MAY BE ASKED TO APOLOGIZE ERE CONTRACTS ARE AWARDED

Members of City Council take Strong Exception to Methods of Bitulithic Company—Ald. Edmondson Nails a Contemptible Yarn, and Ald. Ainsworth Scores Advertising Papers—The Mayor's Suggestion

Alluding to the character of the comment appearing in the interests of the Bitulithic company in the columns of a local paper the other day, to which reference was made editorially in yesterday's Planet, his worship Mayor Cowan said last night that he thought some decided action should be taken to penalize all parties guilty of the offence.

"The attempt to impugn the conduct of Messrs. Manson Campbell, S. T. Martin and John Flook—three esteemed and eminently qualified citizens who generously acceded to our request to investigate the pavements—will, of course, recoil in a community where these gentlemen are so well known and highly respected. I am glad The Planet took up the matter editorially and I think the City Council should insist upon an apology from the company ere any further contracts to them can be even considered. The matter will probably be taken up by the Council."

Under the heading of Enquiries Ald. Edmondson asked the Clerk to read the petition which he presented at the recent meeting and enumerated the names of the ratepayers signed thereto. "I ask this," said Ald. Edmondson, "because I saw in the Banner-News an article which said I tried to force the petition through by misrepresenting it." The Clerk read the petition and the names of 30 ratepayers signed thereto.

Ald. Edmondson—Thank you. You see that more than one-half of the total ratepayers signed the petition, precisely as I stated. I desire, your worship, to call emphasis attention to the article in question, which not only reflects upon myself, but upon the esteemed Citizens' committee who at great inconvenience to themselves and free of all charge kindly acquiesced in our request that they

should examine the pavements and report to us. To these gentlemen I am sure we feel deeply grateful. It is unnecessary to say we have absolute confidence in them. They are men beyond reproach and their honesty has never before been questioned. There is no necessity to speak on their behalf and an editorial article in to-night's Planet deals with that matter strongly and rightly.

But there is another serious matter to which I desire to draw attention. It fits the methods adopted by the attack on the Citizens' committee—methods we will do well to effectually put an end to. I desire to draw the attention of this Council to the fact that one of our most highly revered names, a name beyond reproach, a name that is an honored household word in our city—the name of the ladies of the Ursuline Academy is being hawked around the city in a despicable effort to further some paving ends by this concern. It was said on the streets by their agents and repeated in the hang-outs that the ladies of the Academy had been induced to support brick because the agent of the brick firm had bought a consignment of decorated china from them. I am able on the authority of the ladies to make an absolute denial of this despicable falsehood, and I think it is a deep disgrace that such honored names should be untruthfully dragged in by some scheming pavement concern. The ladies are justly indignant and I think it is time that some stop was put to such methods.

Ald. Ainsworth agreed with Ald. Edmondson. He saw his name connected untruthfully in the Banner-News article, and he felt that people who prepared and printed such untruthful articles should be shown no consideration. The Mayor said the matters alluded to would be looked into.

The Labor Union drew attention to a petition which had been forwarded to the Council.—B. of W. FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Ald. Bell, of the Finance Committee, reported as follows:—That the Chatham Navigation Co. be granted the use of the Rankin dock at the rate of \$50 a year for this year, and that the same be charged for last year.

Ald. Westman thought that the company should live up to their agreement.

Ald. Bell thought that in view of the misunderstanding regarding the agreement this is a good compromise.

Ald. Bell—What is the usual fee for boats loading at docks?

Ald. Westman—I believe there is no charge in Canada for public docks.

Ald. Bell—The private docks charge at the rate of \$10 per landing.

The report was adopted.

Ald. King, for the Building committee, reported that the agreement for the building of the market is drawn up and will be signed to-day.

Ald. Westman, for the special committee appointed to procure a lot for the building which will be used as a tool house, reported in favor of closing up a deal for the old McGavin mill lot on King St. East for \$450. The old market building will be torn down to-morrow and taken to this lot.

The report of the committee was adopted.

Under the head of inquiries Ald. Potter said he had seen in the papers that a merchant had been fined \$1 and costs for breaking the Transient Traders City By-law. Why was the man just fined one dollar? This man does not appear on the assessment. Why would the Magistrate fine the man \$1 under the By-law if the by-law was no good? We must look after the interests of our own merchants. If the by-law is good the man should be fined \$100 instead of one dollar. The Mayor said the matter will be looked into and referred it to the Finance committee.

Ald. Westman reported the Chief of Police often finds the hydrants on King street covered with merchants' goods. The Property committee was instructed to look into the matter.

The Electric Light Company were granted the privilege of putting in new painted poles on King street.

The Telephone Company were granted the privilege of opening up new streets for their lines, the work to be done under the supervision of the City Engineer.

James Rankin, Joseph street, asked relief from dog tax. The assessment of \$1 will be refunded.

Ald. O'Keefe presented a petition from residents on Wellington street from William street to Duke street, asking for an asphalt block pavement. He moved the initiative be taken with the same specification on Park street.

Ald. Austin presented the following resolution:—

Whereas the city will receive during the present year the sum of \$18,000 or thereabouts from the Pere Marquette Railway, being the refund of bonus given the Erie & Huron Railway, we believe that this sum should be mainly expended for the purpose it was originally intended for, namely, the securing of new industries for the city and thereby increasing our population.

Whereas it is deemed advisable to encourage the locating here of further manufacturing industries, this Council hereby agrees that provided The Chatham Best Goods Company will locate here for the purpose of carrying on a manufacturing business at present not represented here, that this Council will grant the following concessions:—

1. They will grant the sum of \$1,000 to be applied towards purchasing a site for a factory for the said industry.

2. Exemption from taxes, excepting school and local improvement taxes.


3. Free water to the extent of 3,000 gallons per day; all connections for the water to be made by the manufacturers.

4. These exemptions to continue in force for ten years.

All the above is conditional to the following:—

They shall erect a building of brick 60 x 175 feet, or its equivalent, costing not less than \$5,000, and shall

CITY COUNCIL FAVOR LICENSE FOR NEW GLASSFORD HOTEL

Co-Operate with the Commissioners by Unanimously Amending By-law to Give Enterprising Proprietor Opportunity to Build His New Hotel—Civic Tool House Purchased—Other Business Transacted

The members of the City Council last evening unanimously decided to co-operate with the expressed wish of the License Commissioners to give the encouragement of a renewal of license to John H. Glassford in order to allow him an opportunity to build a large and modern appointed dollar-a-day house—a much needed acquisition to the Maple City.

The aldermen did not hesitate—one and all—to heartily commend the enterprise of Mr. Glassford, who has proved himself an energetic and valued citizen, and several of the aldermen expressed the hope that other owners of licensed places would go and do likewise.

A resolution was accordingly passed, with the support of every member of the Council, by which the by-law cutting off three licenses is being amended to remove two in order to enable Mr. Glassford to proceed with his commendable project. That the public, realizing the requirements of our city, will endorse the action of the Council there is no doubt.

Ald. Bell, Civic Minister of Finance, introduced the matter. He said that Mr. Glassford, proprietor of the Rutley House, had decided to build at once a first-class dollar-a-day hotel. The Commissioners, he understood, were heartily agreed if the City Council would permit it. It was a good thing indeed, said Ald. Bell, that buildings of the character proposed should be encouraged and more hotel accommodation of the kind mentioned secured for Chatham. Ald. Bell, therefore, moved a resolution providing for the amendment of the license by-law changing the cut from three to two in order that the Commissioners might be in a position to grant a renewal to Mr. Glassford on the terms mentioned.

Ald. Edmondson seconded the motion. He had with him the plans for the new hotel which the aldermen inspected. He felt assured that the Council would not stand in the way of such a splendid improvement as would be the erection of the large and handsome building proposed.

Ald. Westman thought the Commissioners should have required a

higher standard. He preferred such a hotel as was proposed to "four or five of the shacks" to which licenses had been given. But he thought Mr. Glassford should be encouraged and he thought others should be required to bring up the standard of their hotels.

Ald. Austin asked if the Commissioners were ready to take action in favor of Mr. Glassford if the Council amended the by-law.

Ald. Bell said he understood they were. There was a long editorial in the Planet concerning the matter that he thought every citizen would heartily endorse.

Ald. Austin agreed. He was glad to see the step taken by Mr. Glassford and he thought the kind of house he proposed should be encouraged.

Ald. Edmondson was glad the Council took such a decided view of the matter. It would not be fair to ask a man to go on with a \$12,000 building unless his license was assured.

Ald. O'Keefe also spoke in support of the motion. He thought it would be unfair to let the license drop, as Mr. Glassford could not then get it again.

Ald. King was also glad the Council took such an enterprising and proper view of the case.

The motion was then put and carried unanimously.

Murray St. residents wrote that as a result of the Citizens' committee report they protested against the laying of bitulithic pavement on that street.

Several petitions for local improvements were received and duly referred.

J. C. Wanless wrote, asking privilege of using poles for private telephone. Property with power.

Old Trees.
An old yew tree stands in the church-
yard at Portingal, in Perthshire, which
De Candolle, nearly a century ago,
proved to the satisfaction of botanists
to be twenty-five centuries old, and an-
other is still standing at Hedor, in
Bucara, which is 3,240 years old. How
De Candolle arrived at an apparently
correct estimate of the enormous age
of these living trees is a simple thing,
and the principle is doubtless well
known to-day to all. The yew, like
most other trees, adds one line about
the tenth of an inch to its circumference
each year. But the oldest living thing
in the world to-day, so far as known, is
a cypress tree in Chapultepec, Mexico,
that is 6,200 years old—New York Tri-
bune.

Flag Commander at the Nore.
Commander W. Lumsden, who has
just taken up his appointment as Flag
Commander to the Commander-in-
Chief at the Nore, Sir Hugo Pearson,
says The London Star, is a promising
officer in the navy. He was present at
the bombardment of Alexandria, where
he was slightly wounded, and took part
in the Egyptian war. He is the eldest
surviving son of Mr. Henry Lumsden
of Pitcairne Castle, Aberdeen. Like so
many naval officers, he is married to
an Australian, whom he met when he
was in command of the Royal Arthur,
the flagship of the Australian Squad-
ron. She is a Melbourne girl, daugh-
ter of Sir Thomas Fitzgerald, the most
famous surgeons under the Southern
Cross.

OILS FROM FISH.

Valuable Themselves, as Are Also
Their Byproducts.

The preparation of oil from aquatic
animals for both medicinal and tech-
nical purposes is of great importance.
The principal oil producers are the
whales, porpoises, blackfish, seals, wal-
rus, menhaden, herring, cod, haddock,
pollock, hake, cusk, ling, shark, dogfish,
alligator and turtle.

Various subsidiary products are ob-
tained from these aquatic oils and
form a source of considerable profit to
the refiner. Among the more important
of these products may be noted the
following:

At a low temperature there may be
separated from all varieties of aquatic
oils a solid fat or grease known as
"foots" or "stearin" which is somewhat
similar to the tallow obtained from
sheep and oxen. It is used as a substi-
tute for tallow from sheep and oxen
in sizing yarns, as emollient in leather
dressing, etc. By bleaching the oils a
semisolid fat known as "sperm soap,"
"whale soap," "menhaden soap," etc.,
according to the variety of oil treated,
is produced. This material is used in
smearing sheep, washing fruit trees,
soap manufacture, etc. By refining
sperm oil spermaceti is obtained, and
this is used principally in candle mak-
ing, for producing a polish on linen
in laundering and for self lubricating
cartridges.

After the oil is extracted the result-
ing scrap or refuse is dried and sold as
fertilizer.




A PRETTY EXPERIMENT.

It Requires Careful Work, but the
Result Will Repay You.

Amateur magicians as well as ama-
teur scientists will like this little ex-
periment:
Get two goblets of exactly the same
size and shape and plunge them into a
tub of water. Hold them under the
water until both are completely filled
and not a bubble of air remains in
them. Be careful about this; then
while they are still under water bring
them together, brim to brim, one up-
right, the other inverted, and lift them
carefully out, standing them in a plate
provided for the purpose.

One goblet is now standing inverted
upon the other, and both are full of
water. Dry them carefully with a cot-
ton cloth and then move the upper

glass very slightly to one side so as to
leave visible barely a thread of water.
If you do this skillfully and gently the
water will not run out.

On the foot of the inverted glass now
place a small glass filled with alcohol
colored with carmine, and, having dip-
ped into the alcohol a fiber of tapestry
wool or a piece of candle wick, arrange
it with its two ends hanging over and
down from the edge of the wineglass.
Capillary attraction will now set in,
and the colored alcohol will begin to
run down the fiber, dropping on the
foot of the inverted glass and overflow-
ing thence down the sides of the glass.
Thus the red liquid will run gently
toward the brims of the two glasses,
and then, instead of continuing its de-
cent, it will flow sideways between the
rims and thence upward to the in-
verted glass, so that in a few minutes
the small glass on top will be empty,
the middle (inverted) glass will be full
of wine colored fluid and the lower
glass will be full of clear water.

To Make a Pencil Write by Itself.

Take a round box with flat surfaces
(such a box as drugists put pills in);
through the center of both lid and box
pierce a hole, through which a well
sharpened pencil is allowed to pass.
Put a bit of sealing wax around the
pencil to hold it firmly in place. Twist
the pencil as one would spin a top,
and a number of strange designs will
be found traced upon the paper placed
beneath.

Paste this paper on a piece of card-
board, and if this be held firmly with
one hand and tilted from side to side
with the other many extraordinary de-
signs will be made.

A MENTAL PUZZLE.

Double Consciousness Developed by an Attack of Illness.

Speaking of instances of double consciousness, Mental Science notes the following case: The patient was a girl, twenty-two years of age. She suffered from some affection that may have been meningitis, but this is not known positively. She then developed acute maniacal excitement. During this illness the patient presented some remarkable changes of personality—such as are seen in hysteria. The author does not term the curious manifestations by this name, but describes some nine or more different varieties of personality manifested by the patient that are quite interesting. During her normal state the patient could never draw either before or after her illness.

RACE BETS LEGALIZED

Commons Passes Amendment by a Vote of 54 to 34.

Several Members of the Cabinet and the Leader of the Opposition Voted Against It—Bill Stands for Third Reading—Cabinet Has Not Reached Conclusion in the Trading Stamp Problem.

Ottawa, May 2.—When Gus Porter's bill to amend the criminal code came up in committee yesterday, Jacques Bureau moved an important amendment to exempt incorporated race tracks from the operation of the law against "common betting houses." The amendment went through, but not without a keen fight, several members of the Cabinet and the leader of the Opposition voting against it.

The amendment reads: "Provided that a race course of an incorporated association shall not be deemed to be a common betting house merely by reason of any betting thereon during the actual progress of a race meeting, or by reason of recording or registering bets or of anything done thereon as incidental thereto or connected therewith, and nothing contained in clause 1 of section 197 of this act shall be deemed to apply to any such betting or recording, registering, depositing or the becoming custody of any such bets."

A standing vote was taken on the amendment, which carried by 54 to 34. A motion was made for the third reading, but being objected to by Mr. Brodeur, it was not put, so that the bill stands over for its final stage. When it has passed both houses it will relieve the Ontario Jockey Club from the decision of the courts against its betting ring, inasmuch as it will legalize bookmaking just as bets between persons made upon race actually taking place upon association tracks are legalized by sub-section 2 of section 204 of the criminal code.

Before the orders of the day were called, the speaker stated that the election of Hon. Frank Oliver, for Edmonton, had been announced through the Globe. Sir Wilfrid told Mr. Monks that no conclusion had yet been reached regarding the trading stamp problem. Sir William Mulock told Dr. Barr that he understood the stamp used in franking had been abolished by the direct vote of the House, and it was not the intention of the Department to revive the stamp instead of initials as at present, owing to abuses that had crept in during the former system.

Dr. Cameron's Death.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier referred to the death of J. J. Demers, member for Leeds, expressing sympathy. Mr. Borden added a few words, and Mr. Talbot, of Bellechance, spoke at length. Out of respect, the first flag at half-mast on the tower, and a large wreath was laid on the desk formerly occupied by Dr. Demers.

The following bills passed a third reading: An act respecting Ontario, Hudson Bay and Western Railway Co., and an act respecting the Alberta Railway and Irrigation Co.

E. N. Lewis, M. P., is Freed.

The bill for the relief of E. N. Lewis, M. P. for West Huron, was read a third time and passed yesterday. It relieves Mr. Lewis from any penalties he may have incurred through being absent from the date of his election, surely for a mail contractor. Mr. Borden proposed an amendment to the general law to cover such cases.

The Autonomy Debate.

The speakers in the autonomy debate yesterday were Messrs. Bristol of Centre, Guthrie of South Wellington, Boyer of Vaudreuil, McIntyre of South Perth, Derbyshire of Brockville and Forget of Charlevoix. Hon. Mr. Brodeur moved the adjournment at 10.40 p. m.

BLOODSHED IN WARSAW

Nearly 100 Persons Killed or
Wounded By Troops.

After Cavalry Had Demoralized the
Workmen's Procession of Several
Thousands With the Flat of Their
Swords, Infantry Fired Volley Af-
ter Volley in the Shrieking, Fleeing
Multitude-Firing Was Unprovoked.

Warsaw, May 2.-Nearly 100 people
were killed or wounded in disturbances
in various quarters of Warsaw yes-
terday. The troops apparently were
uncontrollable and violated all orders
to act with moderation. They fired into
crowds of demonstrators, and workmen
in retaliation resorted to the use of fire-
arms and bombs. What approaches a
reign of terror existed last night; the
city presents a most gloomy aspect,
and the temper of the entire commu-
nity augurs ill.

May-day opened with every prospect
that the recent gloomy forebodings
would find contradiction in a peaceful
ending. The presence of numerous pa-
troles of Cossacks, cavalry and infantry
were the only reminder of lurking
danger. The first disturbances occur-
ed between 1 and 2 p. m., when a
procession of several thousand work-
men, carrying red flags, marched along
Zelazna street. Suddenly several squad-
rons of Uhlans appeared, but without
interfering with the procession, and
took up a position along the sidewalks
while the workmen passed through the
lines.

Shot Into Fleeing Multitude.
Then a company of infantry ap-
proached from the front and immedi-
ately the cavalry charged into the pro-
cession, driving it with the flats of
their swords into a disorganized mass.
When the cavalry withdrew, the infan-
try fired a volley, whereupon the de-
monstrators turned and fled. The in-
fantry continued to discharge volleys
into the retreating shrieking multitude.
Thirty-one persons were killed and
many wounded, and of the latter it is
believed that fifteen will die.

The shooting is described as having
been quite unprovoked. It has aroused
the most intense indignation among
all classes in Warsaw. Many of those
who were killed or wounded were shot
in the back, showing that they were
running away when they were struck.
Another terrible scene was enacted
at 5 o'clock p. m., at the corner of
Zelazna and Sonora streets, when work-
men fired from behind a wall at a pa-
trol, which immediately opened fire on
the passing crowds, killing or wound-
ing twenty persons.

First Bomb Throwing.
The first bomb-throwing occurred at
5.35 o'clock last night, when a bomb
was thrown into a Cossack patrol near
the Vienna station. Three Cossacks and
one policeman were killed, and two
ladies, who were leaving the station
at the time, were severely wounded
by the explosion of the bomb. Cos-
sacks and infantry fired a number of
volleys, and it is reported that many
persons were killed or wounded.

At 10.45 p. m. disturbances broke
out at the Zombokowska gate of the
suburb of Praga, a cross of the Vistula
River. A great crowd had assembled
there, threatening the troops, when
Russians fired upon the crowd and killed
four and wounded many others.

Shooting at Lodz.
It was reported by telephone from
Lodz yesterday afternoon that a crowd
there had stoned a military patrol,
whereupon the soldiers fired and killed
two men and wounded a boy. Later
a similar scene occurred in Balucki
Square, in Lodz, when two persons
were killed. In Lodz, at 9 o'clock last
night, a bomb was thrown at a patrol,
but it was not effective. The patrol
fired into the crowd and killed three
and wounded two persons.

A student who was distributing pro-
clamations in Wola, a suburb of War-
saw, last night, was killed by a pa-
trol. In Nawrot street, Warsaw, last
night, a patrol killed a woman.

Anarchists Parade in Toulon.
Paris, May 2.-Labor Day was ob-
served throughout France. The trades
union of Paris held a monster meet-
ing and adopted resolutions in favor of
an eight-hour day. Disorderly manifes-
tations occurred at Brest and Etienne.
At Toulon, anarchists marched in a
procession, carrying a red flag, chant-
ing a revolutionary hymn, and bearing
a banner inscribed, "Remember the
victims of capital at Chicago, Linnoges
and Martinique." An affray occurred
in front of the naval arsenal, during
which several workmen were slightly
injured.

May Day in Toronto.
Toronto, May 2.-The only distur-
bance in local labor circles on May Day
was caused by the lathers, about 100
of whom went out on strike for an
increase to \$2.50 for an 8-hour day.
They had been receiving from \$2.35 to
\$2. A conference was held yesterday
afternoon between the lathers and the
bosses and a two-year agreement signed,
by which second-class men will be
paid \$2.75, and first-class men \$3.10, a
slight increase for the skilled laborers.
Thirteen sheet metal workers employed
by W. L. Phipps & Sons also went out,
because they were refused an increase
of 3-1-2 cents, from 25 cents, which was
granted by other firms.

FIRE ESCAPES NEEDED.

Montreal Witness.

It is to be hoped that an immediate inspection will be made of all the conventual buildings throughout the country, and that power will be taken by the Government to require the fullest provision for fire escapes. Such places are free from some of the dangers which beset other buildings, where intoxicated persons are liable to do damage, but buildings three to five stories high, containing none but females, more carefully locked and barred than other buildings, and inhabited by many old women, some of them possibly imbecile, and by many children, some of them reckless, have dangers all their own. The mode of building, while, as a rule, very substantial, is not always of any specially fire resisting quality. There is the more reason, therefore, that there should be the utmost provision for escape in case of fire. There might, at least, be balconies everywhere, and such escape from one to another as would not increase the terrors of the inmates, with regard to possible invasion, which would, however, be the very last thing in probability.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health held a busy session yesterday afternoon and looked after considerable spring cleaning. There were present, Chairman Dr. Charteris, Mayor Cowan, Dr. R. V. Bray, W. R. Baxter, M. H. O. Dr. Hall and Inspector A. Mounter.

A communication was received from Mr. Burke, factory inspector, saying that he had heard nothing from the members of the Board of Health in regard to the health regulations in the factories in this city.

Dr. Bray said that Mr. Burke had taken the matter out of the hands of the Board of Health and should now enforce his own regulations. A motion was passed leaving the matter in the factory inspector's hands.

Health Inspector A. Mounter reported six cases of diphtheria during April. The garbage wagon has over 40 places to call, but owing to cool weather names are not coming in as fast as was expected.

He had five complaints in reference to wells. Three were ordered cleaned, one to put in city water and one to be filled up.

Dr. Bray, for the committee appointed to examine the houses said to be unsanitary, reported progress and asked that the committee be continued for another month.

Mayor Cowan spoke of the house on Park street, next to Roy Tobey's residence.

Dr. Bray said that this was one of the houses they were investigating.

Ald. Ainsworth appeared in reference to the need of a sewer on Pine street. The water backed up and flooded the yards. The old sewer went to St. George street but it was all blocked up and beyond repair. A new sewer with an outlet on Queen street was asked for.

W. R. Baxter said if there was a sewer in the city that needed a sewer it was Pine street. He had been out when it was not flooded that it was difficult to get into the houses.

Inspector Mounter said that there was a six inches of fifth in Patrick Kelly's cellar left by the water backing up.

Mr. Ainsworth presented a report of the City Engineer on the cost. The sewer would cost \$750.

Dr. Bray moved that the City Engineer be asked to prepare a report on the matter of draining the properties around Pine street, and the chairman be authorized to call a special meeting. Carried.

Mayor Cowan called attention to the condition, the alleys were in. He also suggested that all the city by-laws be revised and consolidated.

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THE BRITISH MINISTER

Gerard Lowther Goes to Fez to Support French Policy.

Controversy German Official Press. Which Declared His Visit to Fez Was a Mere Trip to Present Credentials—His Interpretation of His Duty Under British-French Accord and Possible Results.

Paris, May 1.—The British Minister to Morocco, Gerard A. Lowther, in the course of an interview with The Temps correspondent at Tangier yesterday, made the first official declaration that the purpose of his visit to Fez is to support the French policy in Morocco. He said: "When I first arrived at Tangier I sent my credentials to the Sultan before the autumn, but under the present conditions, I start for Fez in three weeks. I will embrace, also, the questions under that clause of the Franco-British accord, in which the two Governments mutually engage to lend their diplomatic support to the execution of that convention."

"My Government is all the more desirous to fulfil this duty since the French proposition submitted to the Sultan of Morocco strictly conforms to the spirit of the accord of April 8, threatening the interest of no third power, guaranteeing the security of Morocco, and providing for the gradual development of the country without sudden transition."

Mr. Lowther's statement controverts the view of the German official press, that he goes to Fez merely to present his credentials.

LYING OFF PORT DAYET.

Russian Squadron Still Within Forty Miles of Kamranh Bay.

Seigon, May 2.—The Russian squadron is lying off Port Dayet (forty miles north of Kamranh Bay) outside of territorial waters.

Russian, German and British transports are off Cape St. James (near Seigon) and in the Saigon river.

The French naval division has been mobilized to preserve neutrality in French waters.

It is surmised here that it is possible Nebogoff may have slipped through the straits at Singapore in the dense mists which prevail and that he may be well on his way to join Rojestvensky.
