"Section 235, chapter 10: It is an

offence to send by mail any information relating to bookmaking, mation relating to bookmaking, poolselling, betting or wagering, etc. The sender of such information by post is therefore guilty of an offence, and if the department has knowledge of it, must, in accordance with the criminal code, refuse to transmit such mail. to transmit such mail."

### SHOW DECREASE

SHOW DECREASE IN CANADA'S DEBT

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 11.—(By Canalian Press.)—A decrease of \$1,925,893 in the total net debt of Canada during the month of December is shown by the monthly statement issued through the finance department this morning. the monthly statement issued through the finance department this morning. On the 31st day of December the net there is very little excuse for unemployment in Canada. That does not apply to the present situation, which

On the 31st day of December the net debt of Canada was \$2,366,861,252. At the end of the previous month the net debt stood at \$2,368,787,146, while on Dec. 31, 1920, the net debt was \$2,308,-218,462. The increase in the debt during the twelve months is therefore \$58,-642,790.

Total revenues on account of consolidated fund during the nine months

Total revenues on account of consolidated fund during the nine months of the fiscal year, which ended on Dec. 31, amount to \$294.270.639 as compared with \$344.354.675 for a similar period in the previous year. This is a decline of \$50.084.036, and is due to the marked falling off in the customs receipts.





Right now the authorities at the O. A. C. are willing to confess that the service they can give in assisting a farmer to dig or drill at the right spot to find water is not satisfactory to the farmers or to themselves. An electrical apparatus was tried out some time ago, and the only fault with it was that it did not do what they wanted done, viz .: Find water.

Farmers do not need much urging to see the need of a supply of pure water on their premises. The average farmer feels that he cannot afford to go ahead on what is likely to be an experiment in trying to find water, and for that reason there is a special urgency in the efforts that are being made to find some device that will, with some fair dewater is likely to be found.

. . .

DR. C. A. ZAVITZ, in his address at the Experimental Union, again makes the point that too many varieties of grain and vegetables are grown. If the full benefits of the results of the experiments conducted all over the province are to be secured by the grain and vegetable growers, it is necessary that the varieties showing the greatest yields should be used.

Dr. Zavitz gave definite figures, showing the best yields to be secured in 1921—a poor season—from O. A. C. No. 72 oats, O. A. C. No. 21 sixrowed barley, Guy Mayle hulless barley, wild-goose spring wheat, Dawson's Golden Chaff and O. A. C. No. 14 winter wheat.

The Green Mountain variety of potatoes showed the best results, giving even a better average yield per acre that the popular Irish Cobbler potato.

Results in 1921 have shown the Irish Cobbier to give a yield of 153 bushels to the acre, and the Green Mountain 176 bushels. In the average results for a five-year period the Green Mountain surpassed the Irish Cobbler by 17 bushels per acre per annum. Whether the good returns are caused by the immaturity of the seed, or from the greater freedom from disease of the northern-grown potatoes, is now receiving special attention.
