New sewers and other improvements would follow in the natural course of things, just as all improvements were now made in the city. There were positively "no terms of annexation." As for assuming Yonge street and the extension of the street care, they would also follow in the natural course of events.

The function of government is not to curtail freedom, but to maintain it—not to fetter trade, but to prevent and punish fraud. The business of government therefore is not to monopolize the trade in "money," but to enact a banking act whip'n shall determine under what conditions currency shall be issued by an individual or a corporation; and then, while leaving all corporation; and then, while leaving all equally free to trade under the act, see to it that its provisions are complied with. This is free trade in "money;" and like free trade in everything else by it the best interests of the public will be best promoted.
