SCENES AND INCIDENTS IN A MEDICAL SCHOOL FOR WOMEN—LIKE THE BOYS, THE GIRLS HAVE THEIR FUN—THE PROFESSOR QUIZZES HER CLASS.

A half-score of blooming young lady students, with Mother Hubbard aprons stretching from their necks to their dainty feet, and large silk handkerchiefs tied about their heads like turbans, stood last night around a large marble-top table in one of the third-story front rooms of the Women's Medical College on North College avenue, says the Philadelphia Record.
