GERMAN INSULTS TO MCMAHON, ime ago it was announced that Marshal McMahon had left Pourru-aux-bois, where time: ago it was announced that Marshal McMahon ha! left Pourru-aux-bois, where his health had then restored, in order to repair to Wiesbaden. To-day we have learnt a fact which ought to be placed in relief. The Germans charged to accompany the Marshal, wished him to declare again his adhesion to the capitulation of Sedan. The Marshal refused energetically, upon which they threatened to have him conveyed to Wiesbaden between two gendarmes. "Do so," he replied, "but I will not sign." As far as he was concerned, they were ashamed of their harshness, and did not insist upon it any longer. They made him give his word to repair to Wiesbaden, and let him go. But they did not act in like manner to his two aides-de-camp, MM. d'Abzac and d'Harmint. They wished to force them again to sign the capitulation, and, upon their refusal they were seut to their destination on foot, and between two gendarmes. Having arrived at their journey's end, one of them, the young Vicemte. y's end, one of them, the young Vic d'Armint, declared to the German chief tha after the treatment which theyhad received, he no longer considered himself bound by his parole, and that he should attempt to escape whenever he got the chance, in order to offer his services to France.

THE BIG CALIFORNIA TREE.—A section of the "Orginal Big Tree" of Calaver. Sounty, California, recently arrived in Boston for shipment to Europe, where it will be exhibited. The tree from which this section is taken was cut in 1853, five men working twenty-five days in felling it. The stump smoothed off, now easily accommodates thirty-two dancers (with musicians) at four sets of cotillons. Theatrical performances have been given on it, and in 1858 a newspaper, "The Big Tree Bulletin," was printed in a house built upon its surface. This tree, when standing, was three hundred and two feet high (near a hundred feet higher than Bunker Hill monument or the spire of Park Street Church). It is estimated that it contained nearly six hundred thousand feet of inch lumber. From a section forty feet long a bottel was constructed.
