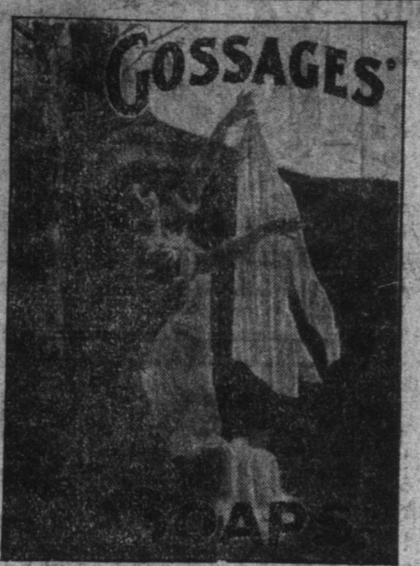

BOVRIL.
 Report of the Feeding Experiments Made in the School of Physiology, Trinity College, Dublin.
 The preliminary announcement of the results of the experiments conducted at the request of the Local Government Board for Ireland during the past year, in the School of Physiology, Trinity College, Dublin, as to the nutritive value of Bovril, and communicated to the British Association at Sheffield ("Times" report, September 3), has created considerable interest amongst the Medical Profession.
 In order to secure a decisive test, dogs were first brought to a constant weight on dried dog-biscuit mixed with known quantities of water. Bovril—from 2½ to 7½ grammes—was then added to the food, with the result that the weight of the animals went up as much as 50 to 100 grammes, or, in round numbers, 10 to 20 times the weight of the Bovril given. Afterwards Bovril was discontinued, and the animals fell back to the original weight. Compared with the effect of hard-boiled white of egg, it was found that from 8 to 10 times as much by weight of the latter had to be given to obtain the same increase in weight, or, taking the dried organic solids in the two foods, from 2½ to 4 times as much egg white had to be given to obtain the Bovril effect.
 In several of the experiments there was a retention of reserve nitrogen, and in all an increased utilisation of other foods.
 It was therefore concluded that Bovril had both a direct and an indirect nutritive value, the latter by causing a more complete digestion and absorption of the other food given.

THE MARCH ASSIZE.

THE jury were not disposed to retire. trial. With that fading I need scarcely say I entirely agree. I am as satisfied of your guilt as if I had seen you commit the act with my own bodily eyes. The circumstance of your being a person who, from habits and education, should have been above committing so base a crime, only aggravates your guilt. However, no matter who or what you have been, you must expiate your offence on the scaffold. The law has very properly for the safety of society, decreed the punishment of death for such crimes; our only and plain duty is to execute that law."

The prisoner did not reply; he was leaning with his elbows on the front of the dock, his bowed face covered with his outspread hands; and the judge passed sentence of death in the accustomed form. The court arose, and a turnkey placed his hand upon the prisoner's arm, to lead him away. Suddenly he uncovered his face, drew himself up to his full height—he was a remarkably tall man—and glared fiercely round upon the audience, like a wild animal at bay. "My lord," he cried, or rather shouted, in an excited voice. The judge, motioned impatiently to the jailer, and strong hands impelled the prisoner from the front of the dock. Bursting from them, he again sprang forward, and his arms outstretched, whilst his glittering eye seemed to hold the judge spell-bound. "My lord, before another month has passed away, you will appear at the bar of another world, to answer for the life, the innocent life, which God bestowed upon me, but which you have impudently cast away as a thing of naught and scorn!" He ceased, and was at once borne off. The court, in some confusion, hastily departed. It was thought at the time that the judge's evidently failing health had suggested the prophecy to the prisoner. It only excited a few days' wonder, and was forgotten.

The position of a barrister in such circumstances is always painful. I need hardly say that my feelings were of a very distressing kind. Conscious that if the unfortunate man really was guilty, he was at least not deserving of capital punishment, I exerted myself to procure a reprieve. In the first place I waited privately on the judge, but he would not listen to no proposal for a respite. Along with a number of individuals—chiefly of the Society of Friends—I petitioned the crown for a commutation of the sentence. But being unaccompanied with a recommendation from the judge, the prayer of our petition was of course disregarded; the law, it was said, must take its course. How much cruelty has been exercised under shelter of that remorseless expression!

I would willingly pass over the succeeding events. Unable to save his life, I endeavoured to soothe the few remaining hours of the doomed convict, and frequently visited him in the condemned cell. The more I saw of him, the deeper grew my sympathy in his case, which was that of no vulgar felon. "I have been a most unfortunate man," he said to me one day. I feel as if deserted by God and man; yet I know, or at least would persuade myself, that Heaven will one day vindicate my innocence of this foul charge. To think of being hanged like a dog for a crime at which my soul revolts! Great is the crime of those imbecile jurors and that false and hard-hearted judge—who thus, by an irretrievable decree, consign a fellow-mortal to a death of violence and disgrace. Oh, God, help me—help me to sustain that bitter, bitter hour!" And then the poor man would throw himself on his bed and weep.

But the parting with his wife and children. What pen can describe that terrible interview! They knelt in prayer, their wo-begone countenances suffused in tears, and with hands clasped convulsively together. The scene was too harrowing and sacred for the eye of a stranger. I rushed from the cell, and buried myself in my lodgings, whence I did not remove till all was over. Next day James Harvey, a victim of circumstance and evidence, and of a barbarous criminal code, perished on the scaffold.

Three weeks afterwards, the court arrived at a popular city in the west of England. It had in the interval visited another assize town, and there Judge A—had left three for execution. At the trial of these men, however, I had not attended. So shocked had been my feelings with the mournful event which had taken place at that I had gone into Wales for the sake of change of scene. After roaming about for a fortnight amidst the wild solitudes of Carnarvonshire, I took the stage for the city which I knew the court was to visit, and arrived on the day previous to the opening of the assizes.

"Well, are we to have a heavy calendar?" I enquired next morning of a brother barrister on entering the court.

"Rather light for a March assize," replied the impatient counsel as he bustled forward. "There's Cartwright's case—highway robbery—in which I am for the prosecution. He'll swing for it, and perhaps four or five others."

Etiquette in the Jungle

Sir Frederick Treves on How to Meet a Lion.

The etiquette to be adopted when a tourist meets a lion in the jungle is described humorously by Sir Frederick Treves, the famous surgeon. In his fifth book of general interest, which is entitled "Uganda for a Holiday" and was published recently, price 3s., by Messrs. Smith, Elder, and Co., Sir Frederick explains in his preface that he visited this part of Africa with the outlook of an "unspecialized traveler"—of the man who merely seeks "somewhere to go to."

"The tourist coming to British East Africa is sure to inquire as to the line of conduct that should be observed when a lion is encountered by the way," writes Sir Frederick. "In answer to such inquiry I was told that the etiquette suitable for the occasion was the following: If the lion when met with is walking in the opposite direction to the tourist, the animal should be allowed to continue his walk without comment. If, however, the lion stops and stares at the tourist it is proper that the tourist should 'shirk' the animal away, as he would an obtrusive goose on a village green. Should the lion be unmoved by this expression of annoyance the tourist is advised to throwumps of earth at the obtuse creature. If, after this, the lion still fails to realize that he is to drop, the tourist is recommended to walk away from the spot with such dignity as the strained position demands."

Sir Frederick Treves has several other things to say about the animals of the world. "The rhinoceros is the embodiment of blind conservatism," he writes. "Its hide is impenetrable. Its vision is weak, while its intellect is weaker. It has, however, two marked qualities—combativeness and sense of smell. It is aroused to its maximum energy by the presence of anything that is new. This object need not be a thing that is aggressive or inconvenient. Its offensiveness depends upon the fact that it is unfamiliar."

"When a rhinoceros smells a man he will charge him with maniacal violence, although the man may be merely sitting on a stool reading Milton. The massive beast will dash at him like a torpedo or a runaway locomotive, simply because the smell of him is novel. Actuated by this insane hate of whatever savours of an innovation the rhinoceros has charged an iron water tank on the outskirts of a camp and has crumpled it up as a blacksmith would an empty meat tin."

"A conservative rhinoceros with a sense dislike of anything new once charged a train on the Uganda Railway, but with no more serious result than the tearing away of the footboard of a carriage. As regards the rhinoceros in this case, it appeared surprised that a thing composed, as it had imagined, of flesh and blood could be so hard. It went off with an additional grievance and an increased swelling of the head."

Shocking Crime

IN SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 14.—Bent in beyond semblance to a human form, the body of an aged woman was found to-day in a vacant lot next to the Savoy Theatre, in the centre of the business district in this city. John Knapp, a former convict, is in jail charged with the murder. The murdered woman was identified as Mrs. Julia Cary, aged 55 years. Identification was made by Mrs. Love, matron of the city prison, who said Mrs. Cary had been in prison a number of times for petty offences. Detectives found Knapp standing in front of a stable where he is employed, not far from the place where the body lay. He was placed under arrest and in his room in the stable was found a wooden weight smeared with blood, and knotted gray hair. Some of Knapp's discarded garments were covered with blood, and the collar and waist of the coat he wore when arrested were spotted with bloody finger prints. A trail was discovered over which the woman had been dragged from the stable to the lot where the body was found. Knapp is 57 years old and has a criminal record having served 13 years in the Polson Penitentiary for the murder of James Quinn, of Humboldt, Iowa, in a gambling quarrel.

London, Nov. 12.—The Times editorially, again dwells on the probability of the King and Queen visiting the Overseas Dominions and says that with the accession of King George the Empire enters a new and more auspicious era; and that he has responsibilities to the Empire which can be fully discharged only by personal contact. It is therefore right and seemly that His Majesty should contemplate holding courts in the Dominions.

The Battle of the Guns.

It seems almost impossible to obtain final facts with regard to the naval position between England and Germany—each succeeding day brings its own contradiction. An important disclosure was made that the new English Dreadnoughts were to be armed with a 13½ in. naval gun, such as had never been used before. The effect of this, we were then told, was that it upset all the German calculations, as they would have to revise their own plans and to provide bigger guns. This would cause delay, and leave us with an enormous margin of Dreadnoughts in 1913. The latest statement is that Germany has decided to go one better, and is to meet the British 13½ in. gun with a 14 in. Krupp gun of greater power.

There is no difficulty in making these big guns, as the English Elswick yard has already placed a 14 in. gun on the new Brazilian super-Dreadnought which it is building.

A Cinematograph Daily

"Pathe Freres, the cinematograph manufacturers, have established a daily service of moving pictures of the news," says the World's Work. The enterprise, which goes by the name of the Animated Gazette, is a complete news organization, with an editor, Mr. Steer, and a staff of 5,000 photo-correspondents scattered pretty well over the world.

"The product of this organization is a cinematograph film which is sent out to a circuit of moving-picture theatres, and is already being seen daily and nightly by more than two million of people. An idea of the circulation possibilities of this kind of thing is gathered from the fact that London has 500 moving-picture shows, that every city and town of Europe and America possesses from one to a dozen."

LIVING PICTURES BY WIRE. "Cinematography by wire has been successfully accomplished by M. Jouard Belin, a French inventor, who has constructed an apparatus by which a series of photographs can be telegraphed instantaneously, and a hundred reproduced many miles away," says the Evening Standard.

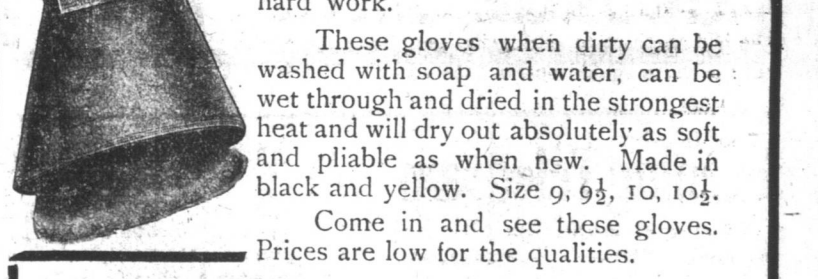

Household Notes. Do not be tempted to experiment with every furniture polish. Never use anything on furniture that you do not know all about. Doing over ruined furniture is costly and varnish is easily hurt. To keep a meal hot for a late comer, fill a soup place nearly full of hot water, place the dinner plate with its contents on top of the hot soup plate and cover closely with still another plate. To keep a gas stove from rusting when it is not in use for the winter first clean carefully with pumice, dry carefully, and then rub over with olive oil. It is best to do this while the stove is warm. It is a great protection from moths when putting clothes away to scatter over them dried wormwood, which may be procured from any druggist. Each article should be wrapped separately in a newspaper. When carpets are not taken up they can be greatly freshened by washing with water in which a tablespoonful of ammonia has been added to a pail of water. This should be done after a thorough sweeping. When wall paper is to be cleaned with medicated putties or crusts of bread the room should first be made free of dirt. Work only in one direction. No paper will stand cleaning more than three times. Always empty a tea kettle after using and before filling again with fresh water rinse thoroughly. In that way you avoid boiling over possible germs and also keep sediment from forming in the bottom of the kettle. In packing away fruit cookies, if will be found wise to put the cookies in a jar or box in layers with a piece of paraffin paper between each layer. Mix thoroughly, add a pinch of salt and sufficient flour to make a dough that will roll out thin. Cut in long, narrow strips and bake in a quick oven.

Sugar Beet.

We have been wondering for some time past, whether what is known as sugar-beet could be grown profitably in Newfoundland and in sufficient quantities to keep a sugar factory running.

Prof. Robertson has told us that he considers the soil and climate particularly adapted for root-crops as compared with other places he had visited, and it may be that Newfoundland is specially fitted for the growth of this particular root. Perhaps some of our farmers are acquainted with what is known as "Sugar Beet" and have information about it, as to how it differs, if at all, from the beet grown here, and as to the treatment of the soil, etc., for its growth.

We are inclined to think it is a subject which the Department of Agriculture should look into, and if feasible, experiments in the growth of this beet should be made on the Experimental Farm, if that has not already been done.

In Europe six million tons of sugar are annually manufactured from this root. Efforts in the same direction are being made in Michigan, British Columbia and elsewhere.

The experience of Posen is illuminating. Posen is a province of Eastern Germany with an area of 11,000 square miles and a population of two millions.

Thirty-five years ago the farmers of Posen were in a destitute condition. A large portion of the land was covered with ferns and mosses. The chief products were beer and brandy and the people who were mainly Poles, had the unenviable distinction of being the worst educated of all the citizens of the German dominion.

In 1885 there was one sugar beet factory in operation in Posen with a capacity per day of 300 metric tons. In 1905 there were 128,000 acres in beets which yielded 1,960,000 tons of roots or 15.31 tons per acre.

Twenty factories were working in the latter year and each factory had a capacity of slicing 1,460 metric tons

per day of 24 hours, in a campaign of 65 days. There was produced in that period 592,554,000 pounds of raw sugar, being an extraction of 15.14 per cent, or, say, 484,199,950 pounds of raw sugar, upon a reduction to 90 per cent, which is as much as the present yearly consumption of sugar in Canada with a yearly value of \$20,000,000.

The capital invested in the twenty factories is reported to be \$4,846,700 or an average of \$238,300 per factory. Drainage and cultivation have greatly improved the physical condition of the province in many respects, and the land is not unlike the rich alluvial soils of the southern part of Ontario. Nothing is permitted to go to waste in the beet sugar industry of Posen. The pulp is fed to stock, the molasses either used for mixing with pulp, for feeding purposes or is used for the manufacture of alcohol, (which is now so extensively used in many arts and industries), the lime cake which is frequently an absolute waste in Canada is used as a fertilizer and not a pound of it is wasted."

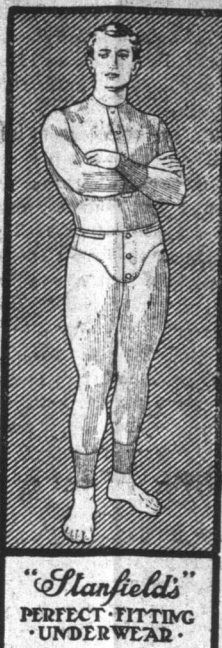

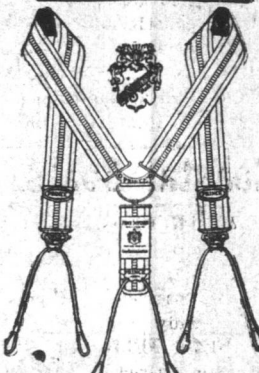

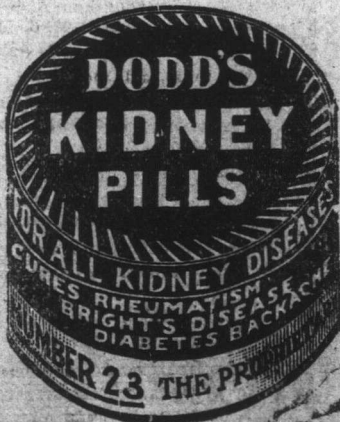

Edens' Grocery Entered

The Belgians are concerned because Antwerp would be isolated in event of war.
Public opinion in Belgium is somewhat occupied with the project recently made public in Holland of fortifying the mouth of the Scheldt. The expenditure foreseen by the Dutch Government for this object amounts to forty million florins, the greater part of which is being devoted to the construction of a fort near Flushing. The Belgians are concerned at this plan, as one of its consequences would be to isolate Antwerp in the event of war. People here have always reckoned that the Belgian commercial metropolis—namely, Antwerp—could always be within the friendly reach of the British fleet should a European war break out. But with a double range of fortifications on the Scheldt, Antwerp would be at the mercy of any Continental invader. The project of fortifying the Scheldt has therefore produced a disagreeable impression in Belgium, and has naturally shattered any further hope of a Belgian-Dutch rapprochement, planned three or four years ago. The project of fortifying the Scheldt has definitely disposed of the projected enterprise.

Stole a Pair of Boots.

A sneak thief stole a pair of boots from the store of Mr. Thos. Peel, Water Street, last night about 7 o'clock. A citizen who saw him colored him and held him till the police came. Inspector Collins knew the man well and wanted Mr. Peel to make a charge against him. This he refused to do as the man gave up the boots and pleaded to him for mercy. The boots would have been no use to him had he got away as they were two left ones, which he took in his hurry to get away.

No More Dusty Roads.

English Engineer Finds Cure by Mixing Granite and Bitumen.
It looks as if a cure for dusty roads has been found at last, thanks to several years' painstaking experimenting by Mr. Francis Wood, borough engineer at Fulham. The material is a mixture of two-inch granite with Trinidad Lake bitumen.
Mr. Wood laid a portion of a road in Fulham with this combination, and although it has been traversed by about two thousand vehicles daily, including automobiles, steam lorries and heavy carts, it shows no sign of wear or dust.

Here and There.

DIED AT HARBOR GRACE.—Capt. Daniel Pumphrey, a prominent resident of Harbor Grace, died there this morning at his late residence, Water Street.

HAND BADLY WOUNDED.—J. Hollett, of Holyteston, while opening a tin of sardines last night gashed the palm of his left hand terribly with the sharp can opener. He had to go to Stafford's drug store to get it stitched.

Geo. Follett, of the Campania, received a message from his father, skipper of the Mary Joseph, stating that the latter schooner had left St. Mary's Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock and that the same night had to put back to St. Mary's again owing to the weather which was very stormy.

Cable News.

TULA, Russia, Nov. 17.
Count Tolstoi is still alive and even said to be slightly improved this morning. His condition, however, continues critical and for many hours the symptoms have been such as to give rise to frequent reports that the end had come. Such a report emanated from Moscow last night, and it was some time before its falsity could be established. The aged author passed a restless night at the home of the station master at Astanova, to which he was removed when illness seized him during his attempted pilgrimage from Shamadino to the Caucasus, where he had hoped to end his days in solitude. Countess Tolstoi has not been admitted to the sick chamber, and even the fact of her arrival has been kept secret from Tolstoi, lest the knowledge of her coming might over-excite the Count. The latter was not pleased when the presence of his son

Sergius was made known to him. When Sergius entered the room and was recognized by his father, he was plainly angry and showed his annoyance by asking, "Why have you come, and how did you know I was here?" At the same time Tolstoi was delighted at the arrival of his friend, Count Vladimir Tohertkoff. The latter remained constantly at his bedside with physicians. His physicians have honored him by allowing him to read the newspapers and also to look over his latest and favorite book, Hamid Murat. He has been permitted even to dictate to his daughter, Alexandra a part of a new article.

MADRID, Nov. 17.
The new project of obligatory military service, now under discussion in the Senate, threatened to complicate the relations between the Spanish Government and the Vatican further, as it does not exempt either the secular or the monastic clergy. The Bishop of Madrid, voicing the clerical protest which characterizes the bill as the most anti-clerical feature of the ministerial programme, declares that it violates the canonical law authorizing ecclesiastical communities, and is especially offensive in that it would deplete the ranks of the clergy. The measure also arouses a protest in a section of the Press on the ground that instead of abolishing the abuse of the 'old regime' under which substitutes could be purchased, which was the cause of the rising in Catalonia last year, it authorizes a system whereby recruits may be discharged after several months' service by the payment of an indemnity, thus continuing the discrimination in favor of those possessed of money.

LONDON, Nov. 17.
An apparently unsupported statement issued to-day fixes Nov. 28 as the date for the dissolution of Parliament. The Government, it is asserted, design to pass the budget before appealing to the country, the debate on the financial measure proceeding in the House of Commons while the Lords are discussing the Veto bill. That the Irish Dictator will figure largely in the Unionist campaign was indicated by the excite-

ment at the annual conference of the Conservative Association at Nottingham this morning, when Henry Chaplin, Unionist member of Parliament for Wimbledon and former President of the Local Government Board, in an opening speech denounced the Government, who, he said, was herding over the rule of the country to the sworn enemy of England who with the gold of foreign millionaires aspires to dictate our destinies.

PARIS, Nov. 17.
The French Government has announced its formal acceptance of the American proposal to refund the debt of Liberia. This, however, is made conditionally, upon the ratification of the frontier delimitation and agreement that Liberia shall grant liberty of commerce to France and that France shall have a right to maintain certain military posts which will be evacuated as soon as acceptable and Liberian forces are substituted. It was further announced that the U. S. had given assurance that the conditions would be met.

LONDON, Nov. 17.
The Lord Mayor and the Corporation will entertain a large number of the American officers and men at luncheon in the Guild Hall during the stay of the U. S. fleet in the Thames. This afternoon the Corporation voted an expenditure of \$10,000 for this purpose.

LONDON, Nov. 17.
Solicitor Newton has secured several thousand signatures to a petition for a reprieve of his client, Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, sentenced to die on Wednesday next for the murder of his wife, Belle Elmore, the actress. It is probable that the petition will be presented to Home Secretary Churchill to-day.

RICHMOND, Ind., Nov. 17.
A wreck is reported on the Pennsylvania railroad near Richmond early to-day. Four or five persons were killed.

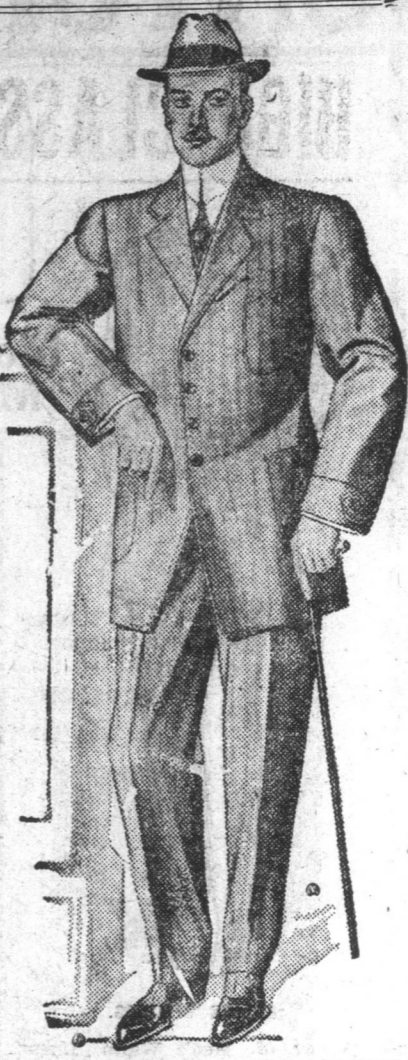

Wars Waged Against Newspapers.

Editors Who Have Died for Their Journals.

No outrage perpetrated in the newspaper world has created so much excitement as the wrecking by dynamite of the Times office in Los Angeles, California. The paper has made many enemies by devoting itself to the cause of capitalism and "union-smashing," and it has been surprised by the police that the labour unions, against which the Times has waged a relentless war, were responsible for the terrible outrage.

Armed With Old Guns.

American newspaper offices have often been attacked by the public. An armed mob once marched to the New York Courier building with the intention of wrecking it. The then editor, Colonel Webb, had feared trouble for a long time, and armed his staff with old guns. So soon as the mob put in an appearance in the street outside the employees appeared at the windows with their weapons. It is said that the guns of the newspaper men were loaded with compositors' proofs rolled into shot, and that this paper ammunition was successful in dispersing the invaders.

More disastrous was the attack on the office of the Aurora, a Philadelphia paper, in 1789. A body of armed Federals broke into the building and so thoroughly thrashed the members of the literary staff with

tin's editor, and fought several duels on behalf of the paper. He met his fate in Texas at the hands of a cowboy.

Only one of the editors of the "Sentinel" escaped death by shooting, and he had the misfortune to be imprisoned. John Lowins was his name, and he had such a violent pen that the authorities fearing that he would cause a riot, had him "boxed up" for a year or two.

Editors were often assassinated in America in the young days of Yankee journalism. The editor of the "Southern Opinion," of Richmond, U. S. A., was one of the last men to be murdered. He was stabbed to the heart as he stepped from his office.

A Journalistic Hero.

Sir William Leng risked his life for his paper, the 'Sheffield Daily Telegraph'. In 1867 a man named Broadhead, the secretary of what was known as the Sawgrinders' Union, was discovered by Leng to be the president of a modern Vehmgericht for the secret trial and punishment of non-union workmen. The journalist made up his mind to attack this organization, although he was well aware that to do so would result in his running terrible risks. He set his best reporters to work, and one of them was bludgeoned in one of the principal streets of Sheffield in the middle of the day. Not long after this dastardly assault the house in which another pressman resided was blown up by dynamite in the middle of the night. Sir William Leng thereupon armed his staff with revolvers and carried one himself. He wrote his leaders with a loaded firearm on his desk and an-

Tim Shannahan on Inquiries.

There was a time in this country when 'twas the fashion to bow and scrape to every rich man. If you saw him down by Job's and you were by the Market House, you would straighten yourself up for a grand bow. That old race has died out, thanks be to goodness; but we have another class here to-day who are "too nice" to open their mouth for fear they'll displease some one else.

Now we would like to ask a question, and we want Mr. Fearu to answer it, and that is, shouldn't our local Board of Trade handle the evidence in connection with the inquiry into the loss of the Regulus and the poor fellows who lost their lives in her? It seems a kind of strange that it should be sent to England and we with a Board of Trade of our own.

Mrs. Tucker is vexed about the way the Inquiry was conducted. She says 'tis high time to cut out this "blue-beard close" business and give us the light of day thrown in on such matters. The public hate closed doors, and the public is suspicious of hole and corner meetings, no matter by whom conducted.

Very solemn looking men, with heavy watch chains and solid boots marching to and from the place of inquiry isn't sufficient to satisfy the interest of the public. And mark well, the public of this country aren't half as soft as they used to be. Why was the Court House built so as to contain seats for spectators to sit upon? Simply to give the public a chance of seeing what was going on. Then why was not the public allowed in in this case? The public confidence is easily disturbed. We see or read samples of it in other countries every day; then let us benefit by others' misfortunes and let us have more publicity, more wide open doors when inquiries are going on, lest we, too, lose the confidence of the great judges—the Public.

The public are watching the Regulus Inquiry, and a few dollars collected is not going to wink out of sight the opinion that a blunder was made; and until 'tis cleared up that opinion will be held and held firmly.

We have other vessels coming on the coast every day in the week, and it is to protect them and the valuable lives they contain that we want no shilly-shallying over the matter. Contemptible is the idea that a man should be afraid to speak, but unfortunately we are becoming a very weak-kneed people in matters of this kind.


