130 TREE SPECIES IN CANADA

In Canada there are over 130 distinct species of trees. Only 33 of these are conifers or softwoods, but they comprise three-quarters of the standing timber and supply nearly 80 percent of the wood used for all purposes, says the C. P. R. Bulletin.

Of the deciduous-leaved or hardwood species, only about a dozen are of commercial importance as compared with twice that number of conifers.
