The day before press day the people line up in front of the office and then they file past the desk and tell him all the news of the week. He writes it up in ten or fifteen minutes, takes it back and hangs it on a hook. The compositors take the copy and shake it over the type cases, say a few mystic words, the type flies into place, and after a few passes by the forman the forms are ready for the press again. And the editor goes down to the bank. It is the greatest snap in the catalogue. Now, if greatest snap in the catalogue. Now, if the editor could only do away with press day his job would be complete.



Rural Telephones.

There are some things about which there can be no two opinions. One of these is the rural telephone. No sound argument can be adduced against. It is cheap for the service rendered. Its benefit in any rural community cannot be over-estimated. It removes isolation, encourages sociability, and is of an advantage in many ways in economizing work and minimizing the difficulties under which many farmers labor. To advocate the rural phone, therefore, is to stand up for something that is of inestimable benefit to the whole country. If this be true of the city where one can fraternize with his neighbor over the back fence, how much more true is it of the country where broad acres separate the farm er from his nearest neighbor. The phone has become an integral part of the rural life of this country and the farmer or the community that is without its advantages does not realize what it misses. For a few dollars a year a farmer can buy more real benefit and comfort for himself and family in a rural phone than he can get by a similar investment in any other way.

To Clean Silver.

For washing silver put half a teaspoonful ammonia into suds; have the water hot; wash quickly, using a small brush; rinse in hot water and dry with a clean linen towel, then rub dry with a chamois skin. Washed in this manner silver becomes brilliant, requires no polishing with any of the powders or whiting usually employed, and does not wear out. Jewelry can be made to look like new by washing in ammonia water. Put half a teaspoonful into clear water to wash tumblers or glass of any description.



DRUGS OF ANTIQUITY.

The Doses That Mankind Swallowed Thousands of Years Ago.

It is admitted that the oldest medical work known is the Ebers papyrus, discovered by Georg Ebers in his journey to Egypt in 1872-8. It is a scroll twenty yards long and a foot wide and has been studied and translated by Von Ocfele and reviewed by Von Lippmann. It was written about 1550 B. C., though some of the mate rial of which it is a compilation dates back to about 8700 B. C.

The medical substances mentioned include copper-once more costly than gold and silver-lead, iron, antimony, carbon, sulphur, salt, soda, gypsum and other minerals; milk, fats from many animals, wax, and the horn, blood and other portions of domestic and wild animals; castor and other oils, honey, raisins, grapes, figs, dates, wine, beer, linen, flax, lanolin, papyrus, numerous resins, caraway, fennel, dill, meliot, watercress, peppermint, cori-ander, lettuce, endive, absinth, pomegranate, calamus, aloes, safilower, crocus, indigo, henbane, mandrake, opium and other plants and vegetable products.

In preparing drugs solids were grated or powdered in a stone mortar. There were many processes of treating them, such as roasting, baking, pressing, steeping, warming, boiling in various substances, macerating with lye, evaporating and fermenting with yeast. Liquids were filtered and clarified. Some recipes contain two or three ingredients, but others have as many as thirty-seven materials.

TETT GIBRALTAR.

The "Key of the Mediterranean" Has Had a Stormy History.

England has been in poss the rocky promontory of Gibraltar since 1704. From that time to this it has been a crown colony under the administration of a governor. By reason of its important strategical position it is called the "key of the Mediterra-

Gibraltar has had a stormy history. In 711 the rock was taken by the Arab chief Tarik, who called it Jebel-al-Tarik (Hill of Tarik) and built a fortress on the promontory. Part of these ruins are still extant. In 1309 it was taken by the Castilians, only to be re-captured by the Moors in 1333. It was held by them until 1462. Following the taking and sacking of Gibraltar in 1540 by Barbarosso, extensive military works were built there by order of Charles V

In 1704 the promontory was cap-tured by a combined force under Sir George Rooke and the Prince of Hesse-Darmstadt, fighting for the Archduke Charles of Austria. The moment it fell into their hands the British admiral threw off the alliance with the Aus trians and took complete possession of the works.

British possession since that time has been unbroken, although it under a Spanish siege for nearly three years and eight months, beginning in 1779. Twice the garrison was on the point of falling because of the starvation of its defenders.

Right on the Job.
At the time Dewey captured the Philippine Islands there was only one lighthouse in operation in the Philippine waters—that on Cape Melville, Balabac island, south of the island of Palawan and marking the entrance be-tween the China sea and the Sulu sea. As is the custom in time of war, the Spanish authorities had ordered all lighthouses to have their lights extin-guished when it was discovered that an attack on Manila was threatened by the American navy. It appears that this order was carried out at all other places except at the lighthouse men-tioned above, where the order was never received. The keeper of this light kept his light burning up to June 30, 1899, without assistance, and was paid for his services from May 1, 1899, to that data by the Philipping governto that date by the Philippine govern-ment.—Philippines Monthly.

Fourierism.

Fourierism was a social system founded by Charles Fourier, born in France 1772, died 1837. Fourier advocated co-operative industrialism, cou-pled with the idea that society should be organized into "phalanges." The phalange was to number about 1,600 persons, who were to live in a common building, with a certain portion of soil for cultivation. The staple industry was to be agriculture, but the various groups might devote them-selves to such as were best suited to their tastes. Several attempts were made to carry out Fourier's theories, but the result in each case was fail-ure.—New York American.

STEADY GAINS MADE BY STERLING BANK.

Annual Statement Shows Bank in Strong Position. Number of Shareholders increased to 1709.

holders increased to 1709.

The Annual Statement of the Sterling Bank of Canada just issued, shows that this conservative, yet progressive, young institution did very well in its year's operations. While up to the present time not much has been heard about the Sterling, still it has gone along very quietly, building around itself a very strong chain of branches throughout the Province of Ontario, and has already rounded out its organization by branches in Montreal and Winnipeg. That its branches must be well located is indicated from the showing they were able to make during the past year when, as is generally known, banking conditions, more particularly in Ontario, were somewhat unsettled. The Sterling's net profits for the year amounted to \$96,825.00, equal to 10.25 per cent. on the capital, which compares with \$92,832.00 in the previous year and \$64,146.00 in 1909. Out of the net profits the sum of \$47,025.00 was applied to payment of dividends, while the balance with what was carried forward from the previous year, making a total of \$85,245.00, was applied to profit and loss account. The total surplus and undivided profits now amount to \$366,862.00 as compared with \$317,150.00 at the end of 1910.

The general statement shows the steady headway the Sterling has made during the past few years, the total assets now standing at \$7,202,341.00, which compares with \$4,304,368.70 at the end of 1908 and \$3,428,956.13 at the end of 1907. The total deposits are now \$4,950,047.00 as compared with \$2,583,691.45 at the end of 1908 and \$3,428,956.13 at the end of 1907. The report of the Board of Directors showed that dwing to the somewhat unsulvant of the somewhat

The report of the Board of Directors showed that, owing to the somewhat unfavorable banking conditions which had prevailed more especially in Ontario duration the past year, a great measure of coning the past year, a great measure of con-servation had been maintained. This resulted in the bank having at all times very large reserves on hand. Notwith-standing the fact that the resources had

standing the fact that the resources had been harbored in a most careful manner, the percentage of earnings to capital were the largest in the history of the bank, having amounted to 10.25 per cent. on the capital.

A feature of the statement which rather indicates the high esteem in which the bank is held throughout the country, is that during the course of such a year as the last has been, the list of shareholders increased by some forty, now reaching a total of 1709 as compared with 1669 at the end of the previous year.

The entire Board of Directors was reelected with Mr. G. T. Somers as President and Mr. W. K. George as Vice-President.

Intensive Farming and Conservation.

Conservation has become one of the watchwords of the day. In the youth of a country like the United States or Canada, natural resources seem to be illimitable, and the only problem is to kill the game, to cut down the trees, to make the rich soil yield its increase, and to discover and extract mineral wealth. As population is augmented, the demand grows, and it is perceived that there is a limit to the supply. Thus arises the question of conserving and of re-

newing the store. In the case of mineral wealth there is at present no known means of restoration or renewal. In the case of forest wealth, there is a process of restoration, which is extremely slow as compared with consump tion and destruction. In the case of field crops and farm animals, there is something like an equal race between demand and supply; and hence the problem of conservation as applied to agriculture is intricate and interesting. It is dealt with by Mr. C. C. James, the Deputy Minister of Agriculture for this Province, in an address on agricultural work for Ontario. Mr. James says that the aim of science is intensive agriculture and the production of high-grade food. In Europe there is intensive farming, because land is dear and labor is cheap. In Ontario land is cheap and labor is dear. In Europe farming is intensive because of necessity and the hard teaching of experience. In Ontario intensive farming must be the result of foresight, and of tries will become old, and that Ontario must eventually face the prob-

lems of France and Germany. Having this purpose in view the Ontario Department of Agriculture carries on a campaign for drainage, for the care and improvement of orchards, for the raising of the standard of farm animals. Mr. James says that it is "not so much a ques tion of conserving our labor. What we are aiming at is to make the labor now being expended more effective." It is recognized that the resources of the soil, if not infinite, are capable of enormous expansion by scientific methods. It is the policy of agricultural scientists to co-operate with farmers in increasing the supply of food. "If we are to get all, or a majority, of our farmers to drain their land, to sow the best seeds, to care for their orchards, to test their cows, to raise only profitable stock, and, in brief, to get the best results for the expenditure of labor, we must get into close personal touch with them and give sympathetic direction to their work." The population of the earth steadily increases, the area of land is stationary, and, consequently, the greatest problem of the future, so far as our material interests are concerned, is that of making the soil yield the maximum quantity



Odd but Effective Way of Attaching a

Then he allowed fifteen minutes for the money to be forth-coming, vowing that if it were not produced within that time he would put steam to his boat and drag the house into the river.

The thieves knew that he would keep his word, and the money was promptly produced.

PRESENCE OF MIND.

Earl Kept His Head, and the Highwayman Lost His.

The Lion of St. Mark.
The symbol of the Venetian republic -the famous lion of St. Mark—is made of bronze. There is a tradition among the Venetian people that its eyes are diamonds. They are really white, agates, faceted. Its mane is most elaborately wrought, and its retracted, caping mouth and its fierce mustaches give it an oriental aspect. The creature as it now stands belongs to many different epochs, varying from some date previous to our era down to this century. It is conjectured that it may have originally formed a part of the decoration of some Assyrian palace. St. Mark's lion it certainly was not originally, for it was made to stand level upon the ground and had to be raised up in front to allow the evangel to be slipped under its fore paws.

The Very Oldest Inn.
Which is the oldest inn in England? The title deeds of the Saracen's Head at Newark date back to 1341, and local antiquaries cite documentary evidence to prove that the Seven Stars at Manchester existed before the year 1356. There is even a legend that the wife of Earl Godwin stayed at the Fountain at Canterbury in 1029. "But what are all these compared with the Fighting Cock at St. Albans, mentioned in 'Old Country Inn,' and said to be the oldest inhabited house in England? A few years ago its signboard modestly chronicled the fact that it had been rebuilt after the flood."
