Henry Bessemer was English born, he son of a French artist, and he re-

eived his mechanical instruction the type foundry of his father. At 18 he went up to London, a raw country youth, to make his fortune. His first invention was an improved method of stamping deeds, or a process for copying bas-reliefs on cardboard, by which he could produce embossed copies o such works in thousands at a small expense. "The process was so simple that in ten minutes a person without skill could produce a die from an empossed stamp at a cost of one penny. It was a process by which any office boy with average intelligence could forge almost all the expensive stamps affixed to documents, and ... was from the sale of these stamps that the English Government obtained an important part of its revenue, the stamps often selling for \$25. # PIONEER OF SHORTHAND

ISAAC PITMAN CENTENARY HAS JUST BEEN CELEBRATED.

The Inventor of the Widely-Known System of Stenography Brought Out His New Idea When Queen Victoria Ascended the Throne-Was Trained as a Teacher and Was an Omnivorous Reader.

The centenary of the birth of Isaac Pitman fell on Jaruary 4th, and the event recalled stimulating memories of the men and his work among old phonographers, and to many young ones it was an opportunity of sharing in a celebration of interest throughout the English-speaking world and beyond it, says Alfred Kingston, who was closely associated with the celebrated Englishman.

Outside a small circle, Isaac Pitman, the inventor of a system of shorthand now in world-wide use would never have been very well known, so busy was he at his desk from 6 a.m. till 10 p.m., but for that marvellous faculty of his for "talking on paper," as he described his shorthand correspondence. It was largely through this channel, in an inter course extending over a good number of years, that I learned to know Isaac Pitman best, for it was in that way that he revealed himself and the motives and methods which prompted and characterized his almost super-

But, whether through occasional op portunities for personal contact, or through the medium of his shorthand letter-writing, I think one may safe y say that the impression you formed of him was always, first and foremost, his untiring capacity for work—scrupulously accurate, effective, and convincing work. If the world regarded him as a dreamer, he saw the practical point at which his work touched the work of the world. How intensely Isaac Pitman saw by faith what that contact was going to be in the future I am reminded by a pile of his stimulating letters which are now before me as I write. But of

these more presently. This is not the place for a biography of Isaac Pitman; the story of his ca reer is admirably told in the "Life" of Sir Isaac, by Mr. Alfred Baker. It must suffice here to say that Isaac Pitman was one of a family of eleven children, born to Samuel Pitman, a cloth factory overseer of Trowbridge Wiltshire, in which town Isaac was born; that he was trained for the Road Training College; that as a youth he read all the books he could get, including Walker's Dictionary, from cover to cover, writing out 2.000 teaching profession at the Borough cover to cover, writing out 2,000 words of the pronunciation of which he had a doubt—not a bad preparation for the future invention of a system of shorthand which was to revolutionize the basis and practice of the

With the instinctive love of knowledge common to all boys," he wrote later in life, "I began to study shorthand. I thought it would be a great advantage to write six times as fast as I had been accustomed to, and I borrowed a book, read it through, copied the alphabet and arbitary words, and have written shorthand

And here came in one of those lit-

tle accidents which have played their part in the romance of invention. Samel Bagster, the publisher, showed Isaac Pitman's manuscript to a professional reporter, who gave this ad-

vice:
"The system Mr. Pitman has sent you is already on the market. If he will compile a new system I think you will be more likely to succeed in your object of popularizing shorthand; there will be novelty about it."

To that unknown reporter the world owes a debt of grafitude, for his suggestion set Isaac Pitman at once on the high road to the invention of phonography. That little electric spark fired a whole train of inventive genius, and straightway the young teacher, now back in the West of England from his first post as a teacher in Lincolnshire, set about the examin-ation of fifty systems of shorthand and the making of shorthand alphabets, on an entirely new line, of the analysis of spoken words and the writing of 'one sign for one sound.'

This was in 1837, of which period Isaac Pitman afterwards wrote: "I recollect one day in particularthe day of Her Majesty's Accession. Throughout my few weeks' holiday I did nothing but make shorthand al-phabets and write with them, and on that day I did not even feel tempted to participate in the general festivi-ties; not that I loved Her Majesty less than other people, but because at that time I loved phonography

When the alphabets were wrought out there was the engraving to consider, and we got this little romantic picture of Isaac Pitman's thoroughness in all that he did:

"To ensure accuracy in the engraving of the shorthand signs, before the railway to Bristol (from Bath) was opened I used to start off every tol, a distance of eleven miles, in order that I might sit by the engraver while he worked and see that the signs were correctly made.

#### TRUTH ABOUT BENNETT

ENGLISH AUTHOR HAS HAD A REMARKABLE CAREER.

His First Literary Success Was the Winning of a Prize In a Popular Weekly Competition and Since That Time He Has Gone on Steadily Winning Laurels In Every Branch of His Art.

About twenty-three years ago London was invaded by a young, unso-phisticated provincial, who could not make up his mind what particular niche in the world he could most conveniently fill. He had tried decorative art, but did not make much progress beyond reducing to speechless-ness professional house-decorators who inspected his designs for friezes and dadoes. He had dabbled in literature for local papers; wrote startling ser paragraphs and articles which editors were pleased to publish, but not to pay for. He had also endeavored to follow in the footsteps of the payers. low in the footsteps of his father,

a Hanley solicitor. Legal work brought him in enough to live on, so he de-cided to stick to the law, and at twenty-one was earning a modest com petence of \$6.25 a week as a shorthand clerk in a London solicitor's

A natural aptitude for certain phases of legal work, "and an equally natural gift for advancing my own

interests," as this young man has since confessed, ere long increased that salary to \$1,000 a year.

He again, however, in spite of this admittedly good salary for the work he was doing, became infected with the literary germ, and that germ developed into a disease when "the most veloped into a disease when "the most popular of all popular weeklies" of-fered a prize of twenty guineas for the best humorous condensation, in 2,000 words, of a serial which had been published in its columns.

The serial story was Mr. Grant Al len's \$5,000 prize novel, "What's Bred in the Bone," and the young man who tried for and eventually carried off the twenty-guinea prize, was Mr. Arnold Bennett, now one of the world's most famous dramatists, whose brilliant novels, plays, and essavs have placed him among the most influential writers of the day. On both sides of the Atlantic his work has achieved a popularity which is all the more amazing when one considers that it is only twelve years ago since he began to devote himself exclusively literature.

That twenty guineas was Mr. Bennett's first pen money, and the prize brought to him visions of literary fame, although it is safe to affirm that even in his wildest flights of fancy he never pictured himself attaining the reputation he possesses to-day. The prize whetted his appetite for literary work. After some time in journalism, Mr. Bennett wrote his first novel, "A Man From the North, which brought in very little money.

he wrote, during the next eight years, a series of novels, among which were his masterpieces, "Anna of the Five Towns," "The Old Wives' Tale," and

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sore head f a family, or any male over 18 years old, may nomest \_1 a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or ister of intending homesteader.

Duties-Six months' residence upn and cultivat on of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may ive within nine miles of his hometead on a farm of at least 80 acres. solely owned and occupied by him by by his father, mother, son, daughter rother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader n good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties - Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to Phones : Bell, 1626, Machine, 547 earn homestead patent), and culti-

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

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


