He added that this conduct was a disgress to the city and a retober. He added that this conduct was a disgrace to the city and a reflection on any civilized community. He was unable to cope with it single-handed and it was at the risk of one's life to interfere. He cited an instance of an occasion recently, the night of a Sabbath Day, how he was compelled to go to the Regimental Headquarters and get the aid of a picket duty. Sergt.
