The mutterings of the dying rebellion are still heard. The despatches have now, however, lost their absorbing interest to the general public. The capture and with it the subduing of the half-breed part of the trouble knocked the bottom out of the war. Big Bear will probably continue to give some or no trouble for some little time to come, but he cannot last in the arena, or more correctly speaking, will be shot or starved to death before the interesting developments will no doubt come to light, and with them the true inwardness of the rebellion.

Hundreds of such women are scattered all over the large cities, entirely ignorant of the kind of premises they enter. Once in ten of ten are driven into a life of shame. The punishment for such iniquities should be commensurate to the offence—life imprisonment would be none too great.

Regarding "greenwood's" inquiry in another column. A fire insurance company cannot escape its liability through insolvency, unless it can be proved that the fire was caused to secure the insurance. There is no doubt that scores of buildings are being burned down in order to defraud the insurance companies, and annually nine out of ten are successful. There is also no doubt that many fires being burned down to secure the insurance. These matters, a chance word often causes untold injury.

The local government met on the 1st inst., to consider three proposals made by different companies for the consolidation of our railways under one management. One was from a company of English capitalists represented in the city by Mr. A. Scott, another by the Windsor and Annapolis R. Co., and the third from parties associated with the Maine Central Railroad. The last named company we learn, proposed the most comprehensive scheme, viz:—The purchase of the Windsor & Annapolis and Western Counties lines; the construction of a connecting link between these lines, from Annapolis to Digby, a distance of 25 miles; the building of an admirably constructed line to all the western counties, from the extreme western shore of Nova Scotia to Lunenburg, making connections with the shore towns of Shelburne and Liverpool; and the establishment of a line of steamers from Halifax, to make connections with the new road, and with Yarmouth and the Maine Central at Portland and some other port close to the latter. So far as can be ascertained, the other two proposals embrace only the consolidation of the Windsor and Annapolis railways, and the building of the connecting link between them. It is unnecessary to discuss the English proposal as it offers to put any considerable amount of money into the enterprise without asking for a large guarantee by the government on their bonds, both other proposals submitted asking for heavy guarantees. It is therefore believed that the English proposal will be the one entertained most favorably.

The government's decision will be looked forward to with much interest. As the nature of the different schemes remain to a great extent indefinite, it would of course be premature to have any expression of opinion in the matter.

The St. John Globe says:—Recent developments in the wheat market seem to point to the fact that wheat has reached its highest point, notwithstanding the crop was reported for some time at a rapid rate. This, no doubt, is due to the large visible supply, and the poor prospects in the United States. Four in St. John has declined 50 cts. per bush. from the extreme highest point it reached during the "boom." Biscuits fell off a cent per bush.

A Peculiar Case.

A curious case, which is involved in a city banking institution, an English insurance company and a New Glasgow hotel proprietor, is to be heard at the supreme court session in Pictou in a few days.
