Points for the People.

THE nearer the day of election approaches the more seriously should the electors consider the motives by which they should be actuated in making a choice of representatives.

The Opposition are laboring hard to deceive the people of this country by making statements which they must know are without a shadow of foundation.

In the year 1879, the last year of the Davies Administration, the public expenditure was \$390,000. In 1885, the last year of Mr. Sullivan's Government, it was \$466,000.

Let us see how this great reduction has been effected. Has the amount expended on Education been reduced? The contrary is the fact; it has increased from \$65,550 in 1878 to \$109,316 in 1885.

How does the expenditure on Roads, Bridges and Ferries compare with that of the Davies Government? In 1878 the amount spent on roads was \$39,000; in 1885 it was \$19,031.

During the two years the Davies Government were in power, they drew from the pockets of the people, by taxes and payments into the Land Office, the enormous sum of \$230,348.
