The day before the fire, adds the dispatch, a secret meeting occurred in a canteen at Nivelles, where the scheme for the destruction of the airdrome was discussed.

London, July 17.—The position of the Allies at the present stage of the German offensive in France is said to be distinctly, satisfactory, in advices received today. The French losses are stated to have been very small. They have lost no guns, the reports

Casualties sustained by the German troops in the offensive up to the present are estimated to number 100,000, according to news received in London today from the battlefront in France.

French counter-attacks have brought the German bridges over e Marne under the fire of the French artillery of medium calibre. FIVE ATTACKS REPULSED.

London, July 17 .- General Von Einem's army, which has now been definitely engaged on the German left wing in the Champagne, yesterday delivered five attacks between Suippe and Massiges. All the attacks were repulsed with heavy losses.

GERMANS GAIN ALONG MARNE BUT ELSEWHERE ARE CHECKED

Paris, July 17.—The Germans last night threw new forces into the battle on the front south of the Marne, and attacked the Allied lines north of St. Agnan, the war office announced today. The enemy succeeded in penetrating into Bourdonneri. The battle is continuing in the woods immediately to the south of this point. On the front further to the east the French held the enemy in the southern outskirts of the Bouquieny wood and at the village

Assaults Elsewhere Broken.

A powerful attack likewise was made by the Germans in the direction of Monvoisin, but they were driven from this locality by a French counter-attack. On the front between the Marne and Rheims the fighting developed violently in the Courton wood. The Germans attacked in the Vreigny region on this front, but their assault here broke down completely.

JUDGE CONFIRMS 12 FINES INFLICTED ON PRODUCERS OF MILK

Refuses to Quash Convictions by Police Magistrate.

The appeal of twelve milk producers against the decision of Magistrate Graydon, by whom they were recently fined \$5 and \$2.10 costs on the charge of selling milk which was found to be below the standard required, were dismissed by Judge Judd and the convictions were confirmed. The bylaw relating to the sale of milk in London says that it must test 3.25 per cent butter fat and 12 per cent total solids. That the milk sold and delivered by the defendants contained only 3 per cent butter fat and 10 per cent total solids was proven by the evidence submitted, Judge Judd states in his decision. The defendants are exonerated from any suspicion of having wilfully caused a deterioration by the addition of water or any other substance. That the milk was delivered as it was given by the cow was admitted. Grounds for Appeal.

The grounds on which the appeals were made are as follows:

1. That the Legislature did not intend the act or any bylaw in pursuance thereof to apply to any case where the actual milk from the cow and delivered in that state fell below the standard.

2. That a person cannot be guilty under the bylaw without intention.

3. That the bylaw is unreasonable and ultra virus of the Legislature, and therefore should not be enforced, though a motion to quash it has never been made.

4. That the wording of the bylaw does the statute of t

made.
4. That the wording of the bylaw does not follow the wording of the statute, and therefore is not on its face valid.

Judge's Interpretation.

In his decision, Judge Judd relates that it would be presumption on his part to attribute to the Legislature any intention other than that expressed by the words of the act. If the law is unreasonable, the only recourse is through the people's representatives. That the court has no authority to interfere with a bylaw passed by a municipality on the authority of the Legislature was his answer to Number 3 in the petition for appeals. That the position of the appellants was a hard one, he admitted, but it was beyond his power to remedy the conditions on which the convictions were obtained. 



A dispatch received in London Monday from Moscow by way of Amsterdam reported that British and American troops had occupied the entire Murman coast in Northern Russia. An earlier dispatch on the same date said the Russian foreign office had sent to Great Britain a demand that British detachments on the Murman coast be reembarked without delay.

The allied troops on the Murman coast are there at the express request of the Russian citizens there. The local population has been aiding the troops in defending the ice-free harbors and the railway running south toward Petrograd. German and Finnish forces have been reported to be threatening the Murman railway, near Kem. AMSTERDAM, July 17.—Thirty-three air attacks were made during June by the Allies against German towns and cities, according to a statement issued at Berlin. Twelve of these were against industrial districts in Alsace-Lorraine and Luxemburg. Four were against the Dillingen and Saarbruecken regions and one each at various places in the Rhine district.

The report admits that slight damage was done to blast furnaces in the Saarbruecken region and at Ludwigshafen, while the damage to private houses is said not to be inconsiderable. FIGHT AGAINST CANADIANIZING

This Startling Declaration Is Made in News Dispatch From Toronto.

TORONTO, July 16. With the object of preventing the assimilation into Canadian nationality of the Ruthenians, who in Canada now number some 200,000, with from five to tweive children in a family, a secret conference of Ruthenian nationalist leaders of the western province will be held at Sastatoon on July 18 and 19.

While the ostensible object of the meeting is to found a Ruthenian national church in Canada, of which Rev. Rodkovich of Montreal, a Ruthenian Catholic bishop, has already been Rev. Rodkovich of Montreal, a Ruthenlan Catholic bishop, has already been chosen as bishop, the move is acknowledged by its sponsors, according to prominent local Ruthenians, to be a political rather than a religious one. The church which is being founded is designed to be a backing for the Ruthenian nationalist movement to preserve Ruthenian customs and language, and to serve as a protective wall to prevent the assimilation of Ruthenians with other Canadians. This meeting means a break of Ruthenian nationalists with the Ruthenian Bishop Budka, who was arrested on a charge of sedition, whom they accuse of giving over the Ruthenians to the French Catholic Church in Canada.


