

SERIOUS DAMAGE BY FOREST FIRES

Unless Rain Sets in Repetition of Last Year's Fires Feared.

Fort Frances, Ont., May 8.—Owing to the extremely dry weather the forest fires have started again and unless rain sets in soon there will be serious damage to the standing timber as well as to the lumbermen and loggers who have been dependent upon the forest for their livelihood.



To Learn Its Capabilities.

It has been deemed advisable in view of the recently awakened interests in the north country and the growing demand for its development that some steps should be taken to ascertain just what it is capable of and what are the resources that it contains. For this purpose the choice of the government fell upon the places in question, Fort Simpson, because it was one of the oldest of the Hudson's Bay posts and at one time the headquarters for the northern trade and the known northern limit of the buffalo range of the early days. Fort Smith because it was the head of navigation on the Mackenzie River waterway.

BIG FOREST FIRES AGAIN BREAK OUT

Towns of Beaudette and Spooner, Burned Last Fall, in Danger. Great Loss is Probable Unless the Rain Comes Soon.

Minnesota, May 7.—Forest fires in upper Minnesota, from the neighborhood of Beaudette eastward and north to the Rainy River, are doing considerable damage and threatening villages such as Beaudette and Spooner.

Laporte, Ind., May 7.—Forest fires are raging throughout this locality and several settlers living a few miles southwest of this village have suffered total losses. The flames are fanned by a strong southerly wind and are sweeping on through the slashings of the cut over the district north of Alsip.

The Minnesota and International passenger train was badly scorched by the flames between Beaudette and Laporte. The smoke is so dense in the fire district that it is almost impossible to travel the roads.

At Short Line park forty men are busy fighting the fire. The smoke is so dense that the sun is obscured and the air is filled with flying embers.

Reports from Hibbing are that fire has threatened the fair grounds, that the buildings have been burned by the flames. Fires are reported from the Surgeon Lake country, where the Weyerhaeuser's have much standing timber.

Reports of the saving of property at the expense of hard fighting come from many points in the Mesaba range, is surrounded by fire, but danger is not imminent. Unless rain comes down, serious damage may be expected over northern Minnesota.

WESTERN BUSINESS IS HAMPERED BY SHORTAGE IN MONEY SUPPLY

Outside Capital is Rapidly Absorbed, and Supply is Not Equal to the Demand—Business Throughout Canada is in Highly Satisfactory Condition, According to Daily's Weekly Review.

From Monday's Daily. Winnipeg, May 8.—The Commercial Bulletin of the business situation in the west, will say tomorrow: "Fears about a shortage in the supply of money constitute an element of increasing importance in the western commercial situation. It has been apparent for some months that the supply of funds would eventually prove inadequate to meet the ordinary needs of the people, and importations from wealthier sections of the world have been quickly absorbed."
