QUEBEC PREMIER

The Legislative Committee Says Before any evidence was submitted G. Senatorial Charges of Corruption Are False.

Quebec, March 14, - The prolonged struggle between Premier Parent and those who want to force him out of office, is evidently now entering upon its final phase, and his retirement in a few days is confidently looked for.

Last night his principal assailants, Senators Legris and Choquette, entirely ignored the committee of inquiry appointed to investigate the charges which they have been making against him through the press. Although duly notified of the offer made by the Premier last week to withdraw his pending actions of damages against them if they came before the committee and made specific charges which might be regularly investigated, they did not appear, their failure to do so being founded, it is said, on objection to making charges to be vestigated by a committee under the control and before which only such witnesses and records as he pleased would be brought. Under the circumstances they declined the committee's jurisdiction, preferring to leave the decision of their cases against Mr. Parent to the law court, which was the tribunal chosen by himself in the first instance. Nevertheless, although the committee had no specific accusations against him, he claimed for himself and his principal employes the right to enter upon a defense in refutation of the grave charges made against them outside of the House by Messrs. Legris and Choquette, and asked leave to lay before the committee affidavits from all the sub-heads of his department, posttively denying the truth of these

This report, it is thought, will be the prelude to Mr. Parent's resignation as leader of the Government. They express regret that Senators Legris and Choquette did not see fit to come forward and maintain the position taken by them before the public, especially in view of the facilities they were offered to bring up their proof if any they had.





Why Sugar Is Dear.

The rise in the price of sugar during the past two or three years has been resented by Canadian housekeepers but it is not peculiar to this country. The Washington correspondent of the New York Sun says that the American people paid \$80,000,000 more for their sugar last year than in 1902. In England sugar today is between 5 and 6 cents per pound, compared with 3 cents in 1902. According to the London Times the world's supply for the past few years has been as follows:

At the close of the season of 1902-03 the market held a surplus stock of a little more than 2,000,000 came the Brussels treaty, by which the sugar-producing countries of Europe agreed to abolish the bounty on exadverse in 1903-04. The present increase in the price of sugar has greatly injured the confectionery business in England. Under the bounty system, Germany, France and Belgium taxed themselves to provide Great Britain with cheap sugar. The British sugar refining industry and the sugar planters of the British West Indies suffered from this bountyfed competition, but cheap sugar built up a great British confectionery and jam trade. To protect the British sugar refineries and West Indian planters, the British Government threatened to impose countervailing duties on bounty-fed sugar and succeeded in inducing Germany, France, and Belgium to abandon the bounties on exports. The Government is now being held responsible for sacrificing the British confectionery and jammaking business in the interests of a handful of planters in the British West

A New Grand Trunk Depot.

The people of London will hear with pleasure that the Grand Trunk Railway Company has decided to replace its present depot by a new one. It is said the building will cost a quarter of a million dollars, but whether the figure is exaggerated or not, the new depot will be worthy of the commercial importance of the city, and will be a grand advertisement. The traveling public is apt to form its impressions of a place by the railway depot and its surroundings. A railway passenger's outlook in traversing a city is bounded for the most part by backyards, and the station is regarded as the city's show window or front street. The present Grand Trunk depot was adequate for many years, but it does an injustice to the London of today. It is to be hoped the design of the new building will be attractive and some attention paid to beautifying the immediate surroundings. The present site is probably the most convenient for the company and the public, the only drawback being the shortness of the distance from Richmond to Clarence streets, which makes it difficult to handle long trains without blocking the crossings. No doubt the city council will do all that is reasonable to facilitate the project. The company is to be congratulated upon its enterprise, and the people of London may be congratulated upon this fresh proof that the Grand Trunk is well-disposed towards the city, and recognizes its claims. RAIN AND WASHOUTS

Southern California Under Five Inches of Rainfall.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 14. - The riolent storm that swept Southern California since last Sunday morning Diego to the Mountains, interrupting all communications by wire with Northern California, demoralizing railroad traffic, and flooding the entire country with from three to five inches of rainfall, shows signs of breaking. The casualties and damage in the vicinity of Los Angeles are briefly summed up as follows: Two men reported drowned and five injured by the washing away of the Seventh street bridge; several other bridges reported to be in weakened condition. The damage along the Santa Monica beach is estimated at \$200,000. The auditorium at Ocean Park was wrecked and 300 feet of the pier washed away. Two hundred feet of piling of the Sando breakwater has been washed away. Trains on the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific are stalled by washouts.



Is Understood That the Firm Has Accepted the Offer of Berlin.







County Constable Westcott Must or in the armories. Stand Trial on Second Charge.

He suggested that Mrs Dart should give him a promissory note payable on a certain date. Not receiving a decided answer, Westcott called again and declared his willing ness to accept \$30 in settlement, but this could not be agreed upon. When Westcott called a third time, he said \$25 would do, and he was granted two notes, one for \$10 and one for \$15. The eccipts which Westcott gave for these notes were produced in court. One of the notes was to fall due about Christmas time, and the other a couple of months later. The notes were not re-deemed at the specified times and Westcott wrote several times pressing for payment. His letters were of a threatening nature, and one was written on the headlined notepaper which

the accused was accustomed to use in his business as a county constable. Mrs. Dart said that about two weeks ago Westcott made another attempt to get the money, bringing his price down to \$15 and finally to \$10. The matte was then placed in the hands of the law, and after Westcott was convicted last Saturday for his first offense, information was laid against him for the

MR. ELSON'S SUGGESTION

Mr. Peter Elson, M. P. for East Middlesex, made his maiden speech in the House recently, in the course of the discussion following the moving by Hon, Sydney Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, of the third reading of bill No. 7, respecting the inspection and sale of eeds, In opening, Mr. Elson complimented the honorable gentleman (Mr. Fisher), for what he believed to be an bonest effort on his part to bring about such legislation as will enable the farmers to obtain clean and pure seeds. He went on to say, however, that in his opinion the bill would have the effect of decreasing the price of clover seeds which farmers had for sale, and increasing the price for those farmers who wished to buy. He argued that when farmers with clover seed to sell went to a merchant, the latter, alleging the increased strictness of the inspection, would give them much less for their seed than formerly. The astute merchant would, however, dump all grades of seed into the one bin, keeping that which contained the least percentage of "noxious" seed on the Thus, said Mr. Elson, when the inspector came along he would grade all the seed in the bin as "No. 1" seed, and the merchant would charge his purchasers a high price accordingly
