tain precautions which should be taken until more satisfactory methods have been discovered. The grower should obtain his seed from fields or stock which was not infected the previous season. If he does not know of a disease-free field, he should obtain it from exceptionally high-yielding fields. Following this, he should go over his seed-producing field repeatedly during the summer, removing all diseased or weak plants. He will also gain advantage by selecting his seed from healthy, vigorous, high-yielding plants.

WORMS MENACE HEALTH OF FLOCKS

They Not Only Cause Death of Fowls, But Affect Their Vigor.

"Intestinal worms," says Dr. W. A. Riley, chief of the divison of entomology at University Farm, St. Paul, Minn., "are often an unsuspected loss to poulry keepers. Not only may they be a direct cause of the death of fowls, but when present in numbers they always affect the health and vigor of the flock. As a rule young chickens are more seri-ously affected by worm parasites than are the older birds. More than a score of different kinds of worms have been

reported for chickens.

A consideration of types and principles of piggery construction brings up a classification of swine growers, roughly, as follows: 1. The farmer who keeps two or three sows, and from which class comes the great part of Canada's hogs. 2. The farmer who specializes a little more in swine growing, keeping five to six brood sows and a boar. 3. The out-and-out hogman who goes in for hogs exclusively, keeping 30, 40, 50 or more brood sows and working, as closely as possible on the two-litter-a-year plan. There are few in this class.





"SIMPLE RULES FOR HEALTH." Rule Three.

Rule One. that Fever requires Bed, Rule One, that Fever requires Bed, is easily recognisable as the most important and useful "rule for health" we have or "rule against disease," if you like it better; and Rule Two—thet Fever requires Investigation—is a very obvious, necessary and common sense outcome of Rule One. Rule One, when properly carried out in every instance everywhere, is in itself worth more than any other one rule I can more than any other one rule I can think of, because it means the rapid disappearance of most infectious diseases, and means a tremendous saving in cases, deaths, sorrow and cash. To Canadians alone, the saving figures at \$1,700,000,000 per

Rule Two, when carried out uniformly, saves the next most important amount of cases, deaths, sorrow and cash, while the combination of the two rules will revolutionize human life, and put us far on the way towards the physical millennum.

CLAIMANTS FOR THIRD POSI-

To find a Rule Three fit to stand as next in importance to such rules as Rules One and Two is therefore as Rules One and Two is therefore a very difficult task. There are several claimants for this position. Correcting Mental Defects, Correcting Physical Defects, Alternating Exercise and Rest, are three which are very important indeed, and each would find thousands of very strong advocates for their claims to consideration as next to the first two

After considering the whole matter for a long time, I am inclined to put Alternating Rest and Work as the "Third Rule for Health." Correcting Mental Defects is very

difficult, uncertain and only relatively successful at the present time. In its chief form, Feeble-minded ness, correction can hardly be hoped for at all. The best we can do at present is alleviation—although we are working towards prevention. But are working towards prevention. But as feeble-mindedness affects, at present, only part of the race (although it is from that feeble-minded part that most of our troubles dome), yet rules for health ought to apply to the whole race, or to the greater part of it, rather than to a group only—at least, a rule as near the only—at least, a rule as near the op as Rule Three ought to so apply. Correction of Physical Defects is more valuable, on this ground, because it is more widely applicable and very much more successful. Perhaps 30 per cent of the individuals of the race have some defect, the correction of which would help them individually, and the race as a whole. Imperfect vision, imperfect hearing, imperfect breathing, tonsils and adenoids, malnutrition, bad teeth, lameness and so on, exist widespread to an appalling degree, and in the total represent a very great loss in efficiency and success. They do not directly cause the great sorrow, pain, suffering and loss that the infectious diseases cause, that the infectious diseases cause, and they are not so preventable as the infectious diseases. It costs money to correct defects, so we cannot save quite as much in cash, although we would gain immensely in efficiency alertness, progress and general well-being by universal correction of defects. This is a good with the set well such to the rule, but not yet quite up to the position of Rule Three.

RULE THREE: ALTERNATING REST AND WORK.

This rule applies to everybody and everything in the world, almost without exception; properly carried out, it is one universal fundamental to long life, efficiency, comfort and happiness, and for these reasons I believe it comes ahead even of correcting physical and mental defects.

tion of this rule, will get along fairtion of this rule, will get along fairly well; and very perfect physique, mismanaged by neglect of this rule, will go to pieces. The more you consider it the more valuable you see it is. Not that there is anything new or startling about it. The fact is that every living thing acts in everything it does by alternation of Work and Rest; but we humans fail to recognize this very often.

We think of the heart, for instance, as an exception, running on

stance, as an exception, running on and on, beginning long before birth, and sometimes continuing even after and sometimes continuing even after death for a few minutes at least. Three billion times the average heart beats by the time we reach the Psalmist's' threescore yeares and ten' —beating all the time, we say, for those seventy years. But the heart is not working all the time. The heart of an average man in seventy years does work equal to lifting three carloads of coal a mile high in the air. But it does not do this by working the whole seventy years. As a matter of fact, the this by working the whole seventy years. As a matter of fact, the heart beats only about 27 years of this time; it spends the other 43 years in resting! That is how it gets such a tremendous lot of work done, considering its size. If the average man did as much as his bear does in proportion to size heart does, in proportion to size and weight, he would be able to lift every day 240 ttons of coal from the cellar to the attic of an ordinary two-story house—a very superfluous piece of work, it is true!
THE HEART WORKS ONLY NINE

Nine hours work, fifteen hours rest, that is the routine for a normal heart, beating away quietly at mal heart, beating away quiety as a normal rate, 72 beats per minute. Of course it does not "lie off" for fifteen hours and "work" the other nine; its "day" is 8-10 of a second long; it works only 3-10 of a second, and rests the other 5-10; but in proportion this comes to the same

When the heart is racing-as in high fever, pneumonia, or other similar conditions—the extra work high fever, pneumonia, or other is miliar conditions—the extra work is done largely at the expense of its resting-time. In a high fever it does not do the same work in the same time by doing half as much, twice as fast, and so getting, after all the same proportion of rest as usual, but it does very much more work, with much less rest. No wonder in all fevers the physicken watches the heart with great anxiety—no wonder he wants to see the patient lying down in bed, making no unnecessary movement—no wonder he insists on everything that will keep that heart from exhausting itself. Not only is the heart working away so exhausting ly, but fever almost always means poisoning of some kind from bacteria—and that usually means some poisoning of some kind from bacteria—and that usually means some poisoning of the heart itself—some weakening of the heart at the very time it is doing the most work and getting the least rest! This effect in disease is quoted only to emphasize the value of rest alternating with work, just as much as possible,

INDUSTRIAL FATIGUE. The old plan was to have every worker work straight ahead as hard and as long as possible—as a race horse does in a Derby race. The new plan is to give very frequent rest intervals—at least every hour with the interesting result that more work is done, better work is done, fewer accident happen, and the whole thing going very much more smoothly and happily for all

NOT LESS WORK, BUT MORE. Proper rest does not mean accom-plishing less in this world; it usu-ally means accomplishing more, not only in the long run, because you last longer, but even from day to day, because you can do what you do faster and better.

Rule Four next time.



SASKATCHEWAN.

It is nonsense to blame everything on the war, as the thick-and-thin supporters of the Meighen Government are fain to do. in reply The time has come for reconstruction, not for the tinkering up of discredited policies, and the continued worship of worn-out fetishes.

Liberal ideals embrace the building up of the country on secure foundations, the development of the natural resources of the Dominion, the curtailment or elimination of expensive and burdensome enterprises, and the expansion of Canadian trade with other countries. It is only by such means that the huge debt which now faces the nation can be wiped cut, and the country resume its proper pace in the march of progress.

In the full vigor of life, he is well fitted to continue the work of directing the destinies of a province which emerged from its pioneer state not so many years ago. More and more the responsibilities of the west are increasing as the tide of population moves in that direction, and it is singularly appropriate that Liberal ideals should prevail where the work of nation-building is so much in evidence.






