ANNAPOLIS SS. The Municipal Council ANNUAL SESSION 1908

(Continued from last issue.)

Upon reading the petition of Chas. T. Morton and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County of Annapolis praying for the appointment of a Committee of disinterested ratepayers to lay out and mark a public road and landing leading from the main Post Road the Eastern side of Deep Brook through property of C. W. Dittmers to a point on the East side of Deep Brook most suitable for a public landing.

Councillor Healey moved that the consideration of the petition as read, be deferred until the April session, seconded by Councillor Grimm. Moved by Councillor Armstrong, seconded by Councillor Rawling in amendment that the prayer of said petition be granted; amendment carried. Edward Bartheaux, Chas. Morton and Wallace Berry were named as a Committee.

Upon reading the petition of John A. Fraser and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County of Annapolis, praying for a road to be laid out from a point at or near Beal's Lake in Ward 10, to intersect the Liverpool Road at or near McKay Brook so called in the District of Graywood and on motion it was ordered that the prayer of said petition as read be granted and that Commissioners be appointed to enquire into the property and necessity of said road, and report.

Ordered that David B. Wright, Elder Fraser and J. B. Whittman be the Committee at the April session.

Upon reading the petition of Agnes M. Shaw and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County of Annapolis, praying for a new road, extending from the main Post Road where the same is intersected by the line between said Agnes Shaw's and Edmund Clark's land and extending Northwardly in a straight line three rods wide until it reaches the Beacons field road so called.

Ordered that the consideration of said petition be deferred until Wednesday afternoon.

Ordered that the matter of a deed of a right of way across the lands of Steadman Newcomb and others of this Municipality be referred to the Committee on tenders and public property to be reported on by the said Committee sometime during this session.

Ordered that whereas Chapter 70 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, Section 89, and amendments thereto provides that Councillors may receive three dollars a day instead of two dollars as heretofore that the Councillor for the Municipality be paid three dollars per day.

Ordered that Chippman Kempton be Revisor for Ward 14, in the place of Wm. McBride deceased.

Ordered that the Council be adjourned until tomorrow, Wednesday morning at ten o'clock.

Wednesday morning the Council met at ten o'clock. All Councillors present. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Ordered that the report of the Committee on tenders and public property as read be received and adopted.

Assessment Question

Discussed by A. L. Davison and Patriot.

To the Editor of the Sentinel—

"Elector's" latest contribution to the Monitor in defence of the absurdly inadequate assessment of favored classes in this county, consists of a very disingenuous attempt to have conclusions upon imaginary premises.

He says that if the houses of the Davison Lumber Company are occupied by yearly tenants they should not be assessed to the owners. It would be quite as relevant to assert that if these houses were used as places of public worship they would be exempt from assessment altogether.

It evidently would afford "Elector" great satisfaction to see the hard work of employees of the company, who happen to be in temporary occupation of the taxation upon these houses so long as the wealthy corporation of foreigners might escape this quite in harmony with his creed and the universal practice in this county that the working man shall pay the taxes for himself and his wealthy neighbor as well. It is no objection to his theory, in "Elector's" eye that he has not the slightest reason for supposing these men to be yearly tenants and consequently liable to assessment.

Under the modest appellation of "Patriot," another correspondent to the Monitor exhibits his patriotism by also defending this discrimination in favor of a corporation of foreigners at the expense of the people of this county.

Permit me to call a sample pearl from this writer's casket of rhetorical jewels—

"In scriptural times, David we are told, became enamored with the wife of one Uriah and in order to get rid of Uriah, he (David) thrust him in front of the battle where he soon got killed and David flirted with the widow all undisturbed. It cannot be that Mr. Davidson in this imaginative warfare that he is waging in this letter is trying to get Mr. Daniels, Mr. Pickup and Mr. Clarke in the front of the battle and get if he could succeed in getting them vanquished how quickly would he be found nesting in the bosom of his beloved party all oblivious we fear to the ills which infest society."

The only weak thing about this passage is its application. If it is to be taken figuratively then I suppose I am compared to David, Messrs. Daniels, Pickup and Clarke to Uriah, and the Conservative party to Uriah's wife. Manifestly it would require a bold flight of imagination to picture the Conservative party wedded to either Mr. Daniels, Mr. Pickup or Mr. Clarke. However, any such unholy alliance does exist, while I would not recommend murder, in the interests of that party I certainly would advise that immediate steps be taken to procure a divorce.

If it is the intention of "Patriot" to impute to me the heinous sin of David, or to infer that I am in the relationships of my neighbors, I wish in the most emphatic manner to deny the charge. What it may be said in palliation of David's crime that unlike some modern imitators, he at least gave poor Uriah a chance for his life. I have no ambition to follow the Patriotic into any such shady transaction. So far as I know no man ever

It has been announced that the shareholders of the Sovereign Bank are to be called upon to pay the double liability but will actually receive something on their shares. They are more fortunate than the others who have been mixed up with bank crashes.

It is proposed by the representatives in the British Isles to appoint active, energetic, commercial agents in the principal business centres of Canada. This is regarded as a panacea for British industry to claim a fair share of Canadian trade. It is believed that the same thing will be done by the representative businessmen of France at an early day.

Dr. Grenfell is now in the United States telling the story of the mission among deep sea fishermen in Labrador. For sixteen years the Dr. has carried on the work in Labrador. He has built four hospitals, established seven cooperative stores, a saw mill and coöperage that supports one hundred families, and a seal-skin boot factory which exported last summer 1,500 pairs of boots. New York city now boasts the Grenfell Association of America.

"OUIDA" DEAD IN ABJECT POVERTY.

Florence, Jan. 25.—Ouida "Louise De La Ramee, the novelist, died today at Varenago, after a long illness. She died in most distressing poverty, her only attendant being an old servant woman in whose arms she expired. She was completely blind in one eye and the other eye was badly affected from her having suffered so much from exposure and privation. During the last few months of her life she was compelled at times to sleep in the open air, being unable to pay for a night's lodging. The immediate cause of her death is set down as asthma, complicated by heart disease.

Ouida had a passionate love for dogs and up to the very last was surrounded by many of them, depriving herself of even the necessities of life to feed them.

The minister of instruction sent her on several occasions recently considerable contributions which had been subscribed for her aid.

Louisa La Ramee was born at Pury St. Edmunds about 1840. Her pseudonym "Ouida" is a childish mispronunciation of "Louise." Her best novel was "Under Two Flags," and was dramatized only recently.

Ouida has lived for a long time past near Florence. Her death occurred not far from the beach where the poet, Percy Bysshe Shelley was drowned. Early last summer attention was called through despatches to the London papers to Ouida's poverty. Marie Corelli started a fund for her benefit and subscriptions were made by several others on her behalf, but Ouida announced her intention of refusing the charity. Reports regarding her ill-health were also published about the same time, but later she appeared to recover.

GATLINGS FOR JAPS.

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 25.—The Asiatic Exclusion League wants the city to purchase a few gatlings for use in preserving the peace if another outbreak with the Japanese should occur in Vancouver. One man declares that a Maxim machine gun is now quartered by the Japanese on Powell street.

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 25.—A dispatch says that immigration agent has received an official notice that the new rule requiring immigrants to book direct from their native country or their country of adoption to Canada, goes into effect immediately and remains until conditions in the labor market have changed.

The Lloyd Manufacturing Company is a concern of no mean proportions. It has paid in wages, etc., during the past twenty years (and which is a direct benefit to the town) a total sum of \$250,000.00. The monthly wage bill of this concern is about \$700.
