

He voted regularly on that donkey for many years, but donkeys sometimes die, and this man't ass finally was called to his fathers. When the poor man next went to the polls he was told he had no vote. "Why?" he naturally asked. "You have lost your qualification; your donkey is dead," was the reply. Now the question is, was it the man or the donkey that had the vote?

Surely a system founded upon so absurd and unstable a contention should be im-proved. Mr. Edgar, in the House of Commons last night, brought forward a bill to make the man the voter; to give each voter the right to vote where he lived only, and to prevent the bringing of residents of foreign countries back to Canada to vote in Dominion Parliamentary contests. So fair, so simple a proposition should have received the unanimous consent of Parliament. It was however, opposed by the Government, By that stand, the Ministers have shown their unfitness to rule a democratic people, for if there ever was a class law-a law that favors the very rich and discriminates against the ordinary voters who make up the mass of the elector-ate—it is the law which enables a man because of his riches to exercise an undue influence in the selection of the representatives of the people. If it were a right principle that a man should have a vote in proportion to his possessions, then the owner of \$20,000 of property in this city would have twenty votes to one possessed by the artisan who owns a house and lot worth \$1,000. The law does not grant that, because the people would not telerate it. Why should they be asked to indorse the contention of the Conservativ leaders that the same principle should hold good, provided the property is distributed over a section of the country instead of held in one place?

The system cannot be defended in equity and the members who indorsed it at the didding of the Conservative leader should be brought to book by their constituents when next they appear before them.
