Mr. Mackenzie King introduced a Bill, No. 1, An Act respecting the administration of Oaths of Office, which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported, That when the House did attend His Excellency the Governor General this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament, and to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy which he read to the House as follows:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

It affords me much pleasure to greet you upon the resumption of your Parliamentary duties.

The interval which has elapsed since the last Session witnessed the Coronation, in the month of May, of Their Majesties King George the Sixth and Queen Elizabeth. The event was one of special significance to the nations of the British Commonwealth. In the Coronation service and ceremonial, recognition was given to the relationship between the Sovereign and his peoples in the several Dominions, as embodied in the Statute of Westminster.

Members of the Government participated in the deliberations of the Imperial Conference which followed immediately after the Coronation. The Summary of Proceedings of the Conference will be placed before you at an early date for your consideration. It is the belief of the Government that the opportunities afforded for the exchange of views and information on questions of common interest and concern, will serve to further the well-being of all parts of the Commonwealth.

It is gratifying to note that, during the past year, there has been a further substantial advance in Canada's economic recovery. Revenues have reached new levels. Trade with other countries has materially expanded. There has been a general increase in employment and marked decrease in the numbers receiving unemployment aid.

The recurrence, in a more acute form, of drought conditions in certain areas of Western Canada has unfortunately made it necessary to provide assistance on an unprecedented scale. The Government intends to continue its activities under the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act.

In view of the success which has attended efforts to assist in the training of unemployed young people, it is proposed to extend the scheme during the coming year.

The Department of Agriculture has been reorganized and its services consolidated along lines designed to improve the Standard and acceptability of Canadian farm products.

Arrangements are being completed for the inauguration of a national trans-Canada air service.

The National Employment Commission, the Royal Commission appointed to inquire into conditions in the Textile Industry, and the Commission appointed under the provisions of the Veterans' Assistance Commission Act, 1936, have concluded their duties. The reports of these Commissions will be tabled in due course.

The strains and stresses, which economic and social developments since Confederation have placed upon Canada's governmental structure, have disclosed the necessity for adjustments which will enable it the more effectively to serve provincial and national needs, and to promote and preserve Canadian unity. My Ministers are of the opinion that, with exact and adequate information, it should be possible for the appropriate authorities to work out satisfactory solutions. As a first step towards this end, a Royal Commission of Inquiry has been appointed to re-examine the economic and financial basis of Confederation and the distribution of legislative powers in the light of the new conditions which have arisen in the past seventy years. The Commission has already held sittings in many parts of the Dominion.

The co-operation of the Provinces has been sought with a view to an amendment of the British North America Act, which would empower the Parliament of Canada to enact forthwith a national scheme of unemployment insurance. My Ministers hope the proposal may meet with early approval, in order that unemployment insurance legislation may be enacted during the present session of Parliament. Members of the House of Commons will be invited to consider the report of the Special Committee on Elections and Franchise Acts, and you will be asked to enact such legislation as may be necessary to implement such of the Committee's recommendations as meet with their approval.

A measure will be submitted to extend the authority of the Board of Railway Commissioners.

Legislation will be introduced with a view to furthering the principle of Parliamentary control of the export of electrical power.

The international situation generally continues to give much ground for anxiety. My Ministers have endeavoured, as opportunity has afforded, to promote international understanding and good-will. They have sought to join the efforts of Canada to those of other countries which are seeking by co-operation and conciliation to effect a settlement of questions and issues which concern the world's peace.

The Administration has followed with deep interest the course of the negotiations being conducted with a view to the conclusion of a trade agreement between the United Kingdom and the United States of America. My Ministers are fully alive to the importance of these negotiations, and to Canada's interest in their outcome.

In August last, the Canadian Government approached the Government of the United States with a view to extending and revising the trade agreement concluded between them in 1935. Exploratory conversations followed which have resulted in efforts to effect a new agreement on a broad and comprehensive basis. It is hoped that negotiations may so progress as to render it possible to submit the new agreement to Parliament, for its consideration, during the present Session.

With a number of other countries, adjustments have been made, during the past year, in our commercial relations in order to facilitate a wider exchange of commodities.

The Government is convinced that, in seeking to co-operate with the United Kingdom and other countries in efforts to promote international trade, it is pursuing one of the most effective means of ensuring economic security and progress in Canada, and the betterment of conditions in other parts of the world.

The Public Accounts of the last fiscal year and the Estimates for the coming year will be submitted for your consideration.

In inviting your careful consideration of the important matters which will engage your attention, I pray that Divine Providence may guide and bless your deliberations.

Mr. Speaker read to the House the following Messages from His Majesty the King:—

BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

Members of the Senate and of the House of Commons of Canada:

I thank you most sincerely for the assurances of loyalty and support contained in the Address which you have presented to me upon the occasion of my Accession to the Throne. It is the dearest wish of The Queen and myself that our Reign may be marked, under Divine Providence, by the blessings of peace and by a steady advancement in the welfare and prosperity of all our Peoples; and in our labours to this end we shall be strengthened and encouraged by the prayers and goodwill of the Canadian Parliament and People.

It is with feelings of deep gratitude that I acknowledge the message of loyalty and congratulation conveyed in your Address of the 10th April which was presented to me by my Prime Minister of Canada on the 11th May.

The assurances of loyalty and devotion addressed to us on that occasion will always be an encouragement to The Queen and myself in the performance of our high task.

We were glad to know that the Speakers of your two Houses were present at the solemn ceremony of our Coronation. The participation in that ceremony of representatives from our oversea Dominions fittingly marked the position of the Crown as symbolising the unity and free association of the peoples of the British Commonwealth.

On motion of Mr. Mackenzie King, a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Casselman, Gray, Mackenzie (Vancouver Centre), Power, and Woodsworth, was appointed to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, lists of members to compose the Standing Committees of this House under Standing Order 63.

Mr. Mackenzie King, delivered a message from His Excellency the Governor General, which was read by Mr. Speaker, as follows:—

The Governor General transmits to the House of Commons a certified copy of an approved Minute of Council appointing the Honourable T. A. Crerar, Minister of Mines and Resources, the Right Honourable Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, the Honourable Charles A. Dunning, Minister of Finance, and the Honourable W. D. Euler, Minister of Trade and Commerce, to act with the Speaker of the House of Commons as Commissioners for the purposes and under the provisions of Chapter 145 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, intituled: "An Act respecting the House of Commons."

Government House, Ottawa, 27th January, 1938. Mr. Speaker laid before the House the Report of the Joint Librarians of Parliament, which is as follows:---

To the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons:

The Joint Librarians of Parliament have the honour to submit their Report on the Library for 1937.

The preparation of the Supplementary Catalogue of books donated and purchased during the past year is well advanced and printed copies will be in the hands of Senators and Members shortly.

The superannuation of Mr. M. C. MacCormac, who had been in the Library for more than fifty years, led to some promotions of members of the staff and created a vacancy in the position of Registry and Shelving Clerk. After competitive examinations, the Civil Service Commission appointed Mr. Robert Morris Hamilton to the vacant position. Mr. Hamilton is a B.A. of McGill University and Bachelor of Library Science of McGill. He also held a Carnegie Fellowship at Columbia University in 1936-7.

The Index volume of the completed twenty volumes of the Dictionary of American Biography was received last November; and the Index to the very valuable set of the Private Papers of James Boswell (Isham Collection) has also been received. The last, and sixth, volume of the Encyclopædia of Canada, edited by W. Stewart Wallace, has now been shelved. Many new works on economics, international affairs, history, and so on, have been added to the Library. The one-volume edition of Audubon's "Birds of America" was recently purchased. It contains 500 Plates. Though reduced in size, the pictures of the birds are coloured, as nearly as possible, like those in Audubon's rare and valuable Elephant Folio edition, of which the Library is fortunate enough to possess a copy.

Amongst interesting donations to the Library during 1937 are the following:

"Art in Federal Buildings." This finely-illustrated volume was privately printed, though related to the United States Treasury Department's "Art Program," which has been in operation for two years. The Library is indebted to the sponsors of the book, and to the Canadian Legation at Washington, through whom it was received.

Another volume of the beautifully illustrated set of the Catalogue of Mr. F. J. Nettlefold's art collection has been donated this year. Also a further volume (No. 12) of the Letters of Sir Walter Scott has been received from an unknown donor.

In spite of numerous readjustments, referred to in former Reports, there is still some congestion in the Library, though the Librarians and staff are doing everything possible to make things convenient to users of the Library.

One petition was laid on the Table.

Mr. Vien, from the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

Your Committee has considered Bill No. 67 (Letter C of the Senate), intituled: "An Act respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway Company," and has agreed to report it without amendment.

Mr. Dunning, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,-Return to an Order of the House of March 31, 1938, for a Return showing:-

1. The yearly profit (or loss) of the Canadian Farm Loan Board since it was formed.

2. How many farm properties were acquired by the Board in each of the years 1935, 1936, and 1937 in, (a) Alberta; (b) Saskatchewan. 3. How many sales were held by the Board in each of the years 1936 and

1937 in, (a) Alberta; (b) Saskatchewan.

4. The total values of all lands held for sale by the Board at the end of the year 1937 in, (a) Alberta; (b) Saskatchewan.

Mr. Rinfret, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,-Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of February 28, 1938, for a copy of all correspondence exchanged between the Ministries of Public Works, Labour, Transport, or other Departments of Government, and the City of Toronto, in connection with the building of the Toronto Air Ports on the Toronto Island at Malton.

Also,-Return to an Order of the House of March 7, 1938, for a copy of all petitions, correspondence, and other documents, relating to the disallowance of the three Alberta Acts (August, 1937), the reservation of the three Alberta Bills (October, 1937), and the reports of the Minister of Justice on these Acts and Bills.

The names, addresses, occupations or business of persons, firms and corporations from whom such goods were purchased, with the quantities and value of such purchases from each person, persons, firm or corporation, showing prices paid and the points of delivery to the Government and points of distribution in the said provinces.

3. The total purchase price of such material.

4. The amount paid for freight on each class of goods.

5. The total cost of storage and handling at points of shipment.

6. The total cost of handling and storage at destination.

7. Cost of reshipment, including handling and freight from first destination in Saskatchewan to final destination.

8. Names, addresses and amounts paid to all persons engaged in, (a) dividing up and reparcelling each class of said goods; (b) distributing such goods; (c) warehousing. 9. Total amount paid for demurrage, and to whom.

10. The final points of shipment from which such goods were distributed.

11. The area described by municipalities or otherwise, within which such goods were distributed.

12. If such goods were distributed to those on relief only, or to the population in general.

13. The total cost of such shipment.

14. From what vote this money was paid.

15. The amount obtained by Governor General's Warrants for the purpose of providing for the costs of this distribution.

16. What amount of each class of such goods was produced in Saskatchewan in the year 1937.

17. What amount of each class of such goods was imported into Saskatchewan from other provinces of the Dominion, and from outside Canada, in the year 1937.

18. The part the Government played in the distribution of free goods contributed by persons, firms and corporations, to Saskatchewan, and the quantities of such goods handled or distributed by the Government or any official thereof.

19. The points in Saskatchewan where distribution of such contributed goods was made.

20. The instructions given officials of the Dominion Government in Saskatchewan with respect to the distribution of, (a) goods purchased and supplied by the Dominion Government; (b) goods supplied by voluntary contribution.

Also,—Return to Order of the House of March 7, 1938, for a copy of all letters, telegrams, correspondence, contracts, tenders and other documents in the possession of the government, dated during 1937, with respect to the proposed scheme under the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act, at Enchant, Alberta.

The Clerk of the House laid upon the Table the Twenty-seventh Report of the Clerk of Petitions, stating that he had examined the following petition presented on the 5th instant, and finds that it does not comply with Standing Order 68, in the following respect:—

The granting of this petition would involve the expenditure of public money which has not first been recommended by the crown. Therefore it should not be received.

Of Ellsworth Gillis, of Ellerslie, Prince Edward Island, praying that the issuing of leases to private interests in respect of oyster beds in Prince Edward Island tidal waters be discontinued; that certain areas be set aside for public fishing in Richmond Bay; that these areas be given the same assistance as leased areas; and that if these requests are not granted, the question of leasing fishing privileges in tidal waters of Prince Edward Island be referred to the Privy Council in England for decision.—Mr. MacLean (Prince).

Mr. Speaker decided,—That as the granting of the prayer of the petition would involve the expenditure of public money, it could not be received.

Sir Eugène Fiset, from the Standing Committee on Railways and Shipping owned, operated and controlled by the Government, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee recommends:-

1. That it be given leave to print, from day to day, 500 copies in English and 200 copies in French of its minutes of proceedings and evidence, and that Standing Order 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

2. That it be given leave to sit while the House is sitting.

3. That the quorum of the Committee be reduced from 12 to 10.

Mr. Dunning, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, of March 16, 1938, for a copy of all letters, telegrams and other documents exchanged between the Federal Government of Canada and the Provincial Government of Saskatchewan, during the years 1934 and 1935, dealing with the offer of the Federal Government to accept the whole financial responsibility for relief within certain areas of the Province of Saskatchewan.

Mr. Rogers, a Member of the King's Privy Council, laid before the House,— Copies of Orders in Council passed under the provisions of the Unemployment and Agricultural Assistance Act, 1937, as follows:—

Order in Council, P.C. 663, dated March 31, 1938: amending the Dominion-Saskatchewan Relief Settlement Agreement dated June 1, 1937, respecting the placement of settlers who may not have been self-supporting at the expiration of the two-years settlement period and for whom additional expenditures during the third year of settlement were found necessary.

Order in Council, P.C. 664, dated March 31, 1938: authorizing the Minister of Labour to modify as occasions may warrant certain agreements entered into between the Dominion and the respective provinces of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, under authority of Orders in Council dated January 13, 1938 (P.C.'s 76, 77, 78, 79, 80, 81, 82 and 83), in respect to expenditures by the provinces and municipalities in providing "Material Aid" (food, fuel, clothing and shelter).

Order in Council, P.C. 682, dated March 31, 1938: amending an agreement entered into between the Dominion and the Province of Ontario under authority of Order in Council, P.C. 2097, dated September 1, 1937, respecting certain relief works projects in Ontario.

Order in Council, P.C. 683, dated March 31, 1938: amending an agreement entered into between the Dominion and the Province of British Columbia under the authority of Order in Council, P.C. 1710, dated July 19, 1937, relative to Youth Training Projects—definitions of certain classes to receive aid.

Order in Council, P.C. 693, dated March 31, 1938: authorizing certain payments to the Eskimo inhabitants of the Province of Quebec.

Of C. E. Fox and 179 other residents of British Columbia, praying that no more fish trap licences be granted in British Columbia.—Mr. Neill.

Mr. Vien, from the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Mr. Beaubien, from the Select Committee appointed on Radio Broadcasting to consider the Annual Report of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and to review the policies of the Corporation with special reference to revenues, expenditures and development, presented the Second and Final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee held seven meetings and had as principal witnesses the Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Board of Governors and the General Manager. During seven sittings, an exhaustive examination was conducted. All information required by the Committee to carry out its terms of reference was supplied, confidential information not susceptible of publication in the public interest being made available privately. The Committee was impressed by the ability and frankness of the principal witnesses.

The bulk of the evidence concerned the program, technical and financial policies of the Corporation. Your Committee is of the opinion that these policies are well designed to carry out the purpose for which the Corporation was created. Your Committee is also of the opinion that the policies of the Corporation are being executed in a business-like fashion.

With respect to programs the Corporation's policy is to utilize Canadian talent in the development of Canadian programs of distinction and quality, and to make available to Canadians the best programs from the United States, Great Britain and elsewhere. With the resources at its disposal, your Committee believes the Corporation can give Canada satisfactory broadcasting service, while at the same time enabling Canada to create programs worthy of exchange.

With respect to the Corporation's plan of national coverage, involving the ownership of high power stations and the extension of CBC coverage to reach all parts of Canada, your Committee wishes to indicate its approval. It is considered that the development of this plan is of great importance in the national interest. Your Committee is of the opinion that while private stations will continue to serve a useful local purpose, the Corporation urgently requires its own comprehensive facilities for distribution. At the present time, large areas of Canada, particularly in the Maritimes, the Prairies and British Columbia, receive somewhat scant and spasmodic service of CBC programs. Your Committee is satisfied that the financial policies of the Corporation are sound and that the administration is being conducted in a prudent and efficient manner.

Your Committee considered carefully the present and future revenue requirements of the Corporation. It is of the opinion that present sources of revenue should be sufficient to maintain and develop the projected plan of national coverage.

With respect to revenue for capital purposes, your Committee is of the opinion that consideration should be given to the provision by loan or grant, of sufficient capital funds to enable the Corporation to complete its plan of national coverage at the earliest possible moment.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the present scale of licence fees of \$50 for privately owned broadcasting stations of hundred watts or under is adequate, but believes licence fees should be increased on higher powered stations servicing densely populated areas.

Your Committee recommends that the incidence of the application of the licence fee be carefully reviewed by the Department of Transport in the light of this year's experience, with a view of effecting a reduction of the licence fees.

Your Committee was impressed with the importance of the establishment, at an early date, of a high power short-wave broadcasting station. Such a station, your Committee believes, would be a great utility in interpreting and advertising Canada abroad and in facilitating an exchange of programs between Canada and other broadcasting systems. Canada, your Committee was informed, is the only major trading nation without such facilities. It is submitted this should be financed as a national project, operated and controlled by the Corporation.

Your Committee believes that the constitution of the Corporation, ensuring a proper division between policy and management and a degree of flexibility and independence essential to the medium of broadcasting, together with ultimate parliamentary control, is well suited to the purpose for which it was created. Public service broadcasting in Canada must necessarily continue to be free from partisan control, and your Committee is gratified to report that the activities of the CBC have been free from any nature of partisanship whatsoever. Your Committee also wishes to pay its tribute to the Governors of the Corporation for their vision, public spirit and efficient conduct of the trust imposed upon them by Parliament.

In conclusion, your Committee wishes to express its belief that the broadcasting system emerging in Canada is, and can increasingly be, an important factor in creating a sense of national unity and approves the general policy of concentrating on a national system of high power stations.

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 12, An Act to amend The Copyright Amendment Act, 1931, with amendments, which are as follows:—

1. Page 1, lines 20 to 31, inclusive. Leave out all the words from "Canada," to the end of the Clause.

2. Page 2, lines 1 to 18 inclusive. Leave out the whole of Clause 2.

3. Page 2, line 18. Insert the following as new Clauses 2, 3, 4 and 5:-

"2. (1) Section one of chapter twenty-eight of the statutes of 1936, and all provisions enacted thereby, are repealed.

(2) Paragraphs (vii) and (viii) of subsection one of section seventeen of the *Copyright Act*, as enacted by section six of chapter eight of the statutes of 1931, are repealed and the following paragraph is substituted therefor:—

'(vii) The performance without motive of gain of any musical work at any agricultural, agricultural-industrial exhibition or fair which receives a grant from or is held under Dominion, provincial or municipal authority, by the directors thereof.'

3. The Copyright Amendment Act, 1931, as amended by chapter twentyeight of the statutes of 1936 and by this Act, shall be read and construed with, and as part of, the Copyright Act.

4. Section ten-B of *The Copyright Amendment Act, 1931*, as amended by chapter twenty-eight of the statutes of 1936, is amended by adding thereto, as subsection six-a the following:—

'(6a) In respect of public performances by means of any radio receiving set or gramophone in any place other than a theatre which is ordinarily and regularly used for entertainments to which an admission charge is made, no fees, charges or royalties shall be collectable from the owner or user of the radio receiving set or gramophone, but the Copyright Appeal Board shall, so far as possible, provide for the collection in advance from radio broadcasting stations or gramophone manufacturers, as the case may be, of fees, charges and royalties appropriate to the new conditions produced by the provisions of this subsection and shall fix the amount of the same. In so doing the Board shall take into account all expenses of collection and other outlays, if any, saved or saveable by, for or on behalf of the owner of the copyright or performing right concerned or his agents, in consequence of the provisions of this subsection.'

5. Subsection one of section seventeen of the *Copyright Act* is amended by adding at the end of that subsection the following further proviso:—

'Further provided that no church, college, or school and no religious, charitable or fraternal organization shall be held liable to pay any compensation to the owner of any musical work or to any person claiming through him by reason of the public performance of any musical work in furtherance of a religious, educational or charitable object.'"

Of Andrew Edwards and 1,297 others, engaged in the inshore fishing industry in Halifax East and Halifax West, urging immediate reconsideration by the Government of trawler licensing.—Mr. Finn.

Sir Eugène Fiset, from the Standing Committee on Railways and Shipping owned, operated and controlled by the Government, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee has considered the following Items of the Supplementary Estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1939, referred to your Committee on May 20, and approves of same, viz:—

Item No. 633, Canadian National Railway Company, \$42,000,000.

Item No. 634, Prince Edward Island Car Ferry and Terminals, \$327,000. Item No. 635, Trans-Canada Air Lines, \$830,000.

Sir Eugène Fiset, from the Standing Committee on Railways and Shipping owned, operated and controlled by the Government, presented the Fourth and Final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee has considered the financial statements of the Canadian National Railways for the year ended December 31, 1937, including the Annual Report of the Canadian National Railway System, the Annual Report of the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, the First Annual Report of the Canadian National Railways Securities Trust and the First Annual Report of the Trans-Canada Air Lines.

Canadian National Railway System:

A substantial increase of \$11,786,119.23 is shown in the operating revenues, this being reflected in both freight and passenger traffic as well as in telegraph, express and mail service. Although the operating expenses increased by \$9,311,168.02, it is to be noted that two-thirds of this amount is accounted for in the two following items, viz: increase in prices of materials, \$3,000,000, and increased rates of pay to employees, \$2,800,000.

Whilst the vote of \$35,000,000 provided for cash deficit has been overexpended by approximately \$7,000,000, practically all of this over-expenditure, namely \$6,134,130, is reflected in the decrease of gross revenue from the transportation of grain grown in Western Canada. The situation in this regard is briefly summarized in the following paragraph of the Board of Directors' Report:—

"The effect of increased productivity in Canada upon the future revenues of the National System does not require to be stressed. An increase in productivity in any form of industry, including agriculture, at once reflects itself in the earnings of the system; and decreases in the volume of production affect seriously the gross revenues of the railway. The gross revenues of the Canadian National from the transportation of grain grown in Western Canada in the years 1925-1934 inclusive averaged \$22,000,000 per annum, the tons of grain carried averaging 5,000,000 during that ten year period. . . It will be noted that the gross revenues of the railway from the movement of Western Canada grain in 1937 were only 44 per cent of those obtained on the average during the ten year period ending in 1934."

One of the most acute problems in relation to the finances of the Canadian National Railways is undoubtedly the one reflected in the enormous amount of interest required to meet its funded debt. Of grave concern to your Committee is the comparatively high rate of interest charged on a portion of the securities involved in this indebtedness particularly on perpetual bonds and on others which are only callable in the very distant future.

Your Committee cannot urge too strongly that the whole funded debt structure of the Canadian National be thoroughly examined and that a determined effort be made to refund at a lower rate the issues bearing interest at a cost out of line with present conditions.

The situation created through the lack of terminal facilities in the city of Montreal was considered by your Committee. Inasmuch as the Statutes already contain an enabling Act in this regard, the consensus of opinion is to the effect that the project should receive further consideration.

Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships:

The operating revenues of the Company indicate further improvement during the year 1937. Both freight and passenger traffic show increased revenue. It is to be noted that after payment of bond interest, but before depreciation and interest on government advances, there is available \$188,537.75 to be paid in reimbursement in part of prior deficits and interests as compared to the amount of \$87,398.55 available for this purpose in 1936.

Canadian National Railways Securities Trust:

The first Annual Report submitted under the provisions of the Canadian National Railways Capital Revision Act, 1937, was duly considered by your Committee, the Chairman of the Trustees, Dr. W. C. Clark, Deputy Minister of Finance, being examined thereon. The report indicates that, as required under the Act, the Minister of Finance transferred to the Securities Trust the Canadian National Railways indebtedness to His Majesty together with the collateral securities held by the Minister in respect thereof, and that in exchange therefor the capital stock of the Securities Trust consisting of five million shares of no par value was issued to the Minister to be held on behalf of His Majesty.

Due to capital losses from certain line abandonments made by the Railway during the year 1937 in respect of which His Majesty has not made cash reimbursement to the Railway, the initial stated value of the capital stock was reduced by \$711,732.21, the authority provided in the Act for such action having been confirmed by an opinion of the Department of Justice.

It is also noted that with the approval of the Governor in Council, interest accruing after December 31, 1936, on the principal of the loans included in the indebtedness to His Majesty was waived by the Securities Trust until further orders by the Trustees.

In accordance with section 24 of the Capital Revision Act, the 1937-38 Public Accounts will, for the first time, set out in a separate appendix, an historical record of the accumulated railway cost to the Dominion since Confederation, regardless of whether the Parliamentary Votes were in the form of loans, grants, subsidies, guarantees or otherwise.

Trans-Canada Air Lines:

Most of the activities of the Trans-Canada Air Lines during the past year have been preliminary to operation. They indicate, however, that the objective of a first class air transport service across Canada will be achieved during the current year.

Assurance has been given your Committee that the service now operating in Western Canada will, in the near future, be extended to Montreal and from there to the Maritime Provinces, where a satisfactory service linking the principal cities in the maritimes is contemplated, the same as is being done for the cities in the Prairie Provinces.

The House resumed the Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Dunning,— That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Supply.

After further Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Moore, from the Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

By Order, February 14, 1938, the House of Commons instructed the Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, "to enquire into the practices of individuals, partnerships and companies making small loans on personal security and to consider the maximum rate of interest and charges which should be permitted for such loans."

Having already considered the legislative applications of several companies making small loans, your Committee had no illusion as to the difficulty of devising a wholly satisfactory relation of debtor and creditor. Times again your Committee had been reminded that usury is an ancient evil; and as often reminded, that despite the innumerable acts of Church and State the problem of usury is, in 1938, still unsolved.

If the legislative action contemplated by this Parliament is to be of substantial benefit to necessitous borrowers—something better than a vain repetition of the popular declaration against high interest—then it must begin within an understanding of the nature and volume of consumer's debt within our times. And the matter is not to be readily disposed of; for, paradoxical as it may seem, a rise of aggregate individual income has been accompanied by a rise of aggregate individual debt. Significantly enough, the country that has the world's best standard of living—the United States—has also the largest volume of consumer's debt (with an estimated fourteen billion dollars distributed in a single year).

To analyse the phenomenal growth of small loans within recent years has been impossible within the time at our disposal; but common observation indicates that the complexity of industry, with its intensified urbanization, and cyclic dips, has multiplied the uncertainties of life against which small loans are so commonly incurred; while the greatest single factor contributing to the volume of individual debt is the widespread practice of buying on the instalment plan. The practice of mass production resulted in a pressure for mass consumption, with a widely advertised acceptance of "a small payment down and the balance on easy terms." Thus a large load of modern debt is in the form of unpaid balances for goods already consumed or in the process of consumption. These debt charges do not come directly within our reference or, for that matter, do they ordinarily come within legislative action; while legislatures have everywhere meticulously concerned themselves over debts incurred by borrowing money, legislatures have not shown equal concern over debt incurred by the purchase of goods.

Whatever the legislative distinction; in practice, there is a relationship between merchandise credit and money credit that cannot be safely ignored in prescribing the rate of charges on borrowed money. A strict comparison of the rates of merchandise credit with cash credit is difficult, if not impossible, largely because the cash price of goods so often bears a portion of the credit cost. However, it is safe to say that the two branches of consumers' credit are to some extent interchangeable. Upon evidence submitted to the Committee, some of the money loaned at rates exceeding 2 per cent a month was borrowed to effect reductions in payment for goods, especially to avoid penalties under instalment plans of payment. And evidently there is a wide variation in the rates of charges involved in instalment sales. The Committee was told that rates as high as 186 per cent per annum had been paid by Nova Scotian fishermen in the purchase of fishing equipment on six months credit; while on certain household equipment the rate involved in instalment sales is about 12 per cent per annum.

That the search for a "reasonable" rate of interest should have continued over the ages is largely due to the application of the word "interest" to dissimilar uses. When money is loaned at the rate of, say, three per cent per annum, it is off-hand confusing to find money also loaned at three per cent a month. And yet, under competitive economy, the spread between interest rates should be accounted for, with almost mathematical precision. While under our present economic system we have imperfect competition, it is manifest that given a sum of \$100,000 for investment the rates on its return will necessarily differ as to whether the sum is say: (a) invested in a block of Canadian Government bonds, (b) loaned to 50 landowners secured by first mortgages, or (c) distributed in lots of \$200 to 500 people in nondescript occupations on personal security.

The rates paid respectively by governments, farmers and consumers differ primarily because the owners of capital are primarily concerned over the safety of their capital while it is out of their possession. In a theoretical sense, "pure interest" may be described as the return on riskless investment; in its commonly accepted sense, "interest" carries a rate designed as insurance for the safety of the sum loaned. A capital borrowed for the express purpose of being consumed necessarily carries a higher rate of insurance than capital borrowed for the further production of capital. And small loans referred to in the Reference of the House are largely designed for consumption, although a distinction between uses (e.g. expenditure for a motor car) is not to be sharply drawn.

The reduction of risk (and consequent reduction of charge on the loan) by the pledge of tangible security does not require laboured comment; the effect on the rate should normally be in proportion to the convertibility of the security into the value of the payment called for under the contract. The small loans within our Reference are made on personal security; and our proposals for the relief of necessitous borrowers have been directed towards establishing facilities by which the value of personal security can be determined with the least possible expense. A.D. 1938

While loans on personal security are made for diverse purposes, as set out in our records, and contain different degrees of risk, they possess two common features that affect the element of cost, namely: "size" and "time". i.e. they are small loans, made for short terms. Quite obviously the purchase of a block of twelve-year Canadian Government bonds requires little expenditure for investigation, and none for supervision; investments on 50 farm mortgages, for varied periods, entail considerable cost for both investigation and supervision; while the investigation of 1,000 applications to effect loans to 500 people for a few months, with meticulous supervision, becomes expensive business when expressed as a percentage rate of \$100 on a monthly basis.

To that phase of the matter namely, the cost of service, your Committee devoted special attention in an endeavour to find in efficiency of specialized financial organization the means of reducing the charges on small loans.

Enquiry was first directed to the country's usual loan channels. The chartered banks have always served their customers with small loans, on personal security, and, at an early stage of its proceedings, your Committee invited the President of the Canadian Bankers' Association to state the disposition of the chartered banks toward an expansion of the service. Following American practice, inaugurated some few years ago, the Canadian Bank of Commerce established in June, 1936, a personal loan department, and up to date has made 60,423 loans for a total amount of \$8,800,000. The cost to the borrower is made up of a discount of 6 per cent per annum and a service charge varying from 50 cents to \$3, depending on the amount of the loan. The result is a total charge of about 1 per cent a month on a loan for 12 months (excluding provision for penalties). The Small Loan Department of the bank has so far been unprofitable even without making any interest charge for the loaning funds supplied by the bank.

The contribution to our enquiry by the President of the Bankers' Association, Mr. S. G. Dobson, and by Mr. James Stewart, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, is appreciated by the Committee.

Your Committee discussed at length a proposal that Parliament should encourage the chartered banks to expand their personal loan services; but it was the concensus of opinion that such action should not be taken without carefully considering the effect on general banking policy. The Canadian banking system is generally regarded as organized to finance industrial productive effort and facilitate the movements of trade and commerce; and, as illustrated by the restriction of loans on real estate, banking regulations are expressly designed to maintain the liquidity of banking assets.

Before encouraging Canadian banks to engage upon a greater volume of consumers' credit, it would appear to be the part of wisdom to have further information as to the relation between consumers' credit and business depressions. Quite obviously unemployment creates difficulty in the discharge of debt-obligations; and it is then—when threatened with financial crisis—that Canada depends upon its banking system to preserve its social solvency.

As custodians of the people's savings, it may well be that the chartered banks should not be called upon to arrange their investments so that, in the unfortunate event of crisis, we should find public savings converted into small loans on personal security which, under normal conditions are regarded as tolerably safe only when administered by highly specialized organization.

Nor was it established to our satisfaction that borrowers would gain (and, in fact, may lose) by the substitution of an interest rate of 1 per cent a month for the banks' usual rate of 6 to 7 per cent per annum. True, the rate of 1 per cent a month is low as compared with the rates usually charged by companies engaged exclusively in loaning small amounts on personal security; but the bank requires an endorsation that many borrowers cannot provide; and it is assumed the bank rejects applications that contain a substantial element of risk or present the prospect of undue cost in supervising collection.

Evidence was presented by Mr. Cyrille Vaillancourt as to the experience of the Credit Unions in the Province of Quebec—the home of the Canadian co-operative loan movement. Commencing in 1900 "Caisses Populaires" (or Credit Unions) were organized in that province and, by March 1st, 1938, there were 393 unions in operation with loan balances outstanding of some \$7,300,000. The rate of interest charged for loans varies from 6 per cent to 7 per cent per annum, the average rate being 5 per cent while deposits are received from members with interest at an average rate of between $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent and 3 per cent per annum.

The experience of credit unions in the province of Nova Scotia was outlined to the Committee by Professor A. B. MacDonald of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N.S. The unions date back to about 1933 and since then 120 unions have been formed in the province. Loans made by the unions, in 1937, amount to approximately \$750,000. The average rate of interest charged on loans is between 6 per cent and 7 per cent per annum with interest paid on members' deposits averaging from 2 per cent to 3 per cent per annum.

The President of the Civil Service Co-operative Society, Ottawa, Mr. S. Rettie, stated that the Society operated from 1908 to 1928 as an unincorporated association, but in the latter year became incorporated under the Co-operative Credit Societies Act of Ontario. The loans of the Society outstanding amount to about \$300,000; the interest rate on loans on personal security is 7 per cent per annum; while the interest allowed on members' deposits is 3 per cent with a bonus from profits which amounted to 2 per cent per annum in 1937—a net rate of 5 per cent per annum. The thanks of the Committee are due to Messrs. Vaillancourt, MacDonald and Rettie for their assistance.

Your Committee expresses gratification with the progress made by co-operative credit institutions but observes that co-operative credit has been successful, in Canada, as elsewhere, only in proportion to the existence of a measure of homogenity in social, religious and economic relations. There were members of the Committee who expressed the opinion that Parliament should subsidize educational work for the spread of co-operative credit; but the majority of the Committee held that this admirable objective—essentially local is better left with the provinces.

Before turning to other sources of credit-supply it seems desirable to emphasize the plain fact that the satisfaction of human wants is to be but imperfectly supplied by credit. The unhappy lot of those who have a deficit economy, in the sense that they are chronically unable to live within their incomes, is not to be bettered by borrowing (no matter the rate). There were members of the Committee who suggested that a deficit economy is to be remedied by change in the monetary system; while others contended that betterment could be brought about only by change in the social order; but with those contentions we are not presently concerned. Evidence submitted on behalf of the Canadian Welfare Council, by Miss Charlotte Whitton and for the Bureau of Legal Aid by Mr. J. A. Edmison, Montreal, indicated that for such people commercial loans are a doubtful palliative and certainly not a solution of the problem of life.

Having concluded that the combined facilities of chartered banks and co-operative credit associations were insufficient to supply a legitimate demand for small loans, on personal security, the Committee turned for information to the experience of the United States where (as already observed) the greatest development has been made both in the volume of credit and, as well, in legislative action designed to provide an adequate credit-supply. The results of the investigation of the Russell Foundation in the field of small loans is of common knowledge. As a result of its study, the Foundation created a department of Remedial Loans and, in 1916, issued a draft bill subsequently known as the Uniform Small Loan Law embodying principles summarized by Mr. Rolf Nugent for the American Academy of Political and Social Science (The Annals, March, 1938) as follows:—

(1) to require those engaged in the business of lending money in sums of \$300 or less at rates of charge in excess of the general statutory maximum rate, to be licensed, bonded and supervised by a public officer; (2) to authorize a relatively high rate of charge for such loans by licensed lenders and to require all charges to be expressed as a monthly interest rate; (3) to require licensees to keep records, to give the borrower a full statement of the terms of his contract, to return cancelled securities upon completion of the contract, and to comply with other conditions designed to prevent abuses or to facilitate their detection; (4) to regulate the use of certain forms of security; and (5) to make a public officer responsible for the enforcement of the act and to provide severe penalties for infraction.

Since 1916 the Foundation has issued several drafts of legislation but the principles of licence and supervision by the State have been preserved and, by 1937, legislation embodying those principles had been adopted by more than half the states of the Union. In an effort to learn how far the procedure laid down by the Foundation could be made helpful in Canada your Committee asked the Foundation to name an economist familiar with the subject and, in response to the request, Mr. Leon Henderson appeared before your Committee and gave a most helpful statement of the practice of the personal finance companies in the United States. Mr. Henderson's evidence is duly reported in the Committee's proceedings.

Your Committee was the more interested in the enactments of the several states because personal finance companies, organized under American practice, had (1932) extended their operations to Canada, and obtaining incorporation by the Parliament of Canada, had come under regulation after the general pattern adopted in the United States.

Desiring information as to the administration of the Uniform Small Loan Law in the United States, your Committee asked the State of Iowa to name an official with experience in administration, and your Committee desires to express its thanks to the State of Iowa for assistance rendered by Mr. R. L. Bunce, Deputy Superintendent of Banking of Iowa. There are some 100 licensed lenders in Iowa operating about 120 licensed offices; the minimum capitalization permitted for a lender is \$5,000 and the opinion was expressed that an increase in this minimum capitalization to \$20,000 or \$25,000 would probably facilitate a reduction in the rate charged to borrowers. Mr. Bunce was of the opinion that only by strict regulation and an adequate rate could the public be protected against excessive rates.

Conditions in Canada and the United States are in several respects dissimilar. And over one feature of dissimilarity your Committee has been gravely concerned; namely, the basic matter of jurisdiction. In the United States jurisdiction over interest is with the states; in Canada jurisdiction over interest is with the Federal Government; while certain jurisdiction over "property and civil rights in the provinces" is with the provinces.

As a result of divided jurisdiction, federal and provincial laws designed to correct the abuses associated with small loans have been so far largely ineffective.

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The borrower's initial interest lies in a clear-cut statement of the total obligations contained in the loan contract and much of the abuse connected with personal finance has plainly arisen from the incapacity of borrowers to decipher the arithmetic of credit contracts. The confusion has been confounded by specious advertising with combinations of charges so intricate that even mathematicians have trouble in arriving at the actual burden of the borrower. To correct that condition your Committee recommends that the maximum rate permitted on small loans should be expressed as a *total charge* to the borrower i.e. a rate that shall include interest, or discount, and all expenses and charges whether for commission, brokerage, chattel mortgage, recording fees, enquiries, defaults, renewals, fines, penalties and all other charges whatsoever, whether those charges are paid to or charged by the lender or to or by any person. In ascertaining the rate on any loan, regard should be had to any collateral contract or document by which the charges imposed under the loan—contract or the terms of the repayment of the loan are effectively varied.

With a view of determining the matter of jurisdiction, the Committee asked for an expression of opinion from the Department of Justice and were advised by Mr. F. P. Varcoe, K.C., as follows:

First: That a project for the regulation of money lenders which would fall short of complete control would probably be inadequate and almost useless.

Secondly: That the Department concluded to advise the Committee as to the powers of Parliament by reference to a feasible project as follows:—

No sum in excess of X per cent of the principal sum loaned shall be exacted from the borrower as:—

1. Interest, that is to say compensation for the use of money and for the risk of its total or partial loss; and

2. Service charges, whether genuine or interest disguised as such; and

3. Disbursements, real or fictitious; and any sum exacted in excess of such per cent shall be deemed oppressive and usurious, exposing the lender to criminal proceedings and invalidating the contract.

Furthermore, if the lender requires the borrower to make any expenditure—that is, imposes an obligation on the borrower to obtain a chattel mortgage, let us say, or make any expenditure to a third person—in connection with the loan as a result of which the cost of the loan exceeds the aforesaid X per cent, the lender shall likewise be guilty of an offence and the contract invalidated.

Dealing with the items of charge mentioned in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3, viz., interest, charges and disbursements of the lender, the projected provisions are justifiable constitutionally, first, as being legislation in relation to interest, or as being indispensably or reasonably ancillary to interest legislation.

The differentiation between true interest charges and service charges is so difficult (they are in many cases probably indistinguishable) and the possibility of disguising interest as other charges is so great that it becomes indispensably or reasonably necessary to regulate or fix these charges in order to make good the interest restriction and there appears to be no reason why the ancillary doctrine may not be relied on notwithstanding that the restriction of the rate of interest and the ancillary restriction of the service charges are contained in one and the same restrictive regulation. Further, the principal ingredient in the gross sum charged the borrower is interest and if Parliament fixes a maximum gross charge, it must be presumed that if the sum is exceeded an excessive interest charge is being made; therefore, the fixing of a gross maximum charge constitutes a limitation of the rate of interest.

The imposition of a gross maximum charge would have this effect, that in each case the interest ingredient therein would be fixed by reference to the other ingredients. It is arguable that by this means there would be a fixing of the interest charged in each case.

Then again, it is to be borne in mind that interest is not only compensation for the use of money but also compensation for accepting the risk of loss. The service charges, for example chattel mortgage expenses, are, theoretically at any rate, made to protect the lender against loss. Parliament, therefore, in restricting certain c. the charges which the lender can make against the borrower is limiting the compensation for accepting the risk of loss and so is legislating in relation to interest or at the worst is enacting legislation necessarily ancillary to interest legislation.

It is noteworthy in this connection that, in England, parliament, when legislating respecting loan societies and money lenders, found it necessary to prohibit the making of charges for expenses (Money Lenders Act, 1927, s. 12, and Loan Societies Act, 1840, s. 23), and in the Money Lenders Act of 1900, excessive interest charges and excessive expenses were treated as equivalent grounds for setting the contract aside.

Secondly, the projected legislation already referred to may be justified as being in relation to criminal law. The charging of an amount in excess of a maximum gross might be regarded as oppressive and usurious.

Thirdly, there is the power to regulate trade and commerce. The lending by money lenders of money at interest is a business which falls in the dominion field of regulation. The combined effect of the assignment of the subject of the regulation of trade and commerce and the assignment of the subject of interest to parliament would seem to enable parliament to deal with all the activities of money lenders.

This analysis leaves to be considered expenditures made by the borrower on the demand or requisition of the lender, e.g., legal fees for chattel mortgages, etc. If the lender imposes an obligation or requirements on the borrower to make an expenditure which raises the cost of the loan to a point in excess of the maximum gross fixed, the result, it would seem, is indistinguishable from the case where the lender himself makes the expenditure and claims to be reimbursed. After full consideration, it would appear that, for the reasons mentioned in connection with direct charges by the lender, parliament has the power to fix the maximum gross cost of the loan including expenditures by the borrower on demand of the lender.

If the views expressed are correct there would seem to be no doubt that the money lenders might be required by parliament to be licensed.

At the same time the Committee asked for an expression of opinion from the provinces and desires to record its unstinted appreciation of the co-operation received upon this somewhat complicated matter. The views of the representatives of the provinces are set out in the reports of the Committee's proceedings. The Attorney General of Ontario stated that he would co-operate 51954-26¹/₂ in all respects with Dominion authorities in the enforcement of any Dominion law relating to the subject or in recommending complementary legislation to be passed by the legislature of Ontario but, at the same time, expressed disagreement with the view of the Department of Justice upon the constitutional question, as did the legal representative of the Government of Quebec. The representative of the Attorney General of Alberta, while expressing no conclusive opinion, indicated that he was impressed with the opinion of the Department of Justice.

In addition your Committee received communications from several other provinces; the Deputy Attorney General of New Brunswick advised that his province preferred that the matter be dealt with by the Dominion. The Attorney General of Nova Scotia referred to a recent Nova Scotia statute designed to be a complement to the Money Lenders Act and stated that there was nothing further that could be done until the Federal Government finally dealt with the situation and that the province would give the fullest co-opera-The Attorney General of the province of Manitoba expressed doubt tion. that Parliament could deal with the cost of loans otherwise than in connection with what is pure interest. The Attorney General of Saskatchewan expressed himself as more than satisfied to have the Federal Government control the charges. The Attorney General of British Columbia expressed the view that the matter of interest is primarily one within the jurisdiction of the Dominion and that the province has no legislative jurisdiction in regard thereto.

Guided by the opinion of the Department of Justice, your Committee asked the Department to draft a bill for the determination of the maximum charge that should be permitted for small loans on personal security and herewith submits the draft of a bill for the consideration of the House. While the bill must speak for itself perhaps two or three observations may be helpful by way of explaining the reasons for the suggested rate.

The evidence submitted by Mr. Bunce indicated that the rate of cost decreases rapidly with an increase in the size of the loan and decreases with the elimination of the smaller lenders. The maximum loan subject to the provisions of the Money Lenders Act (Canada) is \$500, while, in the United States the limit on small loans is \$300; it follows that if the former limit is to be retained the rate adopted in Canada should, on this count, be below the average rate in the United States. Further, the minimum amount of paid capital required of Dominion small loan companies heretofore incorporated is \$100,000; in the United States lenders with funds as small as \$5,000 or less are permitted to be licensed; and consequently a heavier burden of overhead must be carried on a comparatively small volume of business.

Choice must be exercised between graduated rates and a flat rate. The practice in the United States has inclined towards graduated rates in the hope of reducing the maximum rate permitted on large loans while retaining the same rate for the smaller loans; it appeared to the Committee that the device does not effectually attain the objective; and the flat rate is recommended.

In considering the actual maximum rate that should be permitted your Committee regrets that comprehensive statistics are not available as to the rates currently charged on loans in Canada. The companies now operating under Dominion supervision make complete returns of rates and earnings; the provincial companies have on the average a smaller volume of business; and the rates of the provincial companies, it is believed, are generally in excess of those permitted to Dominion companies. The special Acts of Dominion companies permit a rate on loans not secured by chattel mortgages or subrogation of taxes of approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per month, and for loans secured by chattel mortgages larger rates, depending on the size of the loan. The larger rates, however, are further limited by the amendment to the Loan Companies Act of 1934 imposing a maximum limit on the rate on any loan of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per month. Throughout its enquiry your Committee's objective has been to secure the best procurable rate for the borrower. Capital available for the purpose is highly specialized; and it may be, under proper management, the percentage of loss is not unduly high; but it seems safe to assume that at present most people are unwilling to invest in loans on personal security; and of course the source of capital supply becomes further narrowed by the imposition of regulations and the further reduction of the rate.

Obviously the state can intervene advantageously over rates only within a limited field; for naturally a legislative rate at which money is *not* obtainable is of doubtful benefit to necessitous people. In the debates over the subject it would almost seem to have been at times forgotten that to legislate a maximum rate is an injunction that, if people cannot borrow at the prescribed rate, they cannot borrow at all.

By comparison with the rate charged by personal loan department of the Bank of Commerce the rate of 2 per cent a month set out in the draft bill is "high," but it is to be recalled that, so far, only one bank has entered the field and then with a definite statement to the Committee that it is "not talking about going into this small loan business on a large scale"; while the other banks have indicated their unwillingness to enter the field.

By comparison with the rates charged over a widespread operation of unlicensed lenders in Canada the rate is decidedly low. Evidence was presented to the Committee that unregulated lenders have been currently charging rates running into several hundred per cent per annum. Evidence from the United States indicated that 20 per cent a month is not an unusual rate in the unregulated field. In Great Britain, where regulation is undeveloped, the law provides that the fairness or unfairness of the rate must be determined by the Court before which a transaction comes for review. If the rate exceeds 4 per cent a month the lender must prove that it is not unfair; if the rate is less than 4 per cent the borrower must prove that it is unfair.

By comparison with the English indicated rate, the rate suggested for Canada is low; and it is to be recalled that rates of interest in the United Kingdom are generally lower than in Canada.

The maximum rates permitted by legislation in the United States vary with the states and the Canadian rate is not high as compared with rates in those states with which conditions are presumably comparable; as will be observed from the following rates by states:—

> Maine, 3 per cent. Massachusetts, 2 per cent to 3 per cent graduated. Michigan, $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. New York, $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent and 3 per cent graduated. Wisconsin, 1 per cent, 2 per cent and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent graduated. Iowa, $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent to 3 per cent graduated. Oregon, 3 per cent.

The rates of the several states were presumably established after exhaustive enquiry and, in several instances, after the legislative prescription of lower rates had led to a dimunition in the supply of licenced credit with a return of bootlegged loans in volume. In estimating how far American rates govern the effective rates in Canada, it is not to be safely overlooked that Canada is dependent upon the United States for 22 per cent of its working capital.

Finally, the rate of 2 per cent a month recommended in the draft bill must be regarded an experimental rate. In this relatively new field of finance, procedure has to be largely by way of trial; if error is made by naming a rate, too low, or too high, it is subject to correction. Loans of the sort are for relatively short terms (usually a year) and it is thus possible to look forward to a correction of rate without that disastrous disturbance that follows upon legislative intervention in long term contracts. If one may judge the future of personal finance in Canada by the development of the United States, the volume is still in the making and legislative action should obviously be made to conform to the stages of development.

With this report the Committee submits a draft bill entitled "An Act respecting Interest on Small Loans" for the consideration of the House.

A copy of the minutes of proceedings and evidence is annexed hereto.

The Clerk of the House laid upon the Table the thirty-seventh Report of the Clerk of Petitions stating that he had examined the following Petition presented on the 7th instant and finds that it does not comply with the requirements of Standing Order 68 in the following respects, namely,—

It is defective in form and in substance. The defects in its form, although not fatal, are serious, but some of the allegations are offensive to a foreign country which it charges with the theft of some of its territory; and the prayer, made on behalf of aliens, concludes with the request that part of the State of Maine be annexed to Canada.

For these reasons, it should not be received.

Of George Roy, President, and Jean Paul Dumont, Secretary of Cercle de l'U. C. C. d'Estcourt, asking that the Dominion Government take steps to annex a certain belt of land in the State of Maine bordering on Estcourt, as the people in that district are separated from American settlements by a wide belt of forest and are thus compelled to make all their purchases in Canada.— *Mr. Pouliot.*

Mr. Mackenzie King, a Member of the King's Privy Council, laid before the House,—Copies of International Convention of 1936 for the Suppression of the Illicit Traffic in Dangerous Drugs, Protocol of Signature and Final Act, signed at Geneva, June 26, 1936.

1. The total number of permanent and temporary civil servants in the Province of British Columbia, showing each department separately.

2. Total amount of money paid to, (a) permanent employees; (b) temporary employees, showing each department separately.

Mr. Church, seconded by Mr. Baker, by leave of the House, introduced a Bill, No. 144, An Act to amend the Judges Act, which was read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House. Mr. Dunning moved,—That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to go into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting The Dominion Housing Act, 1935.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The House accordingly went into Committee of the Whole on the said proposed Resolution.

(In the Committee)

The following Resolution was adopted:-

Resolved,-That it is expedient to bring in a measure which in Part I thereof repeals The Dominion Housing Act, 1935, and reenacts certain provisions thereof with amendments and additions so as to provide inter alia that the amount of loans to be made and expenses to be incurred shall not exceed \$20,000,000 less loans made under the said Act, and to enable the Minister of Finance to guarantee approved lending institutions or local authorities against loss up to certain maximum amounts in respect of small loans in order to encourage the making of such loans in small and remote communities and in certain districts of other communities and to make payments to lending institutions to cover the special costs of making such loans; which in Part II thereof authorizes the making of loans at low interest rates to local housing authorities to assist in the construction of houses to be leased to families of low income at rentals less than the economic rentals therefor, such loans not to exceed \$30,000,000 in the aggregate; which in Part III thereof authorizes the payment to municipalities of a proportion of the municipal taxes levied during a three-year period upon new low-cost houses constructed prior to December 31, 1940, for owners for their own occupation, but excluding houses constructed under Part II of the Act; and which authorizes the employment and remuneration of technical and clerical staff and the payment of other expenses in connection with the administration of the Act.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Dunning then, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 145, An Act to assist the Construction of Houses, which was read a first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

1. Page 1, line 6. Strike out all words following "1938" in line 5 to the end of the clause.

2. Page 1, line 17. Insert the following as clause 3:-

"3. This Act shall be read and construed as one with the following Acts, respectively:---

- (a) The Manitoba Natural Resources Act, chapter twenty-nine of the statutes of 1930 (first session);
- (b) The Alberta Natural Resources Acts, chapter three of the statutes of 1930, (first session) and chapter fifteen of the statutes of 1931;
- (c) The Saskatchewan Natural Resources Acts, chapter forty-one of the statutes of 1930 (first session) and chapter fifty-one of the statutes of 1931."

(12) If, in the case of a proposal filed prior to the coming into force of this subsection, a debt secured by mortgage, hypothec, pledge, charge, lien or privilege on or against any property of the farmer (hereinafter referred to as the secured debt) has not, by reason of the absence of privity of contract between the farmer and a secured creditor as herein defined, been dealt with by way of a composition, extension of time or scheme of arrangement, the farmer shall be entitled to have the proposal proceeded with or to file a new proposal, in either case, for the purpose of having the secured debt dealt with by way of composition, extension of time or scheme of arrangement in the like manner and with the like results as if this subsection had been in force at the date of the filing of the original proposal.

(13) In the case of a proposal formulated by a Board of Review prior to the coming into force of this subsection whereby a secured debt was dealt with, the farmer shall, notwithstanding the absence of privity of contract between himself and a secured creditor as herein defined, be entitled to have such proposal confirmed by the Board of Review in the like manner and with the like results as if this subsection had been in force at the date of the filing of his proposal by the farmer, or if such proposal was confirmed prior to the coming into force of this subsection it shall be binding as if it had been confirmed after the coming into force of this subsection.

(14) The provisions of the two next preceding subsections of this section shall not apply in any case where by an order or judgment of a Court of competent jurisdiction the title of any farmer to any lands or chattels has been extinguished prior to the coming into force of such subsections."" 2. Page 4, line 17. Insert the following as new Clause 9:-

"9. The said Act is further amended by adding to section eleven, as subsection three, the following:---

(3) No proposal shall be received in any province later than the thirty-first day of December, 1938, except in the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta."

That it is expedient to introduce an Act to regulate the cost of small loans, also with respect to the incorporation and powers of small loan companies, and to provide for the annual licensing of money-lenders, for the administration of the said Act, and the annual assessment of each licensee for the purpose of meeting the expense incurred by the Government in such administration.

Whereupon, Mr. Dunning, a Member of the King's Privy Council, informed the House, That His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

Resolved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at the next sitting of the House, to consider the said proposed Resolution.

Mr. Mackenzie King moved,—That the provision of Standing Order 28 respecting the Committee of Ways and Means be suspended for the sitting of June 16, 1938.

And the question being put on the said motion, by leave of the House, it was agreed to.

Your Committee has had under consideration the following Order of Reference from the House dated May 6:—

"That the subject-matter of the following bill be referred to the said Committee:---

Bill No. 26, An Act to repeal The Companies' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1933."

Representations were heard by your Committee on behalf of the following organizations:-

(a) The Montreal Board of Trade,

(b) The Toronto Board of Trade,

(c) The Dominion Mortgage and Investments Association, Toronto,

(d) The Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, Limited, Toronto.

After hearing the above representations, the sponsor of Bill No. 26, Mr. Bertrand (Laurier), informed the Committee of his desire to withdraw the bill.

Your Committee recommends that the said Bill No. 26 be withdrawn.

A copy of the evidence taken by your Committee is annexed hereto.

(For Minutes of Proceedings, Evidence, etc., accompanying said Report, see Appendix to the Journals, No. 5.)

Mr. Lapointe (Quebec East), a Member of the King's Privy Council, laid before the House,—Report of the Royal Commission to investigate the Penal System of Canada appointed by Order in Council, P.C. 483, dated February 27, 1936, under Part I of the Inquiries Act, consisting of Honourable Justice Archambault, Chairman; R. W. Craig, K.C., Winnipeg, and Harry W. Anderson, Esquire, Journalist, Toronto, and under Order in Council, P.C. 2424, dated September 17, 1936, appointing J. C. McRuer, K.C., of Toronto, in the place and stead of the late Harry W. Anderson. (English and French Editions.)

Mr. Rinfret, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of March 30, 1938, for a statement of the number, occupation and salary of veterans employed in the Department of National Revenue, who have served in any other army than the Canadian Army, the date of their appointment and the length of their stay in Canada prior to their appointment in the Canadian Civil Service.

He also presented, for Mr. Mackenzie (Vancouver Centre),—Partial Return to an Order of the House of February 14, 1938, for a copy of all contracts made by or for the Department of National Defence from the beginning of the present fiscal year (April 1, 1937) to date, as well as a copy of all tenders with respect to each such contracts.

The House resumed the Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Bertrand (Laurier),—That Bill No. 28, An Act to amend the Criminal Code (Sweep-stakes), be now read the second time.

A Point of Order having been raised at the sitting of June 7th on the ground that there were no explanatory notes on the right hand page of the Bill;

Mr. Speaker gave the following decision:—

"Bill No. 28, An Act to amend the Criminal Code, was introduced and read the first time on February 24th, 1938. It did not then contain explanatory notes as required under the regulations adopted in June, 1923, but the Bill itself was not in imperfect shape. Standing Order 70 which prohibits introduction of an imperfect bill was passed on the 20th December, 1867, long before the adoption of the regulations in respect of explanatory notes on the right-hand page. This Standing Order was probably directed against the introduction of blank bills as often happened in early days. The explanatory notes do not form part of the bill proper and they do not have to be approved by the House. They are only given as reasons for the text and to facilitate discussion.

"On May 11th, Mr. Bertrand (Laurier), sponsor for this Bill and the only Member who had until then spoken to the second reading, asked the Law Clerks to have it reprinted with explanatory notes in pursuance of my decision on the previous day. He did so under Standing Order 86, which provides that it shall be the duty of the Joint Law Clerks of the House to assist Members of the House in drafting legislation and to revise, print and put notes upon all bills.

"The reprint was fully distributed amongst the Members of the House on the 13th May before debate resumed, so that the regulation of June, 1923, which had been ignored prior to the first reading, was then duly observed. None of the Members suffered any prejudice as the Bill has been in their hands now for a month and debate has already taken place thereon during four sittings of the House, namely, on May 13th, 20th and 31st, and June 7th.

"The practice followed in connection with several Government measures and Bill No. 11 which were reprinted with explanatory notes between first and second readings pursuant to my decision of May 10th, must also apply in this case. As long as a defect of this nature is corrected before other Members than the sponsor have spoken in the debate on the second reading, the rule is sufficiently observed and the bill is in order.

"The explanatory notes are of minor importance in this case but it is necessary to give a decision which will be followed in future.

"I therefore rule that the House may proceed with the debate on the second reading of this Bill."

The Debate on the proposed motion for the second reading of the said Bill was then resumed.

And the Debate continuing;

8. Amount contributed by the Dominion Government to the provincial government of Quebec for the improvements of the Trans-Canada Highway between August 7, 1930, and October 23, 1935.

Mr. Mackenzie (Vancouver Centre), a Member of the King's Privy Council, laid before the House,—Copies of General Orders and Regulations promulgated to the Canadian Militia and the Royal Canadian Air Force, dated April 14, 1938, to May 15, 1938, under the provisions of Section 141, Chapter 132, and Section 4 (4), Chapter 3, R.S.C. 1927.

The Bill No. 154, An Act to amend The National Parks Act, and The Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island National Parks Act, 1936, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed the following Bills to which the concurrence of this House was desired :-

Bill No. 155 (Letter H-3 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act for the relief of Stella Maude Lash Dawes."

Bill No. 156 (Letter I-3 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act for the relief of Elizabeth Dubnitsky, otherwise known as Elizabeth Dubney."

Bill No. 157 (Letter J-3 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act for the relief of Harry Roth."

Also,-A Message communicating to this House the evidence taken before the Standing Committee of the Senate on Divorce to whom were referred the petitions of Stella Maude Lash Dawes, Elizabeth Dubnitsky, otherwise known as Elizabeth Dubney, and Harry Roth respectively, praying for Bills of Divorce; and the papers produced in evidence before them with a request that the same be returned to the Senate.

Also,-A Message acquainting this House that the Senate do insist upon its amendment to the Bill No. 13, An Act to amend the Lord's Day Act, for the following reasons:-

1. The corporation being the person guilty of the offence and the only one to be possibly benefited by the offence is the only person which should be penalized. To penalize officers, directors or employees is unjust, and is especially unjust in the case of officers or employees whose position may depend on obedience to company policy.

2. The amendment does provide an increase in the minimum penalty in the case of a third or subsequent offence. There are many very small companies, such for example, as small canneries, in respect of whom a fine necessarily greater than fifty dollars might be unduly severe and result in reluctance to convict.

3. There can be no reason why the imposition of fines if appropriately heavy should have less effect in the case of offences against the Lord's Day Act than in the case of offences against any other Act.

Also,-A Message informing this House that the Senate have passed the Bill No. 98, An Act respecting the North Pacific Pelagic Sealing Convention, with amendments, which are as follows:-

1. Page 2, lines 1 to 6, inclusive. For Clause 3 substitute the following:-

"3. (1) Any commissioned officer on full pay in the military, naval or air service of Canada or in the military, naval or air service of His Majesty, or any fishery officer or stipendiary magistrate, on board of any vessel belonging to or in the service of the Government of Canada and employed in the service of protecting the fisheries, or any officer of customs of Canada, sheriff, justice

of the peace or other person duly commissioned for that purpose, may go on board of any ship, vessel or boat within Canadian territorial waters covered by the Convention, which he has reason to believe is in any manner being operated or used in contravention of any provision of this Act or regulation or of the provisions of the Convention, or for aiding or facilitating the commission of any such contravention, and may search her cargo and equipment and examine the master or person in command under oath touching the cargo, equipment and voyage.

(2) If the master or person in command of any such ship, vessel or boat does not, upon any examination under oath by any officer or person under the authority of this Act touching the cargo, equipment and voyage of such ship, vessel or boat, truly answer all questions put to him in such examination, he shall incur a fine of four hundred dollars."

2. Page 2, line 7. Leave out "such".

3. Page 2, line 8. Leave out "as may be deemed necessary".

4. Page 2, line 15. After "Every" insert "such".

5. Page 2, line 35. After "port" insert "or harbour".

6. Page 2, lines 46 and 47. For "the Customs and Fisheries Protection" substitute "this".

7. Page 4, line 2. For "the Customs and Fisheries Protection" substitute "this".

8. Page 4, lines 23 and 24. For "the Customs and Fisheries Protection" substitute "this".

9. Page 4, line 35. For "the Customs and Fisheries Protection" substitute "this".

10. Page 5, line 17. Insert the following as new subclause (3) of Clause 11:--

"(3) Every person opposing any officer or person in the execution of his duty under this Act or aiding or abetting any other person in such opposition is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to a fine of eight hundred dollars and to two years' imprisonment."

11. Page 5, line 17. Insert the following as new Clauses 12, 13 and 14:-

"12. The Attorney General of Canada may in His Majesty's name sue for or enforce any penalty or forfeiture incurred under this Act.

13. All actions for the recovery or enforcement of penalties or forfeitures imposed by this Act shall be commenced within three years after the offence committed.

14. In cases of seizure under this Act the Governor in Council may direct a stay of proceedings and in cases of condemnation may relieve from the penalty in whole or in part and on such terms as are deemed right.

12. Renumber the existing clauses 12, 13 and 14 as clauses 15, 16 and 17.

And also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 110, An Act to amend the Northwest Territories Act, with amendments, which are as follows:—

1. Page 1, line 7. Leave out all words after "section:—" to the end of the Bill and substitute the following:—

"39A. (1) Any person in the public service of Canada may, at the instance of His Majesty's Attorney General of Canada, be granted by the Secretary of State of Canada a certificate of authority in Form A of the Schedule to this Act, which certificate shall remain in force whilst the person named therein remains in the public service of Canada, whether as a peace officer or otherwise and whether he continues to serve in the same capacity or otherwise, subject, however, to rescission of such certificate at any time and at the same instance of such Secretary of State.

(2) Under authority of such certificate but subject to production thereof, if it be demanded, to any person interested as owner, custodian or otherwise of any thing being sought as subject to seizure under this subsection, or of the building or other place or premises in which such thing is believed to be, or to any peace officer, the person named in the certificate may enter in the night time if he be, or be accompanied by, a peace officer, and in the day time without being so accompanied, any building which is not a dwelling house and any other place or premises (including vessels, boats, canoes, vehicles, motor cars, automobiles, aeroplanes and conveyances or any kind whatsoever) which building, place or premises is not within the Territories and in which such person has reason to believe that there is anything the shipment whereof from the Territories is prohibited, conditionally or otherwise, by any Act of Canada or Ordinance of the Territories, and may search for such thing there and seize it if and when found, and for the purpose of such search or seizure he may, in case of necessity, break open any entrance or door, wall, floor, window or gate and any chest or package.

(3) Anything the shipment or carriage whereof from the Territories is prohibited conditionally or otherwise by any Act of Canada or Ordinance of the Territories and any receptacle of any kind whatsoever and any vessel, boat, canoe, vehicle, motor car, automobile, aeroplane or conveyance of any kind whatsoever found containing or appearing to have been used to remove unlawfully such thing from the Territories, shall be seized by any peace officer having a knowledge thereof and be subject to forfeiture.

(4) Whenever any vessel, vehicle, goods or thing has been seized or detained under any of the provisions of this Act or of the Northwest Game Act or when it is alleged that any penalty or forfeiture has been incurred under the provisions of this Act or of the Northwest Game Act the officer or game warden effecting such seizure or detention shall forthwith report the circumstances of the case to the Commissioner.

(5) The Commissioner may thereupon notify the owner or the claimant of the thing seized or detained or his agent or the person alleged to have incurred the penalty or forfeiture or his agent of the seasons for the seizure, detention, penalty or forfeiture and call upon him to furnish within thirty days from the date of the notice such evidence in the matter as he desires to furnish. Such evidence may be by affidavit or affirmation made before any justice of the peace, commissioner for taking affidavits in any court or notary public.

(6) After the expiration of the said thirty days, or sooner if the person so called upon to furnish evidence so desire, the Commissioner or Deputy Commissioner may consider and weigh the circumstances of the case and report his opinion and recommendation thereon to the Minister.

(7) The Minister may thereupon either give his decision in the matter respecting the seizure, detention, penalty or forfeiture and the terms, if any, upon which the things seized or detained may be released or the penalty or forfeiture remitted or may refer the same to the Exchequer Court of Canada for decision. The Minister may by regulation authorize the Commissioner or the Deputy Commissioner to exercise the powers conferred by this section upon the Minister.

(8) If the owner or claimant of the thing seized or detained or the person alleged to have incurred the penalty does not within thirty days after being notified of the decision of the Minister, the Commissioner or the Deputy Commissioner give the Minister, the Commissioner or the Deputy Commissioner, as the case may be, notice in writing that such decision will not be accepted the decision shall be final.

(9) If the owner or claimant of the thing seized or detained or the person alleged to have incurred the penalty within thirty days after being notified of such decision gives the Minister, the Commissioner or the Deputy Commissioner, as the case may be, notice in writing that such decision will not be accepted the Minister may refer the matter to the Exchequer Court of Canada.

(10) On any reference of any such matter by the Minister to the Exchequer Court of Canada that court shall hear and consider such matter upon the papers and evidence referred and upon any further evidence which under the direction of that court the owner or claimant of the thing seized or detained or the person alleged to have incurred the penalty or the Crown produces and shall decide according to the right of the matter. Judgment may be entered upon any such decision and the same shall be enforceable and enforced in like manner as other judgments of that court.

(11) The service of notice to produce evidence and of the Minister's decision shall be sufficient if it is effected by sending such notice by mail in a registered letter addressed to the owner or claimant or the person alleged to have incurred the penalty at his address as stated in the report of the seizure; and the thirty days allowed in respect of either of such notices shall in case of such service by mail be computed from the date of the mailing of such notification.

(12) (a) If notice of intent to claim has been given and the value of the goods or things seized does not, in the opinion of the officer effecting the seizure exceed one hundred dollars such officer shall if he chooses to proceed under this section forthwith cause the goods to be valued by a competent appraiser and if such appraiser certifies them not to exceed the said value a summary information in writing may be exhibited before two justices of the peace in the name of any officer authorized thereto by the Minister charging the articles seized as forfeited under some particular Act and section thereof to be therein referred to and praying condemnation thereof; and the justices shall thereupon issue a general notice for all persons claiming interest in the seizure to appear at a certain time and place to claim the articles seized and answer the information and stating that otherwise such articles will be condemned;

(b) A copy of the notice shall at least eight days before the time of appearance be served upon the person from whose possession the things were taken or shall be left at or affixed to a building, vessel or vehicle, if any, in which they were seized if there remaining or posted in clear view at two public places nearest the place of seizure;

(c) If any person appears to answer the information the justices shall hear and determine the matter in a summary manner and acquit or condemn the articles but if no person appears judgment of condemnation shall be given; and the justices on condemnation shall issue a warrant to the officer first in this section mentioned to sell the goods."

2. Add to the Bill the following as Clause two:-

"2. The said Act is further amended by adding to the Schedule thereof the following:—

'Form A

Certificate of Authority

Granted to an officer enforcing subsection 3 of section 39A of the Northwest Territories Act

This is to certify that (name) of (city, town or other place) in the (province etc.) Dominion of Canada (office or occupation) is authorized by and under section 39A of the Northwest Territories Act to enter in the night time if he be or be accompanied by a peace officer and in the day time without being so accompanied any building which is not a dwelling house and any other place or premises, (including vessels, boats, canoes, vehicles, motor cars, automobiles, aeroplanes and conveyances of any kind whatsoever) which building, place or premises is not within the Northwest Territories and in which such person has reason to believe that there is any thing the shipment or carriage whereof from such Territories is prohibited, conditionally or otherwise, by any Act of Canada or Ordinance of such Territories; and to search for such thing there, and to seize it if and when found, and for the purpose of such search or seizure, in case of necessity, to break open any entrance or door, wall, floor, window or gate and any chest or package.

"That to these ends, wheat, wheat flour, and all the products of wheat, the principal articles of food, farm implements and machinery and repair parts thereof; rough and dressed lumber, gasoline, illuminating, lubricating and fuel oils, etc., nets, net twines, and fishermen's equipment; cements and fertilizers, should be free from customs duties, as well as the raw material entering into the same."

"This House further regrets that the proposals submitted by the Minister of Finance on June 16th, disregard the pledges of the Liberal Party to the Canadian people contained in its platform of 1919 and subsequent years, which declared among other things that the best interests of Canada demand that substantial reductions of the burdens of customs taxation be made with a view to the accomplishing of two purposes of the highest importance: First, diminishing the very high cost of living which presses so severely on the masses of the people; second, reducing the costs of the instruments of production in the industries based on the natural resources of the Dominion; the vigorous development of which is essential to the progress of our country.

"That to these ends, wheat, wheat flour, and all the products of wheat, the principal articles of food, farm implements and machinery and repair parts thereof; rough and dressed lumber, gasoline, illuminating, lubricating and fuel oils, etc., nets, net twines, and fishermen's equipment; cements and fertilizers, should be free from customs duties, as well as the raw material entering into the same."

SPECIAL WAR REVENUE ACT

Resolved, That it is expedient to introduce a measure to amend The Special War Revenue Act, Chapter one hundred and seventy-nine of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, and amendments thereto and to provide:—

1. That Schedule III to the said Act being the list of articles exempted from the consumption or sales tax be amended by adding to the said Schedule the following:—

> Materials for use exclusively in the manufacture of gopher poison; Harness for horses and complete parts therefor and articles and mate-

rials to be used exclusively in the manufacture thereof; Feeds for fur-hearing animals whose pelts have commercial value

Feeds for fur-bearing animals whose pelts have commercial value; Articles and materials for use exclusively in the equipment or repair of boats used by fishermen in the fisheries;

Bricks; building tile, building blocks and building stone; plaster; lime; cement; stucco and stucco dash;

Lumber; sash; doors; shingles; lath; siding; stairways; balustrades;

Plaster boards, fibre boards, wallpaper, building paper, and materials manufactured wholly or in part of vegetable or mineral fibre for wall coverings or building insulation;

Paints, varnishes, white lead and paint oil;

Prepared roofings;

Shower baths, bath tubs, basins, faucets, closets, lavatories; sinks and laundry tubs, not including pipes and pipe fittings;

Glass for buildings;

Furnaces for heating buildings;

Builders' hardware, namely: locks, lock sets, butts, hinges, pulleys and window fasteners.

Structural steel to be used exclusively for the framework and support of buildings and bridges.

Articles and materials to be used or consumed exclusively in the manufacture or production of the aforementioned building materials but not to include materials consumed by waste or wear or abrasives, lubricating oils, fuel oils, permanent or non-permanent plant equipment.

2. That Schedule II to the said Act be amended by striking out the following words in paragraph three thereof:—

Provided that the tax hereby imposed shall not apply to the goods mentioned herein, when sold to or imported by manufacturers of automobiles or chassis for the original equipment of such automobiles or chassis under the following conditions:—

- (i) If less than ten thousand automobiles or chassis are manufactured or produced per annum and at least fifty per centum of the factory cost of manufacturing or producing them, exclusive of duties and other taxes, is incurred in the British Empire;
- (ii) If ten thousand automobiles or chassis or more are manufactured or produced per annum and at least sixty per centum of the factory cost of manufacturing or producing them, exclusive of duties and other taxes, is incurred in the British Empire;

Provided, however, that effective April 1st, 1938, the words "sixtyfive" shall be substituted for the word "sixty" in this paragraph, and substituting therefor the following:-

Provided that the tax hereby imposed shall not apply to the goods mentioned herein when used exclusively for the original equipment of such automotive vehicles.

3. That subsection two of section fifty-eight of the said Act be amended to provide that the excise tax payable upon the sale, transfer or assignment of any share at a price or valuation of one dollar shall be one-quarter of one cent per share.

4. That any enactment founded on this resolution shall be deemed to have come into force on the seventeenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight and to have applied to all goods imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that date and to have applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that date.

Resolution to be reported.

By leave of the House, the said Resolution was reported, read the second time and concurred in, and the Committee of Ways and Means to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Ilsley then, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 163, An Act to amend the Special War Revenue Act, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

The Order being read for consideration of a Message from the Senate insisting upon its second amendment to Bill No. 25, An Act to amend The Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1934;

Mr. Mackenzie King moved,—Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate requesting a Free Conference with Their Honours to consider certain amendments made by the Senate to Bill No. 25, initialed: An Act to amend The Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1934, to which this House disagrees, and upon which the Senate insists, and any amendment which at such Conference it may be considered desirable to make to the said Bill or amendments thereto, and

That the Clerk do carry the said Message to the Senate.

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The House resolved itself again into Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee)

The following Resolution was adopted:-

INCOME WAR TAX ACT

Resolved,—That it is expedient to amend the Income War Tax Act and to provide—

1. That lump sum payments made in Canada, which sever the funds permanently from the assets of the payor company, for the establishment of superannuation or pension fund plans with a view to providing benefits for employees in respect of past years' services, shall be allowed as a deduction to the extent of one-tenth of such lump sum payments in each of ten successive years, commencing the year in which the payment is made; provided that in the case of superannuation or pension fund plans heretofore established by lump sum payments the said deduction shall commence in the year 1938 and continue thereafter until ten years shall have elapsed from the date of the initial payment. 2. That every corporation, the main business of which is the making of small loans shall, notwithstanding any other provision contained in the Income Tax Act, be subject to normal corporation rates of tax.

3. That annuities received under the provisions of any Will or Trust shall be taxable income of the recipient. Such annuities shall be taxable for the year 1937 and each year thereafter notwithstanding when the Will or Trust became effective.

4. That the Gift Tax shall not apply to any gifts made in any year by an individual the aggregate value of which in such year does not exceed an amount equal to one-half of the difference between the income which was subject to income tax in the previous year and the income tax payable thereon. Any enactment founded on this resolution shall be applicable to gifts made in the calendar year 1938 and thereafter.

5. That the rates of tax set forth in the schedule to the Gift Tax be increased as follows:

On gifts up to and including \$25,000-from 2 per cent to 5 per cent;

On gifts exceeding \$25,000 but not exceeding \$50,000—from 3 per cent to 6 per cent;

On gifts exceeding \$50,000 but not exceeding \$100,000—from 4 per cent to 7 per cent;

On gifts exceeding \$100,000 but not exceeding \$200,000—from 5 per cent to 8 per cent;

On gifts exceeding \$200,000 but not exceeding \$300,000—from 6 per cent to 9 per cent;

On gifts exceeding \$300,000 but not exceeding \$400,000—from 7 per cent to 10 per cent;

On gifts exceeding \$400,000 but not exceeding \$500,000—from 8 per cent to 12 per cent;

On gifts exceeding \$500,000 but not exceeding \$1,000,000—from 9 per cent to 14 per cent;

On gifts exceeding \$1,000,000-from 10 per cent to 15 per cent.

Any enactment founded on this resolution shall be applicable to gifts made in the calendar year 1938 and thereafter.

6. That royalties paid by persons abroad out of royalties received from sources within Canada shall not be allowed as a deduction in determining net royalty income from sources within Canada.

7. That if any person or corporation ordinarily resident in Canada effects any transaction which at any stage makes use of any person or corporation ordinarily resident abroad, and which has the effect of reducing the liability to taxation under the Act of such person or corporation ordinarily resident in Canada, such person or corporation ordinarily resident in Canada, shall continue to be liable to taxation under this Act to the same extent as if the transaction had not taken place. This provision shall apply to any transaction only if the Treasury Board upon a reasonable interpretation of the evidence available makes a ruling that the transaction was effected mainly for the purpose of avoiding liability to taxation under the Act. An appeal shall lie from any such ruling of the Treasury Board to the Exchequer Court of Canada.

8. That dividends received by Canadian parent companies from whollyowned non-resident subsidiary companies shall be exempt from the corporation rate of tax if at least 75 per cent of the combined capital of the parent and subsidiary companies is employed abroad. Such exemption shall be granted only if and to the extent that the country in which the subsidiary company is located grants a like exemption to parent companies in respect of dividends

emanating from subsidiary companies in Canada and shall not extend beyond dividends that are equal to profits that have been subject to tax abroad in the year previous to the year of declaration of the said dividends. Any enactment founded on this resolution shall be deemed to have come into force at the commencement of the calendar year 1938 and to be applicable to the calendar year 1938 and to fiscal periods ending therein and to all subsequent periods.

9. That any enactment founded on the provisions of these resolutions shall be deemed to have come into force at the commencement of the calendar year 1937 and to be applicable to the calendar year 1937 and to fiscal periods ending therein and to all subsequent periods, except as otherwise provided.

Resolution to be reported.

Mr. Rogers, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of June 20, 1938, for a copy of all letters, telegrams, reports and other documents passing between the Minister of Labour and any officer or employee of the Department of Labour of the Dominion of Canada and any person in the Province of British Columbia, dated from April 15, 1938, to date, having reference to the unemployed situation in that province as it affects the single unemployed presently occupying the Vancouver Post Office and the Vancouver Art Gallery.

Mr. Rinfret, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of March 31, 1938, for a Return showing:—

1. How many pieces of real estate the Government has bought in Ottawa since the Government has been located at Ottawa.

2. The price paid for each of such properties.

3. Who the owners were in each case at the time of purchase.

On motion of Mr. Mackenzie King it was ordered,—That, for the remainder of the Session, all Private Bills, when reported upon by the Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, be placed immediately upon the Orders of the Day for consideration in Committee of the Whole.

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The Bill No. 145, An Act to assist the Construction of Houses, was read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 158, An Act to amend The Seeds Act, 1937, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 159, An Act to amend the Dairy Industry Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting financial arrangements of the Canadian National Railways for the calendar year 1938.

(In the Committee)

The following Resolution was adopted:-

Resolved,—That it is expedient to bring in a measure to authorize the Canadian National Railway Company to issue securities not exceeding \$17,574,233 in principal amount to provide the moneys necessary to meet expenditures made and indebtedness incurred by the companies or railways comprised in the National Railway System during the calendar year 1938; to authorize the Governor in Council to guarantee the principal, interest and sinking funds of such securities; and to authorize the making of temporary loans to the said Company secured by such securities and not exceeding \$17,574,233 in principal amount to enable the said Company to meet such expenditures and indebtedness.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Ilsley then, for Mr. Dunning, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 174, An Act to authorize the provision of moneys to meet certain expenditures made and indebtedness incurred by the Canadian National Railways System during the calendar year 1938, and to authorize the guarantee by His Majesty of certain securities to be issued by the Canadian National Railway Company, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

The Bill No. 163, An Act to amend the Special War Revenue Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 137, An Act to amend the Criminal Code, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, and progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to consider it again this day.

By unanimous consent, on motion of Mr. Rinfret, the House reverted to Routine Proceedings.

Mr. Moore, from the Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, then presented the Seventh Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Complying with an Order of the House, dated June 3rd, your Committee has had under consideration the subject matter of Bill No. 124, "An Act to amend the Copyright Act." On this particular reference your Committee held five sittings and heard ten witnesses. Your Committee appreciates the dangers involved in making amendments to public Acts, such as the Copyright Act, for the purpose of dealing with a particular controversy and declines, therefore, to express any opinion with regard to the controversy regarding which evidence was heard by the Committee.

Without expressing any opinion as to whether any abuses of copyright exist, your Committee considers it desirable that machinery should be provided for dealing with alleged abuses of rights under the Copyright Act.

Your Committee appreciates the difficulties in amending the Copyright Act in view of the international conventions involved and the intricate and complex nature of the subject, and therefore recommends that the subject matter of this reference and of this Report be referred to the Department of the Secretary of State for further study and for such amendments, if any, to the Copyright Act as the circumstances may warrant.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Pouliot, from the Special Committee appointed to enquire into the operation of the Civil Service Act, presented the Third and Final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Pursuant to Order of Reference dated February 22nd, Your Committee has held 48 sittings; has examined the three Civil Service Commissioners, the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission, the Chief, the Acting Chief, and Investigators Boutin and Jackson of the Organization Branch, and the Chief Examiner of the Civil Service Commission; heard representations from Sir Francis Floud, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., United Kingdom High Commissioner in Canada, the Professional Institute of the Civil Service, the Civil Service Federation of Canada, the Amalgamated Civil Servants of Canada, the Dominion Railway Mail Clerks Federation, the Amputations Association of the Great War and the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League. Briefs were received from Army and Navy Veterans in Canada, Officers, Mates and Petty Officers of Government Ships, the Canadian Postmasters' Association, the Customs and Excise Officers' Association, and the New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Nautical Association.

Your Committee had charts prepared showing the organization of the staffs of the Civil Service Commission and all Departments of the Government whose staff are under the Civil Service Commission, but was unable, in the time at its disposal, to make an extensive enquiry into the various Departments.

Having carefully considered the evidence adduced, Your Committee recommends:-

1. Your Committee deems it expedient and in the interest of the public, the civil service and the Civil Service Commission that a Standing Committee on civil service matters be appointed at the commencement of each session of Parliament and therefore recommends to Parliament that Standing Order 63 be amended by adding after clause (k) of said Order the following clause (1) "on civil service matters to consist of fifteen members, nine of whom shall constitute a quorum."

2. The Committee further recommends that no official or employee in the Civil Service shall make any direct or indirect recommendation or reference by letter or otherwise on behalf of any relative by blood or marriage, or take any part, whether directly or indirectly in any competition, temporary or permanent assignment, promotion, classification or reclassification in which any such relative is an applicant.

3. Your Committee recommends that it shall be the duty of the Civil Service Commission to make their own rulings on the operation of the Act and apply the same uniformly, provided, however, that any Department affected by such ruling may join the Civil Service Commission in any submission to the Department of Justice for an opinion.

4. Your Committee reaffirms the eighteenth recommendation of the Civil Service Committee of 1932 which is as follows:—

18. Your Committee is of opinion that there is a great deal of overlapping in the performance of duties by the heads of different branches of the Civil Service Commission, owing to matters receiving the attention of the secretary of the Commission which are in no way related to secretarial duties.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that the secretary of the Civil Service Commission be called upon to perform only those duties which are peculiarly those of a secretary and that the Civil Service Commission consider ways and means of eliminating duplication of correspondence and departmental memoranda which now pass through the secretary to the commissioners.

And your Committee recommends that all forms presently in use for such purposes shall be altered accordingly.

5. As the multiplicity of classifications and the discrepancy in salary ranges tend to create jealousy in the service and have resulted in injustices and dissatisfaction, your Committee suggests that the service should be divided into five or six broad classes, with a maximum of not more than nine grades in one class, and such division to be set up as soon as possible.

6. From the evidence it appears there is at present a considerable discrepancy in salary ranges as between departments and as between the various branches of the same department and as between the Senate and House of Commons, which militates against efficiency and co-operation, your Committee recommends that the Organization Branch be charged with special responsibility with regard to salary levels in order to simplify ranges and also to thoroughly investigate salaries paid in comparable classes within and without the service.

7. Your Committee recommends that

(1) Annual surveys of departments, units or branches shall be made in rotation by the various investigators, whether requested by the department or not, and such reviews shall be made so as to remedy overlapping, overstaffing or understaffing and any unfair discrepancies which may exist.

(2) If there is to be specialization, it shall be within classes rather than by attempting to cover a whole department from top to bottom, as at present.

(3) Investigators shall mention in each report the time spent with each employee and the date and circumstances of the interviews.

(4) Investigators shall not sit on examining boards as members thereof.

8. In order to give the Civil Service Commissioners a complete picture which will ensure fairness and departmental responsibility, and which will standardize the service and speed up handling of cases, your Committee recommends that the investigator's report and the comments of the chief of the Organization Branch be forwarded to the department concerned and returned to the Civil Service Commission with any comments such department wishes to make.

9. Your Committee recommends that no married woman shall be employed even temporarily under her maiden name and that regulation No. 36 of the Civil Service Commission shall be strictly applied.

10. Your Committee recommends that subsection one of section 38 of the Civil Service Act be amended by adding at the end thereof the following proviso:—

Provided that, except on approval by the Governor General in Council, such authorization shall not extend to the employment of a person who is not a natural born or naturalized British subject and also has been a resident of Canada for at least five years.

11. Your Committee recommends the Commission may, at the request of the department concerned, but subject to the approval of the Treasury Board, appoint without competition any person who has already held a permanent position in the Civil Service and who has resigned, to the same or a similar position within the Department if the Department and the Commission are satisfied that such person is deserving of such appointment, is not over fifty-five years of age, is of good character and in good physical condition.

12. Your Committee recommends that standard advertisements to cover the classes and grades suggested in its fifth recommendation should be prepared and adhered to and that the practice which has often been followed in the past of writing advertisements to fit the qualifications of a single individual should be discontinued. Your Committee recommends further that any reason for varying such standard advertisements should be submitted in writing by the deputy-head suggesting such variation and be reported thereon by the Organization Branch and that no such varied advertisement shall be issued or published unless previously approved by the Civil Service Commission.

13. Your Committee recommends that examination paper should not be translated for examination purposes but should be read by the examiners in the language in which they have been written, whether English or French.

14. Your Committee is of the opinion that whenever advisable transfers to other branches of departments, as well as from one department to another, should be encouraged so as to prevent favoritism and for the purpose of helping employees to acquire a general knowledge of the work of the department or departments of the government. Your Committee considers that the effect of this recommendation will be to open new horizons to the younger employees by offering opportunities for advancement and promotion at the same time preventing the static condition of the service and remedying certain injustices.

15. To facilitate the adjustments of complaints of a civil servant, whose such complaints cannot otherwise be adjusted, your Committee recommends that such complaints be adjudicated by a Board of Appeal consisting of a nominee of a civil service organization named by the appellant, a nominee of the deputy head of the department affected, and a nominee of the Chairman of the Civil Service Commission, the latter of whom shall be Chairman of the Board.

16. Your Committee recommends that ratings on efficiency and fitness, on which selections for promotion are largely based, be made by a Board of three departmental officers instead of by individual departmental officers, as at present, and that a system of periodical ratings recording the efficiency of employees be established, for use in connection with promotions, salary increases and retirements. That the employee shall be advised of the result of all his ratings and shall have the right to appeal such rating to the Board mentioned in the preceding recommendation.

17. Your Committee recommends that promotions shall not be confirmed until after the expiration of fourteen days so as to permit the making of an appeal to the Board mentioned in your Committee's fifteenth recommendation, and in the event of such appeal being made that such promotion shall not be confirmed until the appeal has been disposed of.

18. Your Committee recommends that the practice of placing employees in vacant positions in an acting capacity instead of holding promotion competitions for them be discouraged.

19. Your Committee recommends that the Commission investigate the feasibility of more extensive and adequate advertising of competitions by press and radio.

20. Your Committee regrets that the recommendation of the Civil Service Committee of 1932 "that all papers, documents, et certera, placed on the files of the commission be consecutively numbered in each file, so that removals or deletions therefrom will be apparent" has been ignored, and recommends that it shall be strictly observed and that also each document on file shall be duly initialled and dated.

21. Your Committee recommends that section twenty-one of the Civil Service Act, dealing with vacancies in the departments, be amended by providing (in subsection two thereof) for the case of temporary appointments where there is no eligible list that

the Commission shall forthwith hold an examination and, if necessary, to prevent any serious interference with the public business, but not otherwise, may fill the position at once, *subject to the approval of the head of the department*, by making a temporary appointment as prescribed herein

the only change in the subsection being the insertion therein of the words in italics above.

22. Your Committee is of the opinion that the preference granted by sections twenty-eight and twenty-nine of the Act to persons who have served overseas in the military or naval forces of His Majesty's Allies shall apply only when such persons are natural born or naturalized British subjects, and also had been resident in Canada before The Great War.

23. Your Committee recommends that no male employee shall be retained in the Civil Service beyond the age of sixty-five years and no female employee beyond the age of sixty years, and that such retirement be made compulsory without any extension.

Your Committee is of the opinion that his would materially increase the efficiency of the Civil Service, would facilitate promotion and create a brighter outlook for the future of the younger people in the Service or desirous of entering therein.

24. Your Committee is of the opinion that a departmental division of eighty per cent permanent and twenty per cent temporary results in discrimination in certain branches where the work is entirely permanent and where twenty per cent have to wait years for any hope of permanency, and also that further evil of this system is that a branch may pad up work to bring in extra temporaries, so as to absorb into the permanent quota those who otherwise would not be permanent.

A.D. 1938

25. Your Committee recommends that long term temporaries on the staff of the House of Commons who have been giving satisfactory service for a number of years should be made permanent employees under the Civil Service Commission; and that the evidence taken by the Committee be indexed and 1,000 copies in English and 500 copies in French be printed in bluebook form.

A copy of the Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence taken is tabled herewith; also 3 exhibits filed on May 25th.

Mr. Mackenzie (Vancouver Centre), a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of June 27, 1938, for a copy of the agreement between the Government and John Inglis Company, of Toronto, for the manufacture of Bren machine guns.

And also,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of June 1, 1938, for a copy of all Orders in Council, letters, forms of tender, bids or tenders, cables, telegrams and correspondence of all kinds, relating to the construction of ships for the Canadian Naval Service prior to the 1st day of January, 1913.

Mr. McLean (Melfort) moved,—That the Third and Final Report of the Special Committee appointed to enquire into the operation of the Civil Service Superannuation Act, presented to the House on June 28, 1938, be now concurred in.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The following Orders of the House were issued to the proper officers:-

By Mr. Warren:—Order of the House for a copy of all letters, telegrams, reports and other documents dated from May 1st, 1934, to October 30th, 1934, passing between the Department of Justice and any corporation or individual, having to do with the digging of a ditch from Collin's Bay Penitentiary to City limits of Kingston for a pipe line.

By Mr. Green:—Order of the House for a copy of all contracts, leases, agreements, memoranda and other documents in effect between National Harbours Board and Empire Stevedoring Company Limited, dated during past two years, concerning Ballantyne and/or Lapointe Piers in Vancouver Harbour, or the equipment thereon.

The Bill No. 174, An Act to authorize the provision of moneys to meet certain expenditures made and indebtedness incurred by the Canadian National Railways System during the calendar year 1938, and to authorize the guarantee by His Majesty of certain securities to be issued by the Canadian National Railway Company, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

The House went again into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution to incorporate a Commission with power under the Minister of Justice to manage the penitentiaries of Canada.

(In the Committee)

The following Resolution was adopted:-

Resolved,—That it is expedient to introduce a measure to incorporate a Commission with power under the Minister of Justice to administer, control and manage the penitentiaries; to provide for salaries of the Commissioners and assistant commissioners and to amend and consolidate the Penitentiaries Act and amending Acts and repeal the same.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Lapointe (Quebec East) then, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 175, an Act respecting Penitentiaries, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading later this day.

The Bill No. 164, An Act to amend the Income War Tax Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, and reported without amendment.

Mr. Ilsley moved,-That the said Bill be now read the third time.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 91, An Act respecting the Franchise of Electors and the Election of Members of the the House of Commons, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

Bill No. 158, An Act to amend The Seeds Act, 1937.

Bill No. 159, An Act to amend the Dairy Industry Act.

Bill No. 160, An Act to amend the Bank of Canada Act.

Bill No. 163, An Act to amend the Special War Revenue Act.

The Bill No. 175, An Act respecting Penitentiaries, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The Order being read for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Supply;

Mr. Lapointe (Quebec East) moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

Mr. Crerar made the following Report to the House:-

The Managers on the part of the House of Commons have the honour to report that they met in a Free Conference the Managers on the part of the Senate, for the purpose of further considering the Bill No. 25, initialed: "An Act to amend the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1934," and the amendments thereto.

The Managers on the part of the House of Commons report that the following has been agreed upon as a clause to be substituted for Clause 9 of the Bill as added thereto by the Senate:—

"9. No proposal shall be received in either of the provinces of Manitoba and British Columbia later than the thirtieth day of June, 1939, nor in any other province except the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta later than the thirty-first day of December 1938: Provided that this subsection shall not apply to farmers who are soldier settlers within the meaning of the Soldier Settlement Act."

Mr. Crerar moved,—That with respect to Bill No. 25, An Act to amend The Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1934, the following amendment be substituted for the amendment made in the Senate.

"9. The said Act is further amended by adding to section eleven, as subsection three, the following:—

'(3) No proposal shall be received in either of the provinces of Manitoba and British Columbia later than the thirtieth day of June, 1939, nor in any other province except the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta later than the thirty-first day of December, 1938: Provided that this subsection shall not apply to farmers who are soldier settlers within the meaning of the Soldier Settlement Act'," and that a Message be sent to the Senate to acquaint Their Honours therewith.

And that the Clerk of the House do carry the said Message to the Senate.

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 52, An Act respecting Radio in Canada, with amendments, which are as follows:—

1. Page 1, lines 5 to 31, and page 2, lines 1 to 10, both inclusive. For Clause 2 substitute the following:—

"2. (1) In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,

- (a) "broadcasting" means the dissemination of any form of radioelectric communication, including radiotelegraph, radiotelephone and the wireless transmission of writing, signs, signals, pictures and sounds of all kinds by means of Hertzian waves, intended to be received by the public either directly or through the medium of relay stations;
- (b) "coast station" means any radio station which is established on land or on board a ship permanently moored and which is used for communication with ships at sea;
- (c) "land station" means any radio station or installation of radio apparatus which is not a coast, mobile, ship or private receiving station;
- (d) "Minister" means the Minister of Transport;
- (e) "mobile station" means any radio station other than a ship station or private receiving station, which is capable of being moved and which ordinarily does move;
- (f) "operator" means a person employed, engaged or authorized to operate or assist in the operation of any radio transmitter, radio receiver or other radio apparatus at any coast, land or mobile radio station;
- (g) "private receiving station" means any house, room, vehicle, ship, aircraft, or other place wherein a radio receiving set intended solely for and capable of receiving broadcasting, is located or installed;
- (h) "radio apparatus" means a reasonably complete and sufficient combination of distinct radio appliances intended for or capable of being used for radioelectric communication, whether by transmission or reception, or both;
- (i) "radio" means and includes radiotelegraph, radiotelephone and any other form of radioelectric communication including the wireless transmission of writing, signs, signals, pictures and sounds of all kinds by means of Hertzian waves;
- (j) "radio station" and the same expression when abbreviated as "station" means a station, other than a private receiving station, equipped with transmitting or receiving radio apparatus, or both, and intended for, or capable of being used for, and form of radioelectric communication, whether by transmission or reception or both;
- (k) "ship station" means any radio station established on board a ship which is not permanently moored.

(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in the *Interpretation Act* or any other statute or law, the provisions of this Act shall be deemed to apply and to have full force and effect according to their terms, in the case of all radio stations and private receiving stations or radio apparatus owned or operated by or on behalf of His Majesty in the right of any province: Provided, however, that nothing herein contained is intended to impose or to declare the imposition of any tax upon or to make, render, or declare liable to taxation any property belonging to His Majesty in the right of any province."

2. Page 2, line 33. For "three months imprisonment." substitute "to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months."

3. Page 3, lines 24 and 25. For "three months' imprisonment." substitute "to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months."

4. Page 3, lines 31 to 36, both inclusive. Leave out all the words from "Provided" to the end of the clause and substitute the following:—

Provided that this section shall not apply to any radio receiving set installed in any automobile or other vehicle temporarily in Canada which is owned by a *bona fide* tourist who resides out of Canada; Further provided that the Minister may for any reason deemed by him to be sufficient suspend from time to time the operation of the foregoing proviso either in general or as applicable to particular persons, zones or places in Canada.

"10. (1) Any person who establishes a radio station or private receiving station or installs, operates or has in his possession any radio apparatus, in violation of the provisions of this Act shall be liable—

- (a) in the case of the establishment of a private receiving station or the installation, operation or possession of radio apparatus intended for or capable of being used as a private receiving station, on summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars;
- (b) in all other cases under this section, on summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding fifty dollars and, on conviction on indictment, to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months;

and in the case of any conviction under this section the radio apparatus or equipment, to which the offence relates, may be forfeited to His Majesty by order of the Minister for such disposition as the Minister may direct."

One petition was laid on the Table.

Owing to the large number of meetings required for the consideration of Bill No. 91, "An Act respecting the Franchise of Electors and the Election of members of the House of Commons," your Committee has been unable to devote more than two meetings to the consideration of Bill No. 90, "An Act respecting Political Expenditures," and therefore recommends that a Bill having similar objects be referred to a Committee at the next session of Parliament.

Your Committee has devoted several meetings to the study of methods effecting redistribution in Canada and other countries, but, before making definite recommendations, feels that further time should be given to the subject, and, meanwhile, submits for the information of the House, a report on methods used in Canada, Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and in the United States of America, which report is attached hereto.

(For copy of aforesaid report on electoral methods, see Appendix to the Journals, No. 9)

Mr. Mackenzie King, a Member of the King's Privy Council, laid before the House,—Copy of the Joint Report of the International Boundary Commission upon the Survey and Demarcation of the Boundary between Canada and the United States from the Gulf of Georgia to the Northwesternmost Point of Lake of the Woods; together with the atlas containing 59 joint maps to accompany the Report. Mr. Crerar, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of February 21, 1938, for a copy of all papers, communications and other documents received by, or sent from, the Department of Indian Affairs from or to any person or persons in connection with the custom known as "potlatch" among the Pacific Coast Indians during the years 1935, 1936 and 1937.

Mr. Rinfret, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of March 7, 1938, for a Return showing:—

4. Reletter present paragraphs (g), (h), (i) (j), and (k) of Clause 2 as paragraphs (h), (i), (j), (k), and (l).

5. Page 2, line 18. Insert the following as new paragraph (m):

"(m) "ship" when used in Part VI of this Act includes any ship, boat, barge, dredge, floating elevator, scow or any other floating craft and any raft, crib, dram or bag boom of logs, timber or lumber of any kind, and logs, timber or lumber in boom or being towed;"

6. Reletter present paragraphs (l), (m), (n), (o), and (p) as paragraphs (n), (o), (p), (q), and (r).

7. Page 3, line 18. Insert the following as new subclause (2) of Clause 3:----

"(2) It shall be the duty of the Board to perform the functions vested in the Board by this Act and by the *Railway Act* with the object of co-ordinating and harmonizing the operations of all carriers engaged in transport by railways, ships and aircraft and the Board shall give to this Act and to the *Railway Act* such fair interpretation as will best attain the object aforesaid."

8. Page 4, line 15. After "that" insert "at any time".

9. Page 4, line 23. After "transport," insert "whether in bulk or otherwise,".

10. Page 4, line 23. Insert the following as new paragraph (b):

"(b) that such ship for which such licence is sought was at any time during the period of ten years next preceding the coming into force of this Act used for the transport of goods other than goods in bulk, and".

11. Reletter the present paragraph (b) of Clause 5 as paragraph (c).

12. Page 4, line 26. Leave out "and".

13. Page 4, lines 27 to 30, both inclusive. Leave out paragraph (c).

14. Page 4, lines 32 and 33. Leave out "to the extent of the user so proved".

15. Page 6, line 45. After "Lakes." insert:-

Nor shall the provisions of this Part apply in the case of ships engaged in the transport of goods or passengers between ports or places on the Pacific Ocean and ports or places on the Atlantic Ocean or the Great Lakes or both; but such ships shall be at liberty, notwithstanding the provisions of this Part, to receive at any number of ports or places on the Pacific Ocean goods or passengers consigned or destined to any number of ports or places on the Atlantic Ocean or the Great Lakes or both, and likewise to receive at any number of ports or places on the Atlantic Ocean or the Great Lakes or both, goods or passengers consigned or destined to any number of ports or places on the Provided, however, that such ships shall be subject to the provisions of this Part in respect of goods or pasengers accepted for transport by water from a port or place on the Pacific Ocean to another port or place on the Pacific Ocean or from a port or place on the Atlantic Ocean or on the Great Lakes to another port on the Atlantic Ocean or on the Great Lakes.

16. Page 15, line 11. Insert the following as new Clause 38:-

"38. The provisions of this Part shall not apply to the transport by water of goods in bulk."

17. Renumber the present Clauses 38, 39, 40 and 41 as Clauses 39, 40, 41 and 42.

Resolved,—That towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty on account of certain expenses of the Public Service for the fiscal year ending 31st March, 1939, the sums of \$156,230,497.94 and \$88,757,863.42 respectively, be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.

By leave of the House, the said Resolution was reported, read the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Ilsley then obtained leave to present a Bill, No. 176, An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial year ending the 31st March, 1939, which was read the first time.

By leave of the House, the said Bill was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

An Act to amend The Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1934.

An Act to amend the Criminal Code.

To these Bills the Royal Assent was pronounced by the Clerk of the Senate in the following words:—

"In His Majesty's name, the Honourable the Deputy Governor General doth assent to these Bills."

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed the Honourable the Deputy Governor General as follows:—

" MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

"The Commons of Canada have voted Supplies required to enable the Government to defray certain expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Honour the following Bill:--

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial year ending 31st March, 1939.

"To which Bill I humbly request Your Honour's Assent."

To this Bill the Clerk of the Senate, by command of the Deputy of His Excellency the Governor General, did thereupon say:—

"In His Majesty's name the Honourable the Deputy Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

After which the Honourable the Deputy Governor General was pleased to close the Third Session of the Eighteenth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, with the following Speech:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

In bringing the present session to a close, I desire to express my appreciation of the careful attention given the many measures submitted for your consideration.

International relations and domestic conditions continue to be affected by conflict, disorders and tensions in different parts of the world. The disturbed situation abroad, and prolonged and unprecedented drought in Western Canada, have, unfortunately, somewhat retarded recovery. Improvement in economic conditions has, however, been more steadily maintained in Canada than in many other countries. Gratifying factors in the situation are the further diminution in the numbers on relief, and the progressive and substantial reductions in the 51954-39 deficits in the national accounts. The outlook for agriculture in the West is more hopeful than it has been for some years.

An outstanding feature of the session has been the adoption of measures constituting a long-range nation-wide program of conservation and development, designed to stimulate employment and enlarge the national income. They include a comprehensive housing scheme, under which special assistance will be afforded in the construction of houses to be owned by families of limited means, and of housing accommodation in urban centres to be leased at less than economic rentals.

The Dominion has undertaken to pay a substantial proportion of municipal real estate taxes, over a three year period, on new houses erected before the end of 1940, and to make loans, at low interest rates, to municipalities to enable them to undertake projects of a self-liquidating character.

The housing program has been further aided, and increased activity in the construction industry fostered by the exemption from sales tax of materials entering into the construction of houses and other buildings.

Under the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act, further progress has been made, in the development and conservation of water supplies, and the formation of community pasture areas where lands are not suitable for cultivation.

Appropriations have been made for the continuation, on a broader scale, of the Youth Training Program, and for its extension to include persons of older age.

Provision has been made for the complete nationalization of the Bank of Canada through the acquisition by the government of the ownership, in its entirety, of the capital stock of the Bank.

The Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada has been superseded by a Board of Transport Commissioners, with authority in respect of transport by air and water, as well as by rail.

The trans-Canada air service is now operating a regular air mail schedule over a considerable area of the Dominion. It is expected that, at an early date, a coast to coast service will be in operation.

The provisions of the Criminal Code relating to the improper driving of motor vehicles have been made more stringent. Other important amendments have been adopted.

The War Veterans' Allowance Act has been amended to provide for veterans who, although not totally incapacitated, are incapable of maintaining themselves, and for those who served in South Africa and were domiciled in Canada at the time of their enlistment.

The registration of shop cards has been authorized, a measure which has been advocated for many years by labour unions in Canada.

The Special Committee of the House of Commons on Elections and Franchise Acts has given careful study to the means employed to effect redistribution in Canada and other countries, and to proposals with respect to political expenditures. A new Dominion Elections Act has been enacted.

Considerable progress has been made in the negotiations which, for several months past, have been carried on with the Government of the United States, with a view to revising and extending the Trade Agreement concluded in 1935. It is hoped the negotiations will result in a comprehensive Agreement, which will facilitate the further development of trade between the two countries.
