Cruiser Sydney, Built With Colonial Money and Manned By Colonials, Has Struck Mo st Important Naval Blow of War For Britain.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Nov. 11.—Under the caption of "The End of the Emden," the Herald's critic says: It was a "colonial" that did it-the Sydney, a ship built by colonial money, man ned by colonial forces, and officered as far as possible by colonials, edu cated in the imperial service of Great Britain. Such was the ship which to date has struck the most important naval blow of the war for England. It is to this Australian colonial that every officer and man, of the imperial fleet must give the credit for the wind-up of the Emden. From the standpoint of material, the use was a logical one. The Emden was outgunned and outbattered from the start, and only criminally poor gunnery work on the part of the Sydney could ever have afforded the Emden a chance. The real satisfac tion that the British fleet can take is the knowledge that the Sydney has upheld the best traditions of

that service in battery control. Her Only Chance. It was a case of 6-inch guns, using 100-pound projectiles, against 4.1 inch guns, firing 35-pound shells. There was one chance for the Emden, and one only, namely, to close within effective 4.1-inch-gun range. If she could reach that zone intact she would count normally on delivering in a given time a greater

number of shells than the heavier

guns of the Sydney could deliver Five shots in the air at one time at maximum range can be gotten with the 4.1-inch guns. This will beat anything possible with a 6incher, and it must not be forgotten that a hit is a hit, and for all practical purposes, as between lightlyarmored craft, a 35-pound projectile is capable of doing tremendous

Never Got in Range. But the Emden, apparently, never got within 5-inch range, and it may be put down to a certainty that the three 6-inch guns in the Sydney's No. 1 battery must have smothered the German decks from aft to for-

For one can imagine the Sydney coming up from astern, with every pound of steam she could carry, the Emden, and then cutting loose with the 6-inch pivot on the topgallant forecastle deck, together with the two 6-inchers emplaced on either side, just at the break of the forecastle deck.

That meant for a stern chase three 100-pound projectiles for each salvo, and these three 6-inch guns would be reaching their mark long before the Emden could feel in with her lighter guns. When fire broke out on the Emden ng remained for her but to head in for the beach

## SLAUGHTERING HOOF AND MOUTH CATTLE IN THE WOR LD'S BIGGEST STOCKYARDS BRITISH STOPPED GERMANS IN ALL THEIR ATTACKS

Allied Line Held Firmly, Advancing at Some Points-The Germans Succeeded in Taking Possession of Dixmude in the Evening.

[Canadian Press.]
Paris, Nov. 11.—2:50 p.m.—The French official statement, given out in Paris this afternoon, says: "On our left wing the fighting was resumed yesterday morning between Nieuport and the Lys, with a very great degree of severity. Generally speaking our front was maintained, in spite of the violence and the strength of the Garman attacks directed against certain of our points of sup-

"To the north of Nieuport we were even able to reoccupy Lombaertzyde and advanced beyond this town, but toward the end of the day the Germans succeeded in taking possession of Dixmude. We still hold our positions on the approaches of this town, along the canal from Nieuport to Ypres, which has been firmly occupied. The fighting was very hot at these places.

"The British troops, attacked also at several points, succeeded everywhere

in stopping the enemy. "On the rest of the front the general situation shows no change, with the exception of slight progress by our forces to the north of Soissons, and in the region to the west of Vailly to the right bank of the Aisne. Outside of these two points the state of the weather permitted only minor engagements, which resulted successfully for us. Particularly at Coincourt, three kilometres north of the forest of Parroy, where we routed a detachment of the enemy,



## GERMANY MAKING MAXIMUM EFFORT

Striving To Penetrate Line At a Point South of Dixmude.

STRATEGICAL POSITION

Very Much Same as Napoleon Held. But With Essential Difference.

[Canadian Press.]
Paris, Nov. 11.—7 a.m.—It is becoming more and more evident to French obervers that Germany is now making a maximum effort in Belgium to carry out her determination to penetrate the battle line of the Allies with a frontal attack and reach either Dunkirk or Calais the English Channel.

This attack seems to be taking place south of Dixmude. What is described in an official bulletin as "very violent fighting" in the north continues norning. The foggy weather of the last few days apparently has cleared, an the Germans are pushing the attack. Nevertheless, Paris seems well satisfled with the situation of the Allies and the optimism of the past two weeks continues unabated.

German Position Good. The German position, however, is be ng given considerable study. strategy, regard the German position be tween two adversaries, too far from each other for united efforts in the same operation, as a favorable one, for the reason that it permits the use of wnat s called "internal lines." R EVELSTOKE impressed me as a scattered town of many hotels where people stay for onyou stay there for a week, in any hotel, you will hear after you have gone to bed, somewhere in the quiet hours sounds of people coming into the hall below. Jangling of keys, slamming of doors, coughing, clearing of throats

-and then silence reigns again. In the morning you will be wakened long before your time by banging on various doors, banging here, banging there, and as you turn over for your last nap the voice of the hotel omnibus driver in the hall shouts to the breakfasters: "All aboard!" When you get down to breakfast with the residents there are signs in the dining-room that it has been busy there already. The trains all seem to come into Revelstoke very late at night and go out


