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BILL MINER'S MORAL CODE. Ottawa, Mar. 12-Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Minister of Justice, tabled today a bulky return, which includes all correspondence respecting the escape of Bill Miner from the New Westminster penitentiary. On March 8, 1907, Acting Warden Bourke sent a telegram to the department announcing that Bill Miner had escaped and asking that a reward be offered. To this no reply was received. On March 20, he sent another

Sherwood, calef of the Dominion poli-nemorandum that he had learned from a reliab that the authorities were warned of Miner's escape; that he went through a hole under the fence, and that his hair and moustache had been allowed to grow in order to facilitate his escape.
