end, M. Briand de-  
clared that he was "sick of it all."

The only reason for waiting  
until Monday to present their  
resignations to the President is  
that the ministers wish to show  
their respect for the memory of  
their late colleague, Gen. Brun,  
whose funeral will take place  
Monday morning.

The vote in the Chamber of  
Deputies, Friday, is interpreted as  
the result of an intrigue among  
Briand's adversaries in his own  
party, who have been plotting his  
overthrow since the great crisis  
in the railway strike and blocking  
the Premier's programme of arbi-  
tration in labor disputes in con-  
nection with the public service  
corporations.

Physically and mentally ex-  
hausted, by several years of un-  
interrupted labors in life, M. Briand  
is sincerely anxious to retire.  
Even now he is discussing with  
his friends the delights of a pro-  
posed trip to the Mediterranean.  
It is understood that M. Pinchon,  
minister of foreign affairs, is  
equally determined to withdraw,  
and would not accept a place in  
the new cabinet if it were offered  
him.

The Temps in summoning up  
the situation blames parliament  
for taking too much interest in  
the railway employees, who im-  
perilled the security of the coun-  
try, and not enough in the  
measures to protect the nation  
from civic war.

It is stated tonight that the  
powerful Radical Socialist group  
of Republicans which voted  
against the government on Friday,  
has decided not to accept a minis-  
try not presided over by a mem-  
ber of the Radical or Radical-  
Socialist groups.—[The Radical-  
Socialists are not to be confounded  
with the United Socialist, who are  
a distinct body of about 75 mem-  
bers, who were never allied with  
the government.]


Paris, Feb. 27.—Late this after-  
noon it was announced that Presi-  
dent Fa'ieres had accepted the  
resignation of his cabinet.
