MEETING OF THE TOWN COUNCIL

Contract for Sewer Awarded Last Evening—Other Business.

A meeting of the town council was held last evening, His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair, with Councillors Jamieson, Dickie, Ingram, Devereau and Campbell present.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed, also those of the special meeting held on Aug. 19th.

Mr. Leslie Devar on behalf of the G. W. V. A. which had the "Labor Day Celebration in hand asked to be heard. On motion he was granted the privilege. In addressing the council he brought to the attention of that body that a number of people were building booths or raucous for the sale of refreshments, etc., on Labor Day. He wanted to know if these parties would not be required to pay a license fee. His Worship in replying stated that if the parties were not resident of the town they would, but if they were a license fee could not be exacted. The G. W. V. A. and the Labor organizations however had been granted the right of the streets and public property for Labor Day and no others could erect booths upon them without the consent of the G. W. V. A. or the Labor Organization. This being quite satisfactory Mr. Devar thanked the council and retired.

Two communications were read from Mr. M. D. Dickson, Secretary of the N. B. Executive, with reference to the Housing Act, which has considerably advanced matters here, as some \$50,000 will be available within a short time for those taking advantage of the government's housing scheme. These communications were ordered placed on file.

A communication was read from James Parker setting forth that he had purchased from H. P. Doyle his motor bus and asking that Mr. Doyle's motor bus license be transferred to him. On motion the transfer was granted.

Several communications were read from Mr. Chas. A. Alexander protesting against his assessment as well as various assessments in connection with the A. E. Alexander Estate. Mr. Alexander pointed out that he had complied with the Act in first appealing to the assessors, and asked to be notified of the time when the council would take up the protests. On motion these communications were referred to the Assessment Committee in order that a suitable date could be arranged for between Mr. Alexander and the council.

Another communication was read from Mr. Alexander notifying the council that six months from date the A. E. Alexander Estate would expect the town bond for \$10,000, now being held by the Estate, paid. The communication was referred to the Finance Committee.

A communication was read from Mr. Geo. A. Wallace setting forth that

he had been assessed on \$350 income since returning from overseas and was not doing anything. He asked that he be relieved of this part of his assessment. Referred to Assessment Committee.

A communication was read from the Mother Superior of the Hotel Dieu making application for a three inch water service for the new hospital. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee with power to act.

A communication from Mr. Gordon Connell making application for the position of fireman in the Power Plant was referred to the Electric Light Committee.

A communication was read from Dr. Sprout in which he asked permission to erect a boat house on Crown land along the shore. He was prepared to accept the same terms and conditions as M. M. Mowat who now had one at the foot of Prince William Street. Communication laid on table to be taken up later.

The lease, drawn up by the town solicitor, for the rental of the Town's Isolation Hospital to the County Board of Health, was read. This called for a monthly rent of \$10. On motion the Mayor and Town Clerk were authorized to have the lease executed.

The usual monthly departmental accounts were passed and ordered paid.

The Council authorized to have installed a telephone in the town engineer's residence for the use of the town.

Councillor Dickie of the Water and Sewerage Committee brought up the matter of the necessity of making an early start in putting down the sewer on Minto Street if it was to be done this fall. "Tenders" had been called for. There was but one received. This was from Joseph Capogreco who agreed to do the work at \$250 per lineal foot and \$40 for manholes, the town to supply all materials. The length of the sewer was about 1100 feet. The cost including all material would be \$4700. There was considerable discussion over this matter, but it was finally decided to award the contract to Mr. Capogreco, as his figures were as low if not lower than the town could itself do the work for.

Councillor Dickie also brought up the matter of extending the water and sewerage pipes on Duncan Street West to Mr. Chamberlain's West line. The distance would be 250 feet and the cost \$850.50. This work was also ordered done.

His Worship the Mayor then read a copy of the Address of Welcome which he had presented to His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, from the Citizens of Campbellton, also His Royal Highness' reply, which will be found in another column. The councillors highly complimented His Worship upon the excellent address and upon motion the copy of the address and the reply thereto was placed on file and ordered printed in both the local papers.

There being nothing further before the meeting council adjourned.

NATIONALIZATION VITAL INDUSTRIES

London, Aug. 23.—A general strike or a general election, but probably the latter, will be the result of the Government's declaration against the nationalization of mines, according to a statement made today by Fred Bramley, parliamentary committee man of the trades union congress.

Dr. Bramley added that the Government's decision was in direct opposition to the policy of the trades union congress, which supported the principle of nationalization of vital industries and of general resources where monopoly exists.

According to Dr. Bramley, it was a virtual certainty that the issue would be brought to a head at the meeting of the trades union congress in Glasgow on September 8.

BRITISH PROMISE COAL TO ITALIANS

Rome, Aug. 23.—Promise of relief in Italy's coal famine was given to the cabinet today by Signor Schanzer, Minister of the Treasury, who has returned from London. Great Britain, Schanzer said, promised him she would send half a million tons of coal to Italy as soon as possible.

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

RECORD LUMBER CUT EXPECTED

Expects 250 Million Feet Will Be Cut on Crown Lands in Coming Season.

New Brunswick will next winter have the greatest lumber cut in history, according to all present indications.

The Department of Lands and Mines are preparing for a hitherto unheard of sized cut of 250 million feet on the crown lands, and it is believed that the cut on privately owned lands will be equally as large.

Shipping is now being made available for lumber cargoes from New Brunswick to overseas points, and it is estimated that in one week more than twenty-five million feet of manufactured lumber has been shipped by New Brunswick firms across the Atlantic.

Last week when the general strike in the lumber industry on the Miramichi was called every mill with one exception had a steamer in the process of loading.

The employees selected the psychological moment for their strike, but leading men in the lumber industry declare that the outlook for profitable operations were never better than today despite high prices for labor, supplies and everything that enters into the cost of manufactured lumber.

Returns have only just been completed for the last season's lumber operations on the crown lands of New Brunswick, and the figures have furnished some startling surprises.

While the estimated cut of 200 million feet was said at the time to be extravagant, even the officials of the department have been surprised to find that complete returns show 210 million feet of lumber actually cut on the crown lands and stumpage charged upon it.

Included in this gross amount are some five or six hundred thousand railway ties.

HUNGARIAN AFFAIRS

Budapest, Aug. 25.—Archduke Joseph agreed today to resign his place as temporary dictator of the Hungarian government because of the Socialist objections to him but consented to remain at the head of the state for the time being, when peasant leaders and members of the reactionary party protested.

These were said to have declared they would cause the food blockade against Budapest to be re-established unless the archduke continued to act as regent.

Paris, Aug. 25.—(Havas Agency)—The Budapest newspapers state that the Roumanians have presented new armistice conditions to the Hungarian government, which have been forwarded them to the Allies, according to the Roumanian press.

The dispatch adds that the Hungarian government has declined to accept modification of the terms of the armistice of last November.

BRITISH LAWS ON PROFITEERING

London, Aug. 25.—(Reuters)—The Board of Trade, in explaining the profiteering law, indicates that there will be a central investigation by central committee into the cost and profits of production and distribution of goods, a local investigation by a committee by appeal to a tribunal into complaints of the public prices charged and profits made in the railway distribution of goods.

Local authorities have the option of establishing a local committee. All committees and tribunals established under the Act will be advised not to take action which will hamper or restrict legitimate commercial enterprise.

MAY CONFISCATE OIL PROPERTIES

Washington, Aug. 23.—Officials here, in a report today, it was learned today, by an apparent determination on the part of Carranza and his official advisers in Mexico City, to confiscate the oil property of foreigners in Mexico.

Meanwhile standing lumber is being sold at unprecedented prices. One of the biggest deals of this kind closed for some time is just reported from Queens county, and it is said that \$15 per thousand is the price paid for the standing lumber.

Another case which illustrates the demand for lumberlands is the recent sale by a York county farmer of the wooded part of his farm for \$10,000.

At the Department of Lands and Mines this morning it was said that receipts in stamps and renewals due on August 1st last amounted already to about \$565,000.

FOREIGN CREDITS

Berlin, Aug. 25.—(By the A. P.)—The financial writer on the Lokal Anzeiger takes a gloomy view of the financial situation and the decreasing value of the mark.

He points out that Germany has only 1,500,000,000 marks in gold in the Reichsbank and she cannot dispose of this white paper money—now totalling forty billions of marks, and more daily is being printed.

Only foreign credits will save Germany from complete bankruptcy, says the writer. "If Finance Minister Erberger is able to induce foreign credits to Germany, then disaster can be averted."

UKRAINIAN PLEA

Berne, Aug. 23.—(Havas)—President Lloyd-George of Great Britain is supporting the plea of 500,000 Ukrainians in Canada against the annexation of the Ukraine by Poland, according to a statement from Prime Minister Cazalet of the Ukraine, issued by the Ukrainian bureau here.

FRENCH LOST 173 BRIDGES

Paris, Aug. 18.—(French Wireless Service)—According to a report made to-day 173 bridges were destroyed during the war. The Somme bridges will be the first to be restored and five of these have already been completed.



CAMPBELLTON'S ADDRESS TO PRINCE

Presented H. R. H. the Prince of Wales by His Worship Mayor Murray.

Dalhousie, Aug. 26th, 1919. "Birds Of a Feather Flock Together" Editor of Graphic, Campbellton.

Dear Sir:— The further degradation of Dalhousie happened on Tuesday last, when the public school opened, under the slack and disloyal element.

At the last annual school meeting Allan J. LeBlanc, Registrar, S.F.N.A. and disloyalist, was elected to fill a vacancy on the School Board. The other Trustees resigned at once, as if a spark had been placed beside them, this was followed in a few days by the resignation of the secretary who had held the position for many years.

Concerning the school, during this year, it is a disgraceful and disloyal people, it would seem impossible that two men could be found to sit on a School Board with this man, and that he could be elected to a School Board by Wm. S. Montgomery, mayor and Jas. E. Stewart, former High Sheriff of Restigouche County and former member of the Executive Council, sit with this draft evader and this in war time.

Men from Dalhousie have gone to France and died for their Country, their orphans attend this school, the children of decent loyal men and women are there and have to submit to this outrage of having their education directed by men of this kind and these men held up as an example for them to imitate.

Fancy a shicker being permitted to teach our public school children, our future men and women, by his example, association and by possible speeches he may make to them. The Board of Education should summarily remove this man as a public danger to this town and country.

It has been said by his friends that he is no worse than certain other young men who are pointed out as having evaded the draft. This man is much worse on account of his impudent intrusion into public affairs.

I desire to make myself quite clear, I have no private or personal differences with any of these men, I criticize them only for their conduct in war time and the fact that, as a citizen of Dalhousie consider them a grave danger to this country. Why have the authorities not arrested and prosecuted this evader to public affairs?

The other day in Truro, a barber was sentenced to two years in the Pen for slacking, why should the son of an ex-barber in Dalhousie, not get the same medicine? Men holding office who encourage, condone, endorse and overlook or sympathize with conduct of this kind in war time, cannot object to truthful criticism.

The jails everywhere are full to overflowing with shickers like J. Allan LeBlanc, New Carlisle, Quebec, there are twenty-six of them.

Yet our so called "Leading Citizens" merchants, officials of the Union Government, Mayor, Ex-Sheriff, etc., put him on our Town Council and School Board and make their Town an object of contempt from coast to coast.

A strong, young, robust and cowardly slacker should not be permitted to have any public position in this country. Since J. Allan LeBlanc would not fight, he should not govern.



SERIOUS FIRE FRIDAY MORNING Empress Theatre Completely Destroyed By Fire—Also W. T. Cook's Store.

About two o'clock on Friday morning a fire was discovered at the rear of the Empress Theatre building having apparently started directly under the stage, which was a wooden addition to the building and under which there was no foundation. An alarm was immediately sent in from box 23 and the fire department responded very promptly, but not before the blaze had reached the side walls of the main building, thus giving to the blaze a vent which in a remarkably short time encircled the whole building shooting skyward to the roof. In less than an hour's time the Empress Theatre was a total loss, only a little of the concrete walls being left standing and those owing to their dangerous position were required to be knocked down early in the morning.

The rear of the building occupied by Mr. W. T. Cook as a hardware store caught fire from the wooden addition to the Empress Theatre, and in this building the fire also made rapid headway owing largely to the oil soaked floor and the oils stored in the back shop. This building which was a two story wooden structure became a total loss in as quick, if not quicker time than that of the Empress building. So rapid did the flames spread here that very little of the stock could be removed.

The Commercial block, a large brick building on the West side of the Empress building, was considerably damaged, all glass windows in the rear of this building being melted by the intense heat, the woodwork about the windows burned as well as the cornice about the building. Holes were cut in the roof of this building, to permit of water being played upon fire under the roof. The damage to the Commercial block through fire and water will be considerable.

The firemen worked hard and suc-

ceeded in confining the fire to the three buildings above mentioned.

The Empress Theatre building was owned by Mr. L. T. Joudry and was insured for some \$6,000. The Theatre was leased by Messrs. Harold C. Crockett and James P. Murray who some three months ago installed a moving picture outfit and were conducting a very successful business. These young men unfortunately had no insurance and their loss will be heavy.

Mr. W. T. Cook who owned the building in which he conducted his hardware store had some \$3,500 insur-

ance upon the building, and \$5,000 upon the stock, but will be a heavy loser, his property being valued at some \$20,000.

All the tenants in the Commercial Block which building was owned by Mr. L. T. Joudry will meet with heavy losses, although all carrying some insurance. The tenants are Dr. Gillis, dental parlors; H. R. Humphrey, jewelry store; Geo. G. McKenzie & Co., groceries and dry goods; Irving Floyd, meat market.

While it is hard to estimate the total property loss, it can hardly be under \$50,000.
