DECISION OF THE WASHINGTON PATENT AUTHORITIES

The Bell Patent Get the Best of It—Interesting to Canadians—Edison Gets an Award for an Electric Bell

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The examiners in chief of the patent office have rendered a decision in a patent interference case involving the invention of the speaking telephone. The decision is in favor of the Bell patent. The Edison patent is held to be invalid.

Of fourteen original parties to the case there remain only six. Mr. W. L. Veecher (two applications), Miss A. Edison (one application), John H. Lewis (two applications), John H. Bell (two applications) and Alex. Graham Bell (one application) are the only parties remaining.

The examiners confirm all the Bell awards. Case 6 is generally regarded as the principal case. It is a telephone receiver, the patent of which is held by the Bell company. The Edison patent is held to be invalid because it is not a telephone receiver.
