



If you intend to plant lilies, most varieties of which are very late fall arrivals, prepare your bed and cover it with a few inches of leaves or manure to keep the frost out till the bulbs arrivals. Then you can plant almost any time up to December by reing off the litter and setting in the lilies with a portion of clear sand around each bulb.
