## RESIGNATION OF CASTRO GOVERNOR CONGDON AT VANCOUVER MAY BE JACK THE RIPPER

Special to the Daily Nugget.  
Vancouver, March 24.—This morning on a delayed eastern express the new governor of Yukon, Hon. F. T. Congdon, arrived in Vancouver. It had been his intention to sail for the north on the Princess May this evening, but owing to delays along route he is compelled to change his plans. Tomorrow Mr. Congdon will go to Victoria but will return to Vancouver in time to catch the City of Seattle on the 27th. Before leaving he will make arrangements for his family to remain either in this city or at the capital.

Paris reports say, however, his action was not a mere formality but the outgrowth of serious conditions caused by recent international entanglements. The situation is aggravated by acts of the revolutionists, and a general change of government is expected.

### REPORTED DISCOVERY

Said to Have Been Made at Pelly Banks

Tributary of Pelly Called Campbell Creek, is Scene of the Latest Strike.

There is quite a suppressed wave of excitement hanging over the city due to a rumor that has gained circulation within the past few days concerning a mysterious strike that is supposed to have been recently made near the head waters of the Pelly river. The truth or the falsity of the report can not be ascertained as the authorship of the rumor, though it is a fact that at least two parties have been quietly getting an outfit together yesterday and today whose destination is known to be some point above the Ross river on the Pelly. Another peculiar thing about the supposed strike is that it may have just been made and it may have happened months ago and the Dawson mining recorder's office would have been none the wiser.

The river is approximately 300 miles above Selkirk and the supposed strike is Campbell creek, a tributary of the Pelly that enters the main stream at the Pelly Banks about sixty miles above Ross river. Should it prove true that a discovery of importance has been made in that vicinity the miners would be equal to the necessity of the frightful long and arduous trip to Selkirk in order to record, as there is a mining recorder located at Hoole canyon, about equidistant between the Banks and Ross river. Last fall a gentleman by name of John G. Prouse established a trading post at Hoole canyon and before leaving the city went to the commissioner and offered to act as mining recorder for that section of the country without compensation if the government would constitute him as such so that his acts would be legal. Mr. Prouse was well known, highly respected in the east and the commissioner did not hesitate to avail himself of the offer which would be of an immeasurable benefit to miners and prospectors in that vicinity as a discovery was made. Prouse left for his new station on the last trip of the La France and so far no one is known has not been heard from except in an indirect manner.

## COUNCIL PROTESTS

### Wants Treadgold Concession Cancelled

### Macdonald Presents a Resolution That Receives the Unanimous Support of Members.

Another nail has been driven home in the coffin that is to bury the Treadgold concession. Ever since its passage the people of the territory at large have been hammering away at the octopus, particularly what is known as the opposition party. Lately the board of trade has taken a hand in the hammering process and last night the city council joined the procession, passing a resolution that was presented by Macdonald which insisted that the concession be at once cancelled and that no water monopoly be in the future given to anyone. The moving of the resolution was quickly seconded and it passed the house unanimously upon being put to a vote. Copies of the resolution are to be sent to Premier Laurier, Minister of the Interior Sifton and the Hon. James Hamilton Ross. The latter will be requested to present the resolution to parliament. Its contents are as follows:

### To the Honorable the House of Commons in Parliament assembled.

The petition of the corporation of the city of Dawson, in the Yukon Territory, humbly sheweth:

1. That by order in council of April 21st, 1902, certain privileges are granted to Malcolm Orr Ewing, A. N. C. Treadgold and Walter Barwick, in connection with the proposed establishment by them of a system of water supply for washing out gold-bearing gravel in the district therein described, including the Klondike river, Bonanza, Bear and Hunker creeks and their tributaries.

2. That the benefits conferred upon the grantees are of incalculable value and involve an enormous exploitation of the public resources of this territory for the benefit of a few concessionaires.

3. That in the opinion of your petitioners the accumulation of extraordinary powers in the hands of a single corporation such as is effected by the above order in council, will lead to the paralysis of the independent commercial and industrial life of the community and will prove in the highest degree oppressive and injurious to the public welfare, since the grantees are thereby enabled to crush out competition and to reduce to a position of practical servitude the individual miners in the extensive district affected which includes the richest portion of the Klondike.

4. That the need of this territory is not the creation of monopolies but their prevention, and the encouragement of the individual miners by securing equal privileges and opportunities to all as far as the law and the administration can provide them.

Mr. John Lund of No. 26 above Bonanza, who had the misfortune a short time ago to be thrown from a cutter, is not improving as rapidly as was expected. It is feared he will have to be taken to the hospital at Dawson.

It is said of Mr. A. Raymond of No. 26 above Bonanza that he is one of the most accommodating and obliging young men on the creek. This is evidently true, as it is not an uncommon thing to see Mr. Raymond scrubbing the floor for the cook after a hard days work with more perspiration on his face than there is water on the floor.

Some of the miners on upper Bonanza are very enthusiastic over what they call a good strike on the Keean claim, hillside L. L. opposite 39 above Bonanza. They have found 35 cents on bedrock and have three feet of 5-cent dirt. These boys will not go to Tanana.

A large number of Eldorado miners came to town Sunday to follow the remains of Harry Wadman to their last resting place.

## A RICH PAY STREAK

### Has Been Found on Hillside

### 15 Pup Tributary to Last Chance Creek — Claims Show a Good Average.

The latest creek to be reported as being numbered among the best gold producers of the Klondike is 15 pup, a tributary of Last Chance. This pup, which enters Last Chance creek at 15 above discovery on the left limit, has been worked for the last three years but the only thing connected with it which entitled it to any special consideration was the fact that everyone who attempted to open up a claim lost the money put into it.

There was just enough pay found in the valley of the creek to encourage further prospecting, but no larger returns were found until last fall when some parties sank a shaft on the hillside claim, No. 2, right limit, and struck splendid pay. Others then went to work and claims Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, all on the right limit hillside, were opened up and the paystreak was found to be continuous.

The valley of the creek is apparently a slide, which in a measure accounts for the gold being found there but not in paying quantities.

On hillside claim No. 2, above, which was the first hillside prospect, two channels have been discovered. Going over a rim, 3 feet deep a channel 25 feet wide carrying good
