### The Unbelievableness of Death.

"A simple child that lightly draws its breath And feels its life in every limb, What should it know of death!" —Wordsworth.

There is a vigorous, full of life young woman among my friends who always says in place "when I die, I'll die." Her explanation is that, although in her own mind she knows that she will die, she cannot seem to believe in her heart that this strange thing will really come to her. Most of us are not so frank. And yet don't we all have this same feeling in greater or less degree? We know in our minds that of course we must die sometime but do we actually sense it? I don't believe we do.

One day last summer I spent an hour or so wandering through a very old New England cemetery—or to use the better and braver term for it—burying ground.

Perhaps you may think that is a very queer way to spend a golden hour in summer, but if you ever happen to be near a burying ground over which time has thrown the softening veil of romance, try it some day. I am sure that in the half obliterated Nehemiah and Samanthas and Pollys and Thomases, in the moss covered dates and "Actata" and the quaint inscriptions, you will find many a half told tale to awaken your imagination.

But to return to the main theme. As we wandered through the quaint old burying ground, we came upon a stone marked "1812." The man whose name

was upon it had died at the age of 50 after a good long life. And he had been dead one hundred years! Of course the same thought came into the minds of both of us. "Just think, he has been dead and buried over a hundred years! Some day we, too, will have been dead a hundred years, and someone else will stand by our graves and read our names, on the tomb stones."

An inevitable and tremendous thought! And yet it made so little impression upon us that in two or three minutes we were talking lightly of the most trivial topics.

You see we didn't believe it, at least not with the real belief that comes from the heart rather than the mind.

"As a matter of fact," says Stevenson in Aes Triplex, "although few things are spoken of with more fearful whispering than this prospect of death, few have less influence on conduct under healthy circumstances." And he goes on to show that while we wonder how people who live in cities built on the sides of fiery, volcanic mountains can eat and drink and make merry, and think so little about their mortal condition, we are all very much like them. For though we live continually in the presence and possibility of death, yet as a matter of fact, we think surprisingly little about it.

Yes, when you come to think of it, the unbelievableness of death to the average person, in view of our daily acquaintance with that great fact, is one of the queer quirks of the human brain. Or may it not be something bigger and better—a proof of our instinctive realization of our own immortality?

### Household Notes.

The rust which collects in the hot-water boiler is the chief destroyer of water-backs. The life of the hot-water system will be prolonged if you will open the faucet at the bottom of the boiler occasionally and draw off a few gallons of water.

When the table cloth shows signs of wear, cut it up into cloths the size of napkins. They will often save you good napkins and will come in very handy for the picnic basket or to wrap about a dainty bit of food which is sent to the neighbors.

An old-fashioned cleaning medium for silk is gotten by peeling and washing and grating a potato, then steeping in water over night. Use only the liquid, which should be strained. Two potatoes to a pint of water should make the required strength.

In old houses the boards are sometimes far apart and the floors are very cold. A good cement can be made of old newspapers soaked in water and washed to a very fine pulp. Mix this with flour and alum and fill in the cracks before laying the carpet.

A convenience for a sick person is a good-sized shoe bag with ample pockets fastened with safety pins to the mattress at the side of the bed. In the pockets may be stored books, papers, fancy work, handkerchiefs and various articles that are needed.

In washing new sheets, put a handful of soda in the water with the sheets, and enough cold water to cover them. Then boil for three quarters of an hour; take off and rinse in cold water and blue in the regular way. This process will make them free from lime.

Shad roe croquettes are very delicious. Two cups of the shad roe, cut into pieces after being dolled in salt, pepper a little lemon juice, cayenne and minced parsley. Then make a cup of thick white sauce, three tablespoons of flour to two of butter. Add the beaten yolks of two eggs, then the shad roe. Let the mixture get cold and stiff enough to shape into outlet forms.

In trying the following effects will be gotten: If the original color is white, any color can be obtained. If it is cream, it can be dyed any color of a similar character. Red will dye a darker red; crimson, wine, dark

### Jury Exonerates Champion Pelkey.

Principals Free From Blame—Coroner's Inquest on McCarthy at Calgary—Wife Gets Estate—Bad Effect of Death.

Calgary, May 27.—The coroner's inquest on the death of Luther McCarthy in his fight here with Pelkey developed the cause as a dislocated neck. The first supposition that death was caused by a blow to the heart, was discarded when the heart was found to be sound.

Joe Mosher closed the autopsy and was the first witness at the inquest. He testified that the blow on the edge of the right jaw was the cause of McCarthy's death. He was questioned for more than an hour.


Burns acknowledged he promoted the fight and that McCarthy and Pelkey were to receive \$5,000 each, according to the agreement.

Referee Smith testified that not one hard blow was struck during the battle. His testimony was brief.

Manager McCarthy asserted on the witness stand that McCarthy was in good condition when he entered the ring. He said that, in his opinion, death was not caused by a blow.

McCarthy's body was shipped to his home in Ohio last night.

The jury returned a verdict exonerating all the principals. Criminal pro-

Estate to Wife.  
Fargo, N.D., May 27.—Mrs. Luther McCarty, widow of the late prize fighter, may receive \$65,000, the amount of the fortune left by her husband.

Mrs. McCarty received a telegram yesterday from attorneys in charge, saying that her husband's estate would reach about \$65,000 and that she would be able to claim the money if action were taken at once.

Mrs. McCarty conferred with an attorney who later left for Chicago. She has been working in a restaurant.

Blow to Boxing.  
Chicago, May 27.—The tragic ending of the Polkey-McCarthy fight at Calgary, Saturday, has killed the chances of the boxing bill now before the legislature, according to the opinion of many local promoters who yesterday disposed of options in several halls which they had secured for prospective boxing matches.

The fact that McCarthy's death resulted from a bout in which the principals wore eight-ounce gloves, is regarded by the friends of the bill as an especially strong argument for its opponents. Several religious organizations have prepared to renew their campaign against the pending legislation.

### Stranded in Canada.

Congressman Appeals to Laborers Who Have Been Lured to Northwest By Ads.

Washington, D. C., May 27.—Congressman Curley's office has presented to Assistant Secretary of State Osborne an earnest appeal in behalf of Massachusetts men stranded in British Columbia, whom the American consuls have declined to aid.

It seems that for some time past, advertisements have appeared in certain American periodicals holding forth alluring prospects for construction work with Canadian corporations in the British Northwest.

Laborers in certain instances were offered \$4.20 a day. When the Americans reached the places designated for employment, the work was found to be of the most laborious character, the wages small, and the hours of work irregular.

It is the contention of Congressman Curley that the offending corporations are amenable to the Dominion of Canada, and that the advances made by American consuls to American laborers to allow them to return to their homes can be collected in turn from the British Crown.

### Hot Weather

Followed by Cloudbursts and Hurricanes—Five Soldiers Die of Heat in Prussia.

Berlin, June 5.—A week of excessive heat has been followed by violent thunderstorms, cloudbursts and hurricanes at many points in Germany.

Seven houses have been destroyed by lightning in the village of Wabern, Northhausen and Niedersempron, in the province of Hesse-Nassau. Bertha has been inundated by a cloudburst and several persons are reported to have been trapped in the rising waters in the valley of the Werra, near Eschwege, and drowned. Heavy damage has been done by the cloudbursts in the Upper Schwarza Valley. Two persons have been killed by lightning near Paderberg.

Five infantry men have died from heat prostration, and nineteen are ill as a result of exhaustion during the manoeuvres of the troops.
