Havana, Dec. 26th—Advices from the City of Mexico to the 19th have been received. There was much distress throtout the Republic in consequence of the exhaustion and disorganization caused by the protracted war for independence. A general call was made upon government to take effective measures to preven a concentration of the people were compelled to resort by hunger. Peace had been re-established at Tepic. Many disturbances had taken place in different parts of the Republic.

Havana, Dec. 26—The steamship Virginia, from Vera Cruz, which touched at Sisal on the 22rd, brings important news. The revolution in Hayti was assuming large proportions. Santa Anna had been proclaimed Dictator by the revolutionists and was hourly expected from Havana with men and a million dollars. The port and town of Sisal were in the hands of the rebels, but the port was blockaded by two Mexican gunboats. A number of officers who formerly served under the empire had arrived at Sisal from Matamoras. On the 16th an engagement took place between the Mexican gunboats and the batteries on the shore.
