The men who have heavy interest at stake in the country, who have shown their faith in its future by reinvesting their capital and who are mostly concerned in the prosperity o the camp, are held up to insult and their motives abrought into question by men who are merely out with personal axes to grind.

In the case of the widespread move ment inaugurated by the board of trade to secure renewed interest on the part of the government in the project of establishing a water supply, open hostility has manifested itself from men who merely seek to vent a little spleen occasioned by the belief that if anything were accon plished the credit might rest upon other shoulders than their own.

Such men cannot by any hoodwink ing process, convince the people that they are sincere in their alleged championship of popular causes. They have nothing but their own personal ends to attain and when any hindrance is thrown in the way of their particular aims, they are found willing to sacrifice all consideration for the public good.

The Yukon has suffered enough from such tactics and the time has arrived when a halt should be called.
